64th FTW, ATC restructure New look to meet future airpower goals

The Organizational chart of the 64th Flying Training Wing and other bases throughout the Air Force are taking on a new look as the service restructures to meet tomorrow's airpower needs.

The restructuring was directed earlier this year by Gen. Merrill A. McPeak, Air Force Chief of Staff. Reese was one of the first bases to reorganize, serving as a test wing for the program since May. The 64th FTW was directed to implement the new organizational structure on Nov. 1.

As part of the Air Force restructuring effort, the other Air Training Command host flying wings reorganized this week. Technical training centers are scheduled to implement an objective center structure by February 1992, along lines similar to the wings.

"Reese showed the way in the command," said Col. Bill Henny, wing commander. "Our efforts during the test phase of reorganization helped define the structure of command and Air Force units well into the 21st Century."

Cols. Negley, Driskill appointed new wing roles

For the first time in its history, the wing will have a vice commander as Col. Bob Negley moves into the No. 2 spot Jan. 1.

Currently the 64th Operations Group commander, Colonel Negley will be replaced in ops by Col. Larry Driskill, the group deputy commander.

The addition of the vice commander slot is part of the wing reorganization.

Colonel Negley is a 25-year service veteran and native of New Jersey. He earned his commission through the ROTC program at Colgate University in Hamilton, N.Y.

His current tour at Reese began in April, and he served previous assignments here as an instructor pilot and as chief of CBPO. He is a command pilot with nearly 4,000 flying hours, including 400 combat hours in the OV-10 over Laos and Cambodia. He is married to the former Barbara Browne of Richland, Wash.

As the vice commander, Colonel Negley will also assume responsibility as inspector general for the wing. Colonel Negley

From the command perspective, Mr. Joe Lopez, chief of the organization branch at ATC headquarters manpower and organization directorate, said: "The concept of 'One base, one wing, one boss' brings all the tools at each base under one installation commander."

Referring to the tri-deputy structure set up by the Air Force in the early-1970's, Mr. Lopez said: "This is the most significant change in the Air Force (organization) in about 20 years."

The objective wing restructuring concept has group commanders instead of deputy commanders. As at Reese, the typical wing will now have a support group commander, operations group commander and a medical squadron commander reporting directly to the wing commander and vice commander. Training centers will also have a logistics group commander as will the 12th Flying Training Wing at Randolph (See ATC restructure Page 10)

said he looked forward to working in his new position.

"Since I took over ops in April, I've been continually impressed by the spirit and enthusiasm the people in the wing show," he said. "I have no doubt that I'll have more of an opportunity to see that can-do attitude as vice commander."

Colonel Driskill has been at Reese since July 1990. A native of Amarillo, he came on active duty in 1968. He's a 1968 graduate of West Texas State University, and he earned his commission through Officer Training School.

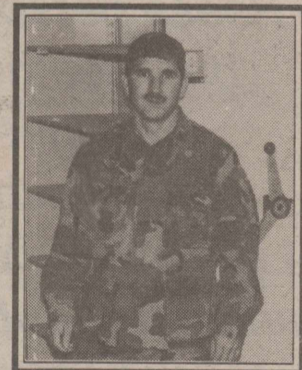
The colonel is also a command pilot and combat veteran, with approximately 5,000 hours, 932 of which are combat hours. Colonel Driskill is married to the former Patricia Gail Wiley of Amarillo.

Like Colonel Negley, Colonel Driskill is looking forward to his new duties.

"The wing has some of the finest pilots and instructors anywhere," he said. "It's a privilege for me to take over an organization with the caliber of people that this group has."

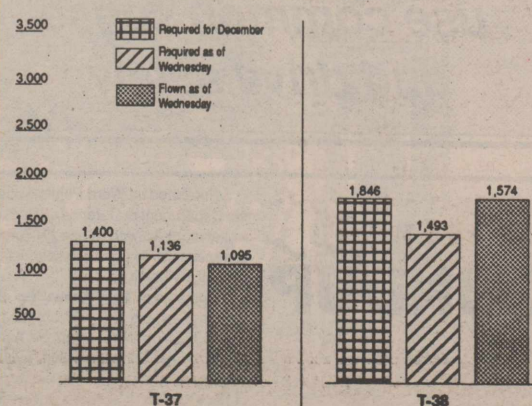

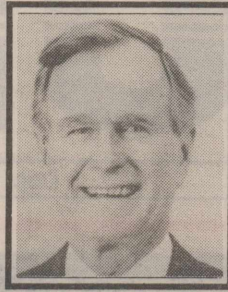
Regardless of your activities, the safety of your family, and you, depends on how you plan and execute your holiday plans.

