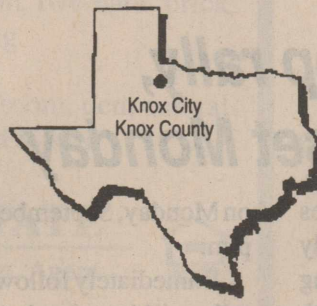

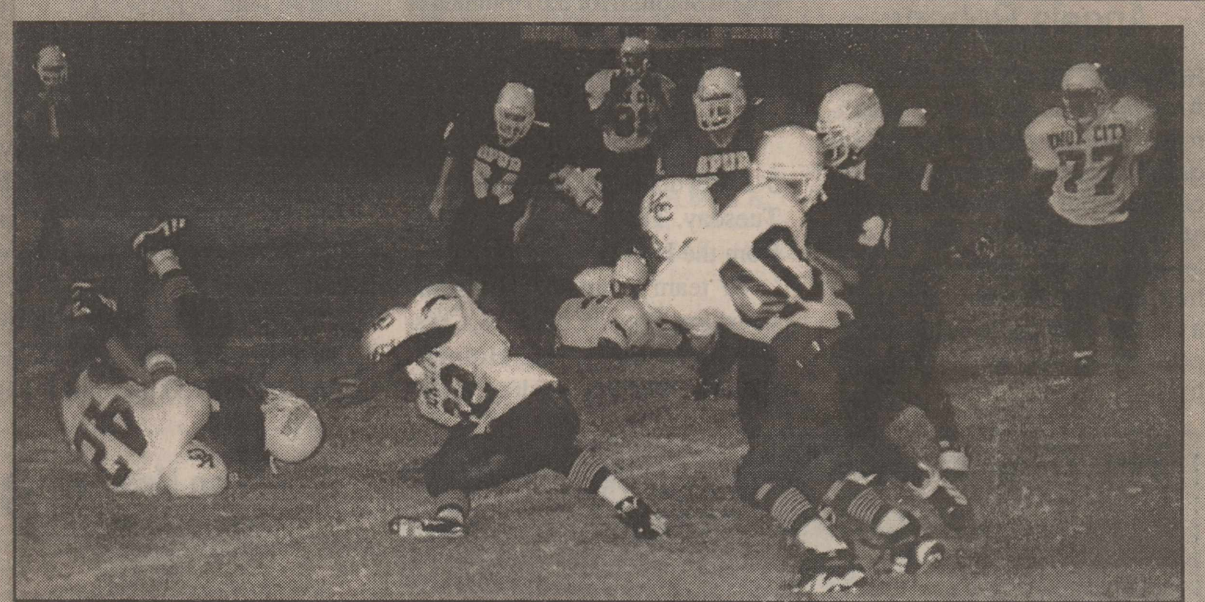

The Greyhounds made the trip to Spur last Friday night.

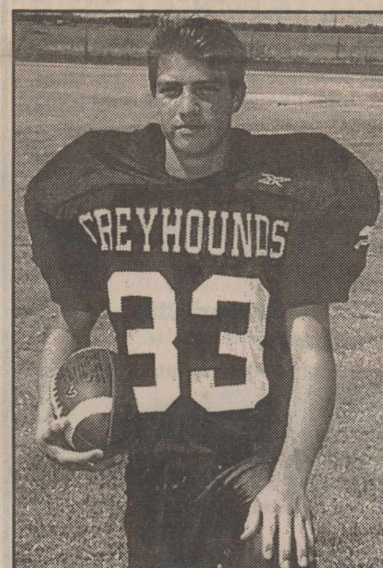

Although the Greyhounds didn't score until their third possession, they kept the pressure on the Bulldogs thanks to two punts downed inside the 5 yard line by Aaron Large. The second of those punts went out of bounds inside the 1 yard line. The two punts, coupled with some real aggressive defensive play by the Greyhounds, put them in position to take the lead on a run by Nefro Gonzales. Myles Richardson added the point after to put Knox City up 7-0.

Spur did manage a touchdown in the second quarter, but Knox City's defense was alert for the trick play when the Bulldogs went for two after the touchdown.

The Greyhounds went to half time up by the score of 7-6.

