Phase two housing renovation plan complete July 11

Phase two of the renovation in Reese Village wrapped up recently, as the contractor turned over the last home July 11.

The 187-unit phase is the midpoint of the village renovation. Designs for phase three are near completion, according to housing officials. Funding for the third phase will come from fiscal 1992 monies.

Mitzi Million, base housing manager, said that phase two progress was "excellent."

"Things went really well, considering that some people had to be uprooted (during renovation)," she said. "The units came out so well, though, that the residents were very pleased."

Residents of phase two units agreed.

"Everything's fantastic," said Sgt. Mike Sitek, 64th Operations Support Squadron. "We have three bedrooms, a nice kitchen and patio — I'm living 'high on the hog.'" He added that a similar place downtown would cost him nearly twice what he would get for basic allowance for quarters.

"We're really impressed," said Nancy Stiffler, wife of Lt. Col. Don Stiffler, OSS. Mrs. Stiffler, whose home was the last one finished in phase two, added that she's very happy with the unit.

"We saw one of the unrenovated units first — this one is great. It has a lot of extras we didn't expect," she said.

The contractor, Sullivan Enterprises of Mississippi, began the second phase in July 1989. Although they had gotten a completion extension to November (due to weather), they still managed to finish by the original two-year deadline.

Of the 398 units in Reese Village, 111 are left for renovation in phase three.

Colonel Hess cites people as a top priority

Citing people as one of his top priorities, Col. Ken Hess assumed command of the 64th Support Group Monday.

The new commander returns here from the Pentagon, where he was chief of the European Command/Central Command Branch, Joint Operations Division, J-3. He served at Reese from July 1986 to August 1988 as assistant deputy commander

and then deputy commander for Operations:

The 22-year service veteran is joined here by his wife, Debby, and his children — J.P., 12, and Jenna, 5. Colonel Hess has noticed many changes at Reese since last here, but noted that some things have remained constant.

"The base looks different physically and the organization has

changed, but things haven't changed in terms of attitude and warmth. People really enjoy themselves here — it shows in the smiles you see around base. That attitude has always been a 'high-water mark' at Reese."

Colonel Hess spoke enthusiastically about his return to Reese.

"I'm very happy to be back; Reese has a great tradition," the Dallas na-

tive said. "My family and I really appreciate the warm welcome we received during the assumption-of-command ceremony."

Looking at the things he places emphasis on, Colonel Hess pointed to people as the key to the overall mission.

"People are what make it happen — we can't afford to lose touch with them," he said. "We have to take care

of the people, especially in these times of growth and change."

Other areas have also caught the colonel's eye. The impending arrival of the T-1 brings with it the need for construction and growth on the base, and the current increased emphasis on environmental issues make that a "hot" subject nearly everywhere. Colonel Hess cited both subjects as high-interest items.

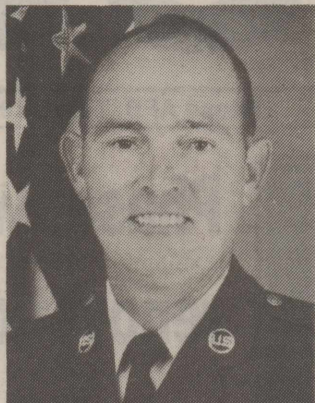

How well do you know the people you supervise?

Give yourself a simple test and try to answer the following questions about your people without referring to an information source.

- List all your people and their marital status.
- Where do your single people live?
- Which dorm?
- Do they share an apartment in town?
- When was the last time you visited their dorm?
- How many of your single people own a car?
- How do they get to and from Lubbock?
- How many of your married-people live in base housing?
- Are the people living in town buying or renting?
- Do you know their spouse's first name and would you recognize them if you saw them?
- How many children do they have and do you know their gender and names?
- Are all the family members in good health?
- How do your people spend their free time?
- What are their hobbies?
- Do they participate in intramural sports?
- When was the last time you watched them play?

Get involved

Answers to these kinds of questions won't just happen. We have to seek them out.

Talk to your people. Show them that you really care and are vitally interested in their total well being. Get involved with your people and in doing so, get them and yourself involved in our base programs.

