Mrs. Malouf, the former Jewel Smart, has been a long time resident of Rotan. She is active in the First United Methodist Church, The Book Review Club and Eastern

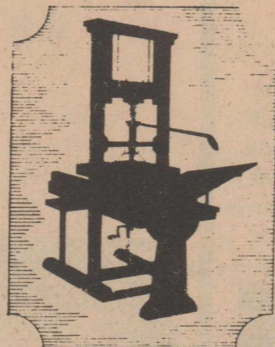
Star. In 1961-62 she was included in "Who's Who of American Women".

## Adult Swine Short Course Set For Rotan

A Swine Production Short Course for adult farmers will be held June 19-22 under the sponsorship of the Rotan High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Tom Harkey, Superintendent, and Mr. Jaeky Miller and Mr. Ronnie Teichelman, Teachers of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Robert S. Cohen, Swine Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science of Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Cohen received a B.S. degree in Animal Science in 1965, and a M.S. degree in Animal Nutrition in 1972 from Texas A&M University.

He has also received the Ph.D. degree in Animal Nutrition from Texas A&M University, 1975.

The short course at Rotan High School is scheduled to begin June 19 at 8:00 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held June 20, 21, and 22. During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Cohen will be available to assist swine producers with individual problems and provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Miller and Teichelman.

Producers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Tom Harkey, or the teachers of vocational agriculture, Mr. Miller or Mr.

Teichelman. An enrollment fee of \$5.00 will be charged.

Abraham Lincoln believed in the Bible. He said, "I believe the Bible is the best gift God has ever given to man. All the good from the Savior of the world is communicated to us through this book." ## SCS Sets Meeting For Public On June 20

"Public views on the future of the conservation, protection and enhancement of Texas' soil, water, and related natural resources will be sought at a meeting to be held in the Community Building in Rotan, at 2:00 p.m. June 20," Glen Webb, chairman of the Upper Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District, said.

The meeting is in response to President Carter's signing of the Resources Conservation Act last November which requires an appraisal and evaluation of the state and nation's soil and water conservation program.

"The RCA act authorizes and directs the Secretary of Agriculture to develop a national soil and water conservation program in cooperation with the public, our local soil and water conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, and the Soil Conservation Service," said Webb.

"This program will establish new direction for future soil and water conservation efforts in Texas based on current soil, water, and related resource appraisals," Webb continued. "One point I want to make clear is that districts in their 40-year history have always assisted landowners with voluntary conservation programs on their farms and ranches. We do not advocate any other approach since farm and ranch land is privately owned and that the interests and welfare of the owners must be served and that programs must be acceptable to them," Webb added.

Actions required by the RCA act include gathering data to appraise the condition and quality of Texas and the nations' soil and water resources by 1979.

The act also outlines a 5-year plan for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's conservation assistance to districts and requires an evaluation of the effectiveness and progress of ongoing programs. Reports will be made to the public and Congress.

"Our first meeting will primarily deal with discussions on soil and water resources in the district and how to conserve them," Webb said. "The public will also have the opportunity to learn more about the RCA act and the mission, relationship, and responsibilities of

the district and Soil Conservation Service.

"I want to emphasize that a grass roots, bottom-up approach is the key to this act. Our district and Soil Conservation Service will need to identify specific resource concerns and associated problems, if any, in addition to determining the extent and severity of these problems. We urge anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation to attend and air their views," Webb concluded.

## Sweetwater Savings Paying New Rates

Savers at Sweetwater Savings Association will be able to earn a compounded interest rate of 8.33 per cent on long term deposits, starting June 1, Association President Ed Aiken, Jr. announced recently.

To earn the full rate, savings must be left on deposit for terms of eight, nine or ten years, and interest left to accumulate.

The new certificates are being sold in denominations of \$1,000 or more. The certificates are federally insured up to \$40,000.

The eight to ten year certificates will carry an eight per cent stated interest rate, but with (daily/continuous) compounding the effective annual yield is 8.33 per cent, if interest is left in the account. "With the new authority just granted, we will be able to help our long term savers accumulate an even better return", Aiken stated. He added that the longer term certificates will also be helpful to home buyers because they will enable the association to stretch the terms of some savings capital, matching more closely the long terms of most mortgage loans.

Aiken said certificate holders may withdraw earnings without penalty at any time. Deposits can also be withdrawn before maturity, but subject to an interest penalty required by federal regulations. The withdrawn de-

posits would earn interest at 5 1/4 per cent, less 90 days interest.

A second new type of savings certificate, also federally insured to \$40,000, is being offered in denomina-

tions of \$10,000 or more for terms of six months. This certificate will earn interest at one-quarter per cent above the average auction rate paid on six month U.S. Government Treasury Bills.

