Knox City To Host Saturday Meet At New Track Field

Hooray! After many years, it's finally time for another track meet in Knox City!

Field events are scheduled to begin Saturday at 9:00 a.m. with boys' and girls' high jump, boys' and girls' discus, boys' and girls' long jump, boys' and girls' shot put, girls' triple jump, and boys' pole vault.

Running preliminaries set for 10:30 a.m., include 400 meter relay; 10:45, 100 meter hurdles, 110 meter hurdles; 11:10, 100 meter dash; 11:30, 800 meter relay; 11:40, 400 meter dash (boys first); 12:00, 300 intermediate hurdles; 12:15, 200 meter dash; and 12:30, 3200 meter run.

Finals for the afternoon to begin at 2:30 are the 400 meter relay; 2:40, 800 meter run; 3:00, 100 meter hurdles; 110 meter hurdles; 3:10, 100 meter dash; 3:20, 800 meter relay; 3:25, 400 meter dash (boys first); 3:40, 300 intermediate hurdles; 3:50, 200 meter dash;

Bentsen Asks Funds To Further Project

According to a story by Brett Jones in the Tuesday edition of the *Wichita Falls Times and Record News*, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen is demanding that the federal government keep its promise to share the cost of cleaning up salt pollution that has made the Red River a virtually unusable source of water. The Red River Chloride Control

Project has been on hold since the Truscott Brine Lake Project was completed in 1986.

Bentsen said he was forced to take action because the Bush Administration is not seeking any money in next year's budget to continue clean up of manmade and natural salt sources polluting the river.

Under a mid-1960s agreement, Texas and Oklahoma were to pay to clean up manmade salt pollution of the river that separates the two states, while the federal government would finance removal of natural pollution sources.

Acting on a thought she had while having her hair done at a local beauty shop, Stella walked into the office of *The Knox County News* and asked if she could look through the large amount of styrofoam 'peanuts' that are in the front window of the newspaper and office supply business. Normally used for packing boxes for customer service of United Parcel Service, the styrofoam was a perfect place to hid the mystery egg.

Acting on a hunch, it took Stella about 20 minutes of actual sifting through the styrofoam before locating

KC Seniors Eligible For Craig Scholarship

Two Knox City High School seniors have an opportunity to win a \$500 college scholarship, it was announced this week by Stacy Angle Thompson, publisher of *The Knox County News*.

The Knox County News is a member of the West Texas Press Association, the world's largest regional press group, and that organization is seeking out two future community journalists to receive stipends of \$500 each.

Through the "Bob Craig Memorial Scholarship" program, named in honor of longtime *Hamiin Herald* publisher Bob Craig who died in 1981, the West Texas Press Association is sponsoring an essay contest based on the theme "My Future and Career Plans in Community Journalism." High school seniors interested in pursuing a career in community journalism may submit their essays to WTPA Scholarship Committee.

The essays must be postmarked no later than April 21, 1989.

The essay is limited to a maximum of 400 words and no letters of reference will be accepted for consideration in the contest.

In addition to being a senior in high school, they must maintain a "B" average or better and plan to continue studies at a school of journalism. Once the winners are selected they must be enrolled in at least three hours of journalism each semester he or she receives assistance.

The scholarships will be divided into payments of \$250 per semester for two semesters for two students. The essays will be judged by the Texas Press Association.

Program Sign-Up Is Nearing April 14 Deadline

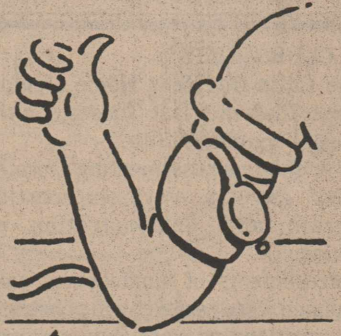
Program sign-up for the 1989 program is drawing to a close—ending April 14 and must be By Appointment Only. Operators wishing to participate in the 1989 Acreage Reduction Program are reminded that Friday, April 14th is the final day to enroll or withdraw from the program without liquidated damages being assessed.

Operators have two weeks additional time to obtain owners signatures on the applications to participate in the 1989 program, April 28, 1989. After that date the County Committee has no authority to approve a contract to par-

ticipate in the 1989 program.

Producers are also reminded that new payment limitation forms must be completed by "ALL" individuals that will receive a payment in 1989 and they must be reviewed and approved by the County Committee. They must determine that the applicant is actively engaged in farming, the shares are commiserative with what they are furnishing to the operation and whether they are one separate persons or must be combined with some one else.

Counts Sponsors Legislation For School Employees' Insurance

AUSTIN - Rep. David Counts (D-Knox City) recently filed legislation that would create the Texas Public School Insurance Act.

