Wing soars at inaugural **Top Flight**

Reese pilots, maintainers and aircraft shined at the command's first "Top Flight" competition at Laughlin AFB, Texas, taking first place in two categories and second in another.

T-37 maintainers from Lockheed were tops in their portion of the maintenance/operations competition during the June 13-14 event, while T-37 "Tweet" pilots took second in their division. T-38 maintainers from the wing were also very competitive, finishing strong. Likewise, "Talon" pilots performed well in a tight contest.

Two wing T-37s — tail nos. 2295 and 0341 — tied for first with 39 of 40 points in the aircraft appearance and sortie reliability category.

During Top Flight, competitors were tested in areas directly related to their daily mission. Pilots flew sorties with command flight examiners, while maintainers were judged on aircraft appearance, preflights, refueling and other maintenance functions.


Competitors and aircraft were randomly chosen by the command shortly before Top Flight. The short notice and random selection was designed to make the competition an accurate gauge of how well the pilot training wings are accomplishing their day-to-day

Though the competitors were doing what they do most every day, there were still some differences from their normal routine.

"During the sorties, the examiners who were with us wouldn't fly any of the maneuvers," Capt. William Russell of the T-37s operations team said, explaining that a student normally would. "They would give us a scenario that might say that the 'student' we were going to fly with hadn't flown in three weeks, and it would also say how he or she had flown. We would have to base our instruction on that scenario.

The Tweet pilots finished second behind Sheppard AFB, Texas. Captain Russell credited that team's experience as the factor that propelled them to victory.

From my perspective

e have completed our first month as Air Training Command's test base for the reorganization of wing structure.

May 14, we took the steps that were prescribed in the test plan: deactivated resource manage-

ment; moved aircraft
maintenance and the maintenance evaluation function
under the new operation group; formed a logistics
squadron from the supply, transportation and logistics
plans and placed it under the new support group along
with the new contracting squadron; moved the comptroller and legal divisions directly under the wing commander and redesignated the 41st Flying Training
Squadron as the 64th Operations Support Squadron
(with newly-acquired operations staff functions) and the
64th Flying Training Wing Hospital became the 64th
Medical Squadron.

Reorganization'kicks off'

That ceremony more than a month ago was much like the kickoff in a football game. The first play is over and now the action is beginning in earnest. We have been busy identifying potential areas of improvement as we look at ourselves through "reorganizational" glasses. I think that we are seeing some streamlining of the decision-making process at second leadership levels—and we expect more benefits to come as the remainder of the wing becomes interested and involved. It really is a great opportunity for us to try and mold the wing into the most effective framework.

The most exciting aspect of a project like this is the imagination and initiative that is unleashed. The almost limitless number of ideas that have been raised concerning methods for units to be better structured is gratifying. For example, in our mid-June report to the command, we are proposing the activation of a unit whose sole mission is to prepare the wing for contingencies. The unit includes readiness, the command post, logistics plans, BEET and disaster preparedness. Their main objective will be to ensure we can handle catastrophes like the Iraqi invasion, tornados and the like.

We have already merged the weather and base operations flights within the operations support squadron. We will propose that life support move into the maintenance support squadron in a combining of like duties. The wing suggested, and I believe the command will support, moving the communication squadron's air traffic control function into operations.

Other areas eyed

Currently, wing teams are looking at command post, orderly room and clerical functions as possible areas where additional streamlining may take place. In some cases, we hope to gain manpower savings over time. In all cases, we will gain efficiencies in the way our people work toward getting the mission done.

It is an exciting time. Each one of us is challenged with looking beyond the walls in which we normally work. The objective is not to do more with less — but to do our own job better. We all have had ideas on how we could be better aligned. Now is a great opportunity to work with the command to test your suggestions.

Our goal is to continuously improve the way we do business. I look forward to your suggestions.

Fourth of July fun can be a "fiery" fate. The use of fireworks at Reese, Reese Village and in Lubbock is prohibited unless the fireworks displays are controlled by a licensed professional company and approved by the commander.

This may seem unreasonable but there are two reasons why the use of fireworks at Reese are prohibited.

First, fireworks create a severe fire hazard potential due to dry weeds, grass and bushes surrounding the base.

Second, fireworks present a real potential for injury to fingers, hands and eyes; loss of hearing; severe burns; and even death!

Some safety tips to follow are:

☐ Always read directions and use com-

☐ Have a responsible adult present.

