# General West praises Reese performance

On his second visit to Reese, Maj. Gen. W. Thomas West, 19th Air Force commander, said Reese people are "proud of who they are, what they do and how they do it."

The general and his wife, Susan, arrived at Reese April 11 for a three-day visit. Gen. West flew T-37 and T-38 train-

ing sorties, toured base facilities and received program updates.

The general discussed

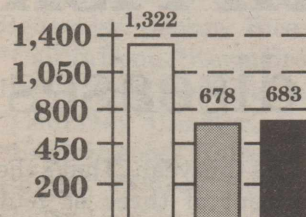
"It's always great to come here," said West. "I look forward to my next visit to Reese."

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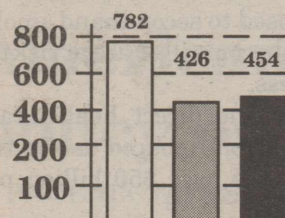

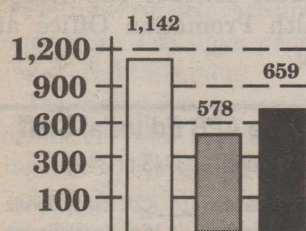
### T-37 sorties



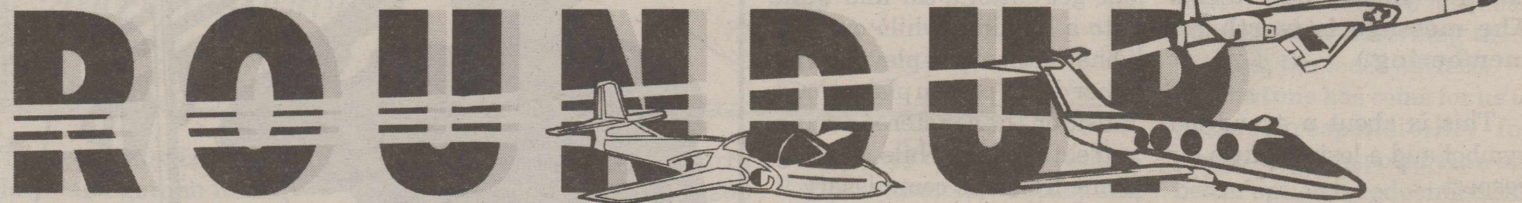

## New AFI defines professional relationships

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Air Force has revised the Air Force Instruction that governs professional and unprofessional relationships, personnel officials said.

The revision of AFI 36-2909, Professional and Unprofessional Relationships, was prompted by the fact that too much of the policy explanation

was removed during the process of converting the document from a regulation to an instruction, officials said.

The AFI doesn't represent a change in policy, but it does clarify the custom and the standards of conduct for maintaining professional relationships in the Air Force.

The revised AFI, which will

contain punitive provisions, clarifies guidance on activities and situations which lead to or constitute unprofessional relationships; stresses the need for professional relationships and personal accountability; and emphasizes commander and supervisory responsibilities.

The AFI will be made a part

of the curricula for basic training, commissioning programs, and professional military education for all military personnel.

Additionally, commanders will make certain all personnel are briefed on the concept at least annually.

Officials said the revised AFI will be distributed in May.

## This 'grand lady' has earned ours

(Editor's note: The following article by Staff Sgt. Barry Weakley, Randolph Air Force Base, Texas, addresses a problem shared by many military installations — including Reese. The message is worth remembering.)

