


From my perspective

Recently, there thas been some confusion among some members of the Reese team as to what is happening on base to reduce the bird aircraft strike hazard, or "BASH," potential.

As you may know, Reese has historical-

ly had a significant bird strike problem. It is, in fact, rated the highest Air Force base in the country for bird strike potential by the Air Force BASH Team. This is clearly demonstrated by the number of bird strikes each year, and Reese flyers are keenly aware of this flying hazard. A bird strike less than a year ago contributed to Reese's last class A mishap, in which an aircraft was destroyed and an instructor pilot received serious injuries.



Reese's aggressive BASH program includes habitat management, trapping and relocation, scares with pyrotechnics and bioacoustics, and the controlled taking of certain authorized species of birds. Every detail of our program is carefully coordinated with federal, state and local wildlife and environmental authorities, as well as the Air Force BASH Team.

Part of our program is the limited use of shotguns and propane gas cannons to reduce our bird population. Currently, the gas cannons are limited to the base ponds but will eventually cover the entire airfield environment. Unfortunately, the birds quickly become accustomed to the gas cannons and are not easily intimidated by them. Therefore, we started a limited base hunting program near the ponds this past winter. All hunters must have the appropriate licenses and stamps, hunt only in season, abide by established state game limits and use only steel shot. In addition, all base hunters must receive a briefing from both wing safety and security police, and they are closely monitored by wing safety.

Shotguns will also be used periodically on the airfield, in conjunction with the proposed gas cannon system, to scare off the small birds that inhabit the immediate runway environment. A

few birds will be killed in this process. These birds are responsible for the vast majority of our bird strikes and pose the greatest threat to loss of aircraft or, much worse, a pilot's life. Lead shot will be used for this purpose, and only the birds covered under Reese's federal permit will be taken.

Our program reflects environmental sensitivity while addressing a very real safety concern. Our wildlife management plan focuses on discouraging wildlife from establishing an ecosystem on the airfield, which increases the likelihood of an aircraft bird strike. I want to emphasize that our focus is not on killing wildlife. In fact, last fall we captured and relocated over 250 prairie dogs which attract species of hawks. This forced predatory birds (hawks) to look for food elsewhere as their food chain was disrupted.

Although our efforts have significantly reduced bird strikes on the base, further reductions remain a challenge. We are continually searching for new ways to reduce the bird threat that we are faced with daily. Do you know your rights?

When military members are suspected of committing a crime, they often do not know when commanders, security police, the Air Force Office of Special Investigations and other military authorities can take legal actions against them or what type of action they can take.

The Uniform Code of Military Justice protects military members' right when they have been suspected of committing an offense. Anytime the OSI, security police, commanders or first sergeants suspect someone of having committed an offense, they must inform the members of their rights under Article 31 prior to asking questions. This applies regardless of whether the suspect is sitting in the commander's office, has been taken into custody or has been placed in pretrial confinement.

After rights are read to suspects, they must decide whether or not to make a statement or consult an attorney. Some people may feel they do not need an attorney because they do not believe they have committed an offense. However, they may not have been in that position before and a defense attorney can better assess their case and tell them if it is in their best interest to make a statement at that time.


A defense attorney can elaborate in detail a person's legal rights, the effect a statement can have on their case and what to expect to happen as the case develops. Active-duty members

can ask for a military defense attorney at any time and be provided one free of charge. If a miltary member is involved in an offense, it may not be in their best interest to make a statement without first consulting a defense attorney.

The decision to ask for an attorney can only be made by the individual. Consulting counsel is a right and does not in any way infer guilt and cannot be used against the member for any reason whatsoever. It is generally in the person's best interest to consult an attorney when dealing with military authorities.

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

Center releases survey results

The results of the recently completed education questionnaire revealed a variety of educational needs and interests.

Approximately 650 questionnaires were circulated to base squadrons. Seventy-one percent of respondents were active-duty military, and 21 percent were civilian employees.

In all undergraduate areas, interests were diverse. The top 10 fields of interest from the responses we received were administration management and computer science/systems management (tied for No. 1); accounting; psychology; hospital administration/health services; financial planning and counseling; social work/ sociology; nursing; marketing; mathematics; and biol-

All of these programs and more are available to Reese personnel, either through onbase programs (South Plains College or Wayland Baptist University), nearby Texas Tech University or through various distance learning programs using video curriculum or correspondence.

A classroom satellite downlink is also planned at Reese and could be in use as ments or questions.

Tuition assistance provides 75 percent of tuition to activeduty military, and the education center can supply information on a wide range of scholarships and grants specific to a persons interests and qualifications. These programs aid active duty as well as retirees and dependents.

Interest at the post-graduate level was also high, with an overwhelming number of respondents showing interest in a master's of business administration. Second and third in interest were aeronautical science and engineering, respectively. The education center can assist anyone ready to begin or continue a master's degree in all three areas mentioned, as well as the majority of the other areas mentioned by questionnaire respondents.

Summer terms for most schools serving Reese begin in late May, so now is the time to plan your schedule, whether beginning your associate's degree with the Community College of the Air Force or finishing a master's program.

What's Bugging You?

Advice from Dr. Ted Shapas, Director of the Combat Labs

(NAPS)—It's cockroach season again for 95 million Americans. Here are answers to some of your questions on how to control these unwelcome houseguests.

Q. I have a cockroach problem. Should I use sprays or baits to keep them away?

A. Most experts agree that baits are the most effective method for long-term control. It's OK to spray the roaches you see, but baits kill roaches where they live and breed behind the walls. Roaches eat the bait and return to their hiding places where they contaminate other roaches. This causes a "domino effect" that can kill dozens of roaches for every roach that eats the bait

Q. I sprayed roaches in my kitchen, but now they're in my bathroom and basement. How can I get rid of them?

A. Once you spray an area, cockroaches can sense the residue. It sounds like the cockroaches have been driven to look for food in other areas—cockroaches love toothpaste! To control roaches throughout your home, place baits against walls or in corners in each of your problem areas (good spots: under sinks and next to appliances). Replace baits regularly for long-term control. If you are using baits and sprays, try not to spray bait stations.

Other field-tested recommendations from the Combat Labs to keep roaches under control:

1. Choose baits with Hydramethylnon. Some roaches become "immune" or resistant to common insecticides. Scientific tests show that no roach is immune to Hydramethylnon.

2. If you live in an apartment building, encourage your neighbors to use baits. Internal pipes and electrical wires can act as roach "super-highways' between units.

3. Prevent cockroach temptations. Store food in air-tight containers, put pet food away and clean food and water dishes, take garbage out regularly and keep surfaces clear of crumbs.

4. Run fans and open windows-roaches hate air currents.



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
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
