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Annual fundraiser exceeds expectations to build museum in Knox County

Over \$5,000 was raised at the annual Friends of the Knox County Historical Commission barbecue and auction held on Sunday, February 6

The proceeds from the event will go toward the group's goal to meet a challenge grant from the Priddy Foundation of Wichita Falls over the next 18 months to complete the Wichita-Brazos Museum and Cultural Center. For every two dollars raised by the Friends, the Foundation will match with one dollar.

According to Mary Jane Young of the Knox County Historical Commission, the funds are in hand to raise the walls and the roof on the recently poured foundation. Anticipated funds will go toward finishing the interior of the building.


The annual fundraising event included a barbecue lunch, a silent

auction and a large number of door prizes. The prized quilt was won by David Albus of Knox City. The quilt was pieced by Mary Cartwright and quilted by Janice Albus.

Introduced at the annual fundraiser were granite and brick permanent markers that individuals, families and businesses may purchase to show their support for the museum.

The markers range in price from \$100 to \$1,500 and more information on them may be obtained from the Knox County Historical Commission at the county courthouse in Benjamin or by writing to the Friends of K.C.H.C. at P. O. Box 104, Benjamin, Texas 79505.

Other ongoing and future fundraising projects of the group include a cookbook and the sale of calendars which feature historic photographs of Knox County.

Time to top dress winter wheat

AMARILLO - Wet fall and winter weather has wheat in excellent shape across the Texas Panhandle and South Plains. But with the moisture come a few problems, area Texas Cooperative Extension agronomists say.

Winter weeds and leached nitrogen are two negatives which may be problems in the crop as it begins to grow, said Dr. Brent Bean, Extension agronomist in Amarillo.

"For the most part, fall and winter rain and snow have replenished subsoil moisture to levels that should give the region the potential for an excellent wheat yield, assuming spring weather conditions are not drastically different from our long-term average," Bean said.

Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research has shown that one uncontrolled tansy mustard weed per square foot can reduce dryland wheat yield by 10 percent.


These weeds should be controlled while they are small and have not used up valuable soil moisture needed by the wheat crop this spring, Bean said.

Mustards that have grown out of the rosette stage and are beginning to bolt or flower are much more difficult to control. Also, less herbicide can be used to control small weeds compared to larger weeds, he said. Many of the herbicides labeled for use in wheat, including 2,4-D, are effective on small mustard weeds.


In choosing a herbicide, consider how much residual effect is needed and which crop will be planted on the land following the wheat. Under the crop rotation plan, use the herbicide with the longest

The Houndettes from Knox City played their final regular season game on their home court on Tuesday night. The Houndettes did not need the advantage as they soundly defeated Guthrie, 90-31.

The win put the KC gals at 10-2 in the district season and a sound second place finish behind Aspermont. The Houndettes will face Klondike in the Bi-District playoff game on Tuesday, February 15 at 6:00 p.m. in Sweetwater.

Junior Nikki Moss led the Houndettes scoring against Guthrie with another big game of 20 points. Teammates Kayla Martin, Brittany Hawkins and Kursten Stafford also posted double-digits on the night with 15, 11, and 10 points.

"We were really on our game", said Knox City coach Miller.

National Child Passenger Safety Week is Feb. 13-19

Sharing candy, flowers, hearts and other symbols of love is the way most Americans celebrate Valentine's Day, February 14.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration chose the week of this "loving" holiday to-commemorate the National Child Passenger Safety Week, Feb. 13-19. "What better way for parents to show how much they love their children than to buckle them up whenever they travel in a car?" said a Texas Cooperative Extension expert

This year, the focus is on increasing the use of booster seats, said Bev Kellner, Extension program coordinator for passenger safety.

Between 94 percent and 99 percent of the nation's children aged 4 and younger regularly ride restrained in vehicles, Kellner said, but "only 10 percent to 20 percent

of children ages 4 to 8 ride correctly restrained in booster seats."

