By allowing employees to select from a single guide, and make their contributions through payroll deductions, the CFC opened wide the door to more opportunities for generous giving.

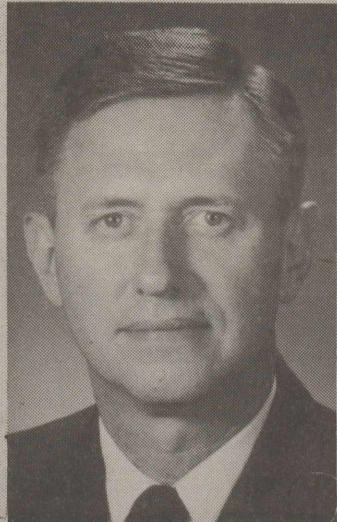
As you glance through the brochure, I'm certain that you found no shortage of agencies that caught your eye.

# Early detection key to cancer prevention

Breast cancer is the most common form of cancer among American women.

According to the American Cancer Society, one in nine women will develop breast cancer in her lifetime.

What is cancer? Cancer is really a number of diseases caused by the abnormal growth of cells. Normally, the cells that make up the body divide and reproduce in an orderly manner, so that our bodies can grow, replace worn-out tissue, and repair any injuries. Sometimes, however, cells grow out of control, divide more than they should, and form masses known as tumors.

Who is likely to develop breast cancer?

Several factors increase the chance that a woman will develop breast cancer, including:

- Those older than age 40, and especially older than 50
- Personal history of breast cancer (already have had cancer in one breast)
- Family history of breast cancer in a close blood relative (mother, sister, aunt)
- Never giving birth, or giving birth after age 30
- Long menstrual history (periods started at an early age and ended late in life).
- Mounting evidence that a high fat diet can increase the risk

The most common sign of breast cancer is a lump or thickening in the upper outer portion of the breast; a lump that does not go away and does

not seem to change in the way it feels. Other signs to look for are swelling, puckering, dimpling, redness, tenderness, or discharge from the nipple. Any of these signs should be brought to the attention of your health care provider.

Most breast lumps are found by women themselves. The best way for a woman to discover a lump early is to become familiar with her breasts and examine them monthly for changes. Classes in breast self-examination are available weekly at the 64th Medical Group.

In addition to breast self-exam, women 20-40 years old should have a breast exam performed by a health care professional every three years. Those over 40 years old should have a professional exam annually.

Mammography is another important step in early detection. A mammogram involves a low dose x-ray of the breast and can find changes too small to be felt by even specially trained examiners. It can detect cancer in its earliest stages, even before there is a lump.

Although mammography can find lumps that cannot be felt, it cannot show everything. About 10-15 percent of cancers that can be felt do not show up on a mammogram. That is why it is so important for women to continue to examine their own breasts regularly.

By following these simple steps: Breast self-exam, professional exams, and mammography, Women can help ensure that developing breast cancers are caught in their earliest, most curable stages.

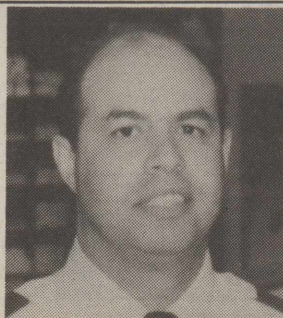

# General Fogleman becomes new Air Force chief of staff

WASHINGTON — Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman became the Air Force chief of staff Wednesday, replacing Gen. Merrill A. McPeak.

General Fogleman, who relinquished the reigns of U.S. Transportation Command and Air Mobility Command at Scott AFB, Ill., Oct. 18, said one of his first priorities will be "to work on building the Air Force into a strong and proud service team within a larger joint team."

Earlier this month the 52-year-old general said he "will stress the importance of, and encourage, joint assignments by rewarding and recognizing those troops who make major contributions in the joint arena."

General Fogleman said he believes his experience as a unified commander in chief has prepared him to be a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff as the United States becomes more involved in joint military operations.

One of General Fogleman's first priorities, he said, will be maintaining military readiness by taking care of Air

Force people and "providing them stability and recognition while ensuring the integrity of our personnel and promotion system."

