



Sheriff's department report

January 1, 1998 thru June 30, 1998

During the first six months of 1998, this department has been extremely busy with not only with in-house problems but also with criminal and civil problems presented to us. In house problems were worked out as time permitted, however, the criminal and civil problems have to be tended to on a timely manner. Some of the in-house problems included, but were not limited to the following:

1. re-organization of the department in general,

2. personnel re-organization, letting each employee know what was expected of them,

3. following up on each inhouse situation and making corrections as needed,

4. creating a file system that was easier for employees to use and would actually contain needed essential information,

5. recondition the jail, in regard to repairs, painting, procedures, etc.,

although the list is endless and ongoing, these are a few of the situations that have been handled.

Some of the criminal offenses that have occurred are as follows: Burglary of a residence - 8, Theft - 21, Assault - 12, Resisting arrest -1, Criminal mischief - 10, Criminal trespass - 1, Driving while intoxicated - 4, Harassment - 3, Burglary of a building - 2, Retaliation - 3, Burglary of a vehicle - 2, Possession of Marijuana - 1, Bond Jumping / FTA - 1, Terroristic threat - 1, Attempted burglary of a

residence - 1, Reckless damage -1, Driving while license suspended - 1, Illegal dumping - 1, Deadly weapon in a penal institution - 1, Cruelty to animals - 1, Aggravated sexual assault - 1, Possession of controlled substance (cocaine) - 1, Minor in possession

This department responded to and handled 11 accidents, two of which were caused due to cattle wandering on the public roadways. We also responded to and assisted in several other accidents, however, since we were only assisting, no report was made by this department. Numerous other situations were attended to in a timely manner, however, due to the circumstances of each individual call, no report was required, although it was documented on the officers daily log. This type of call is not listed above. As far as problems with cattle being loose and causing problems on the roadways, there are untold number of times where this department, as well as the Department of Public Safety, have put cattle back into come enclosure when the cattle are roaming about. Many times the cattle are put up by officers because the owners cannot be determined or it is very late at night and its quicker to do that than call around the county waking everyone up to find the actual owner. Sometimes when a call is received about cattle being out, it may take 15-45 minutes for an officer to arrive in the area, depending on where the officer is and where the cattle are reported to be out. After

arriving at the location, it may take several more minutes to locate the cattle, with many times the cattle having wandered off the roadway and cannot be located. The call may take 1-2 hours out of an officers time when he could be doing something else. On a very regular occasion, the cattle out call may be called in by a passing motorist, many of which give wrong directions, which does not help the officers in locating the said cattle. Along with this, the Knox County Sheriff's Department dispatcher usually is busy trying to either locate a certain brand in the brand book, find the location on the map kept in the Sheriff's Office, or trying to call someone to take possession of the cattle. This county did adopt a stock law some 60 years ago. The effect of this law on cattle wandering around can only be deter-

mined in a court. The past several months have been very busy, with only two regular county officers to handle the investigation, related paperwork, and all the other miscellaneous items thrown in for good measure. Even though being constantly shorthanded, this is a job that we still do because it's something that we enjoy doing and are good at. TDA secures exemption for use of pesticide Admire

AUSTIN - Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry announced that the Texas Department of Agriculture has been granted approval by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to issues specific exemptions allowing the use of Admire 2 Flowable Insecticide (imidacloprid) and Capture 2EC Insecticide (bifenthrin) to control sweetpotato and sliverleaf whiteflies on cucurbits. The specific exemption expires June 25, 1999. Admire 2 Flowable Insecticide, manufactured by Bayer Corporation, and Capture 2EC, manufactured by FMC Gorporation, may be applied following all applicable directions, restrictions and precautions on the EPA registered product label, as well as these additional restrictions.

• One soil application per crop season may be made with imidacloprid, at a rate of 16 ounces (0.25 Ib a.i.) per acre per growing season. For areas with more than one crop per year, no more than 32 fl. oz. product per acre may be applied per calendar year. Admire 2 Flowable Insecticide may be applied at planting as a postseeding drench, transplant drench, hill drench or an in-furrow spray at or below seed level. Application should be made in sufficient water to ensure incorporation into the root zone.

• Bifenthrin may be applied at a maximum rate of 0.1 lb. active ingredient per acre by ground or aerial application, or by chemigation. A maximurn of three applications of bifenthrin per growing season (six applications per acre per calendar year for double cropped land) may be applied. Capture 2EC Insecticide/ Miticide may be applied in tank mixtures only with other products approved for use on cucurbits. Imidacloprid should not be applied within 21 days of harvest.

 A 3-day pre-harvest interval, and a 30-day rotation interval must be observed with bifenthrin. Treated fields may not be grazed prior to harvest. Straw derived from wheat planted in fields treated with bifenthrin may not be used for animal feed.

• To mitigate risks to aquatic systems, ground applications are prohibited within 200 yards and aerial applications are prohibited within one mile of moving water or public waters. Applications are prohibited if there is a greater than 20 percent probability of measurable precipitation for the time period for which the application is

· Applications will be made only by certified applicators, by licensed applicators or by persons under the direct supervision of licensed applicators.



USDA grants Perry's request: Haying allowed on CRP land

AUSTIN - Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry announced today that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved the waiver to allow having of Conservation Reserve Program land in 49 Texas counties. Haying is limited to one cutting, and producers cannot hay and graze the same CRP land.

In May, Perry requested that USDA grant a waiver to allow Texas producers to hay and graze CRP land to provide forage for livestock and to help remove a source of fuel for potential wildfires. The waiver to graze was granted in June.

"With drought conditions becoming worse across Texas, our producers have been looking at every available resource to provide feed and forage for their livestock," Perry said. "The waiver to allow haying of CRP land will provide a source of forage at a time when hay supplies are becoming dangerously low in many areas of the state.

"The dried grass has also posed a serious fire threat in some of our rural areas. Removing this source of fuel from the land helps reduce the danger from fast spreading brush fires,' Perry said.

Emergency having has been authorized through the earlier of either Aug. 31, 1998 or until the county USDA Farrn Service Agency office deems that emergency haying is no longer needed.

Producers who hay their CRP acreage must leave at least 50 percent of each field or adjacent field uncut for wildlife habitat. In addition CRP payments will be reduced by 25 percent of the per acre annual payment rate multiplied by the number of acres actu-

"Farmers and ranchers should also check with their local FSA office for additional details and to complete the necessary forms before they can hay or graze CRP acreage," Perry said.

Texas has 3.6 million acres in CRP land.

"USDA has said it has no money for Texas," Perry said.

"The funds allocated for DRAP have already been earmarked for disaster relief in other states.

"Unfortunately, Texas is just one of many states facing a natural disaster this year. I want to make sure our farmers and ranchers are not overlooked when it comes to needed help and relief," Perry said.


