Chief of staff details AF role in joint operations

Calling the Air Force mission central to the nation's response, the service's chief of staff recently detailed what commanders can expect from Air Force assets during joint-service missions.

Speaking before the American Defense Preparedness Association Symposium in Washington, Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman explained Air Force "core capabilities" and how they support joint operations. These capabilities—global

awareness, global mobility, and sustained combat power—provide options to joint service commanders in han-

dling contingencies worldwide.

"To get the mission done takes a total team effort," said General Fogle-

man, "and no single service is more important than another. Together, we

He will succeed Gen. Ronald Yates, who will retire from active duty this

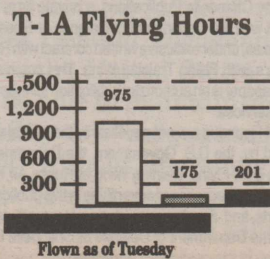
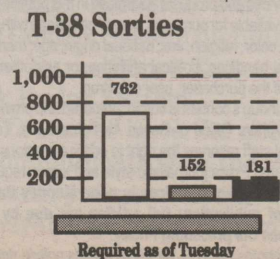
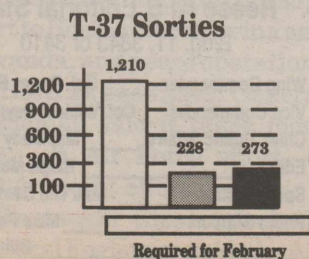

ture, General Boles has been nominated to receive his fourth star and then be appointed the AETC commander. General Habiger, the AETC vice commander since August 1991, will replace General Boles as the deputy chief of staff for personnel.

Electrical fires pose extra threat -- electrocution

All fires are dangerous and present a threat of injury due to flames and smoke, but an electrical fire adds another threat -- shock or electrocution.

If an electrical appliance catches fire, first try disconnecting the appliance or shutting the electricity off at the fuse or circuit breaker box. Once the electricity is cut off, most appliance fires will extinguish themselves.

If you attempt to extinguish the fire do not use water or a water-based extinguisher on the fire. Use a dry chemical or a fire extinguisher which has the letter "C" on it, meaning the extinguisher is approved for use on energized electrical equipment. If unable to extinguish the fire, call the fire department by dialing 911.

ment provides the following safety tips to help eliminate electrical fires in the home or

work area:

Do not overload electrical outlets.

Use only the correct size fuses in the fuse boxes.
 Keep appliances and

extension cords in good condition.

Do not run cords under rugs where people walk through doors or windows or anywhere it may be damaged.

Keep appliances unplugged when not in use.

Feel switch plates and outlets covers for heat. If an excessive amount of heat is transmitted, contact the 64th Civil Engineer service call desk at 3647.

Cover unused electrical outlets with plastic safety caps.

Only buy appliances and cords with the Underwriters Laboratory or Factory Mutual label which indicates these appliances have been tested for fire safety.

Leave air space around appliances such as stereos, televisions and microwave ovens to keep them cool.

Stopping smoking provides several benefits

The benefits of stopping smoking will continue to increase as will your energy.

"Smokers' cough" or chronic bronchitis will disappear. Your risk for heart disease, emphysema, and various cancers will continue to decrease over time until eventually you have no more risk for these diseases than a person who has never smoked (about 10 years after quitting). Finally, if you are saving the money you used to spend on cigarettes, your savings will continue to grow as the price of cigarettes continue to rise.

Of course, to continue enjoying the ripple benefits of stopping smoking, you need to avoid returning to smoking. Many individuals return to smoking even after they have been off cigarettes for some time. No matter which method is used, best available research statistics indicate about

one-third of persons who attempt to quit smoking are successful at staying off cigarettes. There is no doubt that there are many different reasons for an ex-smoker to relapse. Planning ahead is the key to avoiding this pitfall.

A common problem situation is an ex-smoker experiencing a crisis: for example, an automobile accident, death of a loved one, a change in jobs, etc. An automatic response to the crisis may be to ask for a cigarette or other people, wanting to provide comfort, may offer a cigarette and the ex-smoker may accept it without thinking. The way for you to plan ahead for such a possibility is to think now of the reasons you would not return to smoking — even in crisis.

Ask yourself, "What will I do if a crisis occurs in my life to avoid returning back to my old smoking habits?"

For example, many individuals relate to the idea that "no matter how bad things are, smoking will only make them worse." Another point is that the individual will survive the crisis, but smoking

a cigarette then could leave a smoking habit to be conquered again.

One suggestion for handling "crisis-related" smoking urges is to think of a sentence that represents your strongest reason for never wanting to smoke again. Write the sentence on a card and carry it with you always. This sentence should be private, rather than shared with others.

