

Accident claims life of Friona woman

Cinthya Guerrero, 30, of Friona died in a two vehicle accident early Monday morning approximately one mile southwest of Friona.

According to a preliminary report by Texas Highway Patrol Troopers, a 1999 Peterbilt truck tractor towing a semi-trailer driven by Jose Ortega, 26, of Clovis, New Mexico was was facing northbound on County Road 17 and stopped at the stop sign at the intersection with US 60. Guerrero, driving a 2015 Chevrolet Cruze, was westbound on US 60, traveling in the inside lane. Ortega crossed over the eastbound lanes of US 60 and entered the crossover in the center median to travel west on US 60. Ortega failed to yield the right of way and entered the westbound inside lane in the path of Guerrero, resulting in a collision. Ortega was wearing a seat belt and Guerrero was not.

Death Inquest was conducted by Parmer County Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 Rhonda Wilkins.

The accident occurred at approximately 6:50 a.m. on Monday, December 11th. Road conditions were clear and dry. The crash remains under investigation.

Legal challenges to amendments appear quashed

A half-dozen lawsuits challenging the 13 approved Texas constitutional amendments appear to be dead in the water, The Dallas Morning News reported. The secretary of state's office last week declared the propositions approved and now a part of the Texas Constitution, while Gov. Greg Abbott canvassed the election and certified the results. One proposition that would have raised the retirement age of judges was rejected by voters.

In addition, the Texas attorney general's office said the lawsuits had improper "citation and return of service." The plaintiffs are unable to correction those citations because the election results have been certified.

The six nearly identical lawsuits claimed the state used uncertified polling machines that exposed the election to voter fraud, and the plaintiffs called for the courts to throw out the Nov. 7 results and hold a new election using paper ballots only, The News reported.

The suits threatened to delay voter-approved property tax cuts and a raise in retired teachers' pensions.

Abbott enters primary battle fray, mum on fifth special session

The Texas Legislature's fourth special session ended last week with the House and Senate still at loggerheads over Abbott's push to allow the use of taxpayer money to pay for private school costs, commonly known as school vouchers. Last month, 21 House Republicans joined with Democrats to remove the voucher provision from a broad education bill that

Abbott is sticking to his promise to endorse primary challengers to House Republicans who voted against the voucher plan, the Texas Tribune reported. With the holiday season underway, it appears unlikely there will be another special session this year, but Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick said he believed the best day to come back for another session "would be Feb. 5, 30 days before the election."

The impasse means legislation to increase public school funding, provide teacher bonuses and hike funding for school safety measures also died on the vine.

State halts efforts to take Fairfield Lake property

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has ceased its efforts to seize a 5,000-acre tract of private land that once included a state park and adjoins Fairfield Lake, The News reported. A private developer purchased the property from a utility company for about \$103 million last June and plans to close Fairfield Lake State Park were announced. The land for the park had been leased from Vistra Corp., the utility company for 50 years.

Todd Interests, the developer, plans to build luxury homes with a golf course, restaurants and shops, as well as access to a private air strip. Less than two weeks after the developer bought the property, the state voted to condemn the land using eminent domain.

judge-appointed commission of three Freestone County residents put the fair market value of the property at \$418.3 million - more than four times what

the developer paid for it. Fairfield Lake is considered the largest privately owned lake in the state and possibly the nation, The News reported.

State seeks public input on broadband internet

The Texas Broadband Development Office is soliciting input from the public on the proposed Texas Digital Opportunity Plan, which seeks to improve and expand broadband access across the state. Almost 7 million Texans lack access to high-speed internet, or nearly 25% of residents.

"Access to reliable, high-speed internet as a means of advancing education, training, employment opportunities, healthcare, and delivery of essential services is critical to the future of our state," said Glenn Hegar, comptroller.

Through Jan. 5 of next year, Texans can give their opinions on the plan by visiting broadbandfortexas.com/tdop.

The newly created broadband office is partnering with chambers of commerce, the Texas Workforce Commission, industry associations and elected officials to highlight the importance of access to high-speed internet in today's digital world.