☐ Use fireworks outdoors only — away from buildings, vehicles, dry grass and other flammable liquids or gases.

Only light one at a time.

☐ Never point or throw fireworks at an-

other person.

☐ Never alter or take apart any type of fireworks.

☐ Never, under any circumstances, give fireworks to young children.

☐ Have a bucket of water, or portable fire extinguishers ready for emergencies and for dousing misfired and spent fireworks.

☐ Never attempt to re-light or fix malfunctioning fireworks.

☐ Have a first aid kit available in the event of accidents.

☐ Never put fireworks in your pocket or attach them to your person. If an accident occurred, you could be a fireworks display!

Have a great Fourth of July celebration, but do so safely. Burns and injuries received from fireworks can be a lifelong memory that results in tremendous pain and psychological

Heat stress: something to sweat about

With the current heat wave at Reese, it is important to know some of the facts and measures to counter the effects of heat stress.

First, know the three most common heatrelated illnesses:

☐ Heat cramps are characterized by intermittent, painful contractions of muscle. It's caused by excessive loss of salt from sweating. You may feel weak, nauseated and

☐ Heat exhaustion results from exposure to excessive heat. The person may have signs and symptoms of extreme fatigue, headache, weakness, dizziness, dim or blurred vision, nausea and possible vomiting. Sweating, cool skin, rapid heart beat and loss of consciousness may also occur.

Heat stroke is a breakdown of the body's heat-control mechanism. The symptoms are flushed, dry skin, elevated temperature — as high as 105-106 degrees — nausea, a throbbing headache and sweating. These can be accompanied by severe mental impairmentthat can include mental confusion, disorientation, bizarre behavior or coma.

Warm weather isn't going to stop the mission, so what can you do?

The single most important preventive measure is to drink plenty of water. The amount ranges from a pint an hour for temperatures of 80 degrees to more than two quarts an hour for above 88 degrees.

Other measures include avoiding alcohol and beverages with caffeine or sugar. Alcohol and caffeine can cause a loss of vital body fluids, leading to dehydration. Sugar prevents the body from absorbing fluids.

Three meals a day should be eaten to get the salt your body needs.

Don't wait until you're thirsty to drink water. Thirst is not a good indicator of how much water your body needs.



Suggestions earn big bucks

Three recent suggestions by Reese members have saved the Air Force a total of \$19,559.64.

TSgt. David Koester, 3307th Test Evaluation Squadron, suggested that an external ring clamp on the T-38 ejection seat electrical quick disconnect be incorporated into cockpit modification.

Col. Bill Henny, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, when presenting Sergeant Koester with a check for \$708, commented that he was pleased to pass along part of the \$7,079 savings that will result from the sergeant's suggestion.

This was the second time in as many months for Sergeant Koester to participate in the Air Force Suggestion Program. In May, he received \$392 for his successful challenge in the Zero Overpricing Program.

"The bonuses presented to Sergeant Koester are a good example of how two programs work hand in hand for the benefit of both the Air Force and individual members," said Ruedele Turner, suggestion program manager.

MSgt. Joseph McDowell's paycheck will be \$856 larger this month because of a suggestion he made that was approved in 1989. He proposed the use of 8.5-inch computer paper for certain reports rather than 11-inch paper. During a year-long test of the proposal, the Air Force saved \$8,557. 



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OUCH! These things are eating me alive

This is open season for humans. The recent rains kicked off the mosquito breeding season, which in turn kicked off the mosquito biting season.

Mosquitoes breed anywhere water can accumulate: weeds and high grass, pools and tree holes. Additionally, tires, cans and even plastic wrappers serve as artificial breeding areas.

Aside from itchy bites, mosquitoes can transmit diseases such as encephalitis and dengue. Fortunately, the AIDS virus cannot be transmitted by mosquitoes.

"All mosquitoes are active when there is high humidity and moder-

ate temperatures," said SSgt. Robert Roach, environmental health services. "Mosquitoes are attracted to carbon dioxide, which is what humans and other mammals exhale when breathing."

Sergeant Roach said that most mosquitoes don't travel more than 100 yards from their breeding sites. "If you allow mosquitoes to breed near you, chances are you'll be on their menu," he said.

According to Sergeant Roach, fogging and traps only kill the mosquitoes that they come in contact with, but do not leave any lasting protection. Thus, elimination of breeding sites is the most effective means of control.