"I will work with the secretary of the Air Force to ensure our (promotion) system is fair, accurate and open. Building confidence in the promotion system will be one of my major initiatives," General Fogleman said he plans to address the issue immediately.

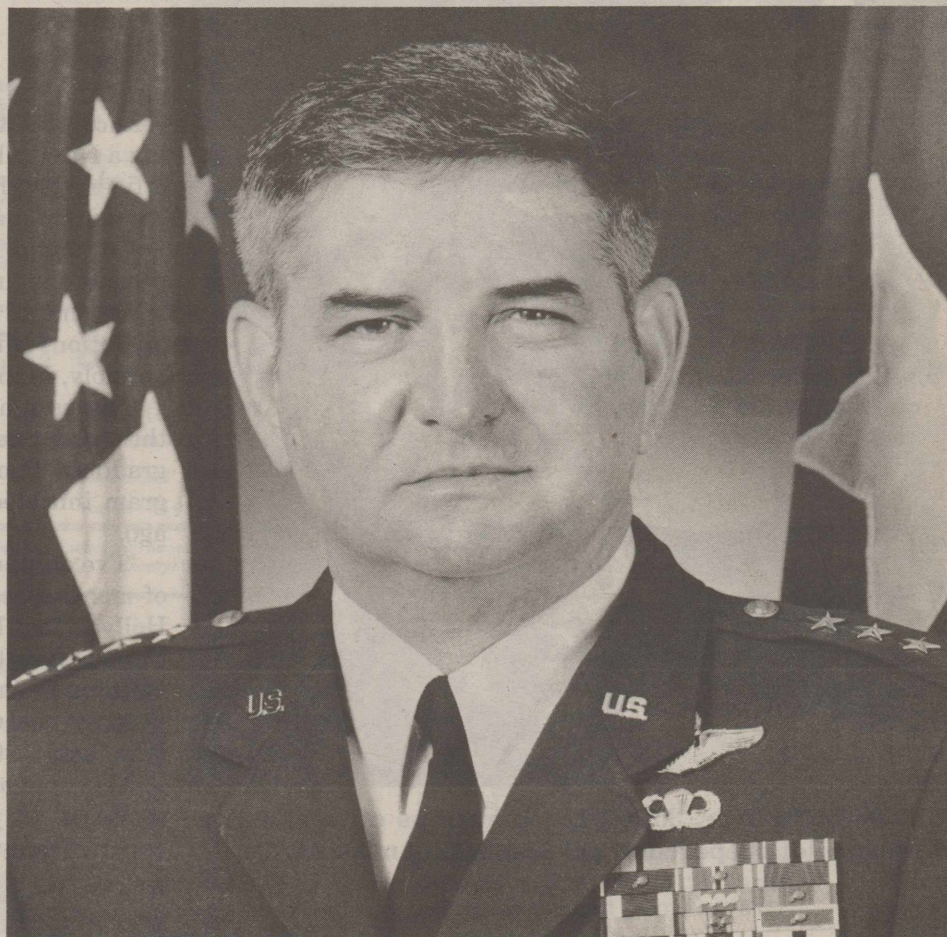
General Fogleman took over TRANSCOM and AMC in August 1992. He is a 1963 Air Force Academy graduate and a 1971 graduate of Duke University in Durham, N.C.

He also received a master's degree in military history and political science from Duke.

The general is a command pilot and has held numerous flying jobs, including instructor pilot, combat fighter pilot in Southeast Asia, and F-15 aircraft demonstration pilot for international airshows.

He also taught history at the Air Force Academy and served on the Air Staff as director of Air Force programs.

The new chief of staff is from Lewistown, Pa. He and his wife, Miss Jane, have two sons.

## AF to end some officer outs FY 95 VSI/SSB programs stop Nov. 18

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS) — Officers eligible for one of the three early out programs have less than a month to get their applications in after the Air Force announced it was closing out the programs.

Air Force personnel officials said military personnel flights will no longer accept applications for the fiscal year 1995 Variable Separation Incentive/Special Separation Bonus and Early Retirement programs after Nov. 18.

The announcement brings to a close the FY 95 programs. It does not affect the FY 95 Officer Early Release program. The Air Force closed out the enlisted VSI/SSB Early Retirement program Oct. 4. More than 2,000 officers and 16,000 enlisted personnel applied for one of the three programs, said personnel officials.