Workers' comp costs drop in state

A report issued by the Texas Department of Insurance indicates that the cost of treating injured employees in the state's workers' compensation system dropped considerably from 2012 through 2022. Total health care costs dropped 30%, from \$1.15 billion in 2012 to \$812 million last year, while the total number of claims dropped 20% during the same period, from 319,000 to 256,000.

Hospital costs also dropped 20% in that decade, while the costs for professional services such as physicians - was down 26%, from \$657 million to \$483 million.

The report used administrative data reported by insurance carriers for the 10-year period. The costs were not adjusted for inflation, which would have made the decrease in costs even greater.

PUC approves new price protections during power emergencies


The Public Utility Commission has implemented a new Emergency Pricing Program that limits consumer exposure to high wholesale electricity prices during power emergencies, as occurred during Winter Storm Uri in February 2021.

"Implementing the Emergency Pricing Program provides another layer of financial protection for Texas consumers and will ensure their electricity bills remain affordable even when conditions are tight in the ERCOT system," Thomas Gleeson, PUC executive director, said.

The new program comes after passage of Senate Bill 3 during the last regular legislative session.

"This is a key part of our ongoing work to ensure electric reliability for Texans at a reasonable cost,"





Maple Syrup Day — Maple syrup is usually from the xylem sap of sugar maple, red maple, or black maple trees. In cold climates, these trees store starch in their trunks and in their roots. In the spring, the starch is then converted to sugar that rises in the sap. The maple trees are then tapped by boring holes into their trunks and the released sap is collected. After the sap is collected, it is processed by heating to evaporate much of the water, leaving the concentrated syrup. A maple syrup production farm is called a sugarbush or a sugarwood. The sap is boiled in a sugar house which is also known as a sugar shack, sugar shanty, or a cabane à sucre. Cana-



Healthy Soups

Here is another warm and comfy soup for cold days. I like the idea of having the taste of lasagna without the work of lasagna. Hope you enjoy.

Lasagna Soup allthehealthythings.com

Ingredients:

1 tablespoon olive oil 1 pound lean ground beef

1/2 pound Italian sausage

6 cloves garlic, minced

1 yellow onion, diced 2 teaspoons Italian seasoning

1 teaspoon salt, plus more to taste

1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes

1 tablespoon tomato paste

28 oz crushed tomatoes 1-15 oz can fire roasted tomatoes

4 cups chicken broth

Directions:

Heat a large heavy-bottomed pot over medium-high heat. Once hot, add the olive oil and then add the ground beef and Italian sausage. Brown the meat, breaking it up as it cooks. Once the meat has browned, add the diced onion and minced garlic. Cook for a few more minutes until the onion begins to become translucent. Next, add the Italian seasoning, salt, red pepper flakes, and tomato paste. Stir until well combined. Add the crushed tomatoes, fire roasted tomatoes, chicken broth, and dried bay leaf and stir. Bring the soup to a boil and then cover and reduce the heat to medium-low and let simmer for 20-25 minutes.

1 dried bay leaf

1 large zucchini, sliced

8 lasagna noodles, broken in half

1/4 cup chopped basil (plus more for garnish)

Cheese Topping for Serving

8 oz ricotta cheese

1/2 cup shredded mozzarella

1/2 cup parmesan cheese

1 tablespoon lemon juice

2 tablespoons fresh chopped basil

1 tablespoon fresh chopped parsley generous pinch of salt and pepper

Cook the Noodles:

While the soup is simmering, cook the lasagna noodles. Break the noodles in half before adding them to a large pot of boiling water that has been seasoned with salt. Stir them occasionally to prevent sticking. Once the noodles are al dente, drain them and let the cool a bit. Use a sharp knife to cut the lasagna noodle halves in half again. Set aside.



Angels watched on in wonder as did I suspect a few others who shared their home with this couple for the night. The day had finally come, and the Christ child arrived with little fanfare. The story I am about to tell happened when Lauren was a junior in high school; she is now 34. I may not have all the details straight, but it is the way I remember the story, and the way I have always told it.

