Comptroller will distribute \$1.2 Billion in Monthly Sales Tax Revenue

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that he will send cities, counties, transit systems, and special purpose districts \$1.2 billion in local sales tax allocations for August. These payments are a 2.8 percent increase over the total payments sent in August 2022.

Cities will receive \$7771.7 million, transit systems will get \$254.3 million, counties will get \$75.2 million, and special purpose districts will receive \$114.0 million. These payments are based on sales made in June by businesses that report tax monthly and on sales made in April, May, and June by quarterly filers.

The City of Friona will receive \$57,117.30 in sales tax allocation for the month of August. This payment is a 20.10 percent decrease from the \$71,494.15 received in August of 2022. For year-to-date 2023, Friona has received \$441,204.03 which is a 15.14 percent decrease from the YTD amount of \$519,921.94 received in 2022. The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will receive \$14,279.33 of the allocation for its operating budget.

Council proposes 2023 tax rate

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday August 14, 2023 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 617 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance. the FEDC and Happy Tribe Academy for a 0-percent, 5-year forgivable loan in the amount of \$37,581.00 to be used in part to purchase playground equipment and signage was approved.

A contract between the FEDC and Frankcurbing and gutters. Runoff will flow west to Grand Ave. and then north to Highway 60. Starting and completion dates for the project will be announced later.

A motion to accept a negotiated settlement between the executive committee of cities served by Atmos West Texas and the Atmos Corporation Energy West Texas Division regarding the company's 2023 rate proposal was approved. The settlement allows Atmos to enact a \$10 million rate increase which is approximately .72 per residential customer. Council members reviewed at report from the Parmer County Appraisal District regarding the 2023 effective tax rate. A motion for a proposed tax rate of .5900 per 100 was passed. By law, council members approved individually and affixed their signature to the tax document. The proposed rate is the second lowest in recent history with the 2022 rate being the lowest. A public hearing for the proposed rate will be held at 8:00 a.m. on Friday,

August 25th.


A motion was approved for financial assistance, as requested by City Manager Lee Davila, from the FEDC in the amount of \$18,000 to be used for the Community Center Bathroom Remodel/Replacement Project.

The bid of \$66,740.00 from Bermea Construction Inc. for the Street Construction Project on 8th Street between Grand Ave. and Ashland Ave. was approved. The project will include gathered, including ordinances from other cities, before the appropriate officials can start the ordinance process.

Four agenda items were tabled until the next meeting. They included two requests for city water service, consideration of a purchase contract for real property with Kendrick Oil, and consideration of a engagement letter with a qualified auditor for the completion of the 2022 audit for the City of Friona.

In other business, the accounts payable for July 2023 were approved as well as the financial statement for July 2023. A budget workshop was scheduled for 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, August 30th. The next scheduled meeting is Monday, September 11th.





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

Commissioners working on budget

Parmer County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, August 14, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.


Commissioners are currently working on next year's budget. Judge Carrasco released some preliminary numbers. The new budget will be approximately \$7.1 million. General revenue is projected to be \$5 million and FM revenue is projected to be \$2.1 million. General expenses would be around \$5.3 million and expenses for the four precincts would total \$1.8 million. Note: These are just preliminary numbers.

Rita Fyffe led a discussion with commissioners concerning the Family & Medical Leave Act which comes into play when an organization has 50 or more employees. Parmer County will soon have to implement the FMLA for its employees.

Sheriff Geske reported to the Court that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center is currently housing 32 inmates of which 12 are paying customers from Lubbock County.

In other business, a contract extension with Rana Crow to maintain the county website for \$200 per month was approved. Commissioners also approved the County Road and Bridge Fee for another year.

Maui Fire — The Maui wildfire is responsible for at least 99 deaths, making it the deadliest in the U.S. in over a century. It destroyed the town of Lahaina which had a population of 12,000 people. 



Air Fryer Chicken Fajitas

Here is an easy version of chicken fajitas to go along with our theme for this month of healthy air fryer recipes.

