Hispanic Heritage Month marked by many events

"500 Years of Hispanic Heritage, 1492-1992 A Cultural Mosaic" is the theme for this year's Hispanic Heritage Month, which kicks off its celebration with a cultural Mass at 5 p.m. Saturday in the Reese Chapel. Spanish music will be performed by Lubbock's "Cipriano". The Mass will be conducted by Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Thomas Fey. Immediately following the mass, there will be a fellowship featuring light Mexican delicacies.

"The events are open to all wing members," said 2nd Lt. Carol Chavez, HHM project officer. "The events are an opportunity for people of different backgrounds to learn about Hispanic culture."

Other events throughout the month include:

□ An Hispanic culture questionnaire contest will be circulated to students at Reese

Elementary. The questionnaires are to be turned in to the school by Sept. 20.

First- and second-graders will be one division while third and fourth graders will be another. A third division will be open to all wing members and their dependents. Questionnaires for the third division can be picked up at the Reese Library.

Savings bonds will be awarded to the winner of each division.

□ The Reese Child Development Center will hold a coloring contest Monday through Sept. 20. The picture to be colored will be the month's logo. The best picture drawers will be presented prizes during a luncheon at 11:30 a.m. Sept. 25.

□ The library will have free chili all day (or until supplies run out) Wednesday. The library will also

have cultural displays all month.

□ The Windmill Lanes Bowling Center will have a "Luz de Luna" special at 7 p.m. Sept. 21. The cost is \$7 for three games and all the barbecue you can eat and beverage.

□ The Reese Youth Center will host a cultural day Sept. 22 at 1 p.m. There will be pinatas for children and make-your-own tacos for 25 cents each.

Savings bonds will be presented to the winners of the Reese Elementary culture questionnaire contest. Folkloric dancers will also be performing.

□ The Reese Main Exchange will host a cultural day Sept. 28 in the gazebo. A band will perform at noon. Folkloric dancers are performing a show of traditional Mexican dances at 1 p.m.

Wing sets sights on CFC goal of \$93,000

The 1991 Combined Federal Campaign will kick off with a luncheon at 11:30 a.m. Thursday in the Officers' Open Mess.

This year's goal for Reese is \$93,000.

"The goal is not as high as last year's \$100,000 since we have fewer military members and civilians since that time," said Lt. Col. Joseph Buchwald, CFC project officer. "I don't think we should have a problem with meeting the goal."

This year, plaques will be given to squadrons who have 50 percent or more participation or 30 percent participation in level II (individuals who donate one hour's pay per month). Those individuals contributing to level II will receive a CFC mug.

"We expect over 70 percent participation this year," Colonel Buchwald said.

The colonel noted that through CFC, wing members are able to provide assistance to a great number of people in a variety of ways. He added that various youth organizations, such as the Reese Youth Center, benefit from the campaign.

Wing members have several options in making their contribution during the 43-day drive, which ends Oct. 31. Individuals can have their donation go to one or up to five of

the 600-plus national agencies listed in the CFC brochure. The brochure includes Lubbock organizations that have been approved by the local CFC coordinating committee.

Donations can be made through cash, check or through payroll deductions.

Keyworkers have been appointed for base units, they are:

□ 64th Flying Training Wing—Lt. Col. Tim House, 6412.

□ 64th Operations Group—1st Lt. Charley Richardson, 6468.

□ 64th Support Group—Maj. Leslie North, 3237.

□ 64th Medical Squadron—Capt. Suzanne Prileszky, 3341.

In addition to the base goal of \$93,000, contributions will also be sought from over 60 federal or government organizations in the local area such as Housing and Urban Development, Small Business Administration, ROTC units at Texas Tech, the Veteran's Administration and Armed Forces recruiters. The goal for the Reese-Lubbock area for this year is \$184,000.

"A lot of people help in the local community, as well as national organizations such as agencies trying to find cures for diseases," the colonel said. "They all need more money to fund such programs," he concluded.

