Every facility on base has a designated tornado area located in a well-protected section of the building.

Knowing the location of the designated shelter is critical to survival.

Kitchen fires started by inattentiveness

ay attention to what is near the stove or oven

In just one minute, your kitchen could be involved in a fire.

How? In just one minute, the time it takes you to talk on the phone, answer the door or check the laundry, a fire can develop on the stove.

Why? Because, for just one minute, you left the stove unattended.

The kitchen contains just the right ingredients for a devastating fire to start. Thousands of fires are caused by unattended

king and result in struction and injury daily. Many, if not all of these fires could have been prevented if you had just stayed for one minute more.

The Reese Air Force Base fire department wants to help you reduce your risk of having a kitchen fire by offering some fire safety information.

Most cooking fires involve the ignition of grease. Whether it is cooking oils, lard, or melted fats from meat, grease is a combustible liquid which ignites easily and burns rapidly.

If grease should ignite in a pan on your stove, smother the fire by sliding the lid or a larger pan over

fire and turn off the ner. If a fire starts inside the oven, turn off the heat and leave the door closed to smother the flames.

Other methods include using baking soda (not baking powder or flour) or a portable fire extinguisher to put out the flames. If the fire appears to be too large to slide a lid on, or for the safe use of an extinguisher, leave the house immediately and call the fire department at 9-1-1.

With a grease fire, it is just as important to know how *NOT* to fight a fire as it is to extinguish one.

Unfortunately, the typical reaction to a grease fire is for the individual to carry the pan outside or to pour water on it. Both of these actions are wrong! Moving a burning pan spreads the fire and can cause serious burns.

NEVER use water or flour to extinguish a grease fire. Water only intensifies the fire and can cause the

grease to splatter. Flour can result in an explosion. Deal with the fire where it starts, on the stove. Keep a lid, baking soda or an approved fire extinguisher close at hand.

Some cooking fires are the result of leaving combustible materials, like paper, towels, dishcloths and paper bags near the stove, oven or other hot cooking appliances. Fires also occur because of a grease buildup in stoves, ovens, broilers, exhaust fans or vents. To avoid these types of fires keep these areas clean and clear of grease or other combustible materials.

Avoid reaching over the stove or oven for anything. Store frequently needed items in other locations around the kitchen. Don't store cookies or candies

near the stove; it only tempts young children to climb on the stove to retrieve them.

Keep all small children out of the kitchen area, especially while cooking is in progress. Keep pot handles turned inward, out of the reach of children, and where you can't bump them accidentally.

Keep appliance cords up on the counter out of children's reach. Check frequently for frayed or broken spots on the cords. Replace those damaged cords or appliances immediately.

The best way to prevent cooking fires is to *NEVER* leave the cooking area unattended.