Air Fryer Chicken Fajitas www.everydayfamilycooking.com

INGREDIENTS

tortillas for serving

1/2 pound boneless and skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1/2-inch wide strips
1 large red or yellow bell pepper, cut into strips
1 medium red onion, cut into strips
1 tablespoon olive oil
1 tablespoon chili powder
2 teaspoons lime juice
1 teaspoon cumin
Salt and pepper to taste **OPTIONAL**pinch of cayenne pepper

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat your air fryer to 370°F. Put the chicken strips, bell pepper, onion, oil, chili powder, lime juice, cumin, salt and pepper, and cayenne pepper (if using) in a bowl and mix. Place the chicken fajitas in the air fryer and cook for 10-13 minutes, shaking the basket halfway through. The fajitas are done when the chicken hits 165°F at its thickest point. Remove the fajitas from the air fryer, warm tortillas if needed, and enjoy!

Study shows cardamom increases appetite, burns fat

Spice could be used to aid weight loss, athletic performance, convalescence

A new study by Texas A&M AgriLife revealed a range of health and dietary benefits of consuming cardamom, including increased appetite, fat loss and inflammation reduction, making the spice a "superfood."

The study's principal investigator, Luis Cisneros-Zevallos, Ph.D., horticulture and food science professor, Department of Horticultural Sciences in the Texas A&M College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, and affiliate scientist with the Institute for Advancing Health Through Agriculture at Texas A&M AgriLife, said the Texas A&M AgriLife Research study shows cardamom could be a healthy dietary choice, and that its consumption can help maintain lean body weight and reduce fat.

"Professor Cisneros-Zevallos's research program is discovering the fundamental basis of how various horticulture crops impact human health," said Amit Dhingra, Ph.D., head of the Department of Horticultural Sciences. "This work directly aligns with the sustainability, wellness and food security focus of our department." The research "Cardamom Seeds Intake Increases Energy Expenditure and Reduces Fat Mass in Mice by Modulating Neural Circuits That Regulate Adipose Tissue Lipolysis and Mitochondrial Oxidative Metabolism in Liver and Skeletal Muscle," was published in International Journal of Molecular Sciences. Cardamom is a popular spice in many parts of the world and the study findings should expand its popularity. The spice has a warm herbal flavor and an aroma that blends eucalyptus, mint and pepper.

known in the U.S. but very common in other parts of the world," Cisneros-Zevallos said. "What we found is that this small spice can burn calories and maintain body weight while increasing appetite and food consumption."

Cardamom study shows health benefits

The studies were conducted using live animal specimens and applied various doses of cardamom seeds in a regular diet. Researchers found that cardamom increases appetite but also increases energy expenditure and fat mass reduction, Cisneros-Zevallos said.

The study also provided estimated dosages for humans – at least 77 milligrams of cardamom bioactives for an adult around 132 pounds. It stated this beneficial dose may be obtained from consuming at least 8 to 10 cardamom pods every day.

The study confirmed cardamom modulates neural circuits that regulate adipose tissue lipolysis and mitochondrial oxidative metabolism in liver and skeletal muscle. Cisneros-Zevallos said other related studies have shown cardamom has anti-inflammatory properties. His research indicates that cardamom may reduce lowgrade inflammation that can lead to chronic inflammation and the development of a range of diseases. "Our team has discovered an amazing opportunity to utilize cardamom as a promoter of overall health," he said. "Cardamom seeds, with this new functionality, can be used in different industries, including the sports industry, functional foods and dietary supplements to favor the production of healthier foods."

work with the National Institute of Medical Sciences and Nutrition Salvador Zubiran, INCMNSZ, in Mexico City, Mexico. The interdisciplinary research team included Claudia Delgadillo-Puga, Ph.D., and Ivan Torre-Villalvazo, Ph.D., both with the national institute.

Creating economic opportunities

Cisneros-Zevallos said the research showed cardamom consumption helped appetite and weight loss. He believes this new functionality discovered in cardamom can be used in the growing market of sports nutrition or as an aid to increase appetite in convalescent people.

"There is a wide range of potential health products for cardamom and its naturally occurring compounds," he said.