A second reason some ex-smokers end up smoking again is that they feel so good about stopping — so totally removed and unhooked from cigarettes — that they feel they can have a cigarette or two just for fun. The rule here is to avoid the one cigarette and a you will avoid all the others.

Some ex-smokers return to smoking because their experience off cigarettes was bad; usually either in terms of gaining weight or having difficulty in managing stress.

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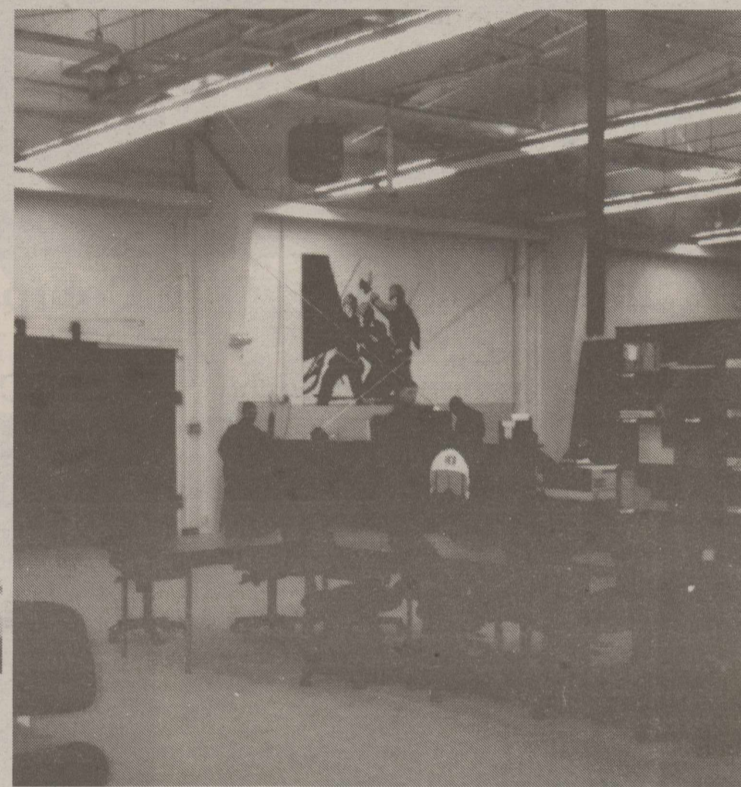
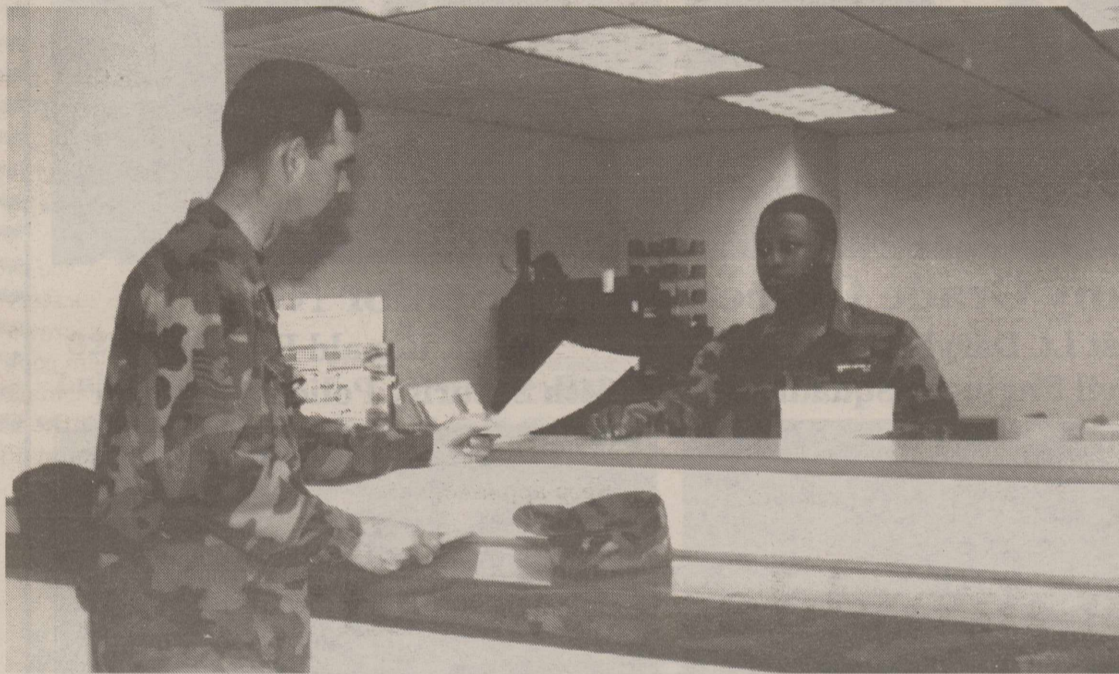
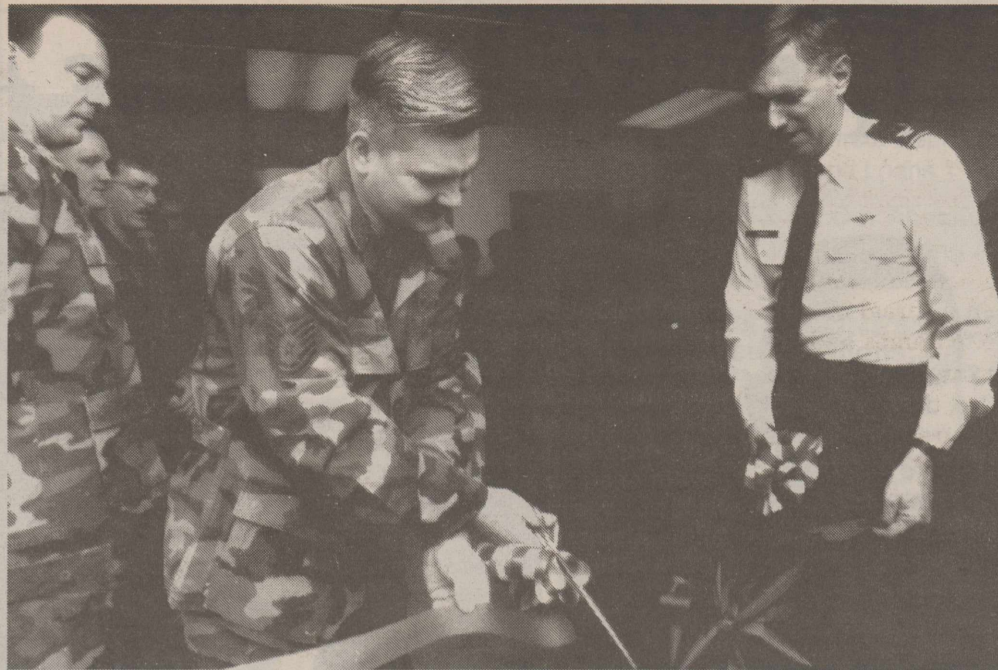
Members of the 64th Logistics Squadron pitch in to improve their facility and save the Air Force \$183,000 in the process.