The battle that I am talking about is the battle for respect. She is "Old Glory", the Stars

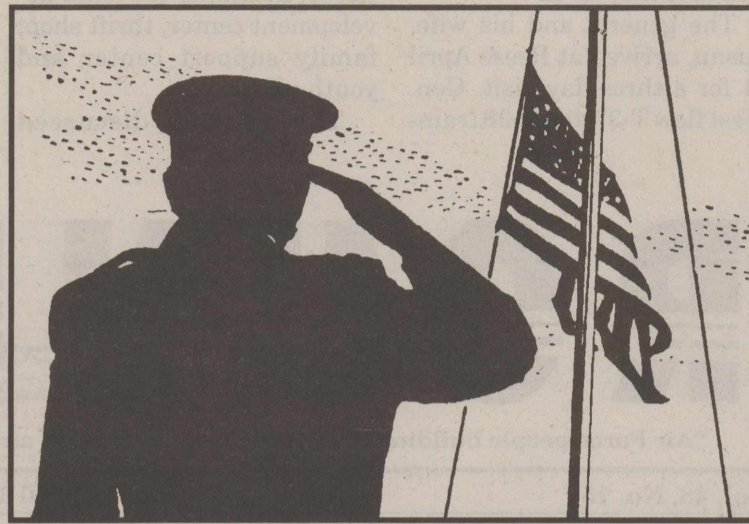
and Stripes, our flag of the United States of America.

After the last notes of the anthem drifted through the evening sky, I passed a couple and overheard one of them refer to the national anthem as "that thing."

People don't even know what our Star Spangled Banner stands for! I have even seen military people walk by our flag with out giving it the



proper respect it deserves.

This article is not for those who stand at attention, salute or place their right hand over their heart. This article is for Old Glory. She honors every person who has made the ultimate sacrifice and died, fighting for the freedom all of us enjoy today. She honors every-

one who has served our country.

I think we all can take a few minutes out of our busy day and show some respect for what our fathers, mothers, brothers, sisters, sons, daughters, uncles and aunts gave, and continue to give, their lives for our freedom and our flag.

Please take the time to tell our future generation — our children — that saluting or paying respect to our flag is not just for the military.

## Drinkers, smokers run triple health risk AMA study links smoking to majority of fatal diseases

Air Force people who drink and smoke are three times more receptive than non substance abusers to die from related diseases, according to an American Medical Association report.

The AMA report cited a recent Mayo Clinic study of 214 people who died. Half of the 214 died from a tobacco-related underlying cause, such as cardiovascular disease or cancer. Only 73 of the 214 people died from an alcohol-related underlying cause, such as chronic liver disease or cirrhosis.

"The prevalence of smoking

among substance abusers is two to three times that of the general population and alcoholics may constitute a quarter of all smokers," the report stated.

At the same time, Air Force health promotion officials said tobacco cessation classes continue to be filled with people who want to quit.

"Quitting tobacco use may be one of the hardest things you'll ever have to do. Fortunately, you don't have to go it alone. We

offer a tobacco cessation course that gives you information and heaps of support to help you succeed, so that you can make that habit ancient history," states one Air Force ad for base tobacco cessation classes.

While Air Force health promotion officials say the number of people who smoke has drastically decreased in recent years, an estimated 3 million teens in the United States still abuse nicotine. Some teens eventually join the Air Force and bring their habits with them.

The Food and Drug Administration said one reason why so many people still smoke is some tobacco companies have

manipulated nicotine levels of cigarettes despite claims they did not. The FDA wants to treat nicotine as a drug.

The AMA also points to the following as reasons why smoking contributes substantially to death and health problems:

□ Almost one-quarter of the U.S. adult population smokes. That figure is slowly declining. However, the percentage of adolescent smokers is increasing, with 3,000 children beginning to smoke each day, replacing those 2 million smokers who either die or quit annually.

□ In the U.S., 420,000 Americans will die prematurely of diseases linked to

smoking this year. That's the equivalent of three or four jumbo jets crashing per day with no survivors.

□ Cigarettes cause about 30 percent of all cancers. Those exposed to secondhand smoke also become ill or are at risk for illness.

□ The direct health care costs from tobacco use in the U.S. are over \$50 billion per year.

Air Force health promotion officials urge all Air Force people to quit smoking today.

In 1969, Gaylord Nelson conceptualized Earth Day, hoping to create a dramatic event focusing national attention on the environment. The objective was to cause a nationwide concern for the environment so large, it would shake the political arena.

