State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$3.93 Billion in December

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced Tuesday that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.93 billion in December, 10.5 percent more than in December 2021. The majority of December sales tax revenue is based on sales made in November and remitted to the

agency in December. "Business spending continued to be the principal driver of growth in sales tax revenue, with rapid growth in receipts from non-retail sectors," Hegar said. "The mining, construction, wholesale trade, and rental and leasing sectors had double-digit gains compared with a year ago, and receipts from the manufacturing sector remain robust as well.

"Growth in receipts from the services sector also reached double digits, while those from restaurants grew at about the rate of inflation for food away from

"Growth in overall receipts from the retail trade sector was more muted, at about the rate of inflation in consumer goods prices. The fastest growth among retail segments was in receipts from food and beverage stores, followed by online general merchandisers as late November holiday sales began. But receipts from store-based general merchandisers and furniture and home furnishings stores were little changed from a year ago, while receipts from electronics and appliance stores, and sporting goods and hobby stores, declined from last year."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in December 2022 was up 11.2 percent compared with the same period a year ago, while the rate of consumer price inflation was up 7.7 percent over the same period. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 56 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$566 million, up 7 percent from December 2021; (2) motor fuel taxes — \$317 million, up 2 percent from December 2021; (3) oil production tax — \$516 million, up 15 percent from December 2021; (4) natural gas production tax — \$371 million, down 3 percent from December 2021; (5) hotel occupancy tax — \$58 million, up 44 percent from December 2021; and (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$137 million, up 10 percent from December 2021.

He was a French mathematician and astronomer who is best known for his invention of a pendulum which demonstrates the rotation of the earth.

The axis on which the Earth rotates is an imaginary line that is drawn straight through the earth. The axis connects the North Pole to the South Pole.



The earth's rotation also determines the seasons. As the earth rotates, the sun intensifies at various angles. The Earth's various positions in space throughout the year also allows us to see different constellations.

The earth's rotation is even responsible for the Coriolis Effect, which is the defection of air currents. Air gets deflected to the right (clockwise) in the Northern hemisphere and to the left (counterclockwise) in the Southern hemisphere. Trade winds occur when the high-pressure wind gets blown to the west from 30 degrees N. Westerly winds occur when air currents are deflected to the east.

Small Town Cookin' By Jeri Lynn White

National Spaghetti Day

National Spaghetti Day is on January 4th each year. I found a quick recipe using the Instant Pot to cook up a pot of spaghetti. The recipe claims this is the easiest spaghetti recipe ever!

Instant Pot Spaghetti

Ingredients

- 1 Pound Lean Ground Beef, OR ITALIAN SAUSAGE
- ½ Teaspoon EACH Salt, Garlic Powder, Onion Powder, Italian Seasoning, OR MORE TO TASTE
- 1 Pound Spaghetti Noodles
- 1 (24 Ounce) Jar Spaghetti Sauce
- 36 Ounces Water, 1 ½ Jars 1 (14.5 Ounce) Can Diced Tomatoes, OR TOMATO SAUCE

Instructions

Set the Instant Pot to sauté' and add the ground beef. Add the salt, garlic powder, onion powder, and Italian seasonings. Cook the meat and seasonings, breaking the meat up until it's completely browned. Turn the Instant Pot off. Drain any excess grease from meat if necessary. Break the spaghetti in half and place on top of meat in the Instant Pot. Pour over the spaghetti sauce, diced tomato, and water. Push the spaghetti down with a spoon if necessary

to make sure it is completely covered in liquid. Seal the instant pot and set it to manual mode, high pressure, 8 minutes cooking time. When the time is up, use manual quick release to open the Instant Pot. Stir the spaghetti well. Serve immediately.

NOTE: This spaghetti may appear to be a little liquidy right after cooking. Be sure to stir well to incorporate all of the liquid into the noodles before serving.

NOTE: Some people have had an issue with their noodles "clumping" together. Try crisscrossing the noodles when you add them to the instant pot, instead of adding them in one big chunk. Some clumping is normal, simply use a fork to pull any noodles apart that have stuck together.

NOTE: This spaghetti will have as much flavor as you put into it! Make sure that you add extra seasoning to taste, and also use a flavorful spaghetti sauce.

Lessons from historical non-fiction

Both of my girls enjoy fiction, in particular historical fiction. Their mother is still holding out a bit, preferring the true events which inspire the stories Julie and Emily read.