Getting to know the people you supervise will help both of you enjoy your job and military life more. You will build a happier, more cohesive working group and realize an increase in production as well.

Seatbelts factor in crash

Since mid-June, two vehicle accidents have occurred within two miles of Reese. Each occurred during daylight hours when driving conditions were at their best.

In each case, the vehicles sustained significant damage, while vehicle occupants walked away without serious injury.

This is a safety article, but rather than jump on a "soap box" to proclaim the effectiveness of seatbelts, we'll let you take a brief look at the accidents and judge for yourself.

Mishap No. 1: It was about 1 p.m., and the weather was clear. Vehicle No. 1 was traveling east on 19th Street at about 40 mph, preparing to turn left onto War Highway. Vehicle No. 2 was traveling west on 19th Street at about 50 mph.

The intersection was clear, and the east-west traffic light was showing green. According to witnesses, vehicle No. 1 turned left onto War Highway, in front of vehicle No. 2, without warning and was struck head on by vehicle No. 2. The impact speed (the sum of both speeds) was about 90 mph, yet no one, including two child passengers, was injured.

Why? Each person was wearing seatbelts or was in a child restraint.

Mishap No. 2: It was 7:15 a.m. Monday morning,

and Vehicle No. 1 was traveling north on FM 179. Vehicle No. 2 was traveling west on Fourth Street heading toward Reese. The weather was clear, and traffic was normal for a Monday morning. Vehicle No. 2 was in the right lane of traffic positioned slightly to the rear of a third (unidentified) vehicle that was in the left lane.

As the third vehicle passed through the intersection, Vehicle No. 2's operator momentarily observed Vehicle No. 1 enter the intersection.

Before the driver could take evasive action, Vehicle No. 1 struck Vehicle No. 2 broadside on the driver's door. On impact, Vehicle No. 1 spun off the roadway, coming to rest facing northeast in a ditch.

Neither driver was injured; both were wearing their seatbelts. Both vehicles sustained major damage. Insurance adjusters classified Vehicle No. 2 a total loss.

Before you "make your call," there is one more item to mention — call this a safety history lesson. Safety statistics show that most severe mishaps occur within 25 miles of home.

The reasons aren't clear. If I had to make a guess about the reason for the 25-mile zone, I'd say it is because this is the comfort zone. People are most comfortable and most familiar with the roads traveled most often. They also tend to pay less attention to traffic and sometimes they don't bother to wear their seatbelts.

The bottom line is you never know where or when you'll be involved in a serious mishap. Buckle up and be prepared.

Sun precautions stressed for summer

With summer upon us, we need to think about protecting ourselves against skin cancer.

The increased incidence of skin cancer in recent decades has drawn the attention of the medical community.

It is estimated that approximately 500,000 Americans develop skin cancer every year.

The main cause of skin cancer has been attributed to the overexposure to the sun's ultraviolet radiation. The possible future depletion of the ozone layer from pollution may allow more ultraviolet radiation to reach the earth's surface and thus cause more skin cancer.

Malignant melanoma, the most serious type of skin

cancer, can be found anywhere on the body. It can begin in or near a mole on your body, making self-examination of the skin more important than ever.

Overexposure to the sun and heredity are the most important factors in causing this disease, especially in fair-skinned individuals. Dark-skinned people can have melanoma under the nails, on the palm of the hands, soles of the feet, and in the mouth.

The surest defense against skin cancer is prevention, early detection and removal of cancerous growths.

For prevention, dermatologists recommend the use of sunscreen with a sun protection factor of at least 15, and avoidance of overexposure to the sun.

Self-examination, preferably monthly, is the best way to detect any abnormal growth from moles and scars as early as possible.

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ACE program realigned under SAC

Reese loses pilots, keeps jets, maintenance operations

The Accelerated Copilot Enrichment program, which gives Strategic Air Command copilots flying time in ATC T-37s and T-38s, became SAC's operational responsibility this month, according to Reese officials.

The ACE program is used by SAC to "mature" copilots in ATC's jets. It provides copilots additional flying time and allows them to make decisions as an aircraft commander, according to Brig. Gen. Everett H. Pratt Jr., ATC's deputy chief of staff for operations and readiness.