The need for this legislation is due to the collapse of many insurance companies throughout the state, leaving several school districts without dependable health insurance coverage for their employees. "The Public School Employees Group Insurance Act will establish a viable health care program for public school employees that is dependable and provides the benefits which they deserve," Counts said.

The health insurance program under this act would be established and administered by the Teacher Retirement System of Texas. The TRS would in turn establish a nine member advisory committee to establish minimum benefit standards.

The program would be funded by the employees receiving group health insurance benefits and by the state. The percentage of the state contribution would be determined every two years by the Texas Legislature, in the same manner as the state contribution to the Teacher Retirement Fund.

Bentsen said he fought the Reagan Administration to keep this project from being shelved. He said it looked as though "we will have to go through another battle with the new administration to get this project back on track."

Bentsen said he would seek \$2.5 million in the fiscal 1990 budget for the project. He is asking Sen. J. Bennett Johnston, D-La., who heads the Senate appropriations subcommittee on energy and water development, to set aside the money for the Red River Chloride Control Project.

Curtis Campbell, director of operations of the Red River Authority, said the \$2.5 million would be used to complete designs on the project. He said completion of the project could cost the federal government in excess of \$136 million.

Campbell said project construction has cost the federal government more than \$51 million, and that amount includes construction of Truscott Brine Lake project. But since the initial phase was completed, funding has been available only to cover operation.

Campbell said if funds were available to complete the project, then the project could be put back on track. He said once designs were completed by the Army Corps of Engineers, then more funds could be requested and major construction phases could begin.

It is estimated that if funds were available, the project could be completed in five to 10 years, but it would be 15 to 20 years before significant levels of chlorides were washed out of the river bed.

Officials from Texas and Oklahoma were to meet with lawmakers in Washington, D.C., on Monday, and Bentsen's office has been in constant contact with the RRA in an attempt to gain information on what needs to be done. Bentsen said the states have upheld their end of the bargain that was struck many, many years ago. "It is now time for the federal government to live up to its commitment and move forward with the remaining elements of construction," Bentsen said.

Bentsen said the state of Texas has spent more than \$50 million to reduce manmade pollution and continues efforts to control contamination. He said Oklahoma appropriates \$5 million a year to control disposal of oilfield brines that threaten the Red River.

When the Reagan Administration considered cutting the project from its list of budget concerns, Bentsen negotiated with the administration to

keep the project if an independent panel reached the favorable conclusion on the project.

Estimating wages wrong is the Number One cause of social security overpayments.

According to Agency records, inaccurate wage estimates caused \$470 million in overpayments nationwide in 1987.

An estimate of 1989 earnings must be filed by April 17 by anyone who expects to earn over the 1989 exempt amount and still receive some social security checks. The 1989 exempt amount is \$6,480 for persons under 65 and \$8,880 for those 65-69. There is no earnings limit for workers 70 and over.

Some tips to help social security beneficiaries in making their wage estimates are: After a few months of work, look at your most recent pay slip. Divide the year-to-date gross wages figure by three if the pay slip reflects three months of work, for example. This will be average monthly earnings. Multiply that amount by 12 to estimate earnings for the year. If you only plan to work part of the year, adjust your figures accordingly.

Some other things to consider are: Will you get a cost-of-living increase crease this year?

Will you get a bonus? Will you get any kind of lump sum payment from your employer?

These amounts need to be added to the earnings estimate to avoid a possible overpayment.

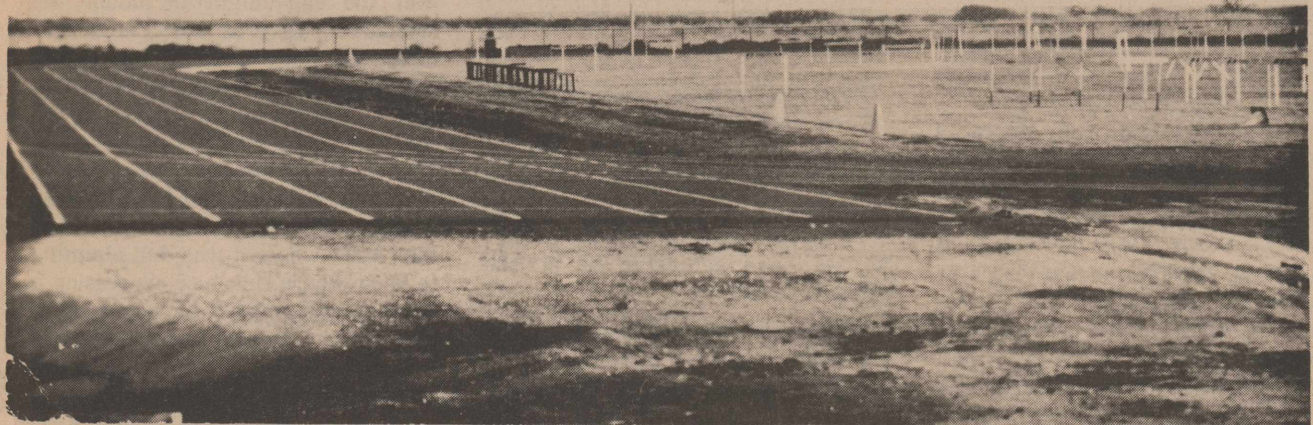

CONTROL TICKS NOW

If you have petted your dog recently you might have noticed the animal to have some ticks.

