

Quality Air Force

' Hit the cutoff man. Don't throw behind the runner. Break up a double play. Baseball is an involved game where small things done right often mean the difference between winning and losing. Good ideas in financial analysis, though small, have led to quality improvements and made life easier for other offices as well.

First, Dan McIntire had a better idea on office design. Not everyone in his office may have agreed, because for three weeks cost and budget analysts found themselves hanging sheetrock, painting, demolishing office walls, pulling up carpet, laying carpet squares and finally installing systems furniture. When all this was done they had transformed a maze of five small offices into a modern, well-organized and efficient office. Mr. McIntire's staff would now probably rate this effort a grand slam.

Next, TSgt. Leon Sosa developed a pamphlet for data collection. He introduced "how to" explanations in the pamphlet for people who were required to provide the data (our suppliers) and a user-friendly format for each data element. We now see measurable improvements in the quality and timeliness of provided data over our previous trial and error method: the better the data, the better the decisions. We'll use the data as the basis for receiving hundreds of thousands of dollars in reimbursements each year. The idea worked so well, Don Shirley developed another pamphlet to collect data for the Economic Resource Impact Statement. One ERIS customer, the Office of the Secretary of Defense, uses the information in their base closing drills; it's obviously important that the data be complete and accurate, and the pamphlet idea has helped.

Creating customer-friendly pamphlets really caught on in the office with the development of the "lease vs. buy decision" pamphlet. Again, the objective is the accurate collection of data so decision-makers (our customers) can make the best economic choice in spending taxpayers' money. Another objective is to ease the pain of the suppliers who provide the data.

Sergeant Sosa has also implemented an automated project status list. In addition to the obvious, the branch chief uses the list to even out the work load and plan future projects. Nothing revolutionary, but something that didn't exist. With the merger of budget, cost and MWR oversight, the resulting financial analysis branch was much more complicated. Now that we have the project list, we no longer overlook taskings, and we get them done when needed.

The comptroller world is changing fast. To address these new or changed tasks, Sergeant Sosa clarified who is doing what and when. He identified the players and suspenses involved for the Suggestion Program and for Interservice Support Agreements. He then essentially contracted in writing with the OPRs to do specific things at certain times. Now, for example, we have an agreement to provide cost analysis on suggestions within 24 hours.

The improvements make a big difference in the service we provide our customers and in our internal processes. For copies of the pamphlets or a sample automated project list to apply in your office, contact Sergeant Sosa at 3074.

General Ashy sends greetings



Do you know what congressional district you live in? Can you define the term "Pro Tempore?" Can you name your congressman and senators?

If not, you're not the only one. Voter apathy has been on the rise in the U.S. for the past 30 years, and the problem is getting worse. One consequence of this is that small, well-organized special interest groups are choosing this country's leaders. Amazingly, many people who complain loudly about the direction our nation is heading are refusing to exercise their right to change it.

While trying to encourage people to register and vote I've come up against the same resistance. I've had people tell me, "Nobody can force me to register. I know my rights." One brave airman finally admitted that

vote but is afraid to because he doesn't know anything about the candidates. And he speaks for a larger number of Americans than he could guess-more than 16 percent of Air Force members confessed that as the reason they didn't vote in the 1988 election. That is our problem and our answer can't be, "I won't vote." All of us need to search for the information necessary to make intelligent decisions on who should be in office. There is too much at stake.

The 1992 election is filled with billion-dollar issues such as: Health care; should there be a national health plan? Capital punishment; is it worth the cost? Abortion vs. Pro-life; What should we do about the homeless and the welfare system? Are continued reductions in the size of the military good for the country?


In the opinion of former

CMSAF James Binnicker, "Congress doesn't care about the military because overall the military doesn't vote."

This year's election presents the best chance in years that there will be new blood in high places since 53 congressmen and six governors have decided not to run for re-election.

Many people have the misconception that their one vote does not count. To those who feel this way, it should be pointed out that had one more person in each precinct voted for Richard Nixon in 1960, President Kennedy would have lost the election. Even absentee ballots have been known to decide many elections.

So it is in your best interest to find out who is running for election in your congressional district and where they stand on the issues important to you. Be sure to register now so you can exercise your right to vote in November.


