





Reese prepares to begin TriCare Wednesday

Changes will translate to better overall care for beneficiaries

As Nov. 1 quickly approaches, the 64th Medical Group faces one of its most significant challenges - implementation of TriCare.

We are absolutely committed to making the transition as smooth as possible, but, as with anything new, change is inevitable. I want to take a few moments of your time to review some of the more significant changes, particularly in accessing the medical clinic.

As we have briefed, TriCare Prime enrollees must be seen within very definite time parameters: acutely ill within 24 hours, routine needs within one week and wellness visits within one month. These standards guarantee your access. Therefore, there is no need for anyone to "walk-in" seeking an appointment.

Effective Wednesday, there will be no walk-in clinic and no weekend/holiday clinic. Access to care, for Prime enrollees, will be through their primary care manager, via the appointment desk, health care finder, or health care information line.

Let me make one clarification to the above. Active-duty sick call will continue as you know it. In order to determine, early in the day, whether or not an active duty member should report/return to duty, sick call will remain in

the primary care clinic from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m., and in the flight surgeons' office from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. and from 1 to 1:30 p.m.

Patients, other than TriCare Prime enrollees, will not be able to make an appointment in the clinic. They will be seen on a "space available" basis. That essentially means that a patient may come to the clinic and wait to determine if there is an available appointment, but it does not guarantee that they will be seen.

That is why we are encouraging anyone who made the choice not to enroll in TriCare Prime to establish themselves with a local, civilian provider. It sincerely is in your best interest.

If you have made the decision not to enroll in TriCare Prime or are a retired member or retired family member using a civilian primary care manager, we will make copies of your medical records for you to take to your civilian provider. Initially, we will copy the last six months of entries in order to meet

the volume of requests in a timely manner.

Later, we will copy the remaining record upon request. There will be no fee

for the first six months of entries; later there may be a nominal fee for the remaining record. Request copies from the outpatient record department. Please make your requests as soon as possible, and allow us about two weeks to process your record.

The 64th Medical Group will continue to fill prescriptions from civilian providers as long as the medication is available in the Pharmacy.

After normal duty hours, TriCare Prime enrollees must seek care through the health care information line and their primary care manager. If, however, you perceive that you have an emergency situation, call 911 or proceed to an emergency room, preferably Methodist Hospital or South Park, if you are able to make a choice.

After hours care, except emergencies, for active-duty members requires the authorization of your primary care manager. Active-duty members may reach their primary care manager by calling 885-3515. Active duty members are likewise requested to seek emergency care at Methodist or South Park hospitals, if able to make the choice.

You must make the choice of a health care option that best suits your needs. Information and assistance regarding the three options of TriCare are available in the TriCare service center located in the 64th MDG, or you may call 885-2999.

I am personally committed to ensuring that you have quality health care regardless of the option you choose. Please feel free to address your concerns in person to the TriCare office, by phone at 885-3521, or by mail to 64th MDG/SGST, 250 13th Street, Reese AFB TX 79489-5008.

Barber and her husband, Donny, a retired senior master sergeant, have two sons, Guy and Bobby.



The survey project is expected to last until Nov. 30. Soil gas activity is under the RCRA phase I Facility Investigation and supports remedial action for cleaning up the groundwater contamination, according to a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers official.

Soil gas activity consists of driving a hollow steel rod into the ground. After special equip-

Air Force alters some reenlistment bonuses

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas (AFNS) Servicemembers in more than a dozen Air Force specialties face changes in their selective reenlistment bonuses.

Two NCOs charged in fighter pilot's death

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Two Air Force sergeants at Spangdahlem Air Base, Germany, were charged Oct. 10 with negligent homicide in the death of an F-15C pilot who was killed in a crash May 30.

TSgt. William T. Campbell and TSgt. Thomas P. Mueller, both of the 52nd Equipment Maintenance Squadron, were also charged with four counts each of dereliction of duty.

If brought to trial and found guilty, the NCOs could each face a maximum jail term of four years, a dishonorable discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and reduction to airman basic, stated a 52nd

Fighter Wing news release.

Maj. Donald G. Lowry Jr., who was on a routine training mission, died when his aircraft failed to operate properly during a takeoff roll and crashed.