Judie Whitten of Benjamin told me of her problem along with Donna Williams of Knox City. Ticks usually infect dogs in late spring as temperatures warm but with unusually high temperatures the ticks have emerged early this spring. The reason for the onslaught of ticks is that they have just hatched from eggs which were able to withstand the cold dry winter. After hatching, the tick then climbs on grass and awaits a host which in most cases is a pet. After engorging for up to a week the tick drops from the host, molts and then seeks another host. As the tick finds its second host it becomes an adult where it will mate and if a female will engorge with blood drops from the host and lay 3000-6000 eggs. The female then dies.

So knowing this, it is important to control the ticks before several females lay eggs.

To control ticks properly there are several steps that must be taken. First, treat the yard, then the shelter. Control measures for this include Dursban LD, Ficam-W, pyrethrins, resmethrin and dichlorvos (Vapona).

If pet is allowed to roam, reinfestation is certainly possible and control measures may need to be taken by repeating steps. Another idea is to get neighbors with pets to treat yards simultaneously to prevent relocation of ticks and this also can make this procedure a less costly investment.

Next treat your pet. There are

several commercial dog dips available for use. To aid in prevention of reoccurrence, a tick and flea collar can be placed on the pet. Again there are many commercial collars on the market. If your pet is allowed in the house, then control measures should also be taken indoors. Chemicals that can be used with minimal odor include Dursban LD, Ficam-W, pyrethrins, resmethrin and dichlorvos (Vapona).

EGGS AND CHOLESTEROL
This year, yet another egg product is surfacing...low cholesterol eggs...and buyers need to be cautious.

Any statement of this type requires a firm to declare a full nutritional label which must be approved by the Food and Drug Administration. That label should disclose the cholesterol level.

With all the concern about dietary cholesterol and fat these days how do these eggs shape up? Recent analysis indicates large eggs contain about 210 mg. of cholesterol and 5.2% of fat. Tests dating back to 1976 show large eggs to have 274 mg. of cholesterol and 5.8 g. of fat.

Why the reduction? Changes in feed, management and breeding practices as well as more sophisticated analytical methods for measuring dietary cholesterol may all account for the lower levels.


The FDA will likely release regulations next year regarding cholesterol labeling claims.

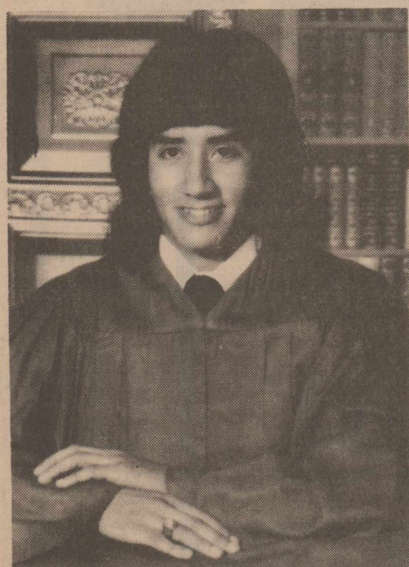

NATIONAL CHOLESTEROL EDUCATION

In P.E., we are doing Notre Dame layups and our high score 62. Coach Chappel said that the 8th grade have 65. So we are doing pretty good.

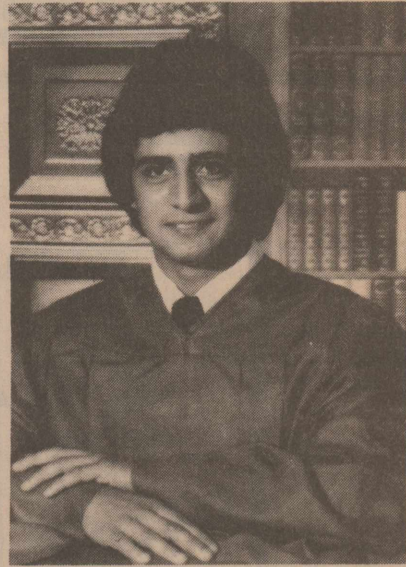
In Band we can play, "The Victor's March", "Jingle Bells" and "Baa, Baa, Black Sheep". Also they are almost through with the band hall.