## Cut Check Losses By Making Direct Deposit

The number of Government checks which are lost or stolen each month could be reduced considerably if more people would have such payments made directly to their banks or savings associations. According to Ed Deaton, Veterans Service Officer for Fisher County, persons now in receipt of disability or death benefits from the U.S. Veterans Administration, may have such payments sent direct to their bank for deposit into their checking or savings account. The procedure to have VA payments sent to a bank is quite simple. It requires only that the veteran, widow, or parent who is receiving the payment to contact their bank.

All banks and savings associations have the U.S. Treasury forms necessary to request an electronic funds transfer of monthly benefits directly to a personal account. The Treasury form must be completed showing the name of the person, the bank account number, and the name and correct mailing address of the financial institution where the payment is to go.

The banks will ask the individual for their VA file number and their social security number, and will complete the form for signature. Following completion, the bank will send the form direct to the VA for action. All VA claimants should be certain the bank is aware of the proper VA office to which the form is to be sent. Anyone who is not sure where their VA records are located may obtain such information by taking their next VA check to their local Veterans Service Officer or any VA office. Coded information on the check itself indicates the location of the VA claim folder, which is also the office where the request for direct deposit must be sent upon completion.

The morning class will be held on two weekdays between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m., the evening class on the same two weekdays between 6 and 10 p.m.

Cost will be \$37.46, which includes textbook, teaching aids and materials.

Instructors will be Glenn Pratt, C.L. Meeks, Don Russom and Jerry Huffman. After completion of the course, written and practical skills examinations are administered by the Texas

Department of Health. Students who successfully complete the tests are awarded Class B Emergency Care Attendant licenses.

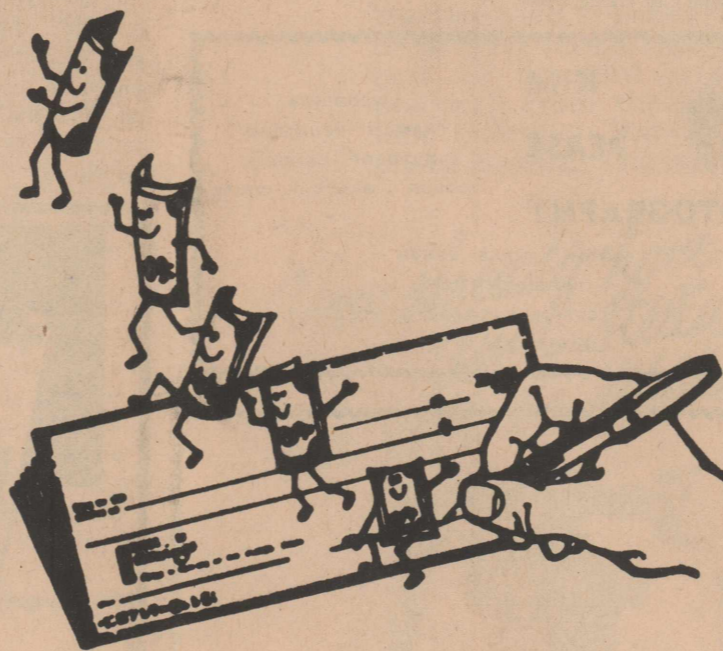

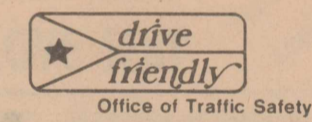

## Texas Crude Oil On A Five Year Decline

Texas' crude oil production declined last year for the fifth consecutive year. The downward trend continued in spite of another year of production at or near the maximum effective recovery rate in nearly all fields.

The output of the nation's No. 1 oil producing state in 1977 was just over 1.1-billion barrels and pushed the state's cumulative produc-

tion since 1889 to almost 42.7-billion barrels. But, last year's production was almost 51-million barrels below 1976 production and more than 162-million barrels below the all-time peak production year of 1972.

Fisher County, which has had recorded production since 1928, last year produced 7,198,979 barrels of crude oil at the rate of 19,723

barrels per day. Production in 1977 boosted Fisher County's production total through the end of the year to 185,591,458 barrels.

In 1977, 26 counties produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil, a decrease of one county from 1976 and four from 1975.

Yoakum replaced Scurry as the state's top producing county, while Ector, Gaines, and Hockley retained the Nos. 3, 4, and 5 ranks they held in 1975 and 1976.

## Brown Dog Ticks Hit Area, Treatment Told

Brown dog tick populations are causing considerable problems for homeowners. This tick is commonly found in urban areas and rarely occurs in rural areas.

The ticks hide in debris, cracks and crevices around buildings and are most often found on the ears, neck and between the toes of dogs.

Dogs are the principal host of the brown dog tick. Therefore, dogs should be examined frequently for these ticks.

Tick infestations can usually be controlled by treating the dog and yard at the same

time. Treatment of the dog's sleeping quarters and around doors and windows may be necessary.

In the home, spot treatments with household sprays containing 0.5 percent Dioxin or Ronnel will control light infestations. Removal


of the dog from the house and treatment of infested areas may be the only means of controlling heavy infestations. The services of a professional may be required for control of heavy infestations.
