## Tech game to honor veterans

Billed by some football experts as a probable war, Saturday's Texas Tech football game against Arkansas at Jones Stadium will have definite military overtones.

The game, which kicks off at noon and will be broadcast on KJTV 34, will feature a pregame salute to all military veterans and a halftime salute to the South Plain's Desert Storm veterans.

Tech is providing complimentary passes to more than 600 area Desert Storm veterans, including several from Reese. In addition, 114 discount tickets to the game were purchased by Reese people through the Information Ticket and Tour office.

The pregame salute will feature a four-ship T-38 fly-by. The fly-by will be led by Lt. Col. Bob Millican, a Texas Tech graduate. Other Tech alumni in the fly-by are Capt. Andy Smith, Capt. Jim Gregory, 1st Lt. Casey Stewart and 1st Lt. Tom Jeffrey. The other members of the fly-by team will be Capt. Don Ross, Capt. Steve Adkins and Capt. Alan Shafer. Capt. Brooks Poland will coordinate the flyover from the ground and Capt. Kirk Willburger and Capt. Bob Faughn will fly an airborne back-up.

Reese's Color Guard and Firing Party will also participate. The Reese 50-state flag team will participate in the halftime ceremony as will area Desert Storm veterans.

The Morale, Welfare and Recreation flight

has arranged for transportation to the game for Reese Desert Storm veterans. Those wanting to ride to Jones Stadium should make a reservation by calling Dee Marino at Ext. 3800. Reservations must be made by 3 p.m. today. Desert Storm transportation will leave the Mathis Recreation Center at 10:15

## Lt. Col. Brooks selected for promotion

Lt. Col. Bob Brooks, special assistant to the 64th Operations Group commander for T-1A Activation and Reorganization, has been selected for promotion to colonel.

Colonel Brooks' selection was announced Tuesday. He was one of 19 line officers in Air Training Command selected. Air Force wide, 45 percent of the eligibles were selected.

Colonel Brooks is on his third assignment at Reese. He originally came to Lubbock in 1967 as an instructor pilot, fresh from undergraduate pilot training at Laredo AFB, Texas. The Florida State graduate served as an IP here for more than three years.

In 1971, the colonel went to Southeast Asia, flying more than 300 combat hours in the C-130 Hercules. A tour as a T-37 Pilot

Instructor Training IP at Randolph followed in 1972 and in 1975 Colonel Brooks was selected for a teaching assignment at the Air Force Academy.

It's quite possible that the Academy might have been Colonel Brooks' last assignment. In 1976 he elected to leave the Air Force for private business in Florida.

"It was the biggest mistake in my life," said the colonel. "I knew it almost immediately."

To keep keep contact with the military community, the colonel joined the Air Force reserves. In 1979 he took advantage of an Air Force pilot recall program and asked to be assigned as a T-37 IP at Reese.

"Until you are away from the Air Force," said the colonel. "You don't really appreciate the professionalism, commitment and sense of belonging that

## Reese tops CFC goal with \$101,979

Reese's unwavering commitment to caring blazed brightly again as the wing contributed nearly \$102,000 to shatter its ambitious Combined Federal Campaign goal for 1991.

The wing's total of \$101,979 was nearly \$9,000 over its goal of \$93,000. The annual campaign of federal employees benefits hundreds of local, national and international health and service organizations.

Many of these organizations also received support from Lockheed, which contributed more than \$21,000 through the United Way campaign.

"We knew that \$93,000 was a tough target," said Lt. Col. Joseph Buchwald, CFC Project Officer. "But the keyworkers did a

great job of getting the word out and the wing response was fantastic.

It was far more than wing officials had hoped for. The per capita contribution actually increased from last year's campaign. Based on 1,757 eligible participants, the average individual contribution was \$58. That's a \$7 increase over 1990 when the wing averaged \$51 from 2,039 eligible participants.

Colonel Buchwald cited his four primary key workers: Lt. Col Tim House, 64th FTW staff; Chaplain (Maj) Leslie North, 64th Support Group; Capt. Suzanne Prileszky, 64th Medical Squadron; and 1st Lt. Charley Richardson, 64th Operations Group.

The individual contributions by these organizations were: 64th Operations Group — \$60,614 (127 percent of unit goal), 64th Support Group — \$33,439 (includes wing staff) and 64th Medical Squadron — \$7,926.

