





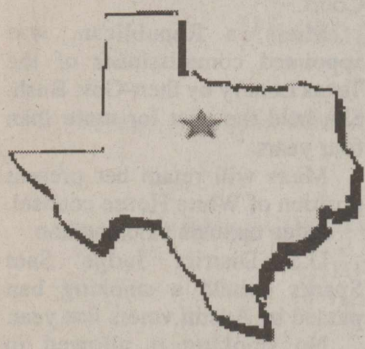

## Veterans Day Program To Be Held November 11, 2005

The 2005 Knox County Veterans Day program will be held Friday, November 11, at the Veterans Memorial in Benjamin, at 11 a.m.

The family of Arthur Thomas Cooke the Gold Star Family, will be recognized and place a memorial wreath at the arch, which is engraved with the names of Knox County veterans killed in war. His parents were Wiley Thomas and Ottis Tomison Cook of Gilliland.

He graduated from Gilliland School in 1942 and was drafted into the Army in 1943. He was in the 27th Infantry of the 25th Division and killed the 31st day of January 1945, in the battle at

Luzon. He is buried in the Manila American Cemetery and Memorial at Manila, Philippine Islands.

From 9:30 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. a historical exhibit related to veterans and American wars will be opened to the public in the Assembly Room on the first floor of the Knox County courthouse. A hamburger meal with beans and homemade cobbles will be served at noon at the Benjamin Ex-Students Memorial Center.

The Veterans Books with information of veterans engraved on the memorial will be on display. We welcome any additional information from veterans families.

## USDA Retracts Plan To Close FSA Offices After Protests

The U.S. Agriculture Department will abandon plans to close more than 700 local Farm Service Agency offices across the country because of widespread opposition in Congress, an official said Tuesday.

When word leaked September 15 that the U.S. Department of Agriculture planned to close more than 700 of its 2,353 Farm Service Agency offices around the country, reaction among Capital Hill agricultural interests was swift and mostly unkind.

"This proposal is ill-advised and ill-conceived (and) yet another example of how out of touch Washington, D.C. is with life in rural America" said Rep. Tim Johns.

"The USDA put the cart before the horse with their FSA Tomorrow plan (there was) little or not consultation with local offices or our farmers and producer groups," said Sen. Jim Talent.

At this time the senate has voted to prohibit any FSA county office from closing and has requested a more detailed analysis of "Tomorrow's" impact and cost.

## Knox City Football To Become Six Man Next Year

The change is coming! Knox City will soon be added to the growing number of schools that have had to make the exciting and difficult change from 11-man to 6-man football. Don't worry though folks, the school is not in any kind of trouble. The attendance numbers are just getting low enough that competition is at risk. "This does not have anything to do with finances, we are just getting small enough that being competitive in 11-man football is difficult," said Superintendent Louis Baty. This is the year for the re-alignments to be determined, and he feels that this is the best decision for the students. Coach Hutchinson agrees "I think this will be a

