## IPs, maintainers selected for 'Top Flight'

Reese pilots and maintainers look to build on the wing's past successes as Top Flight II at Vance AFB, Okla., wraps up today.

The two-day competition tests the capabilities of the command's pilot training wings. At Top Flight I in June, wing representatives took two first places and one second in the flying/maintenance competition.

Representing Reese at the current competition are "F" flight of the 35th Flying Training

Squadron, "G" flight in the 54th FTS, and Lockheed crew chiefs from both the T-37 and T-38 side. The two flying teams have four members each, while each maintenance squad consists of five.

While most of the maintainers were chosen locally and in advance, the pilots found out they were going to Vance late Tuesday morning. In addition, the eight wing aircraft for the competition were picked Tuesday. The pilot and aircraft selections were made at command headquarters.

This method of selection is designed to

make Top Flights an accurate gauge of the capabilities of each wing, as competing pilots have to go into the event without any prolonged or special preparation.

Pilots do have some preparation time, however, according to Capt. Steven Waters, wing project officers for Top Flight II. The T-37 team left Tuesday for Tinker AFB, Okla., and the T-38 team went to McConnell AFB, Kansas, the same day for a day-and-a-half of training.

The competition presents several challenges. "It's a very difficult sortie they'll fly," said

Captain Waters. "They'll be flying with command evaluators who pick up quite a bit of the details — the little things the guys do right or wrong."

Prior to the competition, competitors and other wing members were feeling confident about Reese's chances.

"I've got some pretty good guys here," said Capt. Ron Rednour, T-37 flight commander. "We want to represent Reese the best we can."

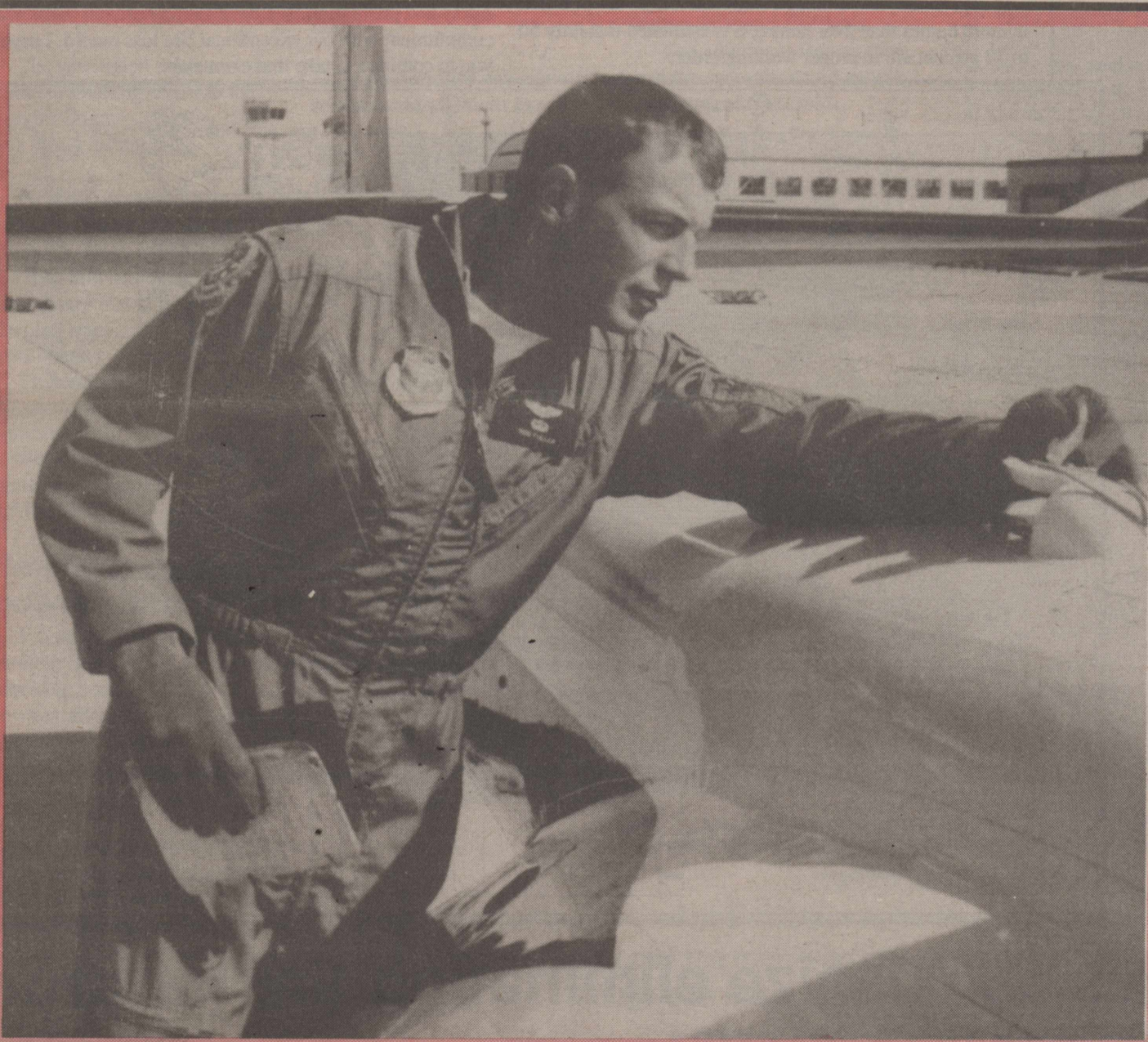
T-38 crew chief Tony Oliver made no secret of his optimism. "We plan on coming back with the trophy," he said with a grin.