"The real heroes of this campaign are the unit key workers who made sure that everyone on Reese had the opportunity to participate in this drive," said the colonel.

Unit key workers included: 1st Lt. Donald Jones, 35th Flying Training Squadron; 1st Lt. Val Bigger, 64th Operational Support Squadron; 1st Lt. David Claus, 52nd FTS; 2nd Lt. Marco Criscione, 54th FTS; 1st Lt. Patrick Perkins, 64th Logistics Squadron; Sgt. Dan

## From my perspective

The Air Force Sergeants Association started its annual membership campaign here Nov. 1.

AFSA is a non-profit professional association for enlisted Air Force, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve members of all ranks.

The association was originally created to provide a "voice" to speak for the enlisted community regarding pending legislation before Congress. Today, with more than 165,000 members, that "voice" is strong indeed.

AFSA has been instrumental in gaining congressional support for the creation of the survivor benefit plan, achieving equity in officer and enlisted hazardous duty pay, ensuring enlisted flight crew members at least 120 days notice prior to removal from flying status, and ensuring passage of the new Montgomery G.I. Bill.

Another key legislative victory was the exemption of enlisted members from having to forfeit basic allowance for subsistence when receiving per diem travel payments.

In announcing the start of this year's campaign, MSgt. Joe Slack, our membership chairman, pointed out that AFSA is currently the only association designed to meet the needs of the enlisted members of the USAF, ANG and AFRES, both active duty and retired.

Noting that membership is entirely voluntary, Sergeant Slack went on to say that "AFSA gives us a chance to participate in the changes that are affecting our careers and lives. With all the defense budget cuts and instability in the Middle East, it pays to be well informed, and the association provides the most up-to-date information that applies to an enlisted Air Force member.

"In addition, our members are making a difference in the local community. Our chapter is a co-sponsor of the annual enlisted awards banquet, provides funds for scholarships through the enlisted wives club annual sweetheart ball, sponsors the Community College of the Air Force graduation ceremony, and has accepted the responsibility for the upkeep and maintenance of the Wolforth Cemetery, where several veterans are buried. To me that is what makes membership in the AFSA an exciting and worthwhile experience."

More than 450 people are now affiliated with Reese's Chapter 1068. Chapter president, SMSgt. Mike Braskett, expressed confidence that the campaign now under way will substantially increase this number.

In addition to legislative representation, members receive many benefits, including a subscription to the association magazine, SERGEANTS, and discount programs for insurance, prescription eyewear, motel and car rental, and more.

Membership in AFSA's Auxiliary is open to spouses and family members of those eligible for AFSA membership, including widows and widowers of those individuals. Auxiliary members enjoy many of the same benefits as AFSA members and receive a quarterly magazine, VIEWPOINT, geared to their special interests.

In order to avoid an accident during this three-day weekend, we all must adjust our driving techniques.

Dangerous driving situations caused by increased hours of darkness, rain, possible, sleet or snow depending where you drive may occur with increased frequency.

It is up to each one of us to be aware of the driving conditions and adjust our driving to match the conditions.

For those of the Reese community that will stay close to home, remember that many vehicle accidents happen within 25 miles of our homes, so be alert.

If we remember the effects of alcohol, penalties for driving and drinking, and the possibilities of a cold weather injury, we will all return to work on Tuesday, safe and well.

## AFR 35-10 tips keep members sharp, warm and professional

Reese is often in the Air Force spotlight due to student pilot graduations and various Air Force organizational tests. For this reason, it is important to brush-up on, and stay current with, Air Force Regulation 35-10 policies as well as Air Force customs and courtesies.

Recently, several uniform items have been phased out. These include the green fatigue uniform and the lightweight (poplin) blue jacket (shades 1157 and 3356). Organizational baseball caps are no longer authorized; only the three varieties of the battle dress uniform cap may now be worn.

As of Jan. 1, 1992, the white crew neck undershirt will also be phased out. These phased-out articles may no longer be worn. The Base Exchange and the Military Clothing store carry the authorized replacement items.