While the Nov. 18 cut-off date applies to most officers, exceptions for captains twice deferred from the CY 94A Majors Board with 15 years or

more total active federal military service, and majors who are twice deferred from the CY 94A Lieutenant Colonel Board will be offered early retirement at the time of board release.

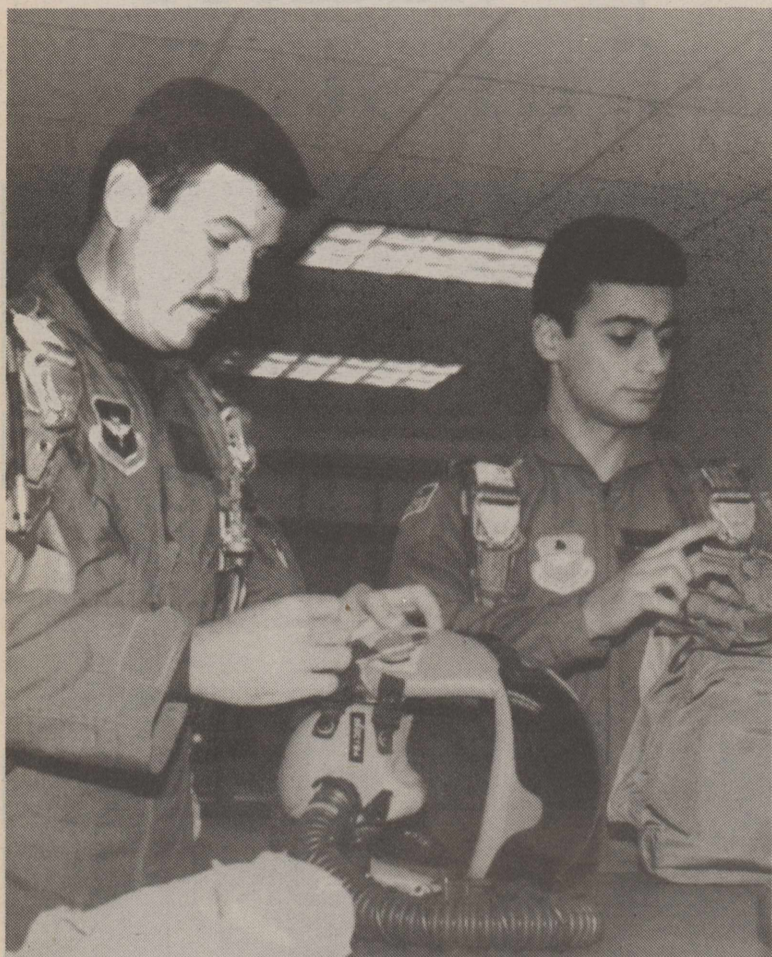
Personnel officials emphasized that while applications are taken until Nov. 18, there is no guarantee all will be approved and those applying "should not make irrevocable commitments based on assumption of approval."

Since the VSI/SSB programs began for fiscal years '92 and '93, and the early retirement program which began in FY 94, more than 9,000 officers and 45,800 enlisted have been approved for one of the three programs. The Air Force's end-strength during that time has gone from 451,533 at the end of FY 92 to approximately 422,300 as of Sept. 30.

# Navy pilot takes on new challenge

## Commander Hollyer takes post as 35th FTS operations officer

Reese has forged another path into the frontier of joint-service pilot training, assigning a Navy pilot as operations officer for the 35th Flying Training Squadron.

Cdr. John Hollyer recently became the first Naval aviator to become a flying squadron operations officer at Reese and possibly, in the Air Force.

The assignment is part of the Joint Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training program initiated here one year ago.

"I've only been here a couple of months," said Commander Hollyer, "but I can already see the long-term benefits the joint-training program will provide in terms of service interoperability and cost effectiveness."

The commander, who brings to Reese 16 years of cockpit experience as a P-3 pilot, in-

structor pilot and Navy test pilot, says he volunteered for the Reese assignment.

"I had been offered a squadron at a Navy installation," said Commander Hollyer. "But I opted for Reese because I knew what was going on here would be a true challenge, and that jointness is the wave of the future for our military."

