Commissary agency reaps benefits

WASHINGTON — Average customer savings exceeding 25 percent with total sales of more than \$6 billion are two milestones the Defense Commissary Agency reached in its first year of operation.

"DeCA is working diligently to invent the future instead of redesigning the past," Army Maj. Gen. John P. Dreska, director of the new consolidated commissary system, told the House Armed Services Committee morale, welfare and recreation panel re-

The first year also saw customers save an additional \$200 million by using coupons. Some studies show commissaries nearly doubling the coupon redemption rate of civilian supermarkets, General Dreska said.

"More people are taking advantage of coupons," said Lila Andermatt, Reese Commissary officer. Over the same nine-month period, coupon usage at Reese went from \$263,000 in 1991 to \$343,000 this year.

"There's also greater savings for customers in the commissary," she added, explaining that since DeCA formed, customers are now able to get products at as

much as a 60 percent savings at times. In the past, 15 to 20 percent was more the norm.

A result of combining the Air Force, Army and Navy programs into one Department of Defense agency was savings of \$50 million in the first year. DeCA took control of the commissaries Oct. 1.

"We did save \$50 million, largely through the reduction of more than 1,600 positions above the commissary level," General Dreska said.


Of the money saved, \$35 million was taken from the DeCA budget as first-year savings and the rest was reinvested in the commissary system to help improve service to the customer.

This was in keeping with the Defense Department's pledge to the military services, who supported consolidation only if it resulted in an increase in customer service.

The agency saved the necessary amount by consolidating regions and headquarters, eliminating redundant overhead functions and successfully completing the largest transfer of duties in the history of the Defense Department.

"Our transfer of function was so successful that not a single person who stated they would transfer to

Quality Air Force

In August 1991, Hq. ATC sent a letter to all flying wings challenging one and all to reduce the allocated time (one hour for priority requests) to move a repair part, once requested from base supply's warehouse, to the mechanic's work bench. In order to meet this challenge, the 64th Support Group commander directed the logistics commander to form a process action team to accomplish this goal.


Using the Quality Air Force process the team was formed and, after a brief study, found that a mechanism was in place that would, with alteration, meet everyone's needs and fulfill all Hq. ATC mandated requirements. The PAT decided to use the Fast Forward Assets Support Training program and Quality Air Force guidelines to accomplish its goal. Although the FAST program had been monitored and changed when required, it had not been totally reviewed at any point since it was implemented in 1984.

After "rediscovering" that the real purpose of FAST was to move repair parts as close to the mechanic as possible, the team quickly realized that a complete FAST overhaul and study was needed. Lockheed studied the problem from their concept and decided that they could repair airplanes faster and more efficiently if they consolidated maintenance efforts, equipment and personnel to the maximum extent possible. With that, Lockheed promptly moved the majority of T-37 and T-38 scheduled maintenance activities and functions to the south end of the runway; in and around building 52. The logistics commander then capitalized on this move to consolidate his Repair Cycle Support Element with FAST, enlarge the FAST area by over 200 percent while at the same time collocating everything with maintenance in building 52. These combined actions resulted in a consolidated location of supply and maintenance workers and spare parts, while permanently eliminating one manpower position for an upfront savings of approximately \$30,000 this year and each year hereafter.

The change did not happen overnight nor without inconve-

nience to Logistics and LSSI. Both supply and maintenance utilized hundreds of man-

hundreds of manhours tearing down walls and moving furniture, computers, men, women, equipment, and etc. Over \$20,000 was spent for building materials, carpets, paints, construction costs for a drive up service window and other necessities. All of which has since been recouped




due to increased efficiencies brought about by the move.

The real proof of any project, as they say, is in the pudding and the pudding is outlined in the before and after charts listed here.

If you have a problem that seems beyond your capability to resolve, or you just want improved efficiency and better customer service in your day-to-day activities, don't hire a consultant, you have those on staff already. Get your

Protective equipment — protecting yourself

For many unknown reasons, military personnel and family members either forget or ignore the need for personal protective equipment while working or playing around the home or during recreational activities. The injuries to the forgetful person are sometimes minor in nature, but they can be quite painful. Here are some reminders to prevent such injuries:

As the lawn mowing season continues there are many operations that require the use of PPE. Wear sturdy shoes to protect your feet from flying objects or objects hidden in the grass during mowing; wear long pants to protect your legs from objects flying off trimmers; and use goggles or a face shield to protect your eyes when you operate your weedeater, powered edger, or mower.

When cooking outdoors use long handled tools

and hand protection in the form of pot holders or gloves. Many outdoor cooks forget a food item on the grill is just as hot as one in a frying pan.

When biking or riding a skateboard an approved impact resistant helmet with an adjustable chin strap can prevent a serious head injury. Knee and elbow pads also protect vital areas when skateboarding.

Protect your eyes and use impact resistant sports eye wear when playing racquetball, tennis, handball or squash. Trying to play without your glasses is just as bad as playing without the protective eye wear.

When hiking or just taking long walks, ensure your foot wear provides support for the sole of the foot and ankle. This support will prevent injuries in the event of an unexpected twist or turn.

When riding a motorcycle or motorbike, over-theankle shoes, long pants and shirt combined with an approved helmet will ensure you are riding in accordance with USAF and state laws.







SPS offers tips, programs to safeguard property

Summer has brought the customary rise in temperatures, but another increase that's come with it is one that security police are looking to "cool off."

Officials in the 64th Senoticed a jump in theft reports in housing, most of which involved insecure property.

> Besides the obvious reasons for securing property, people who have property stolen or vandalized on base can run into trouble making a claim if they don't "lock it up." The regulation that covers claims states that payment may be denied if negligence, such as not securing an item, is involved on the part of the owner or the owner's family.

> Sergeant Meyers added that parents should be on guard if their child has items that they do not recognize, and they should question their child about these

People who want additional security for their valuables can sign out an engraver from the law enforcement desk and mark their property with their sponsor's Social Security number. The engravers can be signed out 24 hours a day.

Being vigilant about the security of your home and goods need not be put aside when on vacation, either. Reese Village residents can request the SPs to watch their homes while gone, and on- and off-base members can have their vehicle watched. The desk sergeant in Bldg. 500 has the necessary paperwork for people who are interested.

Sergeant Meyers emphasized that people who go away should ask their neighbors to check their home periodically whether they participate in the program or not. Neighbors should check mail, take in newspapers and turn on porch lights. at night to discourage break-

DeCA with their function lost a job," General Dreska said.

Also, equal employment figures increased with the consolidation, with more minorities and women earning a greater share of the highgraded jobs with DeCA.

For example, prior to DeCA, 4 percent of the commissary system's black employees were in pay grades 13 to 15. After DeCA, it increased to 7 percent. Hispanic employees in the same grades went from 4 percent to 6 percent, while women increased from 17 percent to 22 percent.

Other changes and improvements include customer service support teams. Team members are responsible for circulating on the sales floor, answering questions, keeping the lines moving through the checkout stands and ensuring shelves are stocked with fast-selling items.

A standard store layout has been developed that is suitable for use in any of the nine different store sizes.

Also, the agency is working with the Defense Finance and Accounting Service to meet many of its accounting and payment needs. This includes a new centralized payroll system with 19,000-plus payroll accounts.

The goal of the consolidation was to increase efficiency and provide better customer service. General Dreska was named director of the Defense Commissary Agency June 26. The commissary headquarters is at Fort Lee, Va.



According to MSgt Vincent King, assistant team leader, the team laid over 30,000 square feet of sod around the base.


"It's been needed for a while,"
