AFAS offers 1996-1997 scholarships

ARLINGTON, VA — The Reservists on extended active Air Force Aid Society awarded \$5 million in education grants for school year 1995-1996.

The grant program, named in honor of General Henry H. (Hap) Arnold, was initiated by the Society's Trustees in 1988 in response to the rising costs of higher education. Since that time over 29,000 individual awards of \$1,000 each have

The Education Grant program provides \$1,000 grants to sons and daughters of active duty, retired or deceased Air Force members, retired reservists over age 60, and Title 10 duty (all other Reserve and ANG are not eligible); and spouses of active duty members and Title 10 Reservists on extended active duty stationed in the United States.

This year 5,000 grants were awarded to help people pursue their educational goals, 500 of the scholarships were to spouses. The Society plans to award another 5,000 Education Grants for the upcoming academic year.

Program officials, though very pleased with the overall response to the program, did voice one concern. Too many

In response to the perception that the form was complicated, the society developed a new financial questionnaire. The society is confident families will be more motivated to complete the process

When you receive a dental examination and cleaning appointment, does the thought of a grinding drill send chills down your spine?

You shouldn't be afraid.

In addition to the examinations, the 64th Dental Squadron provides restorative, surgical, periodontal and prosthodontic services to active duty personnel.

Four dental officers and 16 ancillary staff personnel are responsible for the dental health of approximately 1,535 active duty members here.


This is accomplished through three flights working together to give proper

The clinical dentistry flight, most commonly seen, handle restorative, endodontic (root canals), periodontic (gums), exams and cleaning

The dental laboratory flight makes crowns, dentures, mouth guards and custom face guards.

The dental support flight is responsible for supply, X-rays and sterilization of cleaning equipment. Also, it is comprised of the people everyone meets, the receptionists.

The squadron does provide standby treatment on a space available basis to non-active duty beneficiaries.
