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Wing sets sights on **CFC goal of \$93,000**

The 1991 Combined Federal Campaign will kick off with a luncheon at 11:30 a.m. Thursday in the Officers' Open Mess.

This year's goal for Reese is \$93,000.

"The goal is not as high as last year's \$100,000 since we have fewer military members and civilians since that time," said Lt. Col. Joseph Buchwald, CFC project officer. "I don't think we should have a problem with meeting the goal."

This year, plaques will be given to squadrons who have @ percent or more participation or 30 percent participation in level II (individuals who donate one hour's pay per month). Those individuals contributing to level II will receive a CFC mug.

"We expect over 70 percent participation this year," Colonel Buchwald said.

The colonel noted that through CFC, wing members are able to provide assistance to a great number of people in a variety of ways. He added that various youth organizations, such as the Reese Youth Center, benefit from the campaign.

Wing members have several options in making their contribution during the 43-day drive, which ends Oct. 31. Individuals can have their donation go to one or up to five of programs," he concluded.



From my perspective

Someone once said, "Luck is the residue of good planning." This statement says a lot about the importance of exercises, like the MOBEX (mobility exercise) the wing underwent two weeks ago.

Changing world In the light of the state of world affairs,

it isn't any wonder why it's necessary that we remain vigilant. Some may question why they have to participate in exercises, since the exercise taskings are not normally a part of their everyday job.

The bottom line is that exercises are everyone's business. Readiness is the key ingredient in maintaining a capable military force, and readiness can only be achieved through a total team effort. Unless we give "100 percent" during these simulated contingencies, we won't be ready if and when the "real thing" comes along (like during Desert Storm/ Shield).

As for the issue of world tensions — the fact that the United States has always maintained a vigilant military has been instrumental in the change to the world scene. Continued progress on this front depends on our continued readiness.

You're vital

Whether your exercise role consists of being a security police augmentee, working with the shelter management team, or manning your duty section while co-workers perform their exercise duties, you are a vital part of mission accomplishment. There's no such thing as an unimportant job during a contingency.

So as we go through readiness exercises, give it your all. This assures our readiness for whatever may come. Enthusiasm and a sense of urgency are key ingredients to our success.

Safety considerations

One last thought — you can't do your job if you're in the hospital. Keep safety in mind as you go through any exercise — it could very well turn into a real-world contingency. Work expediently toward mission accomplishment, but do it safely.

Whether at work or during our leisure time activities, **keep safety** at the forefront. We need to sustain a healthy and viable force for successful mission accomplishment.

ave you ever considered the fact that you might be the only person in the world who could save the life of another human being?

Not many of us realize that we are able to give someone a few extra years of life. But there is one way you can be that "one in a million." It's easy, virtually painless, only takes about 30 minutes and makes you feel good when you're finished.

What is it, you ask? It's becoming a blood donor. Most people get a little squeamish when they think about donating blood. They're afraid it will hurt or that they will pass out or get some dreaded disease.

First of all, giving blood does not hurt. An injection of penicillin is more painful than donating blood; you really don't feel the blood being drawn. As for getting light-headed and passing out — yes, that can happen, especially if you have not eaten before donating or if you are fatigued. However, help is there in the event you don't feel well after donating.

United Blood Services has fully qualified technicians in the room at all times who can assist if needed. You will be offered cookies and punch and you can even lie down until you're able to move without feeling light-headed.

With regard to getting a disease; forget it. Only brand new sterile needles and tubing are used when donating. There is virtually no way you could become infected with any disease while donating blood.

Now, how would it make you feel to know that there are people out there who are totally disabled, can't talk or walk, but yet are willing to donate blood? It happened right here on Reese during a recent blood drive. Yet there are many able-bodied people who are "afraid" to give.

Folks, take two steps back and look at yourself. Who knows when you may be the one who is in that wheel-

Blooc A small effort can make you a lifesaver chair, perhaps the victim of an automobile accident who had lost a vast amount of blood because of severe injuries. I'm sure you would hope there was someone out there who cared enough to donate so that your life might be saved.

This summer has been an especially tragic time in Lubbock, and blood supplies are running low. During Operation Desert Shield/Storm, people were more than willing to donate blood. Blood supplies were high at that time, but as soon as the war ended, blood donations decreased.

The need is still high today to treat the sick and injured. The last two blood drives here have been disappointing. The Lubbock community and UBS look to us as one of their principal blood sources, and it makes the base shine with the folks downtown when we have a high donation rate.

Our next blood drive is Oct. 10. Begin making preparations now so you can donate. In doing so, you will feel the satisfaction in knowing you've helped save a life.





Remember, the men and women who made this country great are looking and counting on you to carry on their work and to make the ultimate sacrifice of their life worthwhile.



But most important, it will continue to be free. (Air Force News Service)





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