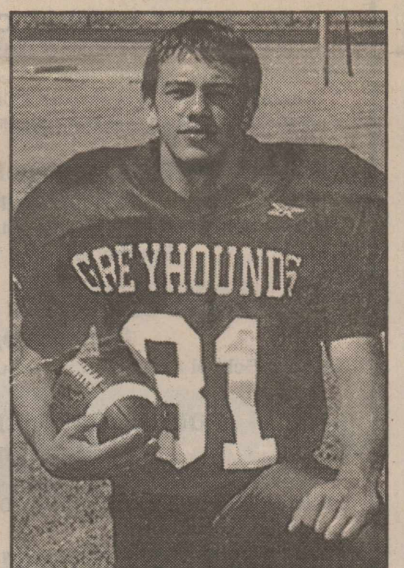

Cattlemen's Round-up set for September 29

Chairmen for West Texas Rehabilitation Center's 1998 Cattlemen's Round-Up from Knox County are David Albus, Larry Thompson and Gary Wilde.

Cattlemen's Round-Up is a program through which folks donate cattle, sheep, goats, horses, cash or handmade items to be sold at special auctions during September and October. Even an occasional pen of ducks, chickens or geese makes its way into the auction ring.

Abilene Livestock Auction will host a sale on September 29 beginning at 1:00 p.m.

Proceeds from these sales help the West Texas Rehabilitation Center provide outpatient services to more than 17,000 disabled children and adults each year. Last year, 23 persons from Knox

County were served at the Rehab Center and 25 were seen in the first seven months of this year.

The first Round-Up event is in San Angelo on September 17, followed by sales at Coleman on October 7; Stephenville, October 14; Eastland, October 20; and Junction on October 26.

Federal Land Bank Association and Texas Production Credit Associations are \$10,000 underwriters for the Round-Up, and Wrangler has added a \$5,000 contribution to the effort.

Approximately 150 Cattlemen's Round-Up volunteers, including Big Country Chairman Mike Alexander of Abilene, Concho Valley Chairman Carter Behrens of San Angelo and Honorary National Chairman Rex Allen, join

volunteers from Knox County. They are assisting this 39th annual Round-Up by promoting sales and asking their neighbors to join them in donating to this year's drive.

Although the focus is in September and October, Cattlemen's Round-Up is a year-round program. Most auction barns are willing to cut a check to the Rehab Center any time an animal is sold.

Persons wanting to donate livestock or those needing to arrange for hauling of animals may contact the Rehab Center 915-793-3509 or 793-3512; David Albus 658-3926 and Larry Thompson 422-4938. Both Albus and Thompson have volunteered their livestock pens for holding areas prior to the Rehab's September 28 pick up.