Earth Day became a reality in the spring of 1970 with over 20 million Americans partici-

pating. In its 26th year, Earth Day is recognized by over 200 million people in 141 countries.

The slogan for this year's Earth Day celebration is "The Time Has Come!"

Indeed, the time has come for us to look at the way we do business and find alternative solutions minimizing the effect it has on our environment and the earth. Solutions or alternatives are becoming more numerous and easier to imple-

ment every day due to technological advances, but they still take some research and work from us.

The time has come to assess the environmental inheritance we are leaving our children. We all want to provide for our children should anything happen to us, likewise, we have to act now to provide a clean environment.

Individually, we can use alternative forms of energy

(such as solar power), plant trees, use public transportation, car pool or bike to conserve fuel and reduce air pollution.

Just by planting trees, we can produce enough oxygen for 18 people every day for every acre of trees; absorb enough carbon dioxide over a year's time equal to the amount we produce driving a car 26,000 miles; and remove gaseous pollutants by absorbing them through the leaf's surface.

The time has come for us to assume responsibility for proper trash disposal. An even better option is reducing trash generation by recycling aluminum, glass, paper, plastic, and yard waste. Yard waste alone takes up 80 percent of our landfill space.

## American Express changes policy on government cards

PHOENIX (AFNS) — Air Force people participating in the American Express government card program can receive information and assistance through the Government Cardholder Assistance Center. Cardholders are also being warned that American Express now reports accounts that are more than 120 days past due to national credit bureaus.

The assistance center provides information and assistance. To reach the center, dial 1-800-492-4922.

American Express officials said the assistance center can also help Air Force temporary duty travelers with concerns about extended TDY or reimbursement timeframes that can affect bill payment.

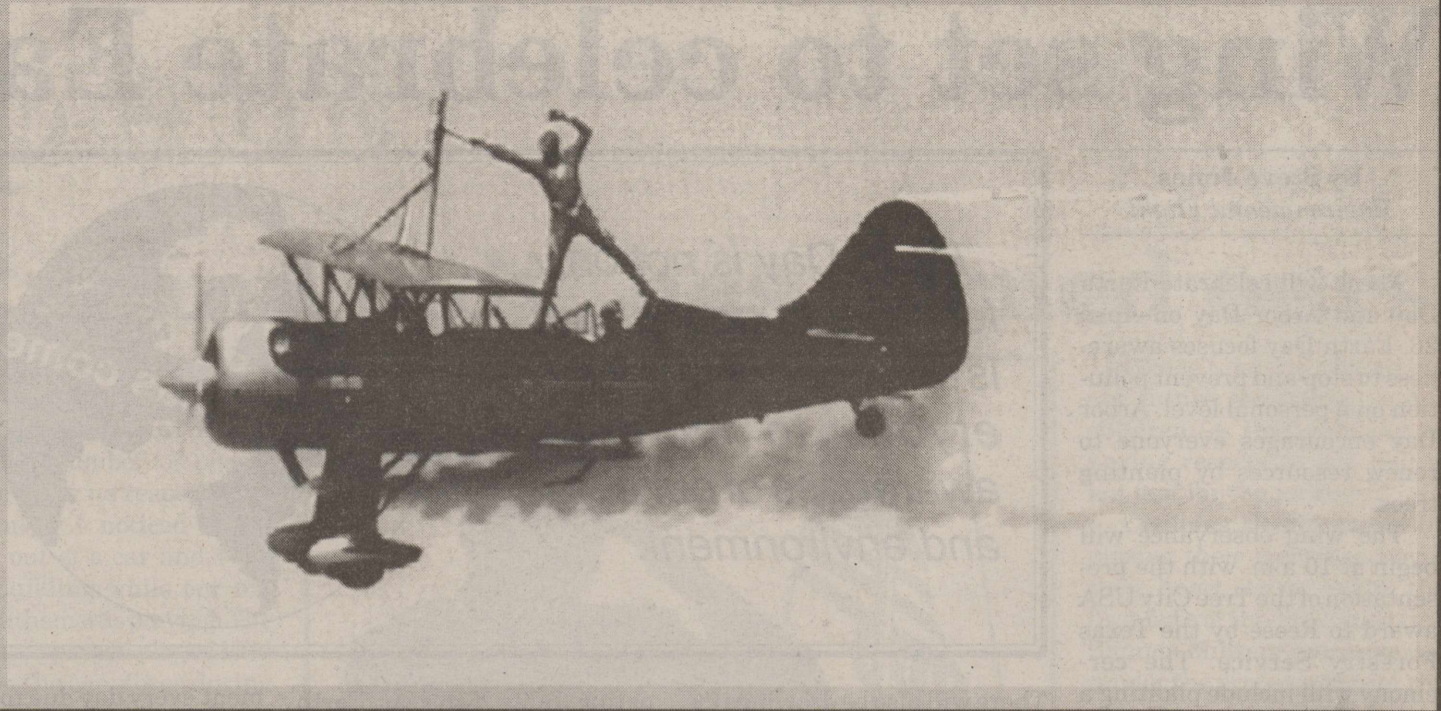
American Express has amended its standard suspension notice to cardholders that are 90 days past due to advise them that if their accounts remain seriously delinquent, action will be taken.

