# Wing takes top command honor

The 64th Flying Training Wing has been selected as Air Training Command's best overall safety program for fiscal year 1991. The wing won the ATC To Promote Safety (TOPS) trophy - the top safety award presented in the command. The wing also received an achievement award for ground safety.

Reese improved its ground safety record by reducing fatalities related to the work place, motor vehicle accidents and sports and recreation, according to safety officials.

"The people at Reese made these achievements in all areas of safety possible," said Col. Bill Henny, wing commander. "Their dedication, professionalism and unfailing concern for one another made the difference."

"The commander's and the unit safety representatives' emphasis on safety were responsible for the wing winning this award," said Lt. Col. Rick Robinson, chief of wing safety.


The award promotes safety awareness over the entire spectrum of ATC operations. The award is presented to the ATC center or wing whose overall safety program is determined to be the best for the fiscal year.

"The wing, as well as ATC, had a tremendous year in safety while recording the best flying year in history," Colonel Robinson said. "The competition was extremely keen according to the people I talked to at ATC headquarters."

Chuck Gerrior, chief of the ground safety section, noted that incident rate in 1991 causing lost military duty time decreased even though man-hours increased.

The safety division was also noted for doing extremely well during the unit effectiveness/operational readiness inspection in February.

The wing was also awarded the National Safety Council Award of Merit in 1991.\*

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# From my perspective

By now most of our Reese men, women and families have returned from the holidays, closing out the book on 1991 and opening up 1992.

As I reflect over 1991, the Reese family exceeded my every expectation. Our primary mission was to produce the highest quality officers and pilots for the United States



Air Force and our allies. We did exceptionally wellgraduating 291 young pilots eager to meet the challenges of tomorrow. We did this flying 56,925 sorties and 69,606.7 hours combined in our aging T-37 and T-38 aircraft all of which are older than our graduates. To highlight our successes even more, we did this all without one Class A or B mishap! In fact, we really shined in our safety efforts, garnering the Best Overall Safety Program in ATC—with significant reductions in on and off duty military mishaps and reportable civilian injuries. Super effort . . . keep it up! Reese people met the challenge—when called up to support Operation Desert Storm—more than 50 of our folks deployed in minimum time to emerge victorious and return without the loss of life or injury and a great sense of pride and honor. Some of our people are still deployed in support of Operation Desert Calm.

In late spring the concept of reorganizing the Air Force and the way we do business only seemed to be a

distant rumor. However, by July we were in the midst of massive changes in our wing organization. Reese was selected to lead the command as the test base for the new concept. The test was to last a year; however, we did so well in the planning, executing and modifications that by the close of the year, all Air Training Command undergraduate pilot training bases were reorganizing to look like Reese. We must keep in mind that all these changes were conceived, tried and tested by our Reese professionals—I am proud of your efforts.

Top Flight was born in the summer and Reese garnered numerous honors at both competitions, including Top Wing at Top Flight II. We have proven to everyone in the command that Reese has unsurpassed quality instructors and maintainers whose superb esprit, camaraderie and teamwork go hand in hand to train and provide the world's greatest Air Force with top notch military aviators.

Our preparations for the newest aircraft and mission in the Air Force, T-1/SUPT, have been second to none. Soon we will see the arrival of our first T-1 aircraft—a longawaited day that will usher in a new era of undergraduate pilot training.

is not only morally wrong, but against the law and is not tolerated in the Air Force.


I ask that everyone, from every echelon of leadership and down to every person, do a self-analysis as we begin a new year. This

great, free nation in which we are so fortunate to live and serve is about equality. Our treatment of our fellow men and women must reflect fairness and sensitivity.



# Incentive plans approved for voluntary outs

Military members who voluntarily leave the service may qualify to get money from one of two new Defense Department incentive packages recently approved as part of the National Defense Authorization Act for 1992 and 1993.

The two packages, the voluntary separation incentive and special separation benefits, were designed to help the services cut personnel strength by 20 percent and realign the force structure during the drawdown. DOD officials hope the payments will ease transition to civilian life and minimize involuntary

The options will be offered to some servicemembers who have between six and 20 years of service. Eligibility will be based on job skills, time in service and pay grades, said Christopher Jehn, assistant secretary of defense for force management and personnel. DOD has not yet set limits on the number or types to serve 20 years in the Reserve of separations; the services will components. decide because they know what they need, Mr. Jehn said.

The voluntary separation incentive is annual payments for a period twice as long as the years a member served. The amount of each payment is 2.5 percent of the member's final annual base pay times the number of years served. For example, an E-6 with 10 years of service would receive \$4,695 per year for 20 years, or a total of \$93,906.

VSI payments can be bequeathed to a servicemember's survivors and will be paid until the term ends, Mr. Jehn said. The money is taxable. The entitlement cannot be sold.

Under the special separation benefits package, servicemembers will receive a lump-sum payment of 15 percent of annual base pay times the number of years served. For example, the same E-6 would receive a flat, taxable \$28,172. Mr. Jehn said a person who takes this option may be eligible for certain involuntary separation benefits, including two years of commissary and exchange privileges and up to four months' medical coverage.