The discovery is a win for both health-conscious consumers and Guatemalan farmers. Currently, there are more than 350,000 families in Guatemala practicing sustainable and environmental cardamom shade-farming in the tropical forest. "Cardamom is of great importance economically for Guatemala," he said. "Expanding its use in the U.S. and globally could provide stability to farmers and aid in the immigration crisis observed in recent years." The study was funded by Heifer International in Guatemala and by the Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture in Costa Rica. Additional support was provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture through the Community Revitalization and Investment Authority program, the Ministry of Agriculture of Guatemala and the Institute for Advancing Health through Agriculture at Texas A&M AgriLife.

Gas prices lower in Texas By GasBuddy

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 4.1 cents last week, averaging \$3.41 per gakkib, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 25.9 cents higher than a month ago and stand unchanged compared to a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.71 while the most expensive was \$4.49 per es remain under pressure from recent OPEC+ production cuts," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.


"While July CPI data looked pretty good with energy prices well below their year-ago level, August data isn't going to look nearly as friendly. Gasoline prices stand just over a dime away from rising back above their year ago level something that is definitely possible by the closing summer holiday. In addition, the largest refinery in the Midwest moved up its seasonal maintenance to several weeks earlier than expected, causing a somewhat unexpected jump at the pump in the Great Lakes. Motorists will likely see a mixed bag at the pump this week, with a few states seeing prices fall slightly, while others will see the opposite." GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

The national average price of gasoline rose 2.5 cents last week, averaging \$3.82 per gallon. State Capital Highlights

Record sea temps could spur more hurricanes

Forecasters for the National Weather Service are anticipating a more active hurricane season this year because of record-warm ocean surface temperatures, the Texas Tribune reported.

Hurricane season runs through the

end of November. The Climate Prediction Center now predicts six to 11 hurricanes this season in the Atlantic Ocean, with as many as five of those being major hurricanes. rologist in Galveston, said the higher prediction is the result of the higher sea surface temperatures.

"The name of the game this season seems to be the heat because it's been quite exceptional," Brokamp told the Tribune.

Another NWS meteorologist, Jeff Lutze, based in Corpus Christi, said the higher probability of Atlantic hurricanes increases the likelihood of a storm striking Southeast Texas.

"The big question mark is whether or not we'll get the upper air pattern to allow the storms to get this far into the Gulf of Mexico," Lutz said. Some of the most damaging hurricanes to hit Texas in recent years came in August or September.

Abbott signs largest property tax cut in state history

Abbott last week ceremonially signed legislation that — if voters approve it in November as expected — will provide what he is calling the largest property tax cut in Texas history. The \$18 billion reduction raises the homestead exemption to \$100,000 and provides other tax-reduction measures.

Voters will decide its fate as one of 14 proposed constitutional amendments in November. The measure is widely expected to pass, as do most measures to reduce taxes when placed on the ballot.

"As the saying goes, everything is bigger in Texas—and now that includes property tax relief," House Speaker Phelan said at the ceremony.



[he] finally [re-appeared] in August 1590, everyone had vanished."





HE SETTLED IN FRIONA WHERE HE OPENED THE TOWN'S FIRST BARBERSHOP IN 1926 AND CUT HAIR FOR GENERATIONS. IN 1951, A YOUNG LEE GIBSON WENT TO WORK FOR MR. ANDERSON AS A SHOESHINER AND GENERAL CARETAKER. AFTER GRADUATING BARBER SCHOOL, GIBSON BEGAN WORKING AT JACK'S IN 1963 AS A BARBER. THEY WORKED TOGETHER UNTIL MR. ANDERSON'S DEATH IN 1969. MR. GIBSON BOUGHT THE SHOP THAT SAME YEAR AND RAN THE BUSINESS FOR SEVERAL DECADES. THE BARBERSHOP REMAINS ONE OF THE FEW STRUCTURALLY-UNCHANGED HISTORIC BUILDINGS FROM EARLY DAYS OF FRIONA'S HISTORY.

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