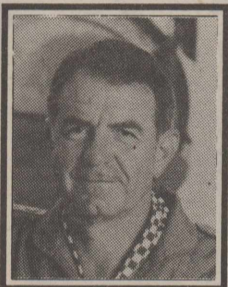

SP holiday safety tips

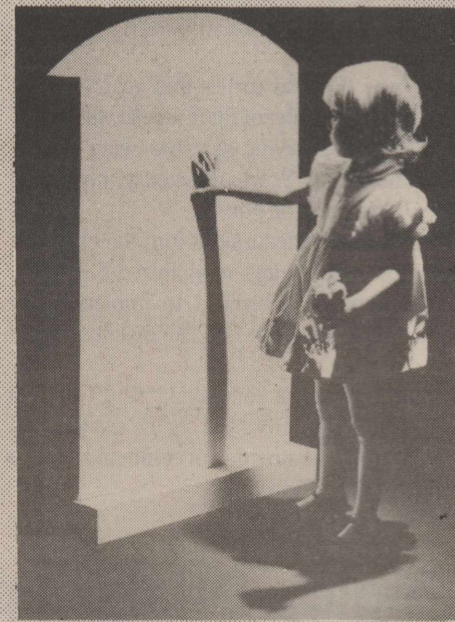
With the holidays upon us, the Security Police offer a few tips to help make your holidays safer:

'Penny for your thoughts'

'Two wing members win hundreds for suggestions

Two Reese employees will find welcome presents in their Christmas stocking this year — a check from Uncle Sam!

Capt. Robert Saenz, 64th Civil Engineering Squadron, saved the Air Force \$30,430 with his idea, and TSgt. Allen W. Hasty followed with his suggestion amounting to \$17,355 in intangible benefits.

Captain Saenz will receive \$1,613 and Sergeant Hasty, \$500. "When new methods cut cost, save time, materials, or simply remove bottlenecks, the Air Force Suggestion Program can return part of the saving to the suggester," said Ruedele Turner, suggestion program manager. "They weren't paid for having brains — but for using them!"

The award to Captain Saenz resulted from his suggestion to relocate space saver bins from Bldg. 552 to the civil engineering complex. This allowed a combination of jobs and eliminated one position in the process. "It took us several months to get the job done," said Captain Saenz. "But now we have a more efficient operation."

Military personnel as well as dependents are spending less time in the Dental Clinic as a result of Sergeant Hasty's suggestion. He proposed combining annual dental checkups with the cleaning appointment. "It saves at least thirty minutes driving and waiting time for every patient," he remarked.

"These awards point out two unique aspects of the

Suggestion Program," Mrs. Turner explained. "It's not a requirement to use only tangible savings as a basis for making cash awards. Intangible suggestions that result in partial man-hour savings, economy, safety, or extended equipment life may also be considered for monetary award when justified."

Awards cannot be paid until the idea is put into use and savings documented. The process begins with a review of the idea by the office of prime responsibility.

In ATC, suggestions must be evaluated within 10 calendar days at the local level.

"We're proud of Reese's record for evaluation time. It stems from supervisors willing to put a suggestion at the top of their work agenda and close follow-up by the unit suggestion monitors," continued Mrs. Turner. "When higher headquarters approval is required, it becomes more complicated. Even then, the suggestion continues to be followed by the program office until all action is complete."

"The Suggestion Program works hand-in-hand with other productivity programs; the Zero Overpricing Program and FASCAP, for example. A suggestion that saves, puts money in the bank — both yours and ours. Documenting those ideas on an Air Force Form 1000 is a first step. Call the Suggestion Office at 3148 if you need more information on productivity programs," Mrs. Turner concluded.