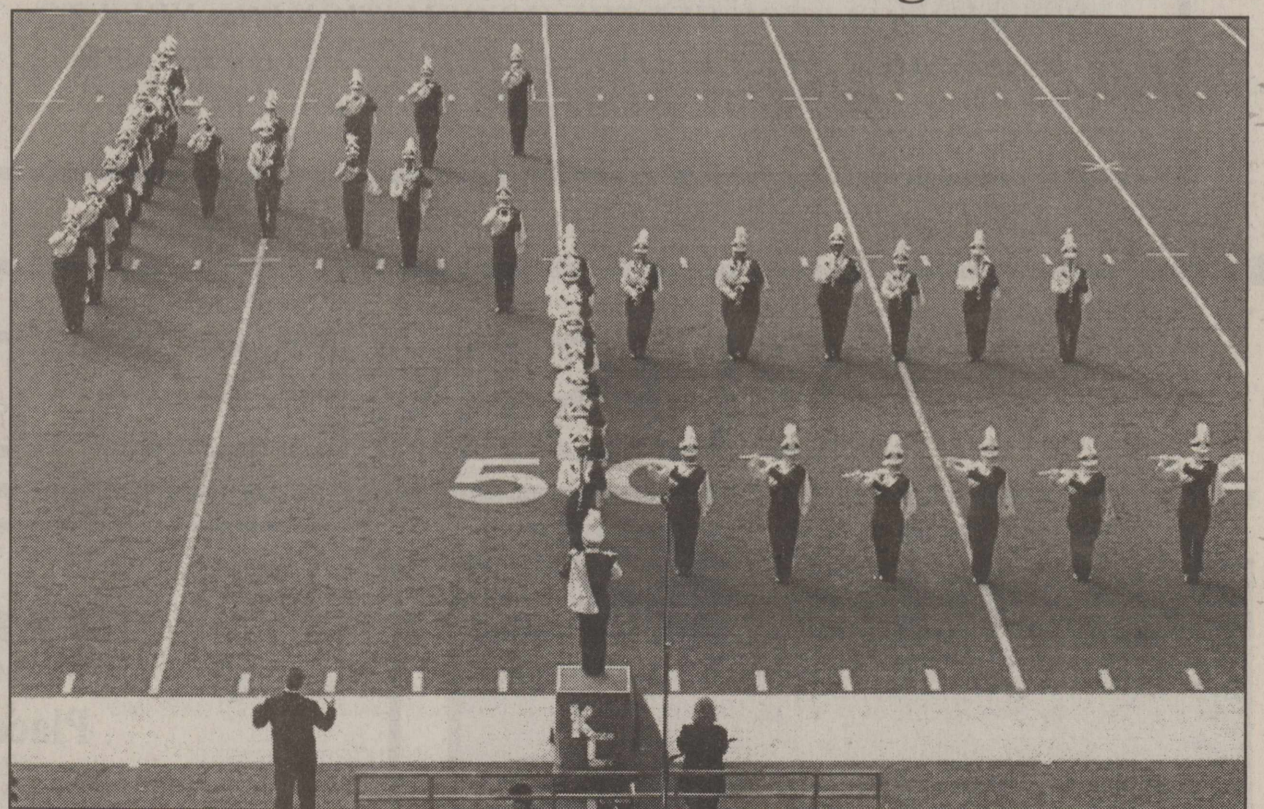

# BAXTER BLACK

ON THE EDGE OF COMMON SENSE *ONE OF THE COWBOY DAYS*

It's the kind of day every cowboy dreams of. Almost makes you wish they weren't numbered. When the desert is green, it's like Wyoming when the wind's not blowing, or a sunny winter day in Ohio. It's early fall. Still supposed to be hot today but we've got morning cloud cover so at 8:30 it's not bad.

Two days ago we dumped a handful of cows in this canyon pasture. They haven't found the water yet so our job this morning is to push 'em back to the water trap and start over. First trick, of course, is to find 'em!

Not as simple as it is in some places. Several ridges, arroyos and big bosques of mesquite look from the top of a ridgeline like green lakes amongst sandy hills and rocky fords. I always empathized with those cowmen in Missouri and elsewhere who run cows in the woods. Especial-

ly since they don't even have any high ground to ride up on to take a look!

Low and behold there was a flash of white in the sea of mesquite green. Maybe the white cow. I'd like to say a Charlois but I suspect she's not purebred! The white spot disappears but we've got their location. This saves us riding clear to the backside.

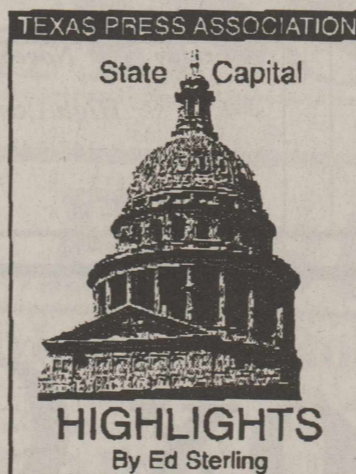
The monsoon rains have been plentiful, grass is abundant, and though it's still green it's beginning to go to seed. Down in the brush where the mesquite, cat claw and white thorn rake at our leggings, we ride as the horses pick their way like pole bending porpoises.

The wild flowers are rioting, so fragile they melt in your hand; yellow daisies, orange poppies, delicate white blossoms with petals no bigger than a grain of rice, purple morning glories, little blue

cornets, giant ivory jimsomweed trombones! Guajia with its feather dusters. And starring in its fall bloom, the bulbous porky-pink barrel cacti with their slashes of deep red that gleam as your eyes constantly scan for tracks and cows.

Even the light green and rust colored lichens decorating the rocks are reveling in the day. Jackrabbits are fat and the deer are everywhere you look. All the four-footed grazers and browsers are enjoying the heavy mesquite bean crop and the giant stalks of many century plants have been gnawed to a ragged stump.

I don't know if the deer or coyotes or javalinas, cow dogs or hawks, rattlesnakes, Gilà monsters, quail, mountain lions or crows appreciate what a glorious day this is, but I know one cowboy who understands, this is as good as it gets.



**AUSTIN** — Former state Comptroller John Sharp, newly appointed chair of the governor's panel on property tax and school finance reform, spoke to the Texas Association of Business in Austin Oct. 28.