"The JSUPT program is a living thing," said the Annapolis graduate. "It is constantly growing and changing as we work to find the best way to merge the operational needs of the Air Force and the Navy."

The enormity of the challenge was echoed by Lt. Col. Don Stiffler, 35th FTS commander. "What we are doing here is unique," said Colonel Stiffler. "We are working with two programs that on the surface have a great many simi-

larities, but feed two vastly different flying cultures and operations.

"One of the great things about having Commander Hollyer here," said Colonel Stiffler, "is that he not only brings us tremendous technical experience, he also provides our students with some different perspectives on military officership. Developing quality officers is just as much a part of our mission as pilot training."

Commander Hollyer said he can envision a time when there will be a single primary training program for both services.

"I don't know when it will happen," said Commander Hollyer.

"There are many, many differences in the two programs that will have to be worked out, but I think it will happen some day," he said.

# Reese, community begin selection of committee

## Wing officials note progress on base restoration program

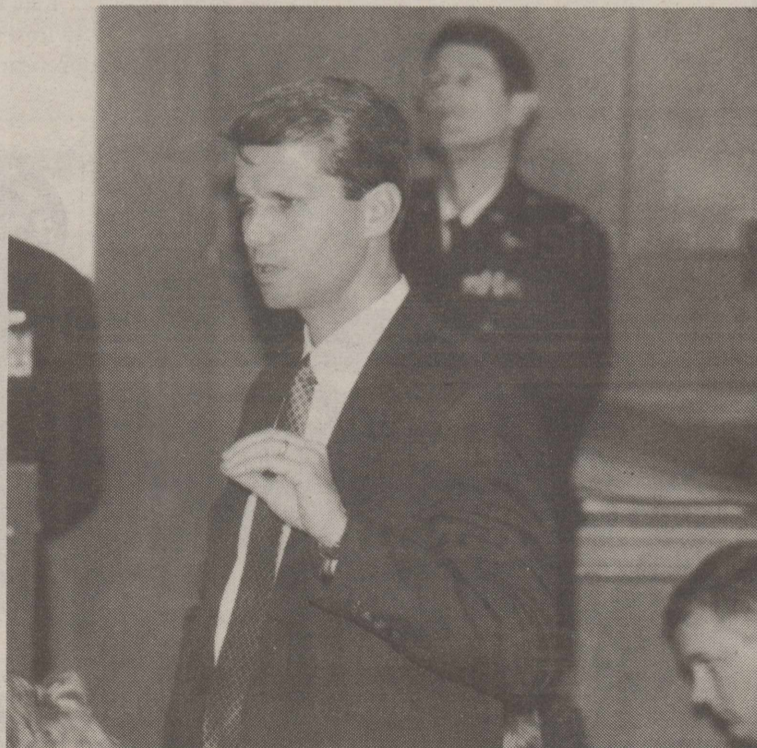
ing a public meeting at Lubbock Christian University.

During the meeting, Col. Terry Weimer, 64th Support Group commander, discussed in detail the initial plan to begin cleanup of the trichloroethylene found in the groundwater beneath Reese and some adjacent property.

The Department of Defense policy regarding the establishment of technical review committees was also briefed, and the wing solicited community members to serve on a selection panel which will determine the composition of the Reese Restoration Advisory Board.

"The committee is the private citizen's avenue to participate in our cleanup program and we welcome all who want to participate," said Colonel Brady.

The board is designed so that its membership will reflect the diverse interests of the local community. It will be a sounding board on behalf of the community. Its members will provide input into the solutions

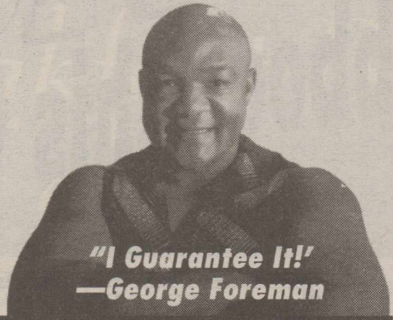

offered for long term environmental cleanup by Reese civil engineers before submitting them to federal and state regulators for their approval of the cleanup plans. It will be a com-