For instance, American Express will report the accounts to a national credit bureau if the 90-day delinquency reaches 120 days.

In addition, all cardholders who are currently 120 days or more past due, and whose accounts have been canceled, will receive a letter notifying them that their account will be reported to a national credit bureau unless they remit payment for the past due balance within a 45-day grace period.

## Joint chiefs chairman predicts timely withdrawal

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff is "very confident" that the U.S.'s peacekeeping role in Bosnia will conclude by Dec. 20 and is wary of talk about staying past the stated mission deadline.

To do otherwise could slow down the peace process and the rebuilding of the war-ravaged nation, Army Gen. John M. Shalikashvili told a group of military reporters recently.

"We need to be careful on this talk about staying longer," Shalikashvili said.

"Such talk could lead people there to say, 'Well, they are going to stay anyway, so we do not have to be quick about making things work.'"

Perceptions that arise from such talk could, in turn, prompt attempts to delay elections or the return of refugees to regions from where they fled during the war, Shalikashvili said. "So, there are some negative aspects to all of this talk about us staying" longer than Dec. 20.

He stressed, though, it's not likely that every servicemember will be out of Bosnia by the deadline "but we will terminate our mission (by then) and get out of there as quickly as we can."

Between now and then, the U.S. contingent will resist ongoing pressure to operate outside the parameters of the peacekeeping mission, he said. This includes such duties as assisting with

the repatriation of refugees or guarding graves.

"If there are things we can do that do not detract from the mission ... then we will do so," Shalikashvili said. But, "the mission comes first."

Shalikashvili said that civilians have been aided by some tasks directly related to the mission, notably the building of the Sava River bridge. The bridge enabled military equipment to enter Bosnia and it also enhanced freedom of movement for civilians.

"But we have to be very, very careful of what it is that we do."

During the 30-minute interview in his Pentagon office, Shalikashvili also addressed joint training, force mod-

ernization and the professionalism of U.S. military people.

In the training arena, the services have done an "extraordinary job" at the individual and unit level, he said.

"Where we have not done so well is understanding what it takes to bring them all together and to conduct joint training. Most of the joint training is for the commanders and the staffs," he said.

"But we have made tremendous progress in the last two years," said the chairman.

He cited as an example a recent U.S. Central Command joint exercise he and Defense Secretary William Perry observed at Camp Blanding, Fla., in which 4,000 troops participated, including Marines, soldiers, airmen and sailors.

The next step is to figure out how to continue such efforts so they don't become "an additional burden," he said.