Lockheed's maintenance operations manager T.O. Hilley added that all the crew chiefs had demonstrated their expertise before being picked for Top Flight II. "I know we've got a darn good team — no doubt about it."

Another factor in the pilots' favor is the experience several members have in major weapon system aircraft, such as fighters, bombers and transports. Captain Rednour has C-141s in his background, while Talon team chief Capt. Steve Worcester and Captain Brian McCullough have flown fighters. Competitors at the first Top Flight said that MWS experience was a key for the team from Sheppard AFB, Texas, which took the top wing award.

On the lighter side of competition, Reese will defend the Top Flight crud championship they captured in June. A mix of Tweet and Talon pilots will take up the challenge to their crud crown.

Results of Top Flight II are due out tonight, and details will appear in the Oct. 11 Roundup.

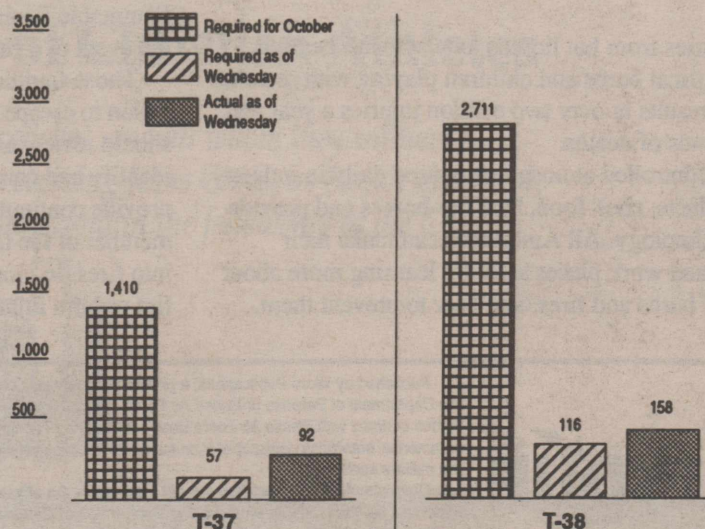

This project will resurface and repair all streets in military family housing and will be phased so as to limit inconvenience. Be prepared to temporarily move your vehicles, because parking will be affected on streets being resurfaced.

The project will continue through December with each section of street being closed for approximately a week.

We appreciate your continued support in making these mission and quality-of-life improvements. With Reese being over 50 years old, many of our facilities and streets desperately need repair or replacement.

We realize the burden caused by all the construction, but the end result will be a base that can continue to serve the Air Force for another 50 years.



## Wing leaders focus on fire safety

Oct. 6-12 is Fire Prevention Week. The National Fire Protection Association theme for 1991 is "Fire Won't Wait, Plan Your Escape."

It was in October 1922 that President Warren Harding proclaimed this nation's first Fire Prevention Week. It has been observed every year since to serve as a reminder of one of America's worst fires — Chicago Oct. 9, 1871. This fire, remembered as the Great Chicago Fire, destroyed over 17,000 buildings and took 250 lives, causing \$168 million in destruction. Tragic fire losses, in both lives and property destruction, continue to occur despite great technological advances made in fire protection engineering, fire prevention, and fire safety education. There were over 11,000 U. S. fire deaths in 1913, compared to approximately 6,000 in 1989. Although

this represents a significant reduction, we must continually strive to completely eliminate this tragic destruction.

