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
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

Mandatory membership?

I'm calling regarding an issue I hear about frequently— officers club and enlisted club membership. To my knowledge, membership at these clubs is strictly voluntary. However, military members are looked down upon if they are not a member of their respective club. Certain organizations even go so far as to collect the names of those who are not members and then confront them about why they haven't joined.

Supposedly you can't be forced to join the club, but it seems you have to join to make others happy and to keep your record in tip-top shape. In the future, I might have to join the club to keep this from happening to me. I'll pay the monthly membership fee just to keep others off my back, but I will most likely not go to the club.

I have nothing against those who attend the club. I just prefer to spend my money and time in different ways. After a long day on base, I like to go home and see my family rather than stay on base to "socialize" at the club. When I do go out, I don't want to feel like I have to go to the same place all the time just to get my money's worth out of a membership fee.

I don't expect those who are higher up on base to agree with me because I know most of them don't. However, I would like the harassment issue addressed. I know there are many on base who agree with me.

I'm sorry you feel that way about club membership. You're right — club membership is strictly voluntary and has no effect on one's performance report or promotion opportunity. However, because of the many good things the club can provide enlisted and officer personnel, first sergeants and commanders encourage people to join.

We're trying to upgrade our facilities and provide more customer service. That's why we contact non-members to get some feedback on what's unattractive to them and to solicit their ideas on ways we can improve our service. Yes, we encourage you to join, but "harassment" is inappropriate and probably won't change your mind.

If you haven't visited the club lately, stop by; membership fees are waived for the month you join!

CPR at the gym

None of the people in the fitness center are CPR qualified, and I want to know why. Last month there was a person who had a stroke at the fitness center. I was told the fitness center personnel should be CPR qualified; I heard that the reason they're not certified is because the supervisor

does not want to send the people over for a half-day of training because of his manning.

You're right — fitness center staff are required to be CPR qualified. However, two individuals were on leave when the last training session was conducted. They've been rescheduled for training, and our entire staff will soon be 100 percent qualified. Thanks for calling.


Fixing up the golf course

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

Being good to the Earth at Reese

being can live. We need to take care of the earth's environment and preserve it for future generations. The effect of ignoring the environment is starting to show more and more.

It is everyone's responsibility to look for alternative ways of doing business to minimize the effect on our earth and environment. Solutions or alternatives are becoming more numerous and easier to implement every day due to technological advances, but they still take some research and work from us. Reducing air pollution has become a federal goal, through the Environmental Protection Agency, by passing more stringent laws to follow. One such law requires Reese to address all potential sources of emissions

Things you can do as an individual include using alternative forms of energy (such as solar power), planting trees and

using public transportation, car pools, or a bike to conserve fuel and reduce air pollution. Just by planting trees, you can produce enough oxygen on each acre of trees for 18 people every day; absorb enough carbon dioxide over a year's time to equal the amount you produce when you drive a car 26,000 miles; and remove gaseous pollutants by absorbing them through the pores in the leaf's surface.

Another form of pollution we in windy West Texas are well

aware of is trash. In some instances, thoughtless people dump trash in the streets or in our neighborhoods; in others, it simply blows out of open trash bins or away from unattended Earth is the only place where every creature and human outings. In all instances, it creates an ugly and polluted envi-

ronment.

All citizens must be responsible for disposing of trash in proper containers, but an even better option is to reduce the amount of trash you generate by recycling aluminum, glass, paper and plastic. Also, try composting tree limbs and other yard waste. They alone take up over 80 percent of our landfill space.

More serious pollution comes from pesticides, fertilizers and other household chemicals. These items are much more serious because their sole purpose is to kill living organisms, and in certain doses or mixtures, they can kill us. Again, it is your responsibility to dispose of hazardous household substances in a safe manner by either using it all up or giving it to someone else who could use it.

The best option is to use non-hazardous substances. For instance, use vinegar instead of bleach or baking soda in-

stead of chemicals to clean rugs and upholstery. The base environmental flight has "household hazardous waste wheels" that have several different alternatives for anyone interest-

Arbor Day on tap by Dennis Tates





Why recycle?

Recycling saves energy, natural resources and landfill space. If current trends continue, Americans will eventually throw away annually more than one million tons of aluminum cans and foil, 11 million tons of glass bottles and jars, 4.5 million tons of office paper and nearly 10 million tons of newspaper. Much of this could be recycled, reducing the environmental damage caused by mining, logging and manufacturing raw materials, and decreasing the amount of garbage being sent to landfills.

By recycling, we can save or recover a significant portion of the energy and raw material used in manufacturing new products. For instance, twenty cans can be produced from recycled aluminum with the same amount of energy it would take to manufacture a single new can from raw materials. In addition to saving energy, recycling can extend the useful life of existing landfills. Where trash is incinerated, removing glass and metals

can actually improve the combustion process.

Each building on base has recycling locations for office and industrial recyclables. The resource recovery and recycling program manager is TSgt. Larry Kime. RRRP workers pick up from housing residents every Tuesday, and they offer drop-off services at the base exchange parking lot recycling trailer. RRRP personnel also provide special pick-up services for bulk items. If you're having a party, they will provide containers to put empty cans, glass and plastic bottles in and pick it up for you. This makes clean-up a snap.

The RRRP shop is now providing a new service. Every Tuesday, along with recyclables, they will pick up yard waste in housing. Please put any yard waste such as grass, leaves or small branches in a plastic bag and set it on the curb along with your recycling bags. This waste will be hauled to a large composting facility located southeast of Lubbock, keeping these bulky items out of our landfills.

To request pick-up service of bulk items, or if you would like additional information on recycling, call 3815.

No more SERBs — possibly

WASHINGTON — Selective early retirement boards are hopefully a thing of the past after fiscal 1995, said the Air Force's top personnel official.

Lt. Gen. Billy J. Boles, Air Force deputy chief of staff for personnel, said in an April 6 interview that the January 1995 lieutenant colonel SERB could be the last one, if projected end-strength requirements remain the same through the end of the decade and if projected losses continue on track.

The January 1995 board will consider 0-5s with more than 20 years of service who have already been passed over at least once for promotion, General Boles said. "We'd like to shoot for that. We don't like to SERB people who haven't been considered for promotion to colonel."

In January, the Air Force conducted what should be its last 0-6 SERB. That board identified 198 colonels for separation by Oct. 1. (Air Force News Service)

Fundraiser Is A "Souper" Success