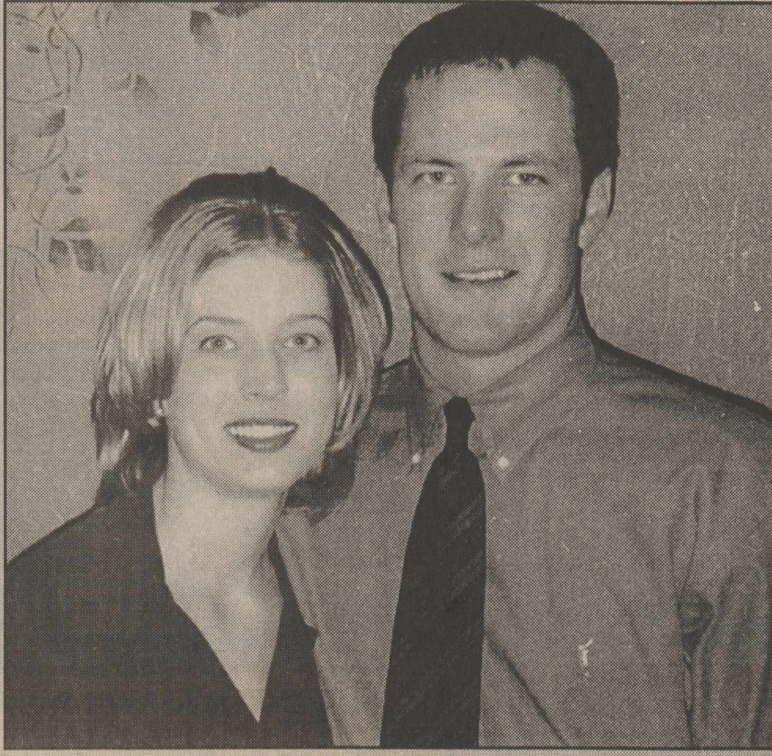

Evangelist for the revival is Harvey G. Albright of Norman,

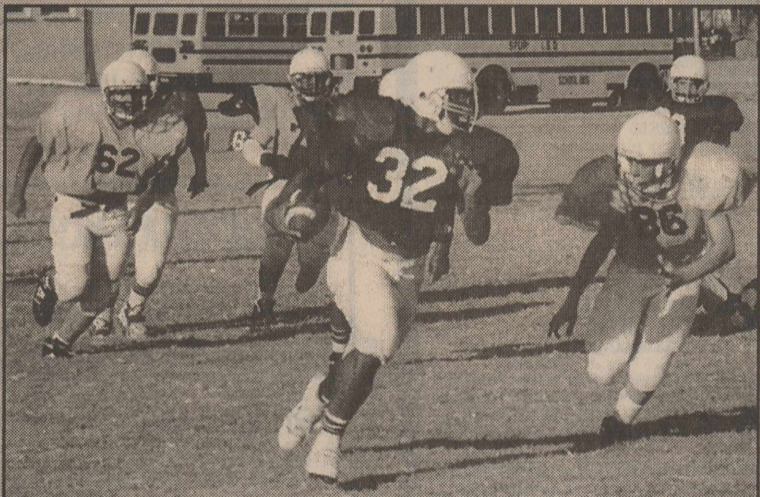
Oklahoma. Leading the music will be Alton Sanders of Weinert.

Pauline Myers will be pianist for the revival at each service.

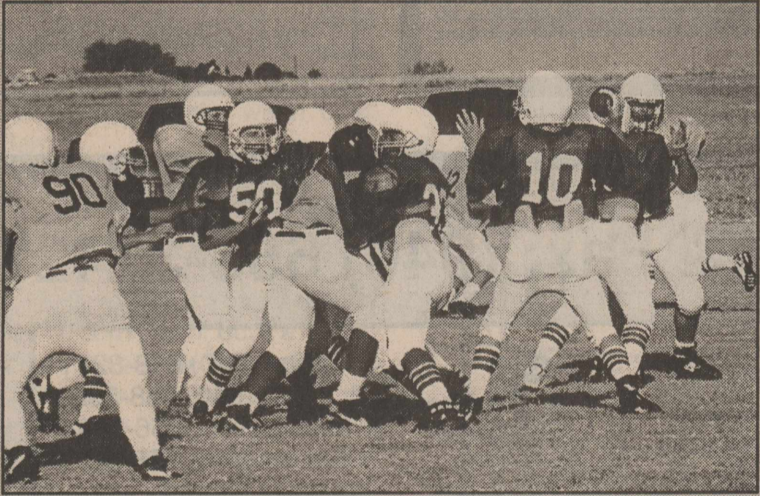
Services will begin at 11:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on Sunday. Weeknight services, each with a special emphasis, will begin at

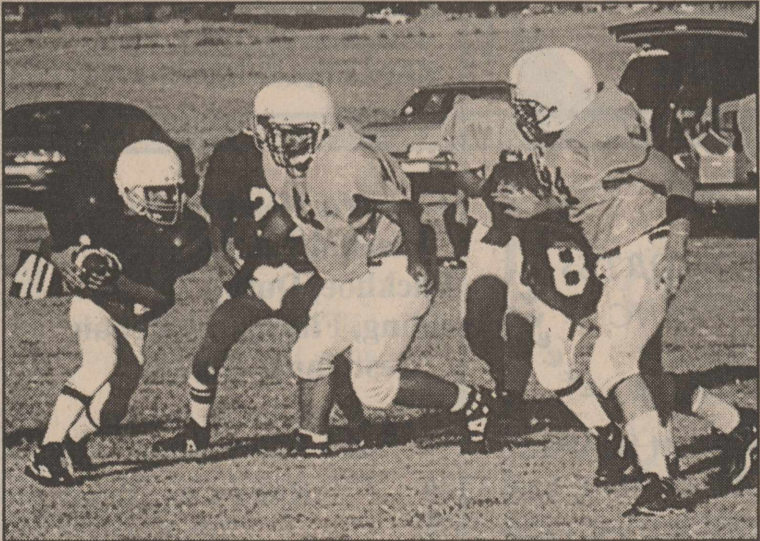
O'Brien Bulldogs win big - again!