And with good reason. According to information from the safety administration's Web site at http://www.nhtsa.dot.gov/people/injury/childps/CPSWeekPlanner2005/pages/FactSheet.htm, crashes involving motor vehicles are the No. 1 killer of children ages 2-14.

"But children ages 4-8 who use booster seats and safety belts are 59 percent less likely to be injured in a car crash than children who are restrained only by a safety belt," the administration's Web site information stated.

Children who have outgrown child safety seats are still physically too small to be protected through the use of safety belts alone.

"Safety belts, which are designed to fit adults, won't fully restrain a child in a crash," the safety agency reported. "Using a booster seat will better protect your child from being thrown from the vehicle, or thrown

around inside it, during a crash."

In order to make the message stronger, Texas State Rep. Fred Brown has proposed House Bill 183, "which raises the required age for child restraint systems from 4 years or less than 36 inches tall to 8 years or less than 57 inches tall," Kellner said.

In addition to making sure children have appropriate seating in passenger vehicles, Kellner said, make sure those seats are installed properly and that all children ages 12 and younger are seated in the backsoot.

"A 2002 study by National Safe Kids reported an almost 82 percent misuse rate for child safety seats," Kellner said. "The Passenger Safety Project at Texas Cooperative Extension reports a 99 percent misuse rate in the more than 5,000 child safety seat installations the project has overseen."

The safety administration listed three most common errors when it comes to child safety seats and their installation in a vehicle:

- The seat isn't attached tightly

enough to the vehicle;The harness isn't fastened tightly

enough; and
- The chest clip isn't used correctly

or used at all. .

Kellner also advised using

this booster seat checklist from SafetyBeltSafe USA agency to

Iraq's Elections Show Hope for Democracy

There is little that people living in Iraq have not seen in the 5,500 years that have elapsed since the world's first literate society, Sumeria, arose on the banks of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers. But recently, the long-suffering people of this nation experienced something new - they voted in free elections.

"Now I feel that Saddam is really gone," Fatima Ibrahim told MSNBC after casting her ballot in Irbil, in the Kurdish northern region. She was a young bride of 14 and only married three months when her husband, father and brother were rounded up by Saddam Hussein's police and have never

This woman and millions of her fellow Iraqis refused to be intimidated by terrorist threats and went to the polls. In an election widely hailed as fair and free, over 60 percent of the Iraqi people turned out. Even Sunni Iraqis ignored calls by their religious leaders to boycott the election and voted in higher than expected numbers. The election is for 13 provincial councils and the new 275-seat National Assembly, which will draft a new constitution.

Neighboring Jordan watched the elections with great interest. King Abdullah II offered congratulations and said the successful election proved the Iraqi people are "stronger than the extremist groups trying to destabilize

As President Bush noted in his stirring inaugural speech, "The survival of liberty in our land increasingly depends on the success of liberty in other lands. The best hope for peace in our world is the expansion of freedom in

Unfortunately, while the Iraqi people have begun their pursuit of democracy, they still face thugs who desperately want to deny this new nation freedom. Jihadists allied to Al Qaeda and remnants of the brutal regime of Saddam Hussein are trying to regain power.

We should not let the horror of these tactics obscure an important point: the terrorists fear what an Iraqi democracy would mean for their cause. The Jihadists and Baathists fear history will sweep them aside, and they are doing all they can to block the spread of freedom.

Abu Musab Al Zarqawi, the Jordanian who has publicly declared allegiance to Osama Bin Laden, and is considered the architect of attacks on U.S. and Iraqi forces, has said as much. "We have declared a fierce war on this evil principle of democracy and those who follow this wrong ideology. Anyone who tries to help set up this system is part of it."

Further, Osama Bin Laden himself, in a recent Al-Jazeera-distributed tape, urged Iraqis not to participate in the election.

The important thing to keep in mind is that the Iraqi people demonstrated in impressive numbers that, however difficult the path may be, this election was a key step toward complete self-rule and the establishment of a democratic system of government.

We should remember our own past, when, after the conclusion of the Revolutionary War, our nation was torn by, first, Shays' Rebellion and, later, the Whiskey Rebellion. These challenges to the new republic led some to doubt the survival of the American experiment.

