County calls for tax hike

Donley County is proposing an increase in its road and bridge tax as part of its budget proposal for fiscal

The County Special tax rate, which funds road and bridge maintenance, will increase by more than three cents from \$0.107900 to \$0.14 in proposed budget. The county's total tax rate - ad valorem, special, and debt rate combined – will go from \$0.627654 to \$0.657406 and will raise the annual tax on a home valued at \$100,000 by \$29.75.

The \$2.2 million budget proposed by commissioners is about \$36,000 higher than the current

County Judge John Howard said the fiscal year 2015 budget had some road and bridge expense in the maintenance and operations budget and that has been moved back to the road and bridge budget in the proposal.

"We hope to engage a multiyear approach to improve the state of roads in the county," Howard said.

Total road and bridge budget disbursements increase by more than \$77,000 in the proposed budget.

One notable stand out in the budget is an \$8,000 reduction in the county's support of the Burton Memorial Library from \$33,000 down to \$25,000. Howard said the revenue just isn't there for the current level of support and that the county had to deal with mandatory expenditures versus discretionary expenditures, which included the

City aldermen split on delinquent tax bid

A split Clarendon City Council regular city meeting last Thursday, August 27.

Do not end birthright citizenship

Many Republicans are falling over themselves to echo Donald Trump's call to end birthright citizenship. Experts will be debating the legality of this for some time — many say a constitutional amendment would be needed — but the real-world impact of birthright citizenship is more important than the legal nuances. Granting citizenship to those born here is an insurance policy for a broken immigration system: It encourages the children of illegal immigrants to assimilate.

Currently, there are roughly 4 million U.S.born children of illegal immigrants and 17 million minor children of legal immigrants. Those already born wouldn't be affected by a repeal, but roughly 1 million babies are born every year to immigrants. As immigration attorney Margaret Stock wrote, "If proponents of changing the Fourteenth Amendment have their way, every baby born in America will now face a bureaucratic hurdle before he or she gets a birth certificate." That's a huge number of newborns to annually condemn to automatic illegal status — and doing so would substantially increase the number of illegal immigrants in the country.

That would be bad enough, but the bigger problems would emerge later, as this larger population of illegal immigrants would assimilate more slowly. Assimilation, or the politically correct term "integration," mostly occurs in the second and third generations. Denying citizenship to children of immigrants would deny them legal equality in the United States, stunting their ability to culturally and economically assimilate.

Imagine being born and growing up here and being constantly reminded that you are not a citizen and will likely never be one. That scenario is theoretical for Americans, but Koreans born in Japan have experienced just that and the results are ugly. The Korean minority, called zainichi, are a legal underclass discriminated against by the government. This causes deep resentment and a proneness to crime and political extremism. The zainichi grew even though Japan has virtually zero legal immigration. By contrast, Korean immigrants and their descendants have thrived in the United States where their U.S.-born children are citizens.


And successful assimilation isn't limited to Korean Americans. According to research from University of Washington professor Jacob Vigdor, immigrants and their children from all backgrounds are culturally, linguistically, and economically assimilating today at about the same rate that immigrants assimilated 100 years ago. Nobody today thinks the descendants of the Italian, Polish, or Russian immigrants of early last century failed to assimilate.

The negative effects of making citizenship much harder or impossible to attain go way back. Republican Rome tightened its citizenship rules after the Second Punic War ended in 202 BC. Romans turned their backs on a previous open-door policy that allowed noble families to immigrate and naturalize while also granting citizenship to loyal allies. The new immigration restrictions led to an uprising in cities pushing for Roman citizenship — one of the stranger civil wars in history. To quiet the unrest, Rome finally reinstated the older rules that had served it so well.

America doesn't face a revolt of allies demanding citizenship, but it does face millions of illegal immigrants, their U.S.-born children, and the challenge of assimilating them. There will always be some illegal immigrants in the United States, regardless of reform or levels of enforcement. Birthright citizenship is an insurance policy that guarantees their children will assimilate instead of simmer on the margins of society.