January 31 marked the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the 64th Logistics Squadron's self-help construction project.

Squadron personnel provided nearly all of the labor in renovating the individual equipment issue, conference room and lobby areas.

The project was broken into two construction phases, each lasting 100 days.

According to TSgt. Dale Tucker, the project's crew chief, the actual cost of the project was approximately \$17,000. Sergeant Tucker said it is estimated that the renovation would have cost the Air Force about \$200,000 if the project work had been done by a contractor.

Global awareness a key element in Air Force leadership

(Continued from Page 1) allow our nation to remain engaged internationally." DoD entered a "period of promise" with the end of the Cold War, "but it's also turned out to be a time of turbulence, turmoil, and uncertainty," he said, referring to the many contingencies involving U.S. forces since the Soviet Union's dissolution.

Many of these nontraditional missions stem from a resurgence in what General Fogleman called ethnic, religious, nationalistic and territorial strife. Citing humanitarian support to Bosnia Herzegovina and Rwanda, and peace operations in Haiti as examples, General Fogleman said it takes more than an Air Force effort—it takes a joint effort.

To tackle these missions, General Fogleman said, the Air

Force will provide commanders information and communications support—part of their global awareness abilities. "It's hard to believe that we would have blue-helmeted troops (on the ground) and not support them," he said. "Our airborne and overhead systems allow us to penetrate, observe, and support the joint commander's many needs."

With this global awareness comes an extensive Air Force command and control network. This includes satellite communications, Airborne Warning and Control System flights and Joint Surveillance Target Attack Radar System.

"You must have the ability to communicate with the forces under your command," said General Fogleman. "You must have the ability to exchange

information with them—freely, frequently and on a global basis. If you can't use the information in a timely manner, it's wasted."

Linking with global awareness is global mobility—the Air Force's ability to quickly move personnel, equipment and supplies to where needed. "We're the only country in the world with such capability," he said. "We have the ability to project power and influence events anywhere in the world with the speed and certainty that our air mobility forces give us."

Yet General Fogleman believes the United States may not be able to maintain global mobility as a "unique national asset" without upgrading the fleet. "If we are going to keep the rapid response we value to deploy combat units and sup-

plies overnight, anywhere in the world—we need a new core airlifter," he said.

Gaining a new airlifter to meet 21st century demand is not about protecting an Air Force program, but about meeting a national priority, General Fogleman said.

He called his third core capability "sustained combat forces."

"This year alone, we've flown 20,000-plus sorties—over Bosnia, Iraq, and Haiti," he said. "These missions have us monitoring and enforcing no-fly zones, providing air support for peacekeepers and similar undertakings."