64th Flying Training Wing

The mission of the 64th Flying Training Wing is to train top quality military pilots with the greatest efficiency and minimum possible cost for today's Air Force.

The training that officers receive at Reese enables them to fly any aircraft in the Air Force inventory with only a short transition training period needed to familiarize them with the new aircraft.

There are normally about 450 students undergoing training and about 350 of them graduate on an annual basis. Besides U.S. Air Force officers, there are also officers from allied nations enrolled in UPT.

The aircraft inventory at Reese includes approximately 77 T-37B and 104 T-38A jet aircraft. Annually, Reese aircraft fly over 60,450 sorties while logging more than 80,500 flying hours.

In January, a new aircraft manufactured by Beechcraft and designated the T-1 "Jayhawk" will be added to the Reese inventory. (This will be a test aircraft and will be used to train instructor pilots for use in training under the specialized undergraduate pilot training concept to be introduced.)

CVQ

The mission of Quality Improvement is to assist the commander in all aspects of development, implementation and evaluation of base-level quality improvement programs. CVQ also assists base leaders at all levels in

assessing quality improvement needs and set up and facilitate quality improvement teams to improve base processes and services. (Conduct and coordinate quality improvement awareness and training programs.)

Safety

The mission of the Wing Safety Office is to preserve Air Force combat capability by helping the commander conserve resources while accomplishing the mission. Primary goals include—ensuring a safe work environment for

disasters, contingencies and HHQ inspections. The office also administers the wing's self-inspection program to ensure agency compliance with directives and regulatory guidance.

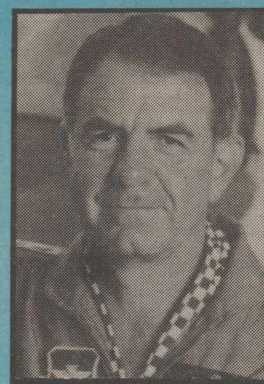
Executive Officer

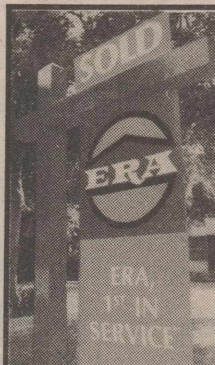

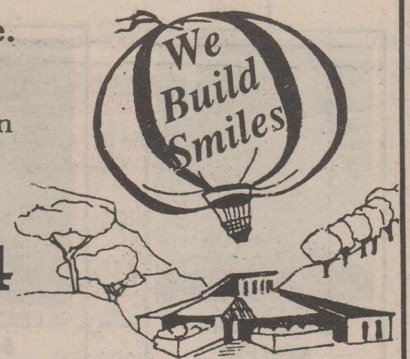

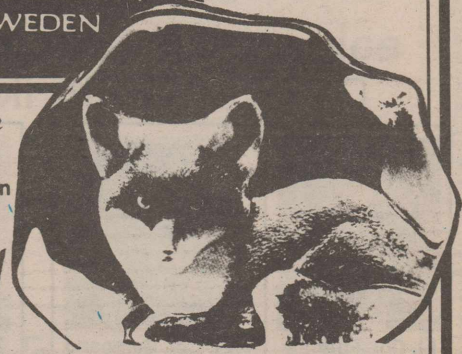

Comptroller

The mission of the Comptroller is to be responsible for all accounting, disbursing, budgeting, data automation, progress and statistical reporting, financial and resources management, related analyses, as well as the oversight function of NAF/MWR financial management. The following flight is assigned: Accounting and Finance.

Readiness and Command Post Flight

The mission of the Readiness and Command Post Flight is to propose, develop, integrate and monitor base readiness to peacetime contingencies and accomplish wartime contingencies, mobilization, and survival, recovery and reconstitution missions.

Judge Advocate

The mission of the Judge Advocate is to support the wing with legal matters. The legal office provides services to the commander, subordinate commanders, and members of the military community, as appropriate, in the areas of military justice, contracts, claims, environmental law, labor law, civil law, legal assistance and operations law.

64th Operations Group

The mission of the 64th Operations Group is to train student pilots in the academic, primary, and advanced phases of undergraduate pilot training. The group consists of four flying training squadrons (2 x T-37 and 2 x T-38), an Operations Support Squadron and two staff agencies (Maintenance QAE and Stan/Eval) working directly for the group commander.

