

The meeting is in response to President Carter's signing of the Resources Conservation Act last November which requires an appraisal and evaluation of the state and nation's soil and water conservation program.

"The RCA act authorizes and directs the Secretary of To Take Part Agriculture to develop a national soil and water In Tennis Camp conservation program in cooperation with the public. our local soil and water conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, and the Soil Conservation Service,' said Webb.

"This program will establish new direction for future soil and water conservation efforts in Texas based on current soil, water, and related resource appraisals," Webb continued. "One point I want to make clear is. that districts in their 40-year history have always asisted landowners with voluntary conservation programs on their farms and ranches. We do not advocate any other approach since farm and ranch land is privately owned and that the interests and welfare of the owners must be served and that programs must be acceptable to them," Webb added.

Actions required by the RCA act include gathering data to appraise the condition and quality of Texas and the nations' soil and water resources by 1979.

The act also outlines a 5-year plan for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's conservation assistance to districts and requires an evaluation of the effectiveness and progress of ongoing programs. Reports will be made to the public and

Congress. "Our first meeting will primarily deal with discussions on soil and water resources in the district and how to conserve them," Webb said. "The public will also have the oppourtunity to learn more about the RCA act and the mission, relationship, and responsibilities of

"Public views on the the district and Soil Conser-

"I want to emphasize that a grass roots, bottom-up need to identify specific resource concerns and associated problems, if any, in addition to determining the extent and severity of these problems. We urge anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation to attend and air their views," Webb concluded.

Sweetwater Savings Paying New Rates

ings Association will be able to earn a compounded interest rate of 8.33 per cent on long term deposits, starting June 1, Association President Ed Aiken, Jr. announced recently.

To earn the full rate, savings must be left on deposit for terms of eight, nine or ten years, and interest left to accumulate.

The new certificates are being sold in denominations of \$1,000 or more. The certificates are federally insured up to \$40,000.

The eight to ten year certificates will carry an eight per cent stated interest rate, but with (daily/continuous) compounding the effective annual yield is 8.33 per cent, if interest is left in the account. "With the new authority just granted, we will be able to help our long term savers accumulate an even better return", Aiken stated. He added that the longer term certificates will also be helpful to home buyers because they will enable the association to stretch the terms of some savings capital, matching more closely the long terms of most mortgage loans.

Aiken said certificate holders may withdraw earnings without penalty at any time. Deposits can also be withdrawn before maturity, but subject to an interest penalty required by federal regulations. The withdrawn de-