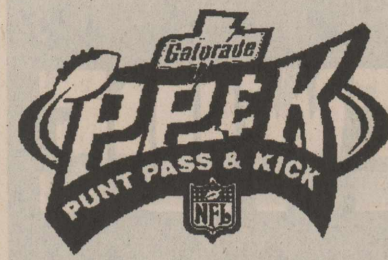

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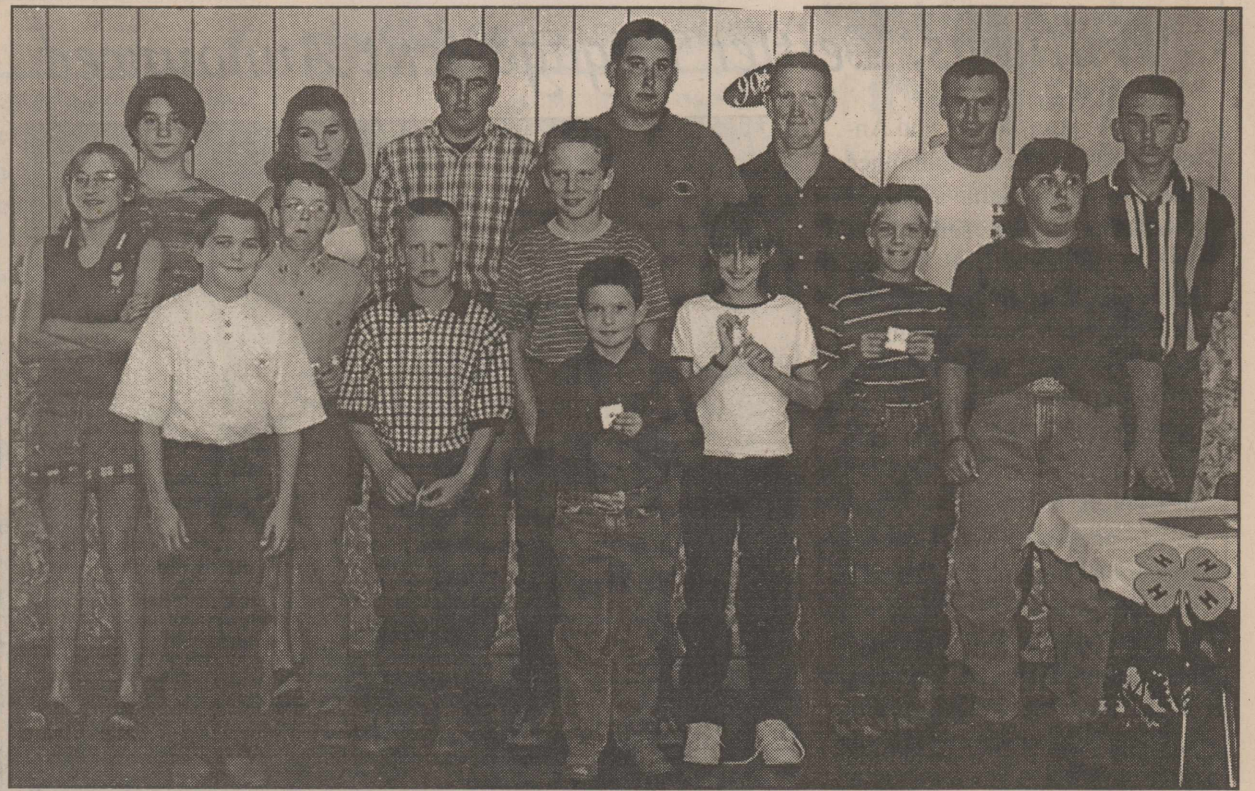
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KING COUNTY 4-H AWARD WINNERS

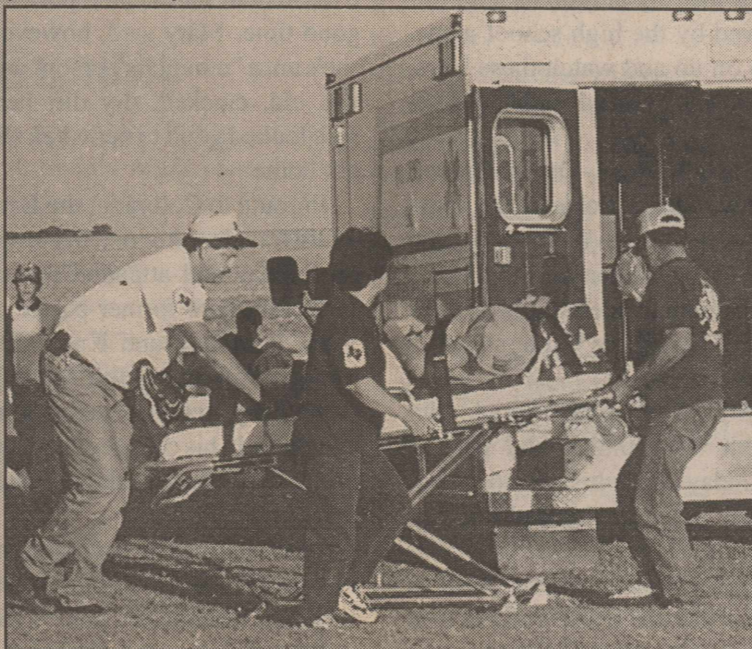
Marilyn and her family were guests at a luncheon honoring the National Merit students held at McBride's Restaurant last Wednesday in Wichita Falls.