Sharp, also a former member of the Texas House and Texas Railroad Commission, said the panel will work closely with every member of the Texas Legislature.

Although members of the panel Sharp is chairing have yet to be named, Sharp said that when their work is finished, "I will tell who was naughty and nice."

Regardless of differences that have stood in the way of a bipartisan solution to school finance and tax reform for the last two regular and three special legislative sessions, Sharp, a Democrat, expressed confidence that the panel's efforts will be successful.

Lawmakers and panelists will find reasonable ways to relieve the property tax burden and adequately fund education, but a personal income tax will not be considered, he said.

One thing for sure, he said, is "We're not going to get more rev-

enue from the present system (of taxation)" because so many Texans already pay the maximum property tax.

Sharp predicted that when the Texas Supreme Court rules on the pending case over the constitutionality of the school finance and property tax laws, those laws will be found unconstitutional.

The ruling will trigger a special session and lawmakers will huddle up to work on both problems. The state's high court heard oral arguments on the subject July 6, and the case has been pending since then.

**Enrollment below expectations**  
Texas public and private colleges and universities recorded lower than expected enrollment this fall, according to a report released Oct. 27 by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

This year's total enrollment of 1,192,243 is only a 19,134-student increase over the fall semester 2004. This causes concern, because enrollment growth is not trending in tandem with the state's population, which is growing more rapidly than anticipated.

State demographer Steve Murdock of the University of Texas at San Antonio said Texas is now 35th in the nation in the percentage of people with college degrees. In 1990, Texas ranked 23rd.

**Money back, comptroller says**  
Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn urged Gov. Rick Perry to call a three-day special session of the Legislature so lawmakers could vote to give every homeowner in the state a check for \$260.

When Strayhorn closed the books on the biennium that ended Aug. 31, she found enough unanticipated surplus tax revenue to

give taxpayers the rebate. But the governor's office dismissed the idea.

**Miers withdraws as nominee**  
Under pressure from her own political party, Harriet Miers withdrew as President George W. Bush's nominee to replace retiring associate justice Sandra Day O'Connor on the U.S. Supreme Court.

Miers, a Republican, was appointed commissioner of the Texas Lottery by then-Gov. Bush. She held the post for more than four years.

Miers will retain her present position of White House counsel.

**Judge upholds smoking ban**  
U.S. District Judge Sam Sparks upheld a smoking ban passed by Austin voters last year.

No smoking is allowed in public buildings, including restaurants and all but a few bars.

The lawsuit that prompted Sparks' ruling was brought by businesses that questioned the constitutionality of the ban. Only about a dozen bars in Austin can legally allow smoking.

**Judge to eye venue motion**  
U.S. Rep. Tom DeLay and his lawyers filed papers alleging potential bias on the part of state District Judge Bob Perkins, who is slated to preside over the Sugar Land Republican's trial on charges of money-laundering and conspiracy to violate Texas election laws.

On Nov. 1, retired judge C.W. "Bud" Duncan of Killeen, a Republican, is to review the motion to move the trial away from Austin to what the former U.S. House majority leader believes will be a fairer court. One of DeLay's objections to Perkins is the judge's membership in MoveOn.org, a grassroots political organization.


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# IT'S THE PITT'S

He mashed his thumb flatter than my wife's biscuits. In hindsight, I should have known better than to think a cowboy and a carpenter could occupy the same body but I thought the missing digits on his hand were from getting his fingers caught in a dally, not a Skil saw."

"So you're still jinxed when it comes to accidents," I commiserated. "Is that the end of it or are you going to finish the sign and go through with your safety program?"

"Oh sure, it can't hurt," said Lippy. "But we're going to make one minor change. Instead of a calendar listing our last accident we're going to use a clock

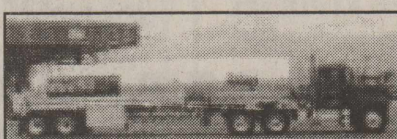
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## Sunset Homecoming 2005

President Johnny Richardson of the class of 48 welcomed the group. Dorman Followill class of 47 from Castle Rock, Co. led us in prayer and also the "Pledge of Allegiance". He was followed by Lendon Walling Class of 45 who led us in song "God Bless America." Dottie Lowrey accompanied him at the piano.

Vice President Buster Lowry class of 44 was in charge of the Memorial Service as we remembered the one teacher and fourteen students who have passed away since Homecoming 2003.

Following the Memorial service Dottie Lowry sang a special "How Great Thou Art."