Twenty-one SAC bases have ACE detachments. A typical detachment has a commander plus two to three instructor pilots. Five ATC installations are "home" bases for these ACE detachments: Randolph AFB, Texas; Reese; Vance AFB, Okla.; Mather AFB, Calif.; and Williams AFB, Ariz. There is also a detachment at Seymour Johnson AFB, N.C., a Tactical Air Command base.

Reese has supported three SAC bases: Minot AFB, N.D.; and Ellsworth and Grand Forks AFBs, S.D.

SAC has assumed the responsibility for ACE flying operations located on its bases. This aligns the responsibility and account-

ability for ACE flying operations under the SAC wing commander and his staff instead of ATC.

Maintenance requirements for ACE have not transferred to SAC. "For now, we decided maintenance would stay the same," explained General Pratt. "ATC will continue to do maintenance using both blue-suiters and contractors."

Maintenance could transfer to SAC in the future, the general added. SAC will program and fund flying hours for the ACE program.

Because ATC has the majority of instructor pilots qualified in the T-37 and T-38, it will continue to train SAC people assigned to ACE detachments.

The 12 Reese T-38's assigned to Minot, Ellsworth and Grand Forks still belong to Reese, according to Maj. J.D. O'Malley, 64th Operations Support Squadron.

The 13 Reese instructor pilots assigned to the ACE detachments, however, now belong to SAC, he added. They are: Capts. Eric Roberts, Gene Kowalski, Greg Kasson, Bryan Tharp, Enrique Grafada, Ralph Merz, Chris Coffland, Ted Davis, Steve Collins, Chris Norris, Scott Hanson, Jim Kubioa and Doug Gould.

"ACE is very successful," General Pratt said.

"It saves the Air Force money, and it

keeps SAC copilots more prepared to perform their primary mission. It's a win-win situation." (ATC News Service)

More considered for promotion

The Summer Youth Employment and Training Program, sponsored by the Texas Employment Commission and Reese, has placed 44 youth in summer jobs on the base.

According to Beverly Miracle, program coordinator, the program provides youth of Lubbock and Garza county with on-the-job training opportunities.

The program, which lasts eight weeks, "is an excellent opportunity for the youth because of the foundation of job skills that are provided as well as responsibility and communications skills," said Mrs. Miracle.

An example of the program's success is a girl who was hired for the program when she was 16-years-old. She continued working during the summer until she was 18-years-old, when she was employed as a clerk typist. She is now a GS-09 staffing specialist at another base.

Chris Salonen, a first-time participant in the program working in the arts and crafts center, said "This

is a great opportunity for me to gain some experience for the future. It's also a way to keep out of trouble."

"I don't understand why anyone who has a chance to help these kids wouldn't," said Terry Bozman, director, arts and crafts center. "We have the opportunity to find someone's strongest skills and apply them to our programs."

Chris is currently designing a new cover for the arts and crafts center pamphlet, scheduled to be printed in August.

"All these kids need is a chance, and I'm glad that I can give them one," said Mr. Bozman. "We've all needed a chance before."

"This is an excellent example of what the program can do for someone," added Mrs. Miracle. "The final result of the program may be a life-long employment opportunity."

Keeping an eye out for quality

QAEs act as liaison between contractors and customers

Have you ever wondered how to officially compliment a base taxi driver? Or who to talk to about the menu at the Caprock Cafe?

These functions, as well as many other important jobs around Reese, are performed by contractors. When a contractor is involved, many people are unsure who to contact to ask a question or resolve a problem.

When a function changes to a contract operation, the overall responsibility for performance remains with the organization that contracts out. The commander of that organization then becomes the functional area chief for the contract.

The FAC will write the statement of work and determine the level of surveillance required to assure quality performance. The people assigned by the FAC to conduct the surveillance and evaluate performance are called quality assurance evaluators.

A QAE is a technical expert who is trained in contracting principles and surveillance techniques. Using a quality assurance surveillance plan, the QAE will monitor the contractor's performance. The QAE also acts as the liaison between the contractor and base customers.

