



Energy conservation Awareness key to achieving Reese reduction goals

As we begin the new fiscal year, energy conservation requirements change and our savings goals increase.

It has been my goal to keep everyone abreast of the changing requirements and the need for conservation to meet these requirements.

Each year the Air Force provides awareness ideas to help us understand energy conservation and why it is needed. The Air Force slogan this year, "Energy Fuels, Our Future," is directed toward the push for alternative energy sources throughout the world.

Alternative energy comes from sources like water, air and the sun, or from using established energy sources in different ways.

West Texas is not the best place

for water generated energy since we do not have large lakes or rivers.

What water we do have can be frozen and used as thermal storage in the chilled water cooling process.

This process goes back to the old ice house cooling days where ice was made at night and used during the day to cool water. The principle is to make ice at night when electric costs are low and to pipe water through the ice during the day to run air conditioning systems.

One thing West Texas is good for is wind. Many of you have probably seen the large windmills at 19th street and the Loop. These are wind turbines which generate electricity and are an excellent source for free energy. This electricity is used to run several pieces of equipment and any excess can be sold back to the utility company.

Two major drawbacks of wind generation are initial cost and the requirement for a large amount of space to operate the equipment. Probably the best source for alternative energy comes from the

sun. You see solar designs everywhere today. New houses are built to

receive direct sunlight heat, called passive solar systems. Collectors added to roofs and walls to heat water for heating systems, and hot water heaters are called active solar systems.

The most popular and by far the most expensive alternative energy source is photovoltaics.

Photovoltaic units are chemically treated cells which, when exposed to the sun, generate electricity. You have probably seen them on television, attached to cars in the solar powered automobile races held every year.

If you are traveling on interstate 27 toward Plainview you will see telephone call boxes on the side of the road.

These phones are powered by batteries which are charged by photovoltaic cells on top.

Because of our dwindling natural resources, we have to find other ways to conserve

This is where alternative fuels come in. Trying to use our current resources more effectively is not a true alternative fuel source, but if you use them in nonstandard applications then you have alternative sources

Probably the most well-known application of nonstandard use is the electric automobile. Propane powered trucks have been around for years and now there are natural gas vehicles.

The Air Force uses both propane and natural gas in their maintenance vehicles on several bases.

If not at Reese, you will see these alternatives in use at some point in your Air Force career because energy conservation will always be here.





EQUAL list released soon

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas (AFNS) - The newest Enlisted Quarterly Assignment Listing of available overseas enlisted assignments will be available in the Reese military personnel flight and on the Air Force Personnel Center's world-wide web home page Tuesday.

This list includes assignments for people wanting to volunteer to move overseas during the July through September 1996 period.

Personnel officials recommend assignment preferences be updated by Nov. 22, to ensure the information is updated in the computer system before actual assignments are made. AFPC's public release of the assignments is Dec. 22.


EQUAL advertises upcoming assignment requirements, by Air Force Specialty Code and rank, and gives people a chance to update their assignment preferences to match vacancies needing filling in a particular cycle. Members should review, prioritize and list specifically those assignment options available to them on EQUAL, personnel officials said.

New listings are released quarterly for assignments available at overseas locations as well as assignments available for those returning from overseas areas. All special duty assignments appear on EQUAL-Plus and are updated weekly.

Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force to visit

Top enlisted to speak at Reese Enlisted Awards Banquet

Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force David Campanale will be the guest speaker for the Reese Enlisted Awards Banquet on Nov. 18.

The banquet will be held in the Reese Club. Tickets for the banquet are \$8 for E-1 through E-4 and \$13 for E-5 and above.

During the banquet Campanale is expected to address issues affecting the Air Force's enlisted force today and in the future.

Campanale discussed some of these issues during a recent visit to Keesler Air Force Base, Miss.

He talked in-depth about promotions, training, health issues, clubs and recruiting.

The target range for promotions, Campanale said, is 16 to staff sergeant, 11 to technical sergeant, 20 to master sergeant, and 13 to chief master sergeant.

When people don't get promoted, it's not a happy time. Obviously, we wish more people could get promoted," he said.

"Those are still pretty good numbers and we're going to at least promote that many every vear.

For those concerned about seven-level training the chief brought good news. "Absolutely—it's going to be offered to all career fields," he said.

"It may take some time to work it into the budget," he added, noting that all the seven-level schools won't be up and running until 1997.

The lack of training has been one problem with the cycle ergometry test, a health issue Campanale is frequently asked about. "I don't know if it's the best possible system," he said. "I just know it's better than what we had."

"In the past, airmen ran 1.5 miles once a year. DOD-wide, about 23 people a year were dying. Nobody's died of cycle ergometry."

According to Campanale, "When the program first came on line, there were some mistakes in the software and some people weren't trained properly on how to administer it. We're implementing some new software and we've done a lot of work on training people. We've learned some lessons along the way to make it more accurate.

Smoking is another health issue the Air Force is addressing. The Air Force has come a long way in educating people of it's hazards, Campanale

said.

"I remember from basic training, the training instructor would stop the flight and say 'Smoke 'em if you got 'em.' If you didn't smoke you had to go paint rocks or something. So most people began to smoke because it was the only way to get a break. That has all changed," he added.

Although Campanale doesn't believe there will ever be a smoke-free base; he agrees the Air Force's education program is having a significant impact.

Now, less than one out of three of our people smoke. Most of those are in the junior ranks, so we just need to educate them and encourage them not to smoke," he said.

The solution to declining club membership is simpler than that of encouraging members not to smoke.

"The only thing people can do to help is join. Although officers clubs is a way to save money, it's not what I really like," he added. "But we have to at least break even and that may be the only alternative."

There is more than one alternative when it comes to recruiting. Just wearing the uniform and opening your doors to prospective applicants can help with the recruiting effort, the chief said.

"Let the local recruiter bring around students, show them what you're made of. If you think the military is a good life, tell them."

During his first 11 months in office, Campanale said he's been "overwhelmed with the troops.

"They're just incredible," he said.

"Every day, no matter where I go, they can bring me to tears and they can make me smile. I'm really proud of them."

Q. I have questions concerning the TRICARE program, where do I go?

A. The TRICARE Service Center is the focal point for all TriCare implementation and benefit questions. The TSC is located in the 64th Medical Group, Bldg 1300 Rm #342, across the hall from Physical Therapy. The administrative hours of the TSC are 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Please feel free to stop in or call 885-2999/1866.

Q. I have problems with the assistance I am receiving from the TRICARE Service Center, who do I talk to?

A. I am the Contracting Officer's Technical Representative for this area. As such I am the liaison between Foundation Health Federal Services Inc., the commander of the 64th Medical Group and Region VI's Lead Agent. One of the technical duties of the COTR is reviewing and evaluating the contractor's performance. If the TSC has been unable to resolve your questions or concerns, please call me at 885-3521.

Q. I am a CHAMPUS eligible retiree. I want to sign up for the civilian TriCare Prime option but I experienced some difficulty when I called the providers on the list I was given, what should I do?

A. We are currently working to resolve this issue. The civilian provider network is our number-one priority.

There has been an unfortunate miscommunication between the Lubbock civilian network and the contractor, Foundation Health Federal Services. Currently, representatives from both parties are working to resolve any misunderstandings.

The 64th Medical Group is committed to providing access to quality health care. If you enrolled in TriCare Prime but have experienced difficulties, please call or visit the TriCare Service Center for assistance.

The staff at the TSC will find you a primary care manager. We sincerely apologize for any inconvenience that might have been experienced.