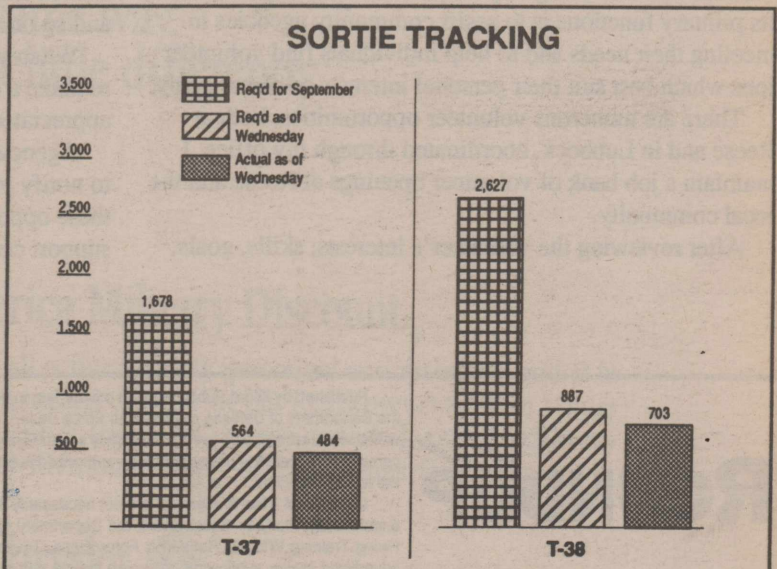

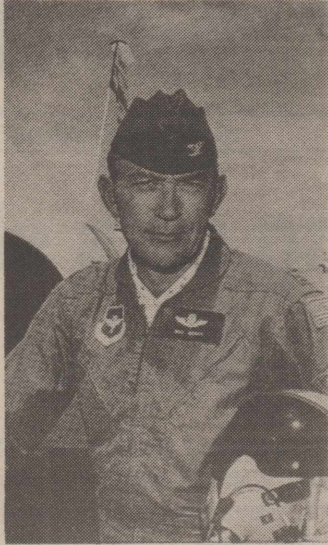

Someone once said, "Luck is the residue of good planning." This statement says a lot about the importance of exercises, like the MOBEX (mobility exercise) the wing underwent two weeks ago.



Changing world

In the light of the state of world affairs, it isn't any wonder why it's necessary that we remain vigilant. Some may question why they have to participate in exercises, since the exercise taskings are not normally a part of their everyday job.

The bottom line is that exercises are everyone's business. Readiness is the key ingredient in maintaining a capable military force, and readiness can only be achieved through a total team effort. Unless we give "100 percent" during these simulated contingencies, we won't be ready if and when the "real thing" comes along (like during Desert Storm/ Shield).

As for the issue of world tensions — the fact that the United States has always maintained a vigilant military has been instrumental in the change to the world scene. Continued progress on this front depends on our continued readiness.

You're vital

Whether your exercise role consists of being a security police augmentee, working with the shelter management team, or manning your duty section while co-workers perform their exercise duties, you are a vital part of mission accomplishment. There's no such thing as an unimpor-

tant job during a contingency.

So as we go through readiness exercises, give it your all. This assures our readiness for whatever may come. Enthusiasm and a sense of urgency are key ingredients to our success.

Safety considerations

One last thought — you can't do your job if you're in the hospital. Keep safety in mind as you go through any exercise — it could very well turn into a real-world contingency. Work expediently toward mission accomplishment, but do it safely.

Whether at work or during our leisure time activities, **keep safety** at the forefront. We need to sustain a healthy and viable force for successful mission accomplishment.

Special month

September marks two very special events at Reese. We will begin our observance of Hispanic Heritage Month on Sunday and the annual Combined Federal Campaign gets under way Thursday.

Each of these events deserves your consideration. The extent of your involvement is your choice, but I hope you will lend your support to both.