Each service contract over \$25,000 has at least one QAE, and this person can answer questions and resolve most issues dealing with

his or her contract. Feedback, both good and bad, can be brought to the QAE by completing a form (AF Form 714) or by calling the QAE. The QAE will discuss the issue with the contractor and return to you with a solution.

Forms can usually be found in the contractor's work area, the QAE's office, or in the 64th Contracting Squadron, on the third floor of Bldg. 800. If you prefer, the QAE can also discuss the issue with you over the phone. In the box below are the names and phone numbers of QAEs for service contracts around the base.

Credit cards to be used for TDY travel

Some Air Force travelers will soon be able to use government-issued charge cards at automated teller machines to get temporary-duty travel advances, according to Reese officials.

All government Diners Club card holders will be eligible to use their Diners Club credit cards at ATMs to get cash advances needed for costs not covered by the government card.

Also eligible for the ATM Cash Advance Program are nonappropriated fund employees of equivalent civilian grade who will probably travel more than twice a year on official business.

Staggered implementation started July 1 and the entire Air Force should be operational by Sept. 30, Reese officials said.

Implementation at Reese will begin no later than Aug. 15, according to MSgt. Roy Threadgill, Reese Diners Club Program manager. Cardholders should contact their unit Diners Club coordinator for an application. The ATM personal identification number, or "PIN," should be received within 30 days after application.

The Air Force expects benefits will elimi-

nate thousands of cash advance vouchers annually. Travel advances are currently in the millions of dollars every year, officials said.

Elimination of cash advances will reduce the cost to the government by delaying expenditure of funds and decreasing the time factor for interest on borrowed funds by two

costs that the Diners Club card doesn't already cover, such as lodging or rental car costs," said Sergeant Threadgill.

"Advances should be limited to those out-of-pocket expenses such as taxi fares and meals."

ATM withdrawals will be limited to \$500 a day or \$1,000 per seven-day period.

When a card has been revoked or suspended.

People who already have a government charge card can apply through their unit orderly room for an ATM PIN.

There is a 4 percent service charge for using the ATM cash advance system, which is reimbursable on the travel claim.

"It's imperative that travelers are conservative when taking advances to preclude possible out of pocket expenses for excessive service charges," said Sergeant Threadgill. For example, if \$200 is withdrawn, and the amount payable after the travel voucher has been completed is \$150, the traveler will be responsible for service charges beyond the \$150.

Anyone eligible who doesn't have a card must apply for a card as well as an identification number.

This number will be sent to the cardholder's billing address.

People are expected to pay their Diners Club in full for any government charge card or ATM cash advance when they get the bill, officials said. (Air Force News Service)

to three weeks.

Another expected advantage will be convenience to travelers. Monies will be available when and where needed, so travelers won't need to carry large sums of cash or travelers checks when on official government business.

"Cash advances should be taken for any

When approved, cash advances will be made by accounting and finance:

□ To people traveling on official business when they are not authorized a government credit card.

□ To people traveling to areas where it's known that the card or ATM advance cash program can't be used.

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Women recommended for combat flying roles

The Air Force chief of staff will recommend a gender-neutral assignment system be used to fill all positions, should the combat exclusion law be changed to allow women to fly combat aircraft.

The Air Force doesn't believe in artificially barring anyone from doing any job, Gen. Merrill McPeak told members of the Senate Armed Services Committee manpower and personnel subcommittee. General McPeak and the other service chiefs gathered on Capitol Hill June 18 to discuss the utilization of women in the military.

Should the law change, all positions, including combat aircraft, will be filled "with the best qualified man or woman selected for each position, according to a single set of standards," he said. "Such an assignment policy would have to be phased in over time."

A bill to lift the ban on women in combat was initiated by Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., who offered an amendment to the bill to cover the Air Force. Personnel Subcommittee Chairwomen Rep. Beverly Byron, D-Md., amended Mrs. Schroeder's proposal to include the Navy. The House Armed Services Committee voted May 8 to let Air Force and Navy women pilots fly combat missions.

Responding to the action, Air Force officials applauded the accomplishments of Air Force women but are waiting until a specific law is enacted before fully assessing the impact and developing plans for implementation.