To stay warm this winter AFR 35-10 identifies a variety of uniform items that will keep the cold out. There are different types of gloves that can be worn including grey wool, black or grey leather, or black mittens. Your hands shouldn't be in your pockets. For warm headgear, either the blue or black stocking cap may be worn with BDU's or the flight suit and jacket from Oct. 1 to Mar. 31. Black, grey or blue plain ear muffs may be worn with all other uniforms, including service dress and the

pullover sweater. The blue winter cap may also be worn with the raincoat and the all weather coat. Keep your sweater at work, because jackets may not be worn indoors.

Ladies hair cannot exceed three inches in bulk, nor touch the bottom of your collar in the back while standing at the position of attention. Additionally, your bangs should not touch your eyebrows. If you pin your hair up, only plain and conservative barrettes, pins, or combs that match the color of your hair are authorized by AFR 35-10.

Even with these uniform reminders, no one can look sharp if they do not follow Air Force customs and courtesies. For example, salute always when outdoors and in uniform, except when a member of a detail or formation (only the senior member salutes) or when you are in a designated "covered" or "no salute" area. A good rule of thumb is, if you should have your hat on, you should be saluting. In addition, you must salute officers in government vehicles that have a flag or metal standard that identifies their rank as colonel or above. Keep in mind that these Air Force customs and courtesies are proven traditions that are acts of respect and courtesy when dealing with other people.

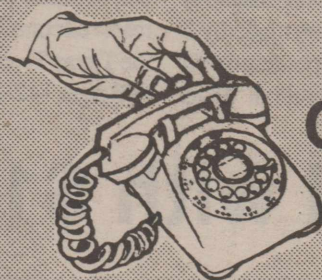

comes with being a member of the Air Force family. Clearly, coming back in the Air Force was the best decision I ever made." Back in the T-37F-Flight, he was selected for major and assigned as chief of the student branch here in 1980. In 1981 he served a tour at the Pentagon as chief of Special Pilot Training Programs and later as Executive to the Director of Personnel Programs. Colonel Brooks returned to Randolph in 1985 where he eventually became the 559th

FTS comamnder. In 1989 he became the Special Assistant to the ATC Commander for Tanker Transport Trainer Selection. In that position, the colonel helped the Air Force select the T-1A Jayhawk as the new trainer for Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training. Reese expects the first T-1A to arrive here in mid-January. Once the T-1A selection was made, the colonel was offered a chance to return to Reese, this time as the deputy air base group commander. In October 1990, six

months after returning to Reese, the colonel was assigned as the wing executive officer and Inspector General. Colonel Brooks and his wife Pat have two children, Michelle and Tara. "The Air Force has been very, very good to me," said Colonel Brooks. "I owe so many people so much, I couldn't begin to say thanks to everyone who deserves it. I just want everyone at Reese to know that I appreciate all of their support."

# Government vehicle accidents on the rise

Imagine one night you're tasked to drive a government vehicle and it's late and getting dark.

After a cursory glance over your shoulder, you back the government pickup out of the parking slot, when you hear a crunch and the sound of breaking glass.

Suddenly, your whole world changes. There are reports to fill out at the vehicle section, the security police, and now there's even a report of survey being done to determine financial liability.

Your section is also short one vehicle because replacement vehicles aren't available at Reese.

And if this wasn't enough, it turns out that you and your supervisor will have to go see the wing commander to explain how the wreck happened as well as what you'll do to prevent it from happening again.

You may be thinking that this is just another one of those articles that don't apply to you. Unfortunately, you're wrong. We've already had 17 reportable incidents/accidents with government vehicles this year. Of these 17 mishaps, 11 were the result of unsafe backing.

The people responsible for these accidents are being charged for the damage and may lose a sizeable amount of their monthly pay.

We're all responsible for the safe operation of government vehicles. From supervisor to operator, we must stress the safe operation of government vehicles.

Our accident rates at Reese are out of line with Air Training Command and Air Force averages. We can't allow this to keep happening.

Too often we become complacent in our work areas. We've made this turn or done this backing maneuver hundreds of times, so we get a little careless. During an operation such as Desert Shield/Desert Storm, losing a vehicle might prevent a part from getting to the airplane, or could injure the person responsible for fixing an airplane.

In addition to the normal safeguarding of government property, we must also prepare for our real world mission.