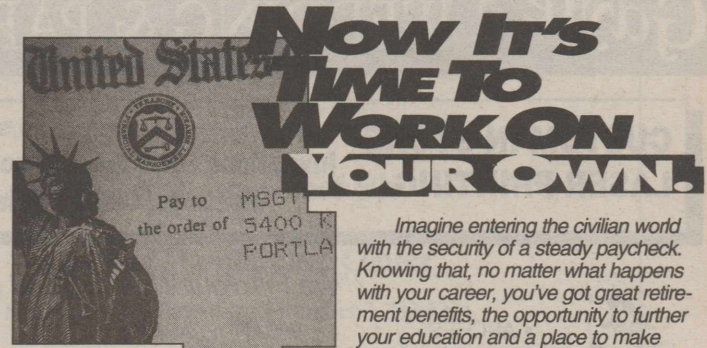

# CONEX

## Reese mobility teams test their readiness to respond to world-wide deployment taskings by packing up and moving to Reese West

Reese went to war this week! There were no casualties during a contingency exercise that provided more than 150 Reese people with invaluable deployment training.

During the CONEX, nearly all Reese mobility members deployed to Reese West, a mock battlefield camp on the west side of the base. The mobility teams fought off hostile attacks, repaired runways and performed many of the missions they could expect to face

in a real deployment.

The exercise began in earnest with mobility processing on Oct. 21 and actual deployment to Reese West Monday through Wednesday.

Lt. Col. Michael Bailey, Reese Base Exercise Evaluation Team chief, tabbed the training session as a tremendous success.

"Our performance improved every day," said Colonel Bailey. "We learned to perform the mission under some very

adverse conditions."

These conditions included some unseasonably cold weather and a variety of BEET directed assaults on the camp. Some of the raids included the actual use of tear gas.

In addition, the teams were challenged by the 64th MDG's M.A.S.H. Olympics team. The team ran deployees through a variety of special field events, such as the mobility bag, litter and combat arms training relay.