The group conducts training using computer aided instruction, flight simulator and hands-on flying of T-37 and T-38 training aircraft. The academic phase teaches the student textbook principles of aviation. In the primary phase, the student gains flying experience in the T-37 aircraft. The advanced

phase trains the student on the T-38 high performance aircraft to prepare for follow-on assignment to fighter, bomber, tanker or transport weapon systems.

The group provides airfield management, weather support and air traffic services in support of flying operations. Also, the group oversees contracts for maintenance of T-37 and T-38 aircraft, simulator instruction and the computer system that supports student management.

T-37 Flying Training Squadrons

The mission of the T-37 Flying Training Squadrons (33rd and 35th FTS) is to train student pilots in the primary phase of undergraduate pilot training. Instructs principles and techniques used in flying T-37 aircraft. Schedules, supervises and flies aircraft and simulator sorties daily to train student pilots. Administratively responsible for all support activities for students and officers.

T-38 Flying Training Squadrons

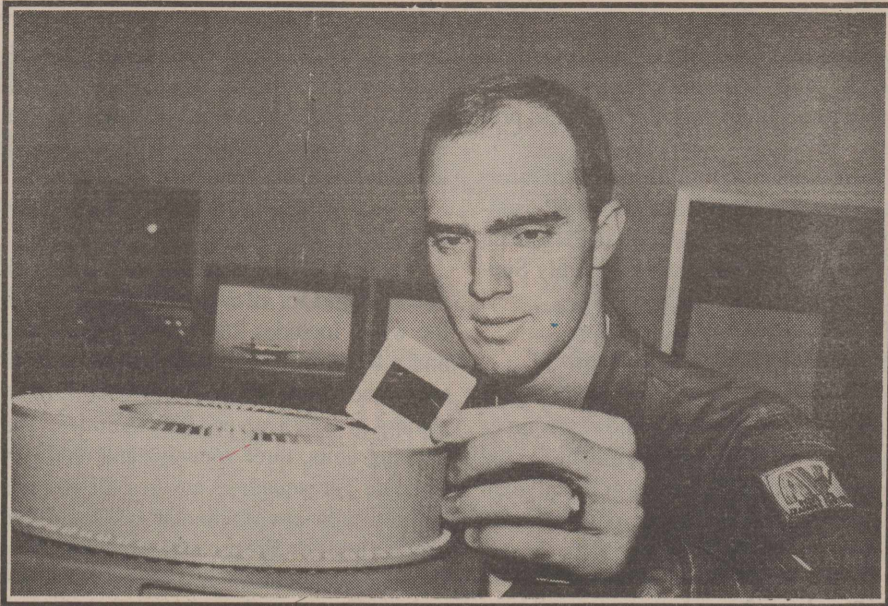
The mission of the T-38 Flying Training Squadrons (52nd and 54th FTS) is to train student pilots in the advanced phase of undergraduate pilot training. Instructs principles and techniques used in flying T-38 aircraft. Schedules, supervises and flies aircraft and simulator sorties daily to train student pilots. Provides the USAF with highly qualified pilots.

Lockheed

Lockheed Support Systems, Inc. has responsibility for organizational and intermediate level maintenance on assigned T-37 and T-38 aircraft, jet engines and associated test and ground support equipment. LSSI also provides maintenance support for Strategic Air Command Accelerated Co-pilot Enrichment Programs at three SAC bases.

64th Operations Support Squadron

The mission of the 64th Operations Support Squadron is to provide direct support to

Undergraduate Pilot Training, to include: flight and academic training, quality assurance of the contract simulator instruction airfield management, weather, air traffic control, flight records, life support, wing scheduling and airspace.

The following flights are assigned: Flying Training Flight, Ground Training Flight, Airfield Operations Flight, Provisional Flight and Weather Flight.

64th Support Group

The mission of the 64th Support Group is to provide logistical and base support services for accomplishment of the wing mission. This includes contracting, logistics support, housing and food services, security of the installation and facilities, communications and computer support, civil engineering, and military and civilian personnel support functions.