"Air Force employment of women today is guided by strict adherence to the combat exclusion law and DOD (Department of Defense) 'Risk Rule,'" General McPeak said.

Ninety-seven percent of Air Force positions are currently open to women. All officer career fields are open to women. But, the combat exclusion law doesn't allow women to be assigned to aircraft that engage in combat missions or operations that expose them to direct combat, hostile fire or capture.

These include fighters, bombers, gunships, forward air controllers, most helicopters and some reconnaissance aircraft.

Open to enlisted women are all but four career fields. Those excluded are defense aerial gunner, pararescue and

recovery, combat control and tactical air command and control.

General McPeak made clear his preference that the law barring women from combat tasks remain in effect. He said his personal view was based on "reluctance to see women exposed to greater risk."

However, the general said he "would be inclined, should the law go off the books, to recommend to the secretary that we gradually open those cockpit positions to women."

"We are committed to sustaining our strong tradition of equal opportunity for qualified men and women and are proud of the contributions women make to the Air Force," he said. (Air Force News Service)

Board approves uniform changes

Eliminating the restrictive wording in Air Force Regulation 35-10 on wear of the lightweight blue jacket is just one of the dress and appearance changes approved by the Air Force chief of staff.

The regulation will read "member will not wear the poly/wool lightweight blue jacket when the service dress uniform is designated or is considered more appropriate."

Other recommendations from the 89th Air Force Uniform Board approved by Gen. Merrill A. McPeak:

□ Allow women to wear diamond or diamond-like earrings with all uniform combinations, except when safety regulations dictate otherwise.

□ Discontinue procurement of the optional polyester/cotton shirt and blouse, because of the unavailability of acceptable fabric. Upgrade the quality, packaging and presentation of the issue shirt.

□ Approve a conservative single-placed clasp to secure the fold-over flap on optional leather purse.

□ Approve outdoor wear of the white cardigan sweater if the metal rank insignia on the white utility uniform can be seen.

□ Give major command commanders the authority to let people wear black, brown or green underwear with fatigue uniforms.

□ Authorize the optional wear of black mittens.

□ Standardize the mounting instructions for both holding and mounting bars on the mess dress.

Items also briefed at the board were:

□ The concept design of the new service dress, and the program schedule.

□ Progress of the uniform board process subcommittee.

□ The Air Force will participate in an Army wear test of new battle dress uniform fabrics and design during the summer.

□ Flight suit enhancement will be modified to include a beaded resin leg crease and maintain the knife pocket attachment as a field modification.

□ The A-2 leather flying jacket is authorized as an approved outer-garment for wear on commercial aircraft.

□ Ceremonial uniforms are designated as optional wear. Their phase-out dates are Aug. 1, 1994, for the blue uniform, and March 1, 1993, for the white uniform.

□ Phaseout of the optional men's mess dress hat is Sept. 30, 1994.

Results of the board will be effective once applicable regulations have been updated. (Air Force News Service)

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History

The first class of 306 students is sworn in at the Air Force Academy's temporary location at Lowry AFB, Colo.

July 14, 1976

President Ford approves enabling legislation authorizing the Community College of the Air Force to grant associate degrees for college-level academic study.

July 15, 1974

Accredited NCO leadership schools are established at Keesler AFB, Miss., Williams AFB, Ariz., and Chanute AFB, Ill.

July 16, 1940

Bombardier training at Air Corps schools starts at Lowry Field, Colo., with the entrance of the first class of bombardier instructors.

July 16, 1945

At 5:29:45 a.m. Mountain War Time, the world's first atomic bomb is detonated at Trinity Site, a desert location near Alamogordo, N.M.

July 17, 1950

Crew training is initiated in ATC when Nellis AFB, Nev., begins giving combat operational training to fighter pilots destined for assignments in Korea.

July 19, 1961

ATC receives its first T-39 Sabreliner. The T-39 is used, along with the T-38 Talon, in the Instrument Pilot Instructor School at Randolph.

July 24, 1917

The first large air appropriations bill, \$640 million, authorizes the aviation section to expand to 9,989 officers and 87,083 enlisted men. (ATC News Service)