The path has occasionally been rocky since then. Women marched, suffered ridicule, and were sometimes jailed as they sought the right to vote in the early part of the 20th Century. Only 40 years ago, African American leaders risked their lives to secure the same liberties others already enjoyed

during the struggle for civil rights. While our progress has been difficult at times, our democratic republic has not only survived; it has prospered. Today we are a beacon of hope and freedom for the world, proving that democracy is not achieved overnight. Although it sometime seems fractious and divisive, it still provides the best form of government man has yet devised.

We must bear those lessons in mind as we support the democratic process in Iraq. It may not be perfect, but it is an important step in the right direction. Recently, our nation saw a touching demonstration of the Iraqis' appreciation of our sacrifices during President George W. Bush's State of the Union Address. Safia Taleb al-Suhail, leader of the Iraqi Women's Political Council, hugged and comforted Janet Norwood of Pflugerville, Texas, whose son was killed in Iraq while serving with the Marines.

By seeing this struggle through, we will deliver a devastating blow to the terrorists and a resounding victory for freedom. I want our friends in Iraq who value liberty to know that we Texans do not abandon our friends when things get difficult. Our country must remain a reliable friend of freedom.

COW PAINTING

My wife collects cow art. I don't think it was anything she planned, or if it was even her idea. She once worked for the state cattle growers association and has always had an "Eat Beef" license on the front of her car. So, I suspect somebody gave her a small cow knick-knack.

Later, a neighbor was visiting, saw the knick-knack and concluded she collected cows! When the occasion arose for a gift, that same neighbor gave my wife another cow knickknack. An avalanche began. Now our house is festooned with photos, paintings, statuettes, refrigerator magnets, key chains, temp tats, sweaters, sweatshirts and hoof and horn motif.

When cities began displaying life-sized painted plastic cows on street corners and in store windows, the barrage increased. I've never quite understood the painted cow (or horse, or buffalo, or wombat) art, though it's very creative. A piano company for instance would display a grand cow with her rib cage propped open and a keyboard for teeth. A jeweler would have a water belly steer covered with glistening calculi stones, and a Mexican food restaurant's cow would look like a piñata.

But where did the idea come from? I think I know. The story has been passed down through the generations of Sierra Nevada ranchers, California vaqueros and sale barn bull haulers until it has achieved legend proportions.

Señor Geraldo, rich rancher, good neighbor and Angus man noticed one of his bulls was gone. He called his neighbor, another wealthy landlord and cattle baron. Sure enough, Geraldo's bull was running rampant in the neighbor's pen of crossbred heifers. Señor Geraldo saddled his registered purebred, standing-at-stud stallion, loaded and trailered him to the neighbors, sorted off the bull and with much whacking and colorful drover language, trailered him home.

The next morning the bull had escaped and returned to the neighbor's fertile playground. Geraldo repeated the saddling, loading, whacking and cursing but the bull stood his ground. Help was called. A local cowboy saddled, loaded and drove to lend assistance. Alas, even two buen caballeros could not move the stubborn bull.

Rolling Plains Ramblings

Already this year I have been amazed and awed by the Human

Two weeks ago we saw the brave citizens of Iraq knowingly risk their very lives to exercise that most sacred right of democracies everywhere - the right to vote.

Drama was intense in war-torn Iraq. The terrorists had threatened to kill any Iraqi who voted in the election. The suicide bombings and exploding rockets in the days prior to the election emphasized the reality of the threats.

At one Iraqi polling place, a hand grenade exploded, injuring several citizens in line to vote. The explosion ripped a leg off an elderly man.

Others in line rushed to help those injured, including the elderly man. They loaded the injured into a waiting ambulance.

The elderly man refused to be taken. They told him he was losing too much blood and if they didn't take him to the hospital he might

"I must vote," he said. "I want to vote first. If I die, I will die casting my vote."