At cheerleading camp that year, Friona's cheerleaders were selected to perform at the Orange Bowl pre-game in Florida. They raised the money for the trip and were on their way! One of the things they had to do was go to Lubbock once a week to learn and practice the routine they were going to perform.

One Wednesday night, there was blowing snow across the road, and school was moved back two hours for the next day. Lauren asked if she could stay up late and watch TV. I told her she could, but to be sure and unplug the Christmas tree lights when she went to bed. She said she would.

Feller was always at work at 5 a.m., but when the weather was bad, he would go in an hour or so earlier. I always slept through him getting up and getting off to work, but this particular morning, I woke up, and I could tell the Christmas tree lights were still plugged in. Feller unplugged them and went to work.

When Lauren came home from school that afternoon, she told me the cheerleaders' van broke down at Muleshoe. The weather had gotten progressively worse; it was getting later and later in the night. Kirk Wright was in charge of the bus barn, and Briana was a cheerleader. Kirk got another van, drove to Muleshoe, and picked up the girls.

By now, it was really late; it was hard to see because of the blowing snow. Everyone on Highway 214 had gone to bed, so there weren't lights on at houses. It was a slow drive back to Friona, and it didn't help that they couldn't tell where they were. Lauren said everyone was scared; that is, until they got to our house and saw the Christmas tree lights on.

They knew where they were; they knew they were close to Friona and their homes. All the fear and anxiety they were feeling melted into joy and peace at the sight of the light of a Christmas tree. I will always believe God kept Lauren from unplugging those lights. Before she went to bed, she walked by the tree at least four times and never once thought about unplugging the lights!

We are in the season of Advent where we are watching, preparing, waiting for our Light, Jesus Christ, the One who takes our fears, anxieties, stress and turns them into peace and joy. He is the Light that guides us, just like He guided the one who drove the Friona cheerleaders home that night. He is the Light that makes us feel safe! He is the Light that shines through us as we live for Him. He is the Light in His Word that teaches us about who He is; that teaches us how to live and how to serve Him: He is the Light that is our salvation and eternity.

The Light comes to us in many different ways. We should always be looking for the Light to guide us, teach us, direct us, so we can know where we are going, and where we need to go. We can never extinguish the Light of Christ; it is eternal, and there is great peace and comfort in that!

May you see and experience the Light of Christ this Christmas and every day afterward!

Comptroller Distributes \$1.1B to Local Governments

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.1 billion in local sales tax allocations for December, 2.5 percent more than in December

2022.
Texas cities will receive \$681.6 million, transit systems will get

\$229.8 million, counties will get \$66.2 million, and special purpose districts will receive \$100.2 million.

The City of Friona will receive \$51,971.79 in sales tax allocation for the month of December. This payment represents a 3.21 percent decrease from the \$53,697.04 received in December of

2022.

For year-to-date 2023, Friona has received \$668,341.74 which is a 10.41 percent decrease from the YTD amount of \$746,053.21 received in 2022. The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will receive \$12,992.95 of the December allocation for its operating budget.

Lower gas prices for the holidays

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 14.0 cents last week, averaging \$2.56 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 20.3 cents lower than a month ago and stand 10.2 cents lower than a year ago.

According to Gas-Buddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$1.59 while the most expensive was \$3.99 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline fell 9.6 cents last week, averaging \$3.11 per gallon. The national average is

down 23.7 cents from a month ago and stands 10.1 cents lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel fell 8.4 cents last week and stands at \$4.10 per gallon.

"For the 12th straight week, or three straight months, the national average has continued to decline, now at its lowest level of 2023 heading into the prime of the holiday season as oil prices continue to struggle amidst cooling demand," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at Gas-Buddy.

"With nearly 80,000 gas stations in the U.S. now priced below \$3 per gallon, and 23 states also seeing average prices of \$2.99 or less, motorists are getting substantial relief at the pump in time for the holidays. The trend is likely to continue in most states this week, while the national average could soon fall below \$3.05 per gallon, the lowest since 2021," De Haan added.

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.