Charges allege that the two maintenance NCOs negligently installed and inspected the fighter's longitudinal and lateral flight control rods, failed to inspect the work, and failed to complete the aircraft maintenance paperwork properly, said the news release.

Administrative actions also could be taken against "several other" 52nd EMS servicemembers, the official

Life Goes On

Reese Closure **Survey Team** Visits Oct. 10-13

Reese Air Force Base, Texas quarters Air Education and Training Command (AETC), the parent command for Reese's 64th Flying Training Wing, will send a 16-member site survey team to Reese, Oct. 11-13. Following the stop at Reese, the survey team will also visit AETC's three other undergraduate pilot training bases before mid-November.

The visit marks the beginning of Reese's closure process and the redistribution of Reese assets and mission to the other three bases. According to Major Mike Connolly, survey team chief, "The objective of our visit is to identify all assets requiring redistribution from Reese, to determine Reese closure costs, to validate data gathered during Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) site surveys in March and April, to assess the capability of all remaining bases to accept the increased workload generated by Reese closure, and to review beddown plans for additional resources. In addition to these BRAC '95 requirements, we will also determine the military construction required to allow the three remaining bases to accomplish peak pilot training production in future years."

According to Colonel Randy Gelwix, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, "The fact of Reese's closure became law Sept. 28 and the official closure date is set for Sept. 30, 1997. After the survey team completes its visits to each base, a time line will be developed for the orderly, phased drawdown of the base's mission and personnel from Reese."

The team will visit Vance AFB, Enid, Okla., Oct. 23-26; Columbus AFB, Miss., Oct. 30-Nov. 2, and Laughlin AFB, Del

Rio, Texas, Nov. 6-9.

Team representatives will work with their Reese counterparts in the areas of aircraft maintenance; airfield operations, civil engineering; command, control, communications, and computers; contracting; services, supply and equipment accounts. News Release, Oct. 6, 1995



What is TRICARE Prime?

TRICARE Prime is one of the new options offered to CHAMPUS beneficiaries in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas. The TRICARE Prime program is modeled after the health care delivery system most commonly associated with a Health Maintenance Organization (HMO). Beneficiaries may enroll in TRICARE Prime to take advantage of the enhanced preventive benefits, lower out-of-pocket costs, and no claim filing

How Do CHAMPUS-Eligible Beneficiaries Enroll in TRICARE Prime?

Eligible beneficiaries must obtain an enrollment packet and select a Primary Care Manager. There is no enrollment fee for active-duty family members. Retirees, retiree family members and survivors do have an annual enrollment fee which can be paid in quarterly installments. Beneficiaries simply mail in a completed enrollment application. Enrolled members will receive a TRICARE Prime identification card in the mail. Beneficiaries enroll for a 12 month enrollment period.

Q. I am a CHAMPUS eligible retiree. I want to sign up for the civilian TRICARE Prime option but I experienced some difficulty when I called the providers on the list I was given, what should I do?

A. We are currently working to resolve this issue. The civilian provider network is our number one priority. There has been an unfortunate miscommunication between the Lubbock civilian network and the contractor, Foundation Health Federal Services. Currently, representatives from both parties are working to resolve any misunderstandings.


Complete resolution of this technicality is expected by today. Due to this delay, we are extending the enrollment deadline to Tuesday. If your application is turned into the TRICARE Service Center by Tuesday, your effective date for TRICARE Prime will still be Wednesday. We sincerely apologize for any inconvenience that might have been experienced. For further questions, please stop by the center (Bldg 1300, Room 342) or call 885-2999/1866.

Q. Will CHAMPUS-eligible retirees and retiree family members who want to enroll in TRICARE Prime be enrolled to a civilian Primary Care Manager?

A. Yes, since Reese is closing, retirees and retiree family members who elect to enroll in TRICARE Prime will be assigned to civilian Primary Care Managers. Enrolling this group of beneficiaries to a civilian network will negate the need for transferring them from a military to a civilian PCM while the 64th MDG begins downsizing.

Those who do not enroll in TRICARE Prime will seek care under TRICARE Standard (CHAMPUS) with the option of using the civilian network of providers (TRICARE Extra). As of Wednesday, all beneficiary categories, with the exception of active duty and their family members, will be seen at the 64 MDG on a space available basis only.