After reviewing the volunteer's interests, skills, goals,

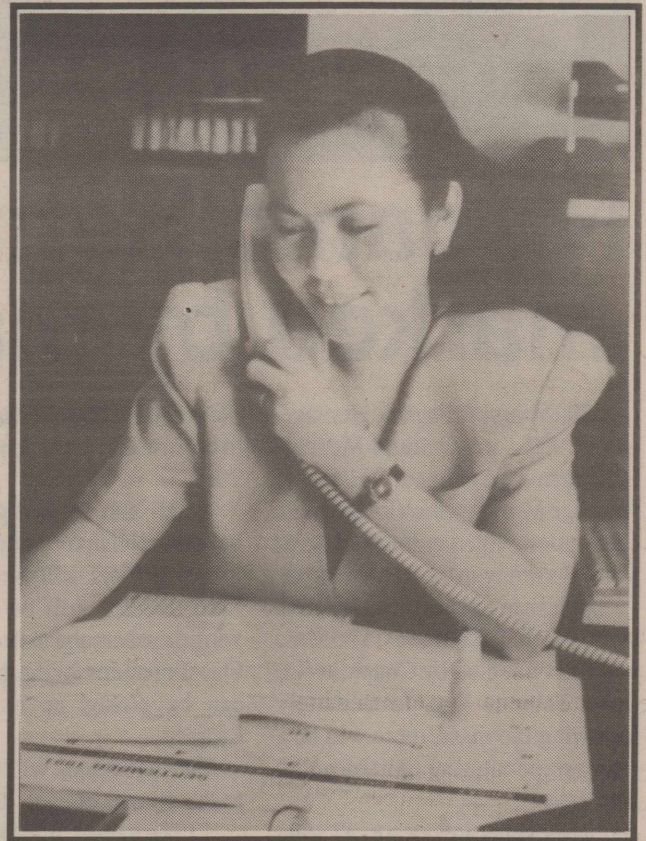
availability and previous work or volunteer experience, options for volunteer placement and placing the volunteer at his/her desired agency will be reviewed.

Have you ever considered the fact that you might be the only person in the world who could save the life of another human being?

Not many of us realize that we are able to give someone a few extra years of life. But there is one way you can be that "one in a million." It's easy, virtually painless, only takes about 30 minutes and makes you feel good when you're finished.

What is it, you ask? It's becoming a blood donor.

Most people get a little squeamish when they think about donating blood. They're afraid it will hurt or that they will pass out or get some dreaded disease.

First of all, giving blood does not hurt. An injection of penicillin is more painful than donating blood; you really don't feel the blood being drawn. As for getting light-headed and passing out — yes, that can happen, especially if you have not eaten before donating or if you are fatigued. However, help is there in the event you don't feel well after donating.

United Blood Services has fully qualified technicians in the room at all times who can assist if needed. You will be offered cookies and punch and you can even lie down until you're able to move without feeling light-headed.

With regard to getting a disease; forget it. Only brand new sterile needles and tubing are used when donating. There is virtually no way you could become

infected with any disease while donating blood.

Now, how would it make you feel to know that there are people out there who are totally disabled, can't talk or walk, but yet are willing to donate blood? It happened right here on Reese during a recent blood drive. Yet there are many able-bodied people who are "afraid" to give.

Folks, take two steps back and look at yourself. Who knows when you may be the one who is in that wheel-

chair, perhaps the victim of an automobile accident who had lost a vast amount of blood because of severe injuries. I'm sure you would hope there was someone out there who cared enough to donate so that your life might be saved.

This summer has been an especially tragic time in Lubbock, and blood supplies are running low. During Operation Desert Shield/Storm, people were more than willing to donate blood. Blood supplies were high at that time, but as soon as the war ended, blood donations decreased.

The need is still high today to treat the sick and injured. The last two blood drives here have been disappointing. The Lubbock community and UBS look to us as one of their principal blood sources, and it makes the base shine with the folks downtown when we have a high donation rate.

Our next blood drive is Oct. 10. Begin making preparations now so you can donate. In doing so, you will feel the satisfaction in knowing you've helped save a life.