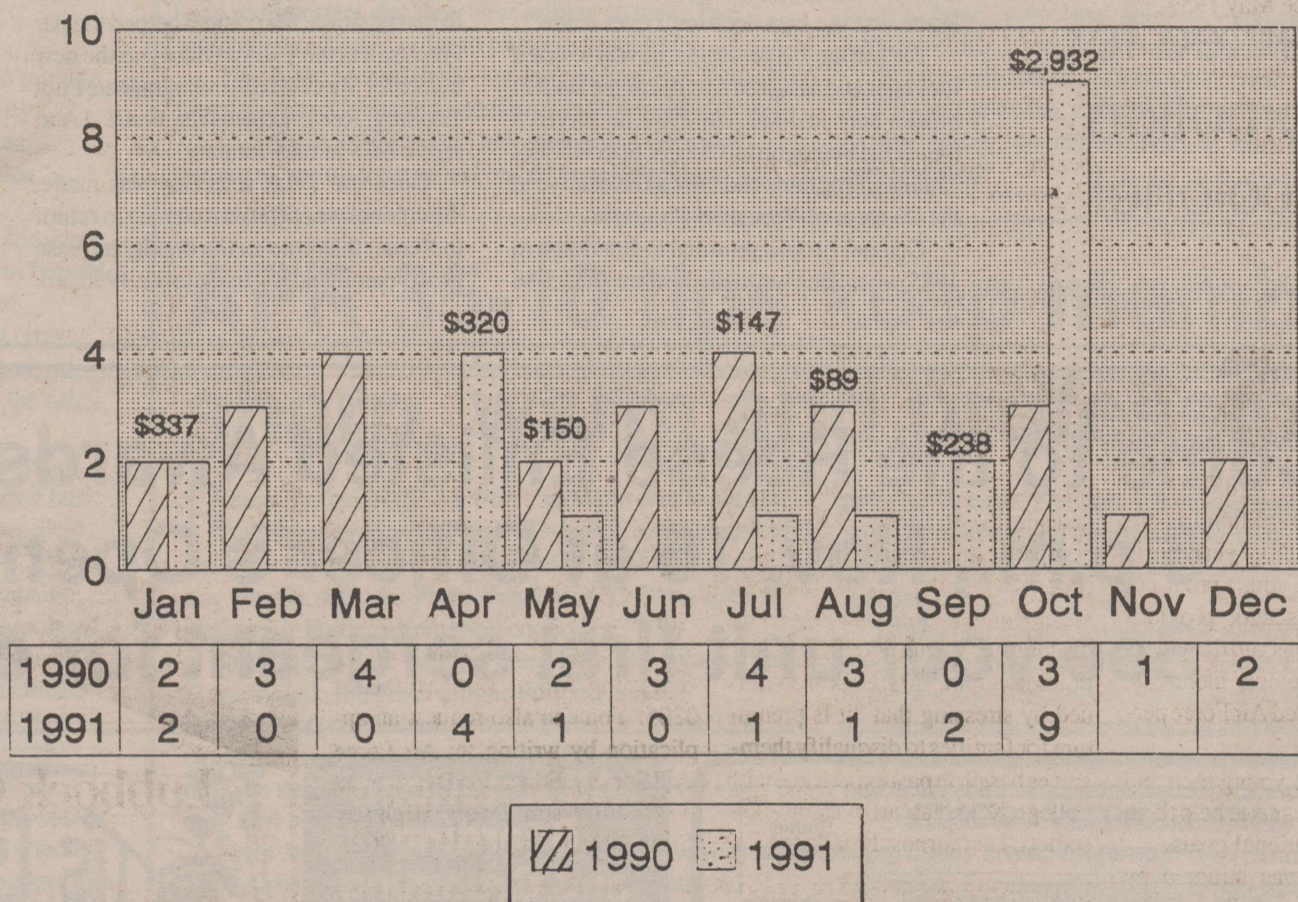
In these days of shrinking budgets and doing more with less, we really can't afford careless accidents. We must take the extra minute to make sure we have a spotter for backing and that the area behind the vehicle is clear. We can't allow complacency to slip into our everyday operations.

Vehicle accidents cost everyone money. At Reese, our vehicle maintenance is done by contract. The cost of all our accidents will be added into follow-on contracts. That's \$5,000

that could have been spent on people programs. This money will now be spent on vehicle repairs.