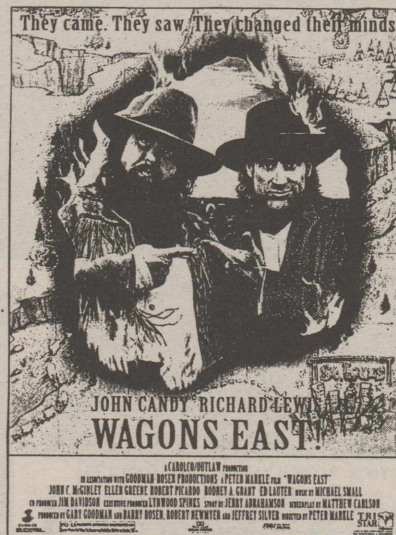

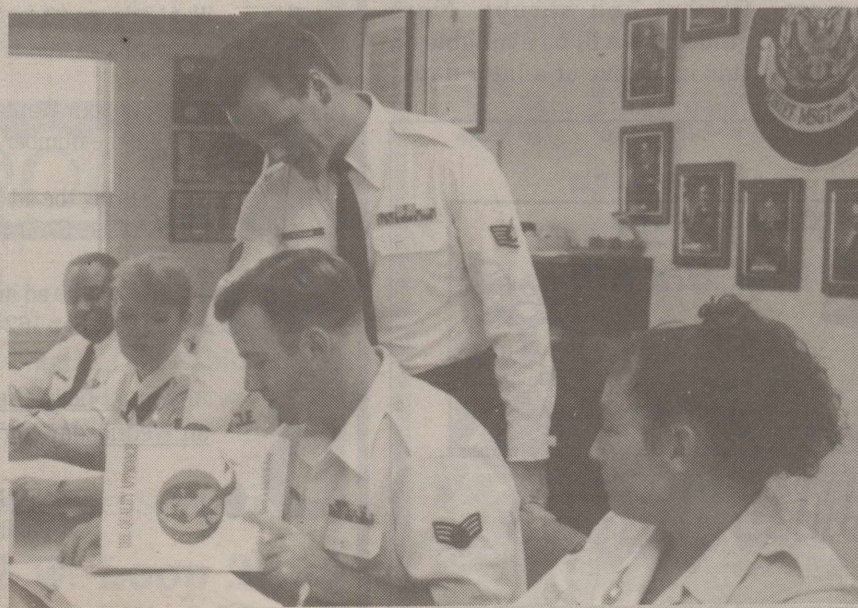

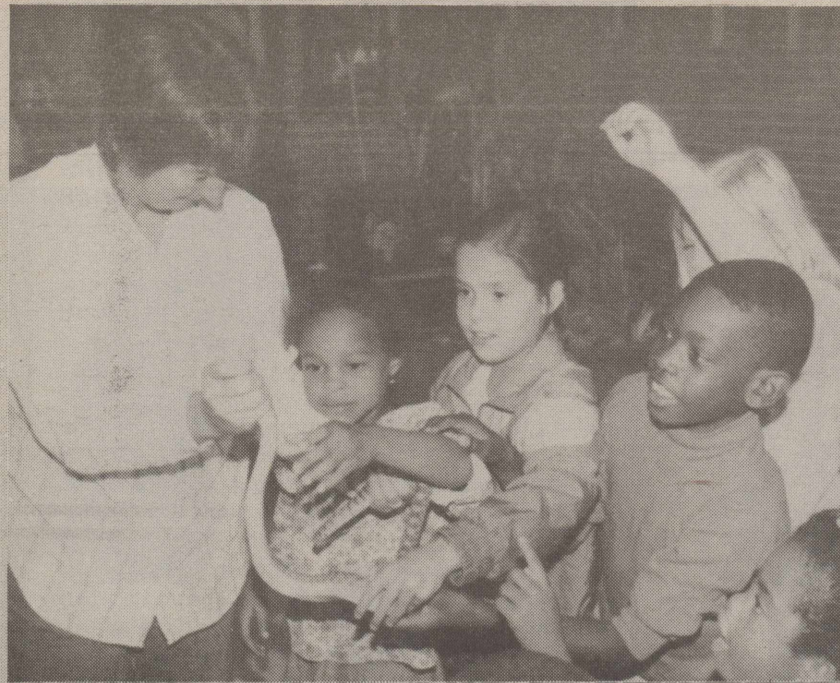

Flower voucher program to begin in spring**

The 64th Civil Engineer Squadron recommends Reese Village residents take certain steps to help maintain the grounds around their homes during the fall and winter seasons.

Some seasonal ground maintenance ideas:

□ The next time residents mow their lawns they should set the mower height at 3 inches to help protect the turf.

□ Fescue grass seed may be sowed in the fall. Any other grass seed should not be sowed until the spring. Grass seed is available at the self-help center

□ Do not sweep leaves into

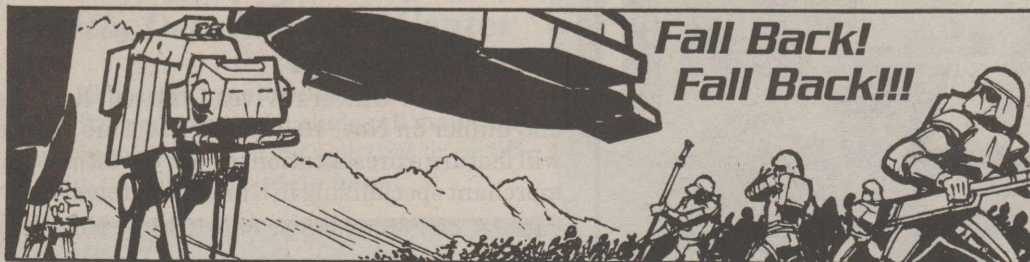
the street. This causes the street sweepers to fill up too quickly. Please bag your leaves and place them near the curb on Monday each week.

□ Continue to water shrubs, trees, and plants through the winter to ensure their survival. This is especially critical for items planted within the last two years. For best results, water at least once every two weeks as long as the temperature is above freezing.

In addition, the grounds maintenance contractor will start trimming trees on the base and in housing next month. The trees selected for pruning this year are those that

pose safety hazards during high winds, trees with branches near buildings and houses, and those overhanging roadways and sidewalks. For resident safety, please stay away from these operations; the process is expected to continue through March.