Regarding modernization, Shalikashvili noted that big ticket items such as the Air Force F-22 fighter get a lot of attention, but the "non-sexy stuff that no one ever goes to Congress and testifies about" is just as important.

Such things as tent pegs, webbing and trucks "have a direct impact on how servicemen and women feel about themselves, how they feel about the job," he said.

What matters mostly — whether it's web gear or an F-22 — is how each piece of equipment "increases that service's capability to be more effective as a member of the joint team," he said.

Overall, Shalikashvili said, the devotion of servicemembers makes a big difference everyday.

Globally, from efforts like the recently concluded Haiti operation and ongoing operations from Southwest Asia to Bosnia, on- and off-shore, the professionalism of the troops has had a huge positive impact, he added.

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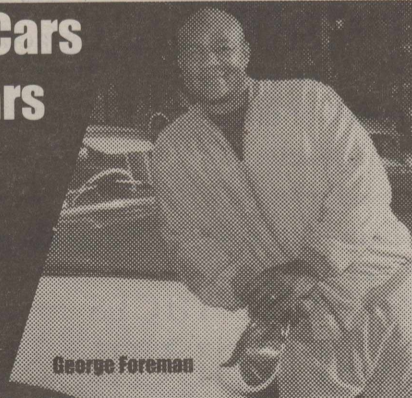

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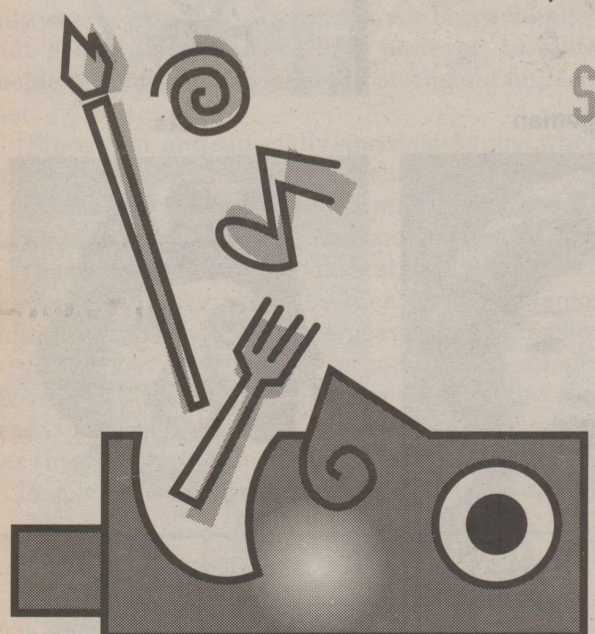

The nominees, and the primary area of service, include:

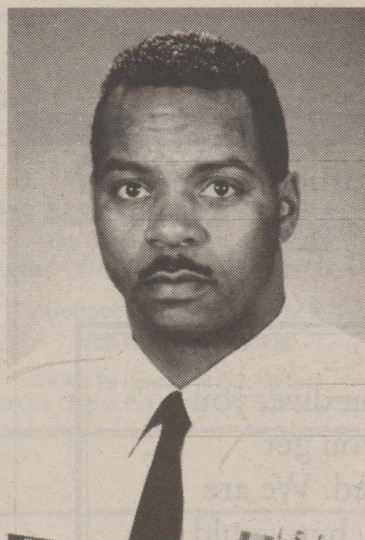

### **AF accelerates chevron wear date**

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Air Force has accelerated the mandatory wear date for the new enlisted chevron from Oct. 1, 1999, to Oct. 1, 1997.

The original date coincided with the mandatory wear date of the new uniform. But since sales of the old chevron have tapered off, Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman agreed to accelerate the new chevron wear date by two years, said personnel officials here.

When Air Force introduced the new service dress uniform in February 1994, enlisted members could only wear it with the new chevron. Air Force changed that policy in November 1994, however, to allow people to wear the new chevron on the old uniform coat.

"Since then, and especially since last August when new chevrons became available through the supply system, people pretty have much stopped getting the old chevrons," said a personnel spokeswoman.