Tammy Richardson introduced our speakers who reflected on our past. We were honored to have two of the three living graduates of Sunset first graduating class of 1932 present. Christene Clowdis Burnes of Abilene and Lola Mae Lawrence McGregor of Midland. Seventy five years

past graduation-both women expressed how much Sunset had meant to them and how wonderful to be back.

Next on the program was Orville Strickland of Ft. Worth class of 39. Orville entertained us as he told that in his early days of Sunset students had to sit in double desks. He and J.R. Hill shared a desk.

Orville had in his possession a small pair of scissors which he used and carefully cut the sleeve of J.R.'s shirt and when J.R. stood up his sleeve fell to the floor. That day it was a lot of fun, but the next morning a note came for Mrs. Hill.

So at Homecoming 2005 Seventy five years later Orville presented J.R. with a new shirt. Quanita Hunter Nelson stood up and told Orville that she thought he should pay interest. Orville's reply was I did that shirt cost me \$34.00 and I only cut one sleeve.

Wardell Sweatt Townsend also of the class of 39 from Aurora Co. was next to reflect. She paid tribute to the wonderful teachers of Sunset. Del was one of a few women of her time to serve our country in the Waves

and she was invited to Washington D.C. in 1997 to take part in the Dedication of "THE WOMEN'S MEMORIAL." She wore her 1944 uniform.

Next on the program was Joe Burton for Lawton Okla.. Class of 40. Joe recalled of his young days as he helped with farming in the land by Gillispie. ## Last GED Test Dates For Fall

Vernon College is offering students one last opportunity this semester to take the GED test to earn their high school diploma equivalency. The test will be given on the Vernon campus November 15 & 16. Testing will start at 9:00 a.m. each morning in Room 409 of the Sumner Applied Arts Building.

Pre-registration is required in advance of the test. There is limited seating and tests, so students are encouraged to sign up early.

All first-time examinees must sign-up in person and arrive at 8:30 p.m. on the first day of testing to fill out the required Demographics booklet.

A Texas resident who is at least 18 years old (17 years old with signed parental permission), who has not graduated and who is not enrolled in school, is eligible to take the test.

Everyone taking the GED test must provide a Texas driver's license or Texas Department of Public Safety ID card, and social security card at registration and at each testing session.

If a driver's license or Texas ID is not available, a person may obtain one through the Texas Department of Public Safety Driver's License Division.

The full battery of tests costs \$65, and a re-test for an individual section is \$15. Cash, checks, or money orders made payable to Vernon College are acceptable. Prices are subject to change. Payment is to be made in the Business Office, and a receipt must be shown in the Student Services Office prior to testing.

## Breast Cancer News

### Early Detection Means Less Toxic Treatment

(NAPS)—Women who have breast cancer detected by mammography are about half as likely to have toxic treatments as those who have cancer detected by physical examination—regardless of their age, a new study shows.

Overall, patients whose cancer was detected at physical examination were three times more likely to be treated with chemotherapy than those who had their cancer detected by screening mammography, said the lead author of the study, Richard J. Barth, Jr., MD, Chief of the Division of Surgical Oncology at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center.

Chemotherapy is commonly recommended for patients with tumors larger than a centimeter in diameter or with cancer that has spread into the lymph nodes, Dr. Barth explained. Cancers detected by mammography were half as large as those detected by physical exam. In addition, only 16 percent of those patients whose tumors were detected by mam-

mography had cancer spread to the lymph nodes compared with 42 percent of those who had their breast cancer detected on physical examination, he said.

Overall, patients who had their breast cancer detected on physical examination were more than twice as likely to be treated with mastectomy rather than breast conservation, he added.

While there continues to be debate on whether screening mammography increases survival of women ages 40 to 49 and 70 and older, there is no doubt that mammography detects cancer earlier, Dr. Barth said. The study provides strong supporting evidence that women over 40 should be screened with mammography, he said in the January 2005 issue of the "American Journal of Roentgenology." The journal is published by the American Roentgen Ray Society, the oldest radiology society in the U.S.