The total fire loss for the Air Force during fiscal year '90 was over \$3 million, which is a reduction over previous years. We have demonstrated with new, innovative ideas and education programs that fire prevention works. Reese had a "zero" dollar fire loss for fiscal year '91, a fact we all can be extremely proud of.

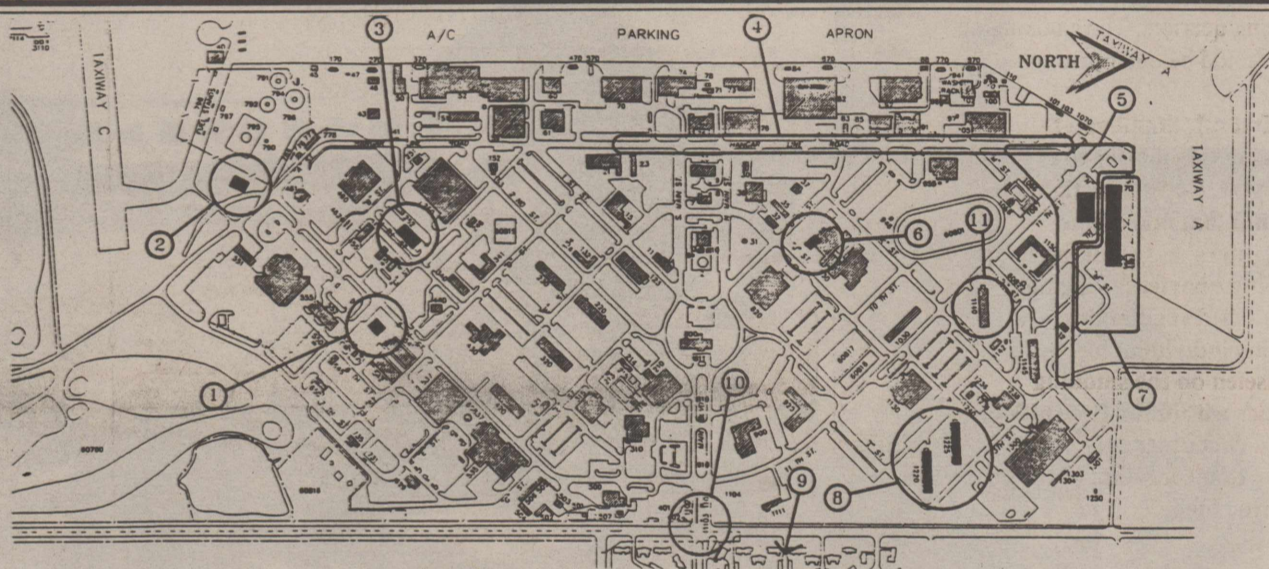
During the February inspector general visit, the team cited Reese's involvement with the fire safety house and child safety programs as a first in the Air Force and the best seen. Your effort and support has helped to create a foundation to prevent needless destruction, injuries and loss of life. During this week, various fire safety programs will be conducted. I strongly encourage participation by the Reese community and urge all commanders and supervisors to stay involved and continue to lead the way in ATC with the best fire prevention program ever.

## Week's activities emphasize eliminating fire hazards

Each year in October, Fire Prevention Week is observed with special emphasis on reducing or eliminating a villain that kills over 6,000 men, women and children each year.

Burn injuries from hot liquids, contact with heating devices, electrical burns and children playing with matches and lighters results in over two million injuries a year and many thousands of deaths.

Fire in a controlled atmosphere is used daily in industry to make products, cook food, heat our homes and provide advanced technology. All Americans can make their homes, cars and work places safer by learning more about the causes of burns and fires, and how to prevent them.

One of the most important steps we can take is testing and maintaining the smoke detectors in our homes.

Developing good safety habits is critical. For example, children and adults should learn the safe use of stoves, microwave ovens and portable heaters; the storage of flammable liquids such as gasoline; and proper reaction in the event of a fire.

Those families that have not yet done so should develop a plan to escape a house fire, and every family member should review and practice the plan. Make every effort to identify and correct any fire hazard within your home and provide continuing education and supervision to every member of the family to prevent fire hazards from turning into fires. In most cases people plus carelessness leads to fire or burn injuries.

When fires do occur we must be ready for immediate action. Each member of the family old enough to recognize the sound of the smoke detector should be educated on the actions to take. In situations involving infants, handicapped, or the elderly, adults should have the added responsibility of ensuring their safety and escape.

Reacting to a fire in the middle of the night when asleep can be the most traumatic experience any person or family can go through. The fire prevention office on base can provide detailed step-by-step procedures and recommendations on how to escape a burning building. Fire department members are here to assist you in any way possible at any time.