It's in everyone's best interest to keep our vehicles running safely. We all know that, but somehow we've let our guard down in supervision and operation. We have to stop this trend, one way or another. Let's find a way.

## Mission maker

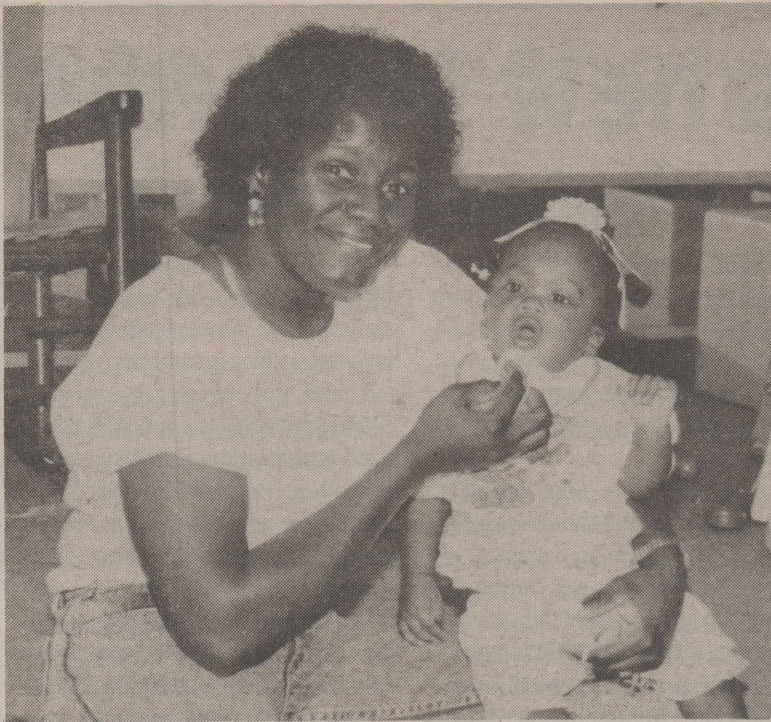
Many individuals enjoy spending time with children, but not six or seven at a time.

## AFAS awarding grants

The Air Force Aid Society awarded nearly \$4 million in education grants for school year 1991-92. The education grant program, begun three years ago, provides \$1,000 grants to sons and daughters of Air Force active duty members, retirees and deceased Air Force personnel.

This year, 3991 young men and women received grants to help them pursue their educational goals.


The program was initiated by the society's board of directors in 1986 in response to the rising costs of education, especially for the transient Air Force community. In its first year, the program was restricted to children of active duty personnel and 804 awards were provided. But the overwhelming response, reflected by the number of applicants, led society officials to expand the program to include children of retirees and deceased Air Force members. The number of possible awards has increased from the original 804 to 3991 this year; and the society expects to award 5,000 education grants for the upcoming academic year (1992-93).

Dory Larkin, the society's education program manager, though very pleased with the overall response to the program, did voice one concern. According to Ms. Larkin, "Too many applicants did not complete the entire application


process. Out of 8,205 initial applicants last year, nearly 1900 did not complete the second step of the process by submitting the financial statement and thus automatically disqualified themselves from selection for a grant." Ms. Larkin continued by stressing that "it is premature for families to disqualify themselves based on past experience with college financial aid systems. The society has purposely tailored our



# Air Force unveils new uniforms

## New look is streamlined, functional and comfortable

WASHINGTON — The new look for the Air Force is streamlined and functional, and gives Air Force people a more distinctive uniform, one that clearly identifies them as airmen, the chief of staff said.

Whether sitting down, standing or saluting, the new design is "a heck of a lot better," said Gen. Merrill A. McPeak. The armhole features a fuller cut and the move from four to three buttons opens up the front of the jacket. "I think it will really be a big hit with the troops

because it's so much more comfortable."

After three decades of wearing the uniform, the Air Force's top enlisted member agreed with McPeak. "This is probably the most comfortable uniform I've worn," CMSAF Gary R. Pfingston said at an Oct. 31 press conference unveiling the new attire.

"We are a dynamic Air Force and we're going to have an incredibly more dynamic Air Force," Pfingston said. "And I think it's time we designed something to lead us into the next century."