Servicemembers who accept either package incur a Reserve duty obligation.

The special separation choice, for instance, carries a three-year commitment. Under the voluntary separation incentive program, the Reserve duty and yearly payment periods are the same. That is, the E-6 with 10 years' service is required

Program costs and savings aren't readily available at this time, Mr. Jehn said. Those figures depend on the number of people who select the packages and which one they take, as well as their current pay and



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# MAC bases transfer as AF restructures

SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE, III. - Rhein-Main AB, Germany, will transfer to U.S. Air Forces in Europe April 1 and Military Airlift Command's C-130s and accompanying overseas assets will transfer to USAFE and Pacific Air Forces as part of Air Force-wide restructur-

The move is part of the disestablishment of Military Airlift Command and the establishment of the Air Mobility Command. Col. Al Willis, the AMC transition team director, said the transfer includes all theater-based tactical airlift wings, theater C-130 aircraft and crews, and associated theater C-130 support activities.

Under a proposal sent to Air Force Headquarters, MAC will retain overseas strategic aerial ports, maintenance, and command and control resources to meet its worldwide responsibilities. To house these assets, MAC will establish airlift support groups. These responsibilities will transfer to AMC this summer when the new command is activated.

AMC will also transfer its theater-assigned C-130 operation and maintenance funds to USAFE and PACAF, and will organize, train, equip and provide C-130s to theater commanders.

MAC will remain the single C-130 weapon system manager, the gaining command for Air Reserve component tactical airlift C-130 assets, and retain responsibility for standardization of C-130 regulations, tactics, training and operating procedures.

Additionally, the command will manage strategic airlift aircraft maintenance facilities and personnel; strategic aircrew staging; and infrastructure to include strategic aerial port operations, passenger service, and airlift coordination centers among other functions.

With the deactivation on April 1 of the 322nd Airlift Division, Ramstein AB, Germany, and the 834th Airlift Division, Hickam AB, Hawaii, MAC will transfer to **USAFE**:

☐ Rhein-Main AB, Germany, with 3,000 manpower authorizations

☐ The 435th Tactical Airlift Wing, Combat Support Group, C-130 maintenance and support and 37th Tactical Airlift Squadron, at Rhein-Main.

MAC will transfer to PACAF: ☐ The 374th Tactical Airlift Wing at Yokota AB, Japan, and its accompanying maintenance and support.

☐ The 21st and 345th Tactical Airlift Squadrons, and roughly 950 manpower authorizations at Yokota

☐ The 17th TAS, its maintenance operations and about 350 manpower slots at Elmendorf AFB,

Some manpower authorizations from each organization will transfer from MAC to USAFE and PACAF for C-130 staff expertise.

The transfer of theater-assigned C-130s will remove some of the command overhead at Rhein-Main, RAF Mildenhall, England, Yokota and Elmendorf. As a result, MAC will establish or restructure organizations to align units functionally while maintaining its global airlift system.

The mission of these units will not change drastically but will focus on providing command and control, aerial port and maintenance support, Willis said.

While the restructure enhances unity of command by placing theater assets under one commander, C-130 operations will continue to provide the interface with strategic airlift to provide AMC's global airlift its global reach capability. (MAC News Service)



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# Screening gives wing members chance to help those in need find a Needle in a haystack

A needle in a haystack.

Finding one is difficult. But what's more difficult is saving a patient who needs a bone marrow transplant.

That's because matching two people's bone marrow is a 20,000-to-1 shot according to officials in the Naval Medical Research Insti-

tute in Bethesda, Md.

People at Reese have a chance coming up to narrow those odds. A marrow donor screening drive is set for 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Jan. 27 in the 64th Security Police Squadron. The screening is not difficult according to its organizers.

"It takes about 20 minutes at most, and it's

similar to what you'd do donating blood," said TSgt. Mike Gutierrez, SPS. "You fill out some consent forms and give some blood sample. That's all there is to it."

All servicemembers, family members and Defense Department civilians are being recruited as donors and are eligible to be recipients. Sergeant Gutierrez added that Desert Storm veterans are also eligible; currently, Desert Storm participants can not donate blood because of a parasite infection that has been detected in some gulf vets.

# Programs put food on table

Two local programs have helped families live a little better for a number of years. They are the holiday food fund and the South Plains Food Bank

The holiday food fund begins when members of the organization solicit funds from squadrons and other organizations throughout the year. These funds are held in a non-profit account until needed.

The account is managed by the family-support center under the control of the board of directors.

Every year, around holiday time, a call is made to commanders and first sergeants asking for names of Reese families that could use assistance. The board of directors reviews the submitted lists and decides who to provide funds to.

Each family selected receives a \$40 check to be used at the commissary or, if civilian, a local supermarket. After the holidays, any unused funds can be used through the year for special situations as requested by commanders and first sergeants.

This past holiday season, 49 checks totaling \$1,960 were given to families identified.

Another program that aids Reese personnel is the South Plains Food Bank. The family support center is a member of the food bank and may issue vouchers for food. When someone is identified as needing food assistance, a voucher for either 50 or 100 pounds of food is issued, depending on the size of the family. The individual presents the voucher at the food bank where the food is furnished.