New World Coming: The Roaring Twenties and the Making of Modern America is my commuter book this year. The UIL Social Studies topic covers this remarkable decade, so my investment in this book is both work and leisure.

Nathan Miller's reflections on the rise of Herbert Clark Hoover to winning the 1928 Presidential election has been particularly interesting. Hoover's historic legacy remains, for the most part, his presidency during the Stock Market Crash and subsequent Great Depression. The great irony of his administration's failure to manage the fallout of those times stands is a personal takeaway after reading and listening to Miller's 2004 publication.

Hoover's strong Quaker faith was both an altruistic motivator that led him to solve hunger problems in war-torn Europe during the World War I and the years following. That same faith impeded him during our own country's greatest

economic crisis. Hoover leaned on the tenets of "belief in the power of the individual, the importance of freedom, and the value of conscientious work and charity" (University of Virginia, Miller Center). How could such noble qualities prevent his presidency from succeeding?

As Hoover had pulled himself up by his bootstraps (an orphan by eight and separated from his siblings to live across the country in Oregon with family), he believed all individuals in a free country such as the United States had the innate power to overcome adversity with hard work. And when charity needed to be dispersed,

it should come from cooperative donations of those obliged to help because of their own good fortune.

Before becoming president, Hoover was known as the Great Humanitarian for the work he did during the Wilson administration. Before the days of the Internet, cell phones, or overseas air travel, Hoover efficiently put together a successful plan to feed ten million people in war-torn Europe, particularly Belgium-a country that Germany had obliterated on its way to France.

When the Stock Market crashed in 1929 leading to the Depression, President Hoover's belief in the power of the individual to overcome was misguided. Many wealthy patrons had lost their fortunes and could not be tapped to provide humanitarian relief. Shortages, an impacted labor market, bank closures, and fear on a grand scale were beyond charity. Hoover made some attempts with the President's Organization for Unemployment Relief, but in many ways he did not realize the magnitude of this crisis needed more than voluntarism and cooperation across many sectors. The government had a role to play, and Hoover backed away from that necessity.

This book bears witness to our 31st President's work ethic, resiliency, engineering skill, integrity, and desire to make a difference. Still, his story will never not include the failings during his four-year-term in office.

Historical non-fiction, when written with keen research and objective eyes as Miller has done, will almost always be a mirror into our own stories: the good, the bad and, hopefully, the noble: Hoover accepted the chance to again do humanitarian food relief work after the Second World War. He lived to the age of 90.

Cold weather sends prices up

Average gasoline prices in Texas rose 21.7 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.82 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 8.4 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 5.7 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. According to Gas-Buddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.27 while the most expensive was \$4.17 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 12.3 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.17 per gallon. The national average is down 22.5 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 9.5 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has fallen 1.4 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.67 per gallon.

"For the first time in two months, the nation's average price of gasoline rose sharply last week, as extremely cold weather led to many refinery issues, shutting down over a million barrels of refining capacity, pushing wholesale prices up," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan added, "In addition, China's reopening plans gave markets inspiration that global oil demand will start to recover, as China's nearly three year Covid-zero policies appear to be coming to an end. While the jump at the pump will likely be temporary as most refiners get back online after cold-weather related issues, some regions like the Rockies may see more price increases than others as cold-weather shutdowns hit the region fairly hard, with one refinery likely remaining down through the first quarter of 2023. Most areas have seen the bulk of the rise already hit, but should oil continue to rally, more increases could be on the way."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

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

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



Higher calf prices projected for Texas ranchers in 2023

Cattle ranchers should see higher calf prices in 2023, according to multiple agricultural economists and market analysts. Continued high demand for beef, strong export markets and tightened supplies due to drought are expected to push cattle prices higher. "Our numbers are tightening up as a re-

sult of the drought that we've experienced and record high feed costs. The herd has downsized more than we'd anticipated. That's going to lead to even tighter fed cattle and beef supplies in 2023, 2024 or into 2025," Randy Block, chief executive officer of CattleFax, said. He noted over 50% of the

nation's beef cattle herd suffered from drought conditions in 2022. Prolonged drought conditions and high feed costs led to a significant liquidation of the cow herd in the Lone Star State, as well as other states like Oklahoma and Kansas. Source: Texas Farm Bureau's Texas Agriculture Daily