McPeak, Pfingston and Capt.

"We believe we have the best Air Force in the world," McGinn told the media. "As demonstrated in Desert Storm, airpower has come of age. And we believe the time is right for the United States Air Force to have a distinctive uniform that reflects our profession."

It will be a new look for the Air Force, uncluttered and with a high quality design and materials. "Understated elegance. A design that never ages," she said.

The Air Force has never had its own distinctive service dress uniform, specifically the coat, Air Force officials said. When the Air Force became a separate service in 1947 Congress wasn't willing to fund an Air Force uniform. When Congress finally agreed, the Air Force got its funding for a new blue uniform and by 1949 it was ready for distribution.

Basically, the style of the uni-

form all these years has been the same for the Army and Air Force except for the color. Over the years the color of the Air Force service dress uniform, the lapel and collar shape have changed, but not the basic design.

Gone are name tags, epaulets, metal rank insignia and collar insignia. The new design features, including color, rank and button design, are what make this service uniform distinctive, officials said. After examining the rank insignia of the other services, other countries' Air Forces and the aerospace industry, the Air Force has decided to wear-test a braided sleeve style rank insignia for officers, similar to that used by the Royal Air Force and the airline industry.

Enlisted members can look for bigger and bolder rank insignia on the new uniform. The Air Force will be wear-testing a chevron which can be worn on both the service dress and mess dress uniforms, eliminating the need for a separate, expensive mess dress chevron.

"It's a classy chevron that can be worn on both uniforms and the enlisted person doesn't have to come up with additional money out of his pocket," Pfingston said. There will also be a return to tradition with the addition of the star to all enlisted chevrons. And to provide greater recognition to the top three enlisted grades, another new design feature will be wear tested. Specifically, one stripe will

be taken off the bottom and put at the top starting with master sergeant. Senior master sergeant will have two stripes up with five down and chief, three up and five down.

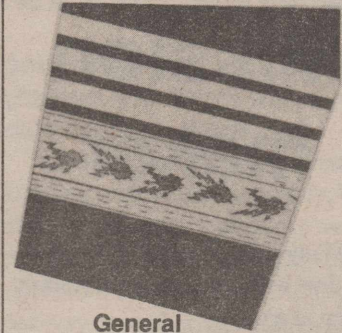

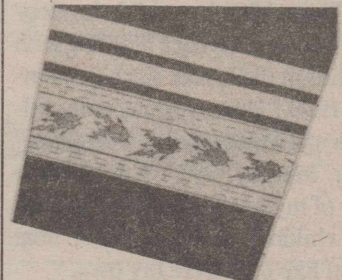
ing on the individual's rank, officials said. Air Force members currently spend about \$30.5 million on uniforms and accessories each year. When the new uniform is introduced, it's estimated that those costs will drop to \$27 million a year, an overall savings of \$3.5 million.

All too often Air Force members have been required to have uniforms they seldom wore, officials said. So senior leadership decided a review of the overall uniform program was needed, resulting in a three-phase program. Phase one eliminates the blue ceremonial and white ceremonial uniforms which became optional items in February. The distinctive new service coat design should suitably replace them at functions previously requiring those uniforms. Phase two is to redesign the service dress uniform with emphasis on style, comfort, fit, quality, mass producibility and customer satisfaction. Three different fabrics, (see New Uniforms, Page Eight)

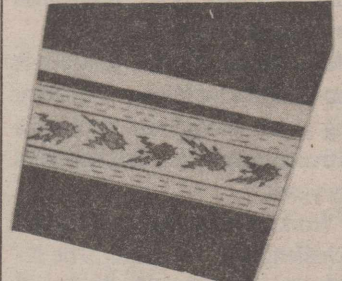

polyester-wool blends in different weaves, are also being wear-tested in this phase. Officials said the polyester-wool blends were chosen because they are easy for manufacturers to work with and, because of the fabric dyeing process, each item can be purchased as a separate rather than a uniform set. The type of wool being used will be warm during cold weather, and during hot weather will help wick away the moisture, officials said.

Also, the 88th Air Force Uniform Board approved a wear test of two new women's skirts with functional pockets. This wear test has been incorporated into the service dress coat wear test.

Phase three will involve reviewing other uniform clothing items, insignia and accouterments, and eliminating duplication where possible.