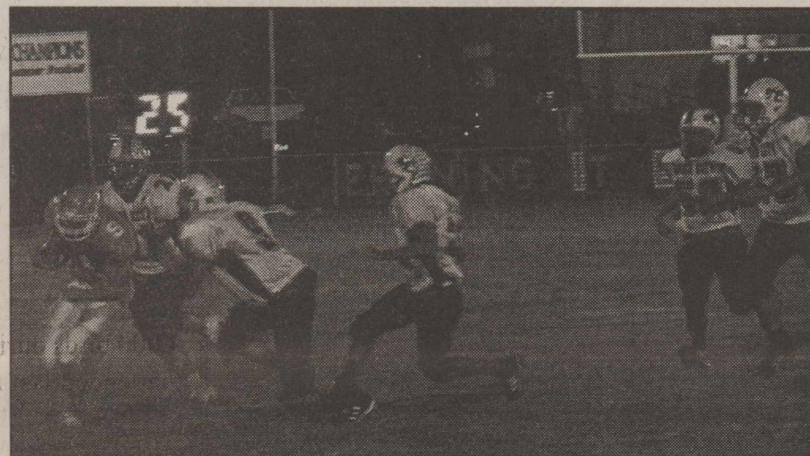

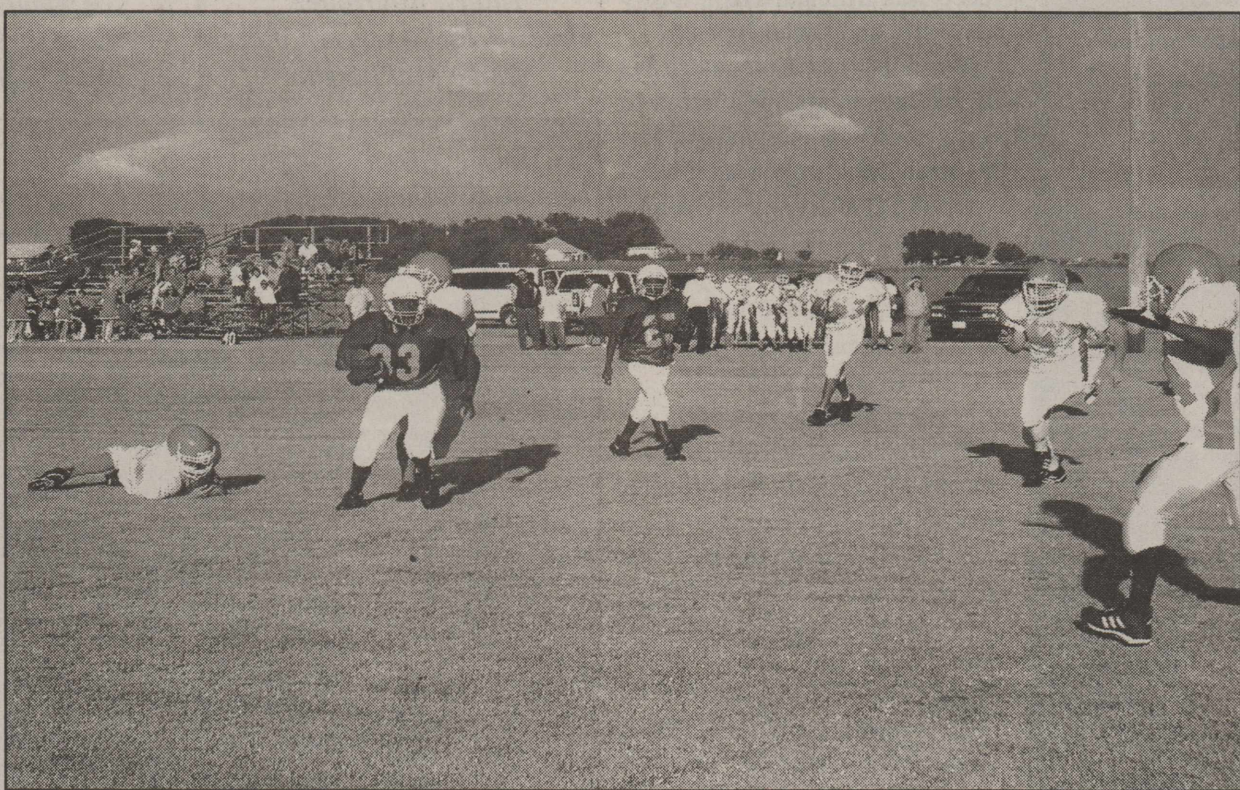

## Department Of Agriculture Stepping Up Bird Flu Surveillance

The Department of Agriculture will nearly quadruple the number of chickens it test, this year, primarily due to the bird flu that has swept through Southeast Asia, Romania and Turkey.

The department tested about 4,000 birds during the 12 months that ended last August. Over the next year, it will test about 15,500 chickens from backyards to major poultry farms, Agriculture Commissioner Charles Bronson said Monday.

"We have not found any that's shown signs of avian influenza

here in Florida, but we're going to stay vigilant about it," he said.

The stepped-up program will be paid for in part by a \$130,000 federal grant.

There have been no cases of the disease in the United States but in the last three years, it has spread through Southeast Asian poultry populations and killed at least 65 people.

The virus does not pass from person to person easily, but experts believe this could change if the virus mutates.