We are the midst of a failed immigration policy that has produced around 12 million illegal immigrants. Now is not the time to cancel birthright citizenship and its benefits.

Texas' own one-stop cowboy shop

In 1917, two well-known Texas landmarks opened their doors for the first time: Dallas Love Field Airport and the Oliver Saddle Shop. But while the planes flying out of Love Field look considerably different now, the saddles coming out of Mr. Oliver's Shop haven't changed much.

In fact, in the workroom of the Oliver Saddle Shop in Amarillo, you can still find 100-year-old machines in use. When I visited in July and asked current owner Richard Oliver about them, he told me, "Well, they're still good machines!"

Richard's grandfather, Claude W. Oliver, first opened Texas' oldest family-owned saddle business in Vernon. When his sons Bill and Jack took over, it continued there as "Oliver Brothers Saddle Shop" until 1960 when Bill brought the business to Amarillo, which his grandson calls the "hub of the cowboy culture." Richard, Claude's grandson, now runs the business today with his two sons Bryan and Zeb, meaning the Olivers' secrets to saddleshaping and leather-carving have been passed down through four generations.

While the techniques and machines are the same, no two saddles are exactly alike. Each custom-made saddle is built to perfectly fit the rider's seat, and the tree the framework that gives the saddle its shape also differs depending on what the saddle will be used



for. Traditional cowboys, who make up most of their clientele, require deep, heavy-duty seats in order to stay comfortable on a horse for 12 or more hours a day, while arena ropers prefer a shallower seat more optimal for their performance.

If you visit the shop in Amarillo, the open floor plan lets you see the art in action. Just behind the storefront, a bright light shines over a tall workbench where Bryan and Zeb stamp and carve leather belts. A full wall-length shelf holds dozens of cowhides ready to be cut, tooled, and sold. Richard told me each saddle uses about two and a half hides.

Three out of every four saddles from the shop are custom-made down to each stitch, and if you're in the market for one, you'll have to wait your turn. While it takes about a week to craft a

saddle, demand is so high that there is about a 10-month wait list.

The wait doesn't stop folks all over the world from ordering. Cowboys as far as Germany and Japan can be found sitting on Oliver saddles, marked by their iconic triangle logo. Even President George W. Bush owns an Oliver saddle – his has the Presidential seal stamped on it.

With all of their time crafting custom saddles, spurs, bits, and chaps, this one-stop cowboy shop doesn't have much time to spend on advertising. But the Olivers don't need to – the quality of their product speaks for itself. The biggest change in the past century of saddle sales has been the addition of a website. But the demand for Oliver saddles comes from word of mouth.

As the Olivers will tell you, buying a saddle is a personal decision. A saddle can make or break a cowboy, and a good one will last a lifetime. Fortunately for riders in Texas and around the world, the Oliver family formula for strong, reliable saddles is currently being passed onto its fifth generation. Teenagers Colton and Austin are already learning saddle repair, and it won't be long before they take on the Oliver family rite of passage: completing their very first saddle.



New Use for Popular Injection Approved

The United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved a new use for Dysport (abobotulinumtoxinA). It is now approved to be used to help treat muscle spasticity of the upper body limbs in adults. Dysport may help reduce spasms in the muscles of the elbows, wrists, and fingers. Upper arm spasticity is a combination of muscle stiffness, some soreness, twitching, and pain. It commonly occurs after an injury to the nervous system. Improvement was seen as early as one week after the injection was administered and lasted in some people for up to twenty

Dysport is an injectable form of botulinum toxin type A that is approved to help manage a condition called cervical dystonia and may be used for cosmetic purposes to reduce the appearance of frown lines. Dysport works by preventing the release of a chemical from nerve endings causing less activity in the area of injection. Dysport is available in a vial that must be refrigerated after it is mixed with a liquid. Some of the side effects include dry