McPeak said the Air Force is looking at eliminating the service dress hat as a mandatory item.

The new uniform, in the full range of sizes, will be tried by 300 military members during the fit test. A fit assessment will be determined and a size prediction chart will be generated to help determine who should wear what size, based on their individual measurements.

It's an opportunity to identify and correct problems with the uniform prior to wear-test article-pro-

duction, officials said. The wear test will involve 800 participants and will address user comfort, acceptability, fit, appearance and ease of care. Any problems identified during wear testing will be corrected before mass production.

Senior leadership will "harden" on the final uniform design, fabric and rank insignia style after the wear test and an evaluation of the results. This evaluation will include comments from approximately 800 persons participating in the six-month wear test that is scheduled to start in May.

The three primary locations for the wear test are San Antonio, Washington, D.C., and Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio. The contract for the uniform was awarded to Red the Uniform Tailor Inc., May 30.

Research and development is scheduled to be completed in December 1992 with patterns and specifications being delivered to the procuring agencies by March 1993. The plan is to have the Army and Air Force Exchange Service introduce the new uniform through the military clothing sales stores. It should be available during May 1994.

The Defense Personnel Support Center plans deliveries to the recruit center at Lackland AFB, Texas, and military clothing sales stores starting in spring 1995. It could become mandatory in fiscal 1999.