64th Logistics Squadron

The mission of the 64th Logistics Squad-

ron is to provide supply support to Reese T-37/T-38 aircraft; 376 customer accounts and five remote units. The squadron manages wing support agreements, War Reserve Materiel and mobility planning and deployment capabilities. They supervise operation and maintenance of all government vehicles. In addition to passenger/personal property support, they handle surface freight, packing and crating.

commanders at all levels. They provide the systems, services, resources and procedures to ensure maximum wartime readiness programs.

The following flights are assigned: Information Management Flight, Military Personnel Flight, PME Center, Civilian Personnel, Education, Social Actions and Family Support Center.

64th Security Police Squadron

The mission of the 64th Security Police Squadron is to support and protect resources for all assigned. The squadron also has a vital air base group defense mobility commitment of 13 people, standing ready for world wide deployment.

64th Services Squadron

The 64th Services Squadron is to provide facilities and leisure time activities that stimulate, develop and maintain the mental, physical and social well-being of personnel.

The following flights are assigned: Mission Flight, Business Activities Flight, Community Support Flight and Resources Management Flight.

64th Contracting Squadron

The 64th Contracting Squadron is responsible for solicitation, award and administration of all contract actions for the 64th Flying Training Wing. They directly support the wing mission by contracting for a wide range of base services, supply requirements and construction projects. They implement congressionally mandated socioeconomic programs and contingency contracting directives.

The following flights are assigned: Construction Flight, Management Analysis Flight, Services Flight and Commodities Flight.

64th Communications Squadron

The mission of the 64th Communications Squadron is to provide voice and record com-

munications, data automation and audio/visual services in support of the wing mission. It also operates and maintains navigational aids, ground radio service facilities and meteorological equipment.