We must all remember that fire can strike anyone at anytime!

## From YOUR perspective

As wing commander, I need to hear things "from YOUR perspective." Your inputs and suggestions can help Reese remain the pacesetter in the command. If you see something good, call me. If you have a problem that you feel needs my attention, call me. First, however, consider using your chain of command.

You may remain anonymous if you wish, but those who leave their name and number can get a direct response to their call. Calls can be made to the Careline 24 hours a day at 3273.

### Smoking in the fire department

I'm calling about cigarette smoke getting into the sleeping quarters of the fire department. I'm not against smoking, but I don't want to sleep in smoke. It affects my health and job performance.

The ventilation carries smoke from the smoking area into the sleeping quarters. The smoking area should be outdoors.

First off, thank you for bringing this matter to my attention. Upon investigation, I did find that one of our firefighters was smoking in his sleeping quarters — against established regulations.

This individual has been counseled on the smoking policies within the fire station. If you encounter this problem again, don't hesitate to contact the fire chief.

### Smoking on the bowling lanes

I'm part of the intramural bowling league, and I think there should be consideration given to bowlers who don't smoke. It's just too smoky in there — smokers should step outside if they need to smoke that badly.

Air Force Regulation 30-27 allows smoking in recreational/leisure facilities where smoking was permitted prior to the regulation implementation date of July 1988. The bowling

center met this requirement.

We have tried to accommodate both smokers and non-smokers by only allowing smoking in the lounge area. Smoking is not permitted in the pit or dining areas.

Additionally, we have installed air circulators and cleaners in the lounge area and will continue to actively review the situation to find ways to improve the center environment.

### Speeding in the housing area

I'm calling about people speeding in housing, up and down the street in front of our home. It looks as though people are driving 40-45 mph coming off the base.

Maybe a couple of speed bumps would slow down traffic. There are a lot of kids out here and I'm afraid someone will be hurt.

Security police will initiate selective enforcement in your

area and cite offenders as warranted. In addition, if you observe a violator, try to obtain a description of the vehicle, operator and a license plate number, then notify the security police desk sergeant at 3333 and file a traffic complaint.

The security police will in turn conduct an investigation based on your complaint. If you have any further problems, please don't hesitate to call security police 24 hours a day.

### Indoor tennis court on base?

I would like to see Reese build an indoor tennis court.

Thank you for your interest in tennis. We have looked into the cost associated with enclosing one of our current courts — about \$250,000. Unfortunately, we don't have that kind of money to spend on tennis.

# Reese over 78 percent of CFC goal

The 1991 Combined Federal Campaign at Reese has finished its second week, and the wing has contributed \$72,358 of its \$93,000 goal as of Wednesday morning.

The campaign got under way with a Sept. 19 luncheon and it runs through Oct. 31.

The 64th Operations Group sur-

passed their goal as of Wednesday morning with donations of \$51,256; their goal was \$47,000. The 64th Support Group is at the halfway mark with donations of \$18,028; their goal is \$37,000. The 64th Medical Squadron has raised \$3,074, toward their goal.

"All the units are doing great since

we are only in our second week of the campaign," Lt. Col. Joseph Buchwald, CFC project officer.

In a similar note, Lockheed has its own United Way drive and has reached its goal. Lockheed does not participate in CFC since it's not a federal agency. They have raised \$16,838; their goal was \$16,250.

Lockheed reached its goal with only 42 percent of their employees reporting so far.

"They have really outdone themselves," Colonel Buchwald said. "Last year they raised a total of \$2,789, but have contributed eight times as much this year."

A master sergeant from the 64th

Logistics Squadron earned the "leadership award" with a contribution of \$1,000, while a lieutenant colonel from the 64th Mission Support Squadron earned the gold award (donation of \$750-\$999). A major, also from MSS, earned the silver award (donation of \$500-\$749).

Retired Brig. Gen. Richard A. "Ish" Ingram focused his remarks on the importance of telling the airpower heritage story, particularly to youth.

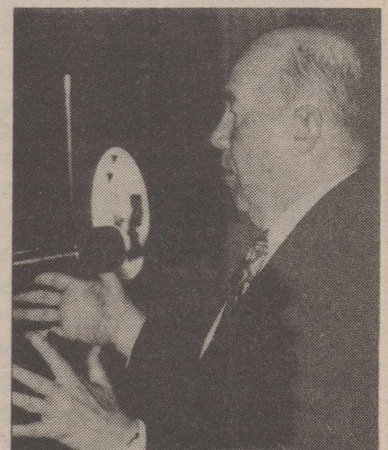