To meet the heavy Air Force commitments, General Fogleman said, the Air Force increased the number of precision aircraft support missions

—four times the amount flown during Operation Desert Storm.

He said fielding the Low Altitude Navigational Targeting Infrared for Night Flying systems into F-16s and F-15Es gives joint commanders the ability to use lethal combat power with little collateral damage.

In peacekeeping operations, General Fogleman said, air power can serve as a valuable force multiplier.

"Typically, a peacekeeping force is lightly armed—to match the mission and threat environment," he said. "However, a belligerent can rapidly concentrate forces and outgun the peacekeepers."

Air power—because of its speed, lethality, precision—can quickly be brought to bear."

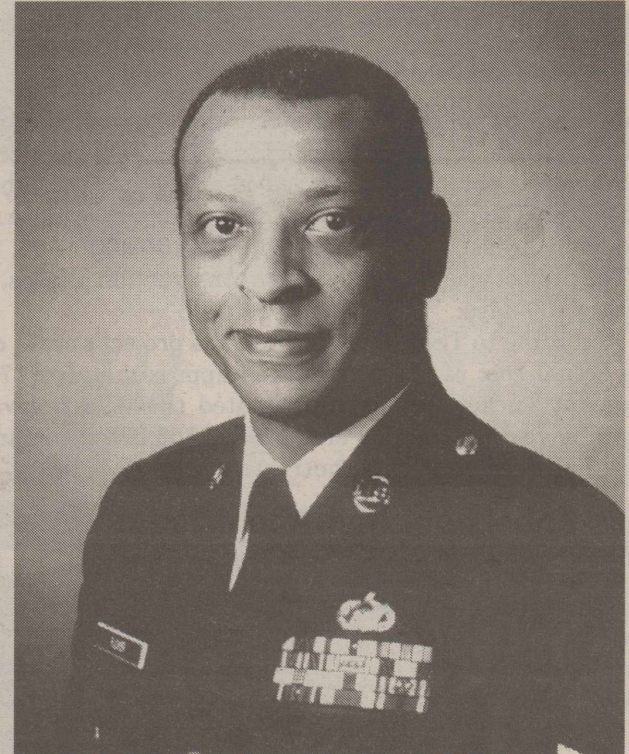

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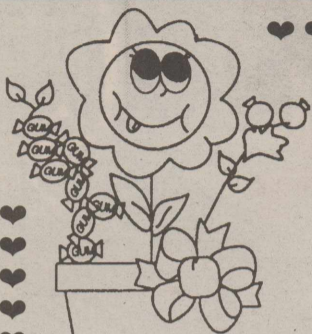
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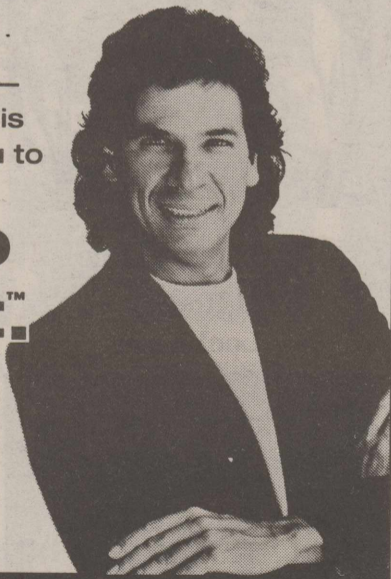
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64th OG announces best of year

Twenty-nine individuals were recognized as the best in their respective positions during the 64th Operations Group Awards Banquet at the Reese Club Feb. 4.

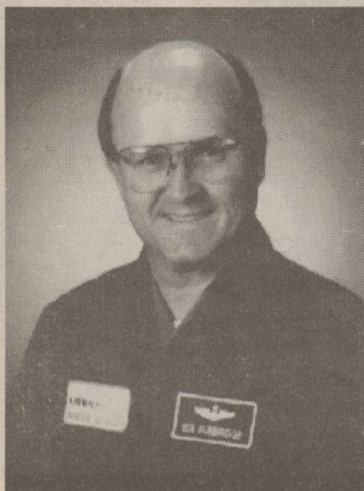
Col. Randy Gelwix, 64th OG commander, presided at the banquet.

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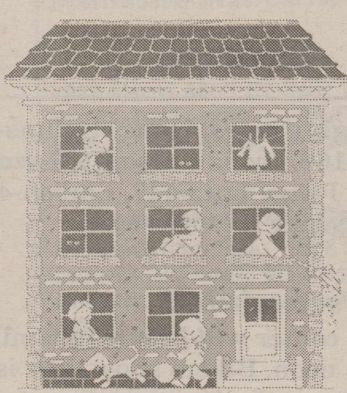
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64th LS-A dethrones 64th CES, 71-67