At another polling place, a suicide bomber standing in line killed several Iraqis. One of those killed was a young boy standing in line with his mother. Again, people rushed to help those injured; trying to hurry them away from danger. The mother refused to leave the

line to the ballot box. "I will vote first," she said.

"Then I will mourn my son."

As in Afghanistan, women in particular turned out in large numbers. The women were in one line. The concern was that women suicide bombers might hide bombs in the bulky burkhas worn by many Muslim women. They would pat each other down to find hidden bombs. In doing so, they knowingly risked their lives.

At another voting area, an Iraqi policeman saw a terrorist standing in the line of people waiting to vote. He grabbed the terrorists as he set off a hand grenade.

The guard minimized the explo-

sion and kept those in the line from being injured or killed. The brave guard died so others could vote.

These Iraqis expressed the value of freedom. They accepted the responsibility that goes with freedom and the right to vote.

Those of us in the United States could take a lesson from these former victims of the tyrant, Saddam Hussein. In our presidential elections, only about half our qualified citizens actually bother to cast a vote. We have grown used to our freedom, but do not always accept the responsibilities that go with it.

Next week I'll the story of the first reservation for southern plains Indians. The hopes were that this reservation would keep the Comanches and other Indian tribes from raiding homes in the northwestern frontier of Texas. It didn't, but I'll bring you that story next week.



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

determine if a child needs to ride in a booster seat. When seated in a passenger vehicle

- Does the child sit all the way back against the auto seat?

- Do the child's knees bend comfortably at the edge of the seat? - Does the safety belt shoulder harness

cross the shoulder between the neck

- Does the lap belt rest as low as possible, touching the thighs?

- Can the child remain comfortably seated this way for the entire trip?

If the answer to any of these questions is "no," Kellner said, the child needs to ride in a booster seat.

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

tolerated residual, Bean said. A list of herbicides labeled for

wheat, along with residual and crop rotation restrictions, can be found in the agronomy sections' of the Amarillo and Lubbock Extension Experiment Station Web sites: www.lubbock.tamu.edu and www.amarillo.tamu.edu.

Dr. Calvin Trostle, Extension agronomist at Lubbock, said producers may see light green wheat foliage when growth occurs during cool, cloudy weather. If this yellowgreen color persists after several days of sunshine, it is likely due to inadequate nitrogen. "The presence of vigorous darker

green wheat growth around cattle droppings and urine spots is added evidence that nitrogen is deficient," Trostle said. "Also, nitrogendeficient wheat will generally have yellow older leaves as the plant transfers nitrogen to younger growing leaves."

If both conditions exist, weeds and nitrogen deficiency, producers should consider applying herbicide and fertilizer together in order to save on application costs, the agronomists said. Some wheat diseases, such as wheat streak mosaic and high plains disease, can produce yellowing symptoms that may be confused for nitrogen deficiency. The leaves will show an irregular mosaic or mottled

pattern of yellowish and normal green if these diseases are present.

The rule of thumb for determining wheat nitrogen need is 1.5 pounds of nitrogen per bushel of expected yield, Bean said. For example, a 35-bushel wheat crop that has not been grazed will require 52.5 pounds of nitrogen for the entire growing season. In the absence of a soil test, dryland wheat exhibiting nitrogen deficiency symptoms should be fertilized with 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen. An irrigated wheat field should be fertilized with 60 pounds of nitrogen, with additional nitrogen applied in the irrigation water later as needed, depending on the yield goal, the agronomists said.

"Ideally the nitrogen should be applied two weeks prior to wheat jointing," Bean said. "This will hopefully improve the chances of the nitrogen moving into the soil where the roots can pick up the nitrogen when the wheat begins its rapid growth during the jointing phase."

Research has shown very little benefit to grain yield when nitrogen is applied after the second joint (node) is visible on the wheat plant, Bean said. Any nitrogen added after this may benefit grain protein, but will have little effect on yield.

Leaf burn from liquid nitrogen can be minimized by applying nitrogen while temperatures are cool. Even if leaf burn occurs, it will have little effect on final grain yield, he said.


season finale OT win

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