The new chevrons have bolder stripes than the old chevrons. They also make it easier to identify senior enlisted members -- master sergeants, senior master sergeants and chief master sergeants have stripes above and below the star. Senior airmen and sergeants both will wear the new E-4 chevron, which has three stripes with a star.

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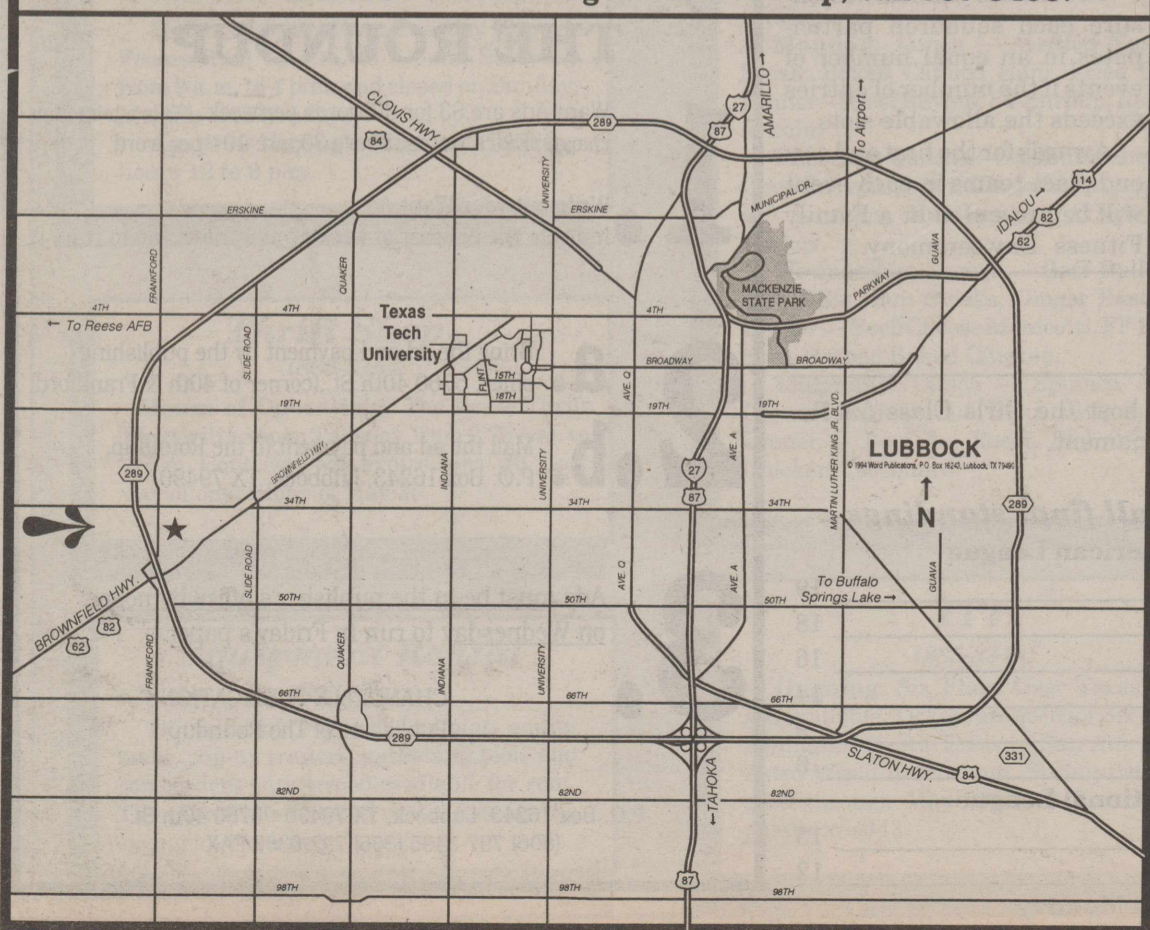
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