Anyone needing assistance should see their commander or first sergeant, who will make the referral to the family support center.

# We have some good news and some bad news

We have some good new and liter. In August, the Reese level was some bad news.

Good news: The number of cavities children get has dropped dramatically since fluoride was added to toothpastes and drinking water. In fact, many children today reach their teenage years without having a single cavity.

Bad news: Unfortunately, excessive fluoride can cause problems. Fluoride occurs naturally in West Texas water, and the levels of fluoride peak in summer.

Base bioenvironmental officials said Reese has been told by the Texas Department of Health that its water sometimes exceeds the maximum allowable fluoride level. Public law states that fluoride in water must be less than 2.0 milligrams per

The bad side is that this makes fluorosis — a discoloring of teeth enamel — a greater possibility in children 14 and vounger. Fluorosis ranges from barely noticeable discoloring to pitting of the enamel

The good side is that fluoride does fight cavities, and the cosmetic damage from fluorosis does not harm the teeth.

The 2.3 level of fluoride in Reese water last August was not common according to bioenvironmental officials, and dental experts on Reese said the risk of fluorosis is low. The average Reese level in 1991 was 1.2 according to 1st Lt. John Bell of bioenvironmental.

"My office takes water samples eight times a month and sends them to the dental officer," he said. "The dental clinic ensures the water is safe to drink."

For added protection against fluorosis, Capt. (Dr.) Michael Najera of the dental clinic offered the following tips, either of which will work:

☐ Have children drink only bottled or purified water, which has no fluoride.

The clinic can provide fluoride drops that can be added to bring the water to an optimum level.

☐ Have kids drink a mix of bottled and tap water.

# Changes reflected in electronic filing rules

Procedures for electronic filing in the 1992 tax season have been released by the Internal Revenue Service. In 1992, taxpayers nationwide may file electronically where there is a balance due on the return. This was not so before.

All electronic filers must file a revised Form 8633 (Application to Participate in the Electronic Filing Program), whether or not they have participated in the program before.

An electronic filer must also ensure that the Electronic Filing Identification Number and/or the Electronic Transmitter Identification Number assigned to it by the IRS is not used, or transferred to, any other entity.

A tax return cannot be electronically filed after Aug. 15, notwithstanding the fact that the taxpayer has been granted an extension to file. IRS Form 4868 (Application for Automatic Extension of Time To File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return) cannot be electronically filed. Further, an amended tax return cannot be electronically filed. A taxpayer must file an amended tax return on paper in accordance with the instructions for IRS Form 1040X (Amended U.S. Individual Income

Finally, a tax return that has a foreign address cannot be electronically filed. Armed Services post offices are not considered foreign addresses.



# Six receive Article 15s

Six wing members received Article 15 punishments during the first quarter of the 1992 fiscal year for a variety of offenses under the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

According to staff judge advocate, Maj. Edmund S. Bloom, commanders imposed punishments based on factors such as the seriousness of the offense and the prior service and disciplinary record of each offender. The offenses and punishments were:

☐ A staff sergeant was reduced to the grade of senior airman, ordered to forfeit \$500 pay per month for two months, restricted to Reese for 30 days, and ordered to perform 30 days extra duty for engaging in three instances of dereliction of duty, violations of Article 92, UCMJ, making false official statements on two occasions, violations of Article 107, UCMJ, and for soliciting another military member to engage in a dereliction of duty, a violation of Article 134, UCMJ.

☐ A sergeant received a suspended reduction to the grade of airman first class and was ordered to forfeit \$150 pay per month for two months for theft of base exchange property, a violation of Article 121, UCMJ.

☐ A sergeant was ordered to forfeit \$150 pay for one month and to perform seven days extra duty for engaging in drunk and disorderly conduct, a violation of Article 134,

☐ A sergeant was ordered to forfeit \$150 pay for one month and to perform seven days extra duty for engaging in disorderly conduct, a violation of Article 134, UCMJ.

☐ A senior airman received a reprimand and was ordered to perform seven days extra duty while awaiting discharge for assaulting his wife in violation of Article 128,

☐ An airman received a suspended reduction to airman basic and was ordered to forfeit \$150 pay for one month and perform seven days extra duty for consuming alcoholic beverages while underage and engaging in drunk and disorderly conduct, violations of Article 134, UCMJ.

### **CHAMPUS** news

As Reese's health benefits advisor, Carolyn Johnson hears a great number of questions about CHAMPUS and other health benefits. One of the more common questions is:

Q: I brought my husband (a retiree) into the emergency room at Reese for care. They were unable to treat him, so he was transferred to a civilian hospital in Lubbock. The civilian hospital admitted my

husband and kept him for four days. Now I am told I need a nonavailability form. Why do I need this form if the emergency room sent my husband downtown?

A: The non-availability statement is required by CHAMPUS even when the patient is referred from Reese. The only time the NAS is not required is if the patient has primary health insurance, or lives at least 50 miles from Reese.

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

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