64th Medical Squadron

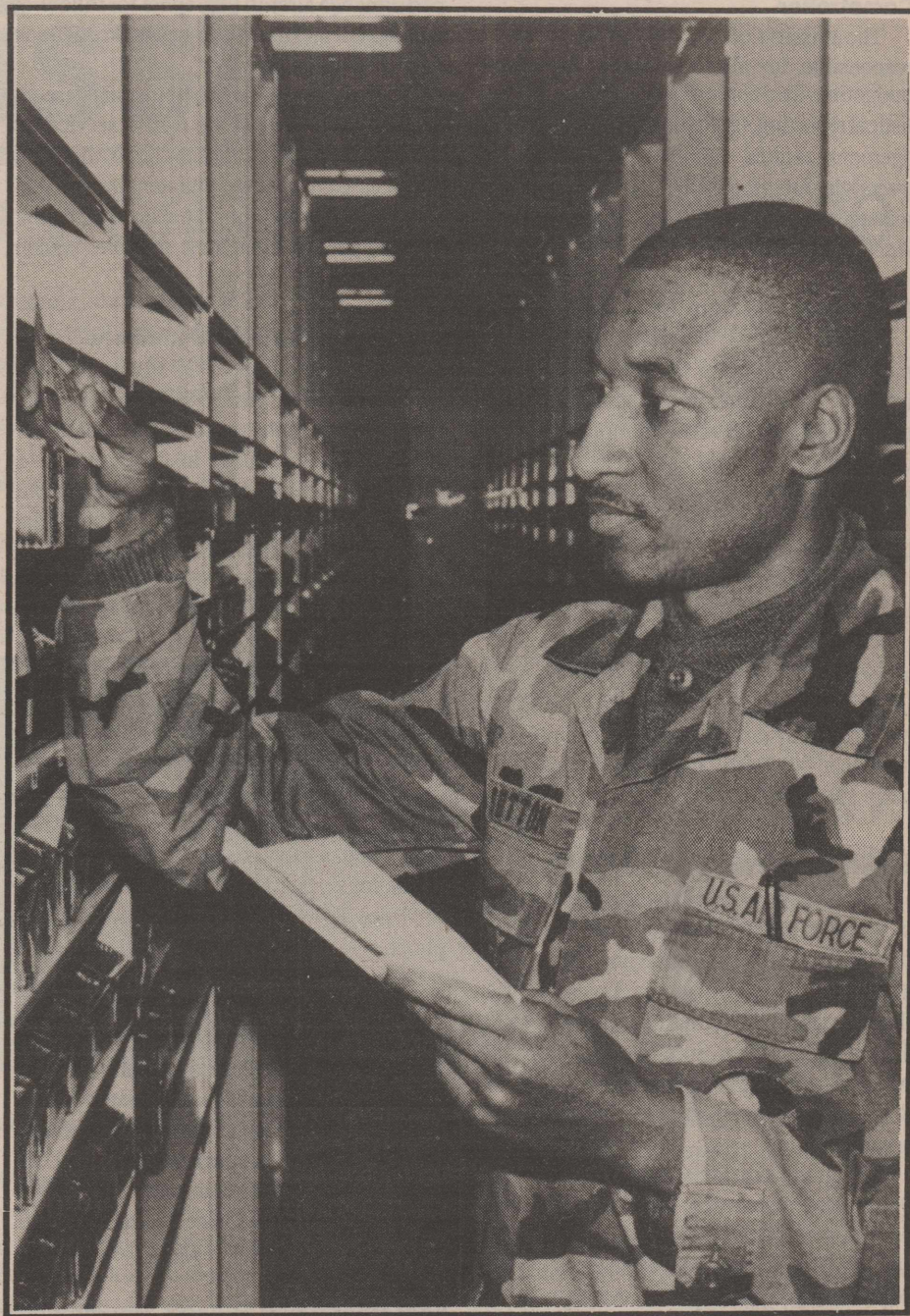

AFB, Texas.

Within the technical training centers, technical training wings will be called "groups" and will take the place that an operations group fills in the objective wing structure.

Within the group will be squadrons. Squadrons are broken down into flights.

Noting the success of the test program here, Lt. Col John Weis, chief of the ATC headquarters organizational resources division, said: "The structure works. People (at Reese) like the streamlined chain of command."

The Air Force chief of staff's goals for restructuring, as stated in an Air Force "White Paper," are to:

- Strengthen the chain of command.
- Decentralize the flow of power to people in the field.
- Streamline and flatten Air Force structure.
- Consolidate resources under one field commander.
- And, untangle organizational lines.

T-1 Site Activation Task Force

The people of the T-1 Site Activation Task Force exist to provide undergraduate pilot training students and instructors with the very best SUPT training system without the burden of acquisition minutiae. Our end customer is the pilot of the military transport on which we will someday fly.

Det. 2, 3307 Test and Evaluation Squadron (TES)

The primary mission of Det 2, 3307 TES is to conduct the follow-on operational test and evaluation (FOT&E) of the T-1A Training System at Reese.

This involves operational evaluation of T-1A aircraft, simulator and other related ground-based training components. In addition to the FOT&E, Det 2 provides personnel to the Air Force Operational Test and Evaluation Center's qualification operational test and evaluation (QOT&E) team and Aeronautical Systems Division's Site Activation Task Force (SATAF) also located at Reese.

The following flights are assigned: Logistics Flight and Operations Flight.

AFOTEC

The mission of the Air Force Operational Test and Evaluation Center (AFOTEC) Test Team is to conduct Qualification Operational Test Evaluation (QOT&E) of the T-1A Training System to evaluate the effectiveness and suitability of the aircraft and simulator to perform in an operational undergraduate pilot training environment and to identify deficiencies that would impact student pilot training.

Base Exchange

The mission of the Army and Air Force Exchange Service is to provide quality merchandise and services to soldiers and airmen around the world. The base exchange generates earnings to support the Morale, Welfare and Recreation programs of the Army and the Air Force.

OSI

The mission of the Air Force Office of Special Investigation is to provide the following services to all Air Force activities and Dep Department of Defense elements when the Air Force is responsible for administrative or logistical support; economic and general crimes investigation, antiterrorism and special investigative services.

Under the former tri-deputate system, deputy commanders had operational control, but no Uniform Code of Military Justice or command authority over people within their respective deputates.

Under the new structure, group commanders have Article 15 jurisdiction over the subordinates and Article 15 appeal authority over sub-

ordinate commanders' actions.

"Current force structure reductions, coupled with lessons learned from Desert Storm, make this a logical approach to maximize the utility of our shrinking manpower resource," Mr. Lopez said.