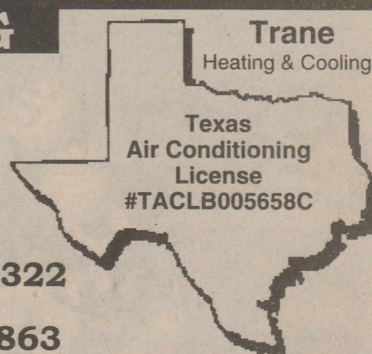

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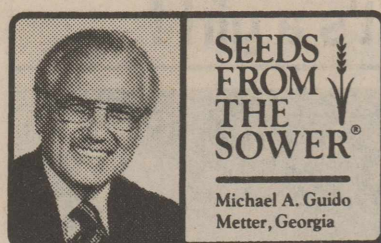

By yielding you may lose in a moment what it took you a lifetime to gain. So submit yourself to God. "Resist the devil, and he'll flee from you."

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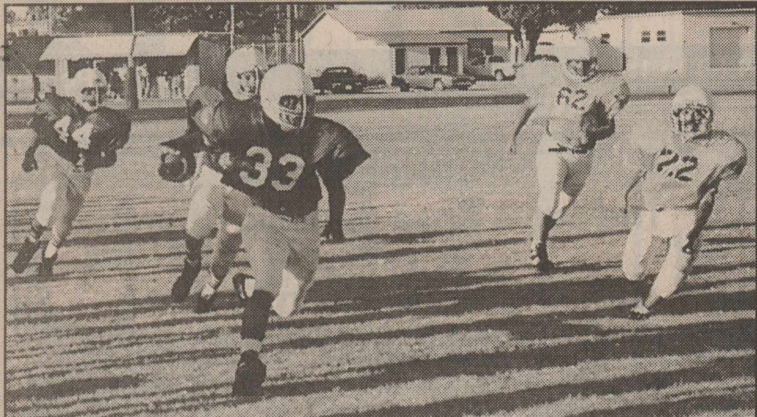
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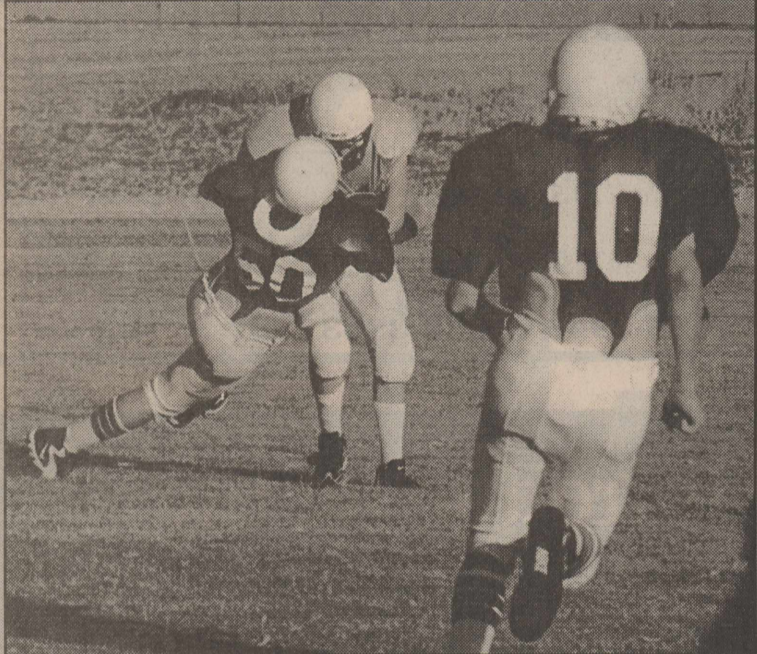