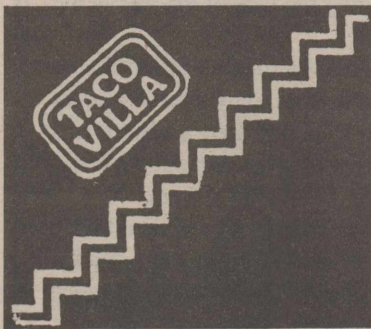

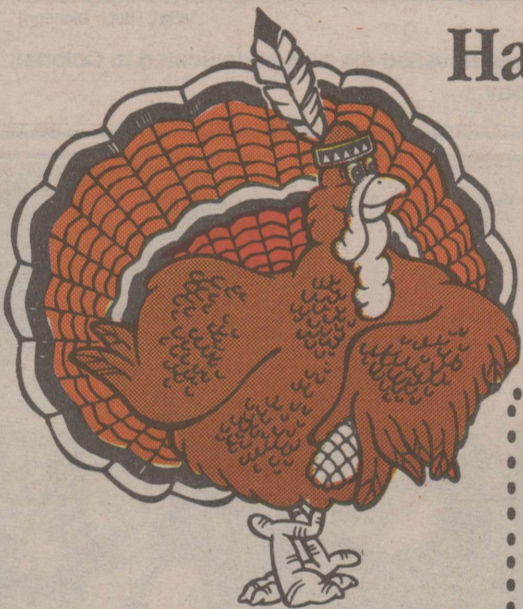

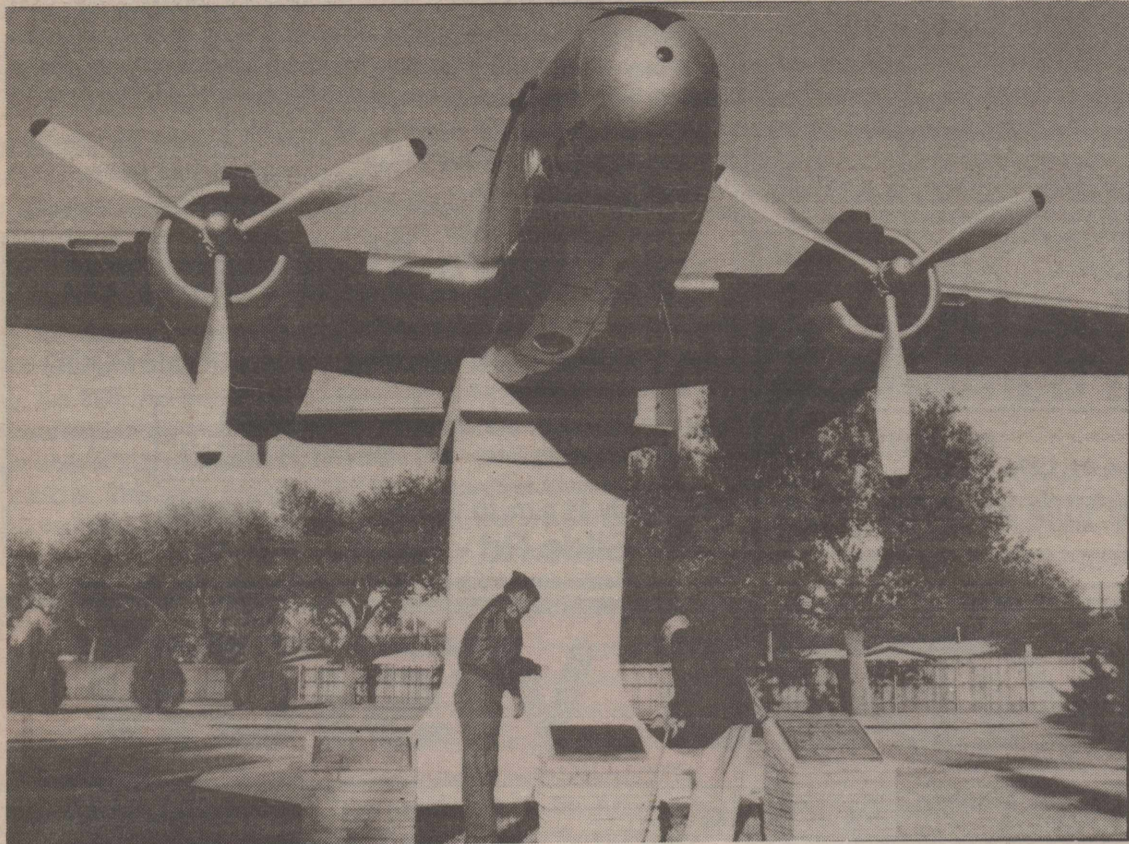

# B-25 dedication honors Lt. Col. McElroy

Colonel Robert Negley and Retired Lt. Col. Edgar McElroy unveiled the plaque dedicated to Colonel McElroy Wednesday during the B-25 dedication ceremony.

The heritage of Reese grew richer Wednesday with the dedication of a static display B-25 Mitchell to one of Doolittle's Raiders — retired Lt. Col. Edgar E. McElroy.

Col. Bob Negley, 64th Operations Group commander, presided over the 4 p.m. dedication ceremony.

"I'm in awe," said the colonel. "We modern-day pilots have so much technological support. It's hard to fathom how fliers such as Colonel McElroy accomplished what they did. I salute them all."

The dedication ceremony officially linked Reese to some of the most legendary names in the history of American Air Power. The B-25 is named after Gen. Billy Mitchell, who pioneered strategic bombing. The B-25 was flown by then Colonel Jimmy Doolittle in the first Allied air attack on Japan in World War II.

Colonel McElroy piloted the 13th of 16 B-25s in the Doolittle Raid on Tokyo. The raid is credited with

changing the face of the war in the Pacific.

The raid also made aviation history as the first and only time that an air strike by land-based bombers was launched from an American aircraft carrier — the USS Hornet.

Colonel McElroy lives in Lubbock. He and his wife Agnes are active in the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce Host Family Program.

The Reese B-25 was originally put on static display here in 1959. It was the alst B-25 to fly a training mission in Air Training Command.

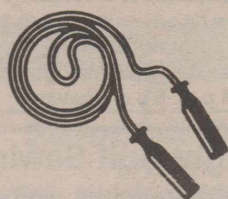
The second half began much like the first when another missed assignment allowed a quick two points for Empire.

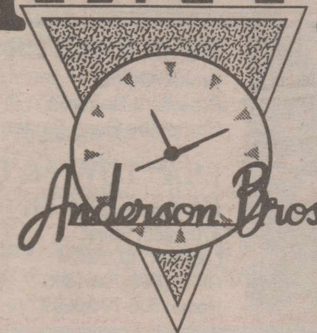

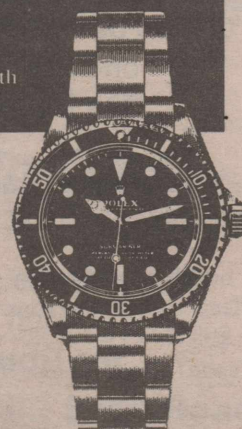
