Munday Officer Killed

A Munday police officer was shot and killed early Sunday morning as he attempted to arrest a man who apparently had robbed Allsup's Convenience Store in Munday.

Perry Floyd Patton, 26, of Munday, died at Haskell Memorial Hospital about 3:00 a.m. Sunday. Patton had been a fulltime police officer since last August and a reserve officer for five years before that.

District Attorney Chad Williams said that Patton was called about 2:00 a.m. Sunday when the convenience store was robbed. "He was going to the scene of the crime, and he met the suspect about a block from the store," Williams said. Patton tried to arrest the suspect, and the two scuffled. "We believe the suspect got the gun, and shot him with his own gun," Williams said.

The suspect ran from the scene, and the officer was taken to the hospital where he died.

Gary Adams, 25, of Munday was arrested by two Knox City deputies northeast of Munday about five hours after the shooting, according to Williams. Adams, who was arrested a short distance from where Patton's pickup had been driven into a ditch, was charged with the crimes and taken to the Knox County Jail in Benjamin.

Services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock from the First Baptist Church in Munday. Patton received a full-police honor guard ceremony by the Wichita Falls Police Department.

Burial was in the Johnson Memorial Cemetery at Munday.

Survivors include his wife, the former Karen Beaty; a daughter, Chelsea, who is eight months old; his parents, LaRue and Floyd Patton of Weinert; one sister, Penny Hahn of Stafford; one brother, Walter of Houston; his grandmother, Mary Johnson of Munday; and three nephews.

Memorials may be made to the First National Bank in Munday.

Congressmen Request Hearing on Santa Fe

U.S. Representatives Bill Sarpalius and Charles Stenholm have requested an "oral" hearing concerning abandonment of Santa Fe Railroad line from Sweetwater, Texas, to Odell, Texas, near Vernon.

Portions of congressional districts of Sarpalius and Stenholm are affected by the abandonment proposal, they said.

Area towns along the line are Chillicothe, Qunah, Crowell, Knox City, and Truscott, all in Texas.

The congressmen have contacted the Interstate Commerce Commission and urged an investigation into the proposed abandonment of 155 miles of northwest Texas railroad, according to Russell Middleton, a staff assistant to

Stenholm who deals with transportation issues. A public hearing would force the ICC to further review the abandonment proposal, Middleton said.

The railroad has filed an abandonment request, but ICC has not approved it yet, Sarpalius said. He also said that opposition to the abandonment process could halt procedures.

"The purpose is to generate support to prevent Santa Fe from abandoning," Sarpalius said. Sarpalius said his Washington office had received calls from his constituents in the 30th District concerned with the abandonment proposal. He said the ICC can stop abandonment.

"If we can show how it will have a

drastic impact on the economy, it can be avoided," Sarpalius said.

Wheat, cotton, and other agricultural endeavors rely on railroad transportation of produce along the line, farmers contend.

An oral hearing date will not be set until after May 30, Middleton said, but the location will be in Sweetwater.

Grain elevator operators and farmers dependent on railroads to transport their produce are hoping for another chance to protest.

Tanja came to the United States August 18 and was met at Dallas-Fort Worth Airport by her host parent, Dale Wainscott; Sequoyah Reynolds, and Curtis Shiflett of Duncanville. She noted that they were easy to find for they were holding a "Welcome, Tanja!" sign!

Prior to her visit to Knox City, she has visited additional times in the United States. Among the favorite sights topping the list are California and Boston.

Tanja loves Knox City and the United States and said she is not looking forward to leaving for she loves the people here. She commented that she loved the Foursquare Church where she attended three times a week. In the Foursquare Church, she said it was "neat, how people accept you" and continued by saying it is a "big family, they make you feel right at home".

During her year in Knox City, Tanja visited the Jerry Gard family in New Jersey. This was a special visit as Tanja's mother was an Au-pair girl for the family, meaning she took care of the children and did housework for the

family when she was 22 years old. During this visit, Tanja also visited in New York and spent one day at school with a friend, attending German classes and having a discussion with the teachers.

Another trip for Tanja was a gift from her parents for her 18th birthday which was December 27. She visited California February 28 through March 6, along with 317 other foreign exchange students. They visited Los Angeles, Disneyland, Universal Studios, San Diego, San Francisco, and across the border into Mexico. She summed it up as "won-der-ful!"

Favorite classes for Tanja at Knox City High School were typing and food and textiles. Favorite class she will miss is that of Coach Underwood's, which she termed as "hard, but very neat."

Friends she will miss most are Nancy Marin and Jennie Grindstaff, and the one thing she will miss most is "going places with everyone. It was wonderful." Her most favorite thing to do in Knox City that she will miss is "crusin' with friends", she said smilingly.

Tanja liked the Friday afternoon pep rallies for the Greyhounds as well as the competitiveness of sports. She said she likes the way "y'all" do it and

LANDSCAPE REPAIR... AFTER THE STORM

Moisture was needed badly in the area and was received last week but we also had other precipitation in that of hail and also high winds. With damage to much of the landscape, garden and fruit trees you might be wondering where to start.

If tree limbs were blown from trees, homeowners should finish what "mother-nature" started by pruning limbs broken off or split from the tree. On larger branches using a saw cut on the underneath side of the branch one third of the way through the branch. This will keep the bark from being slipped from the tree. Next, cut the branch off about one foot from the trunk of the tree. This will take most of the weight from the tree. Then finish cutting off the branch flush with the trunk of the tree.

If smaller branches were damaged by hail or high winds, remove by using shears or saws. Be sure to trim limbs to the nearest crotch or Y of the limb.

If gardens or flowers were damaged, evaluate for the possibility of survival. If terminals of the plants are still intact, plants should begin growth after being fertilized with a balanced fertilizer to produce later this summer.

If homeowners should need consultation with landscape, feel free to call the county Extension office.

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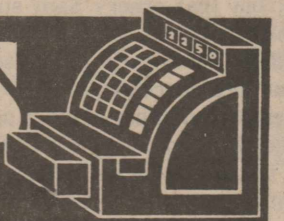

City Council Minutes

May 9, 1989

The following is an unofficial and unapproved report of the City Council Meeting of the City of Knox City as presented by City Administrator Lynward Wilcox.

The City Council met in regular session May 9, 1989, with Mayor Derrell Marion presiding. Councilmembers Barbara Barnard, Joe Barnard, Marq Brockett, Rob Harrison and Larry Staggs were in attendance.

Mayor Derrell Marion called the meeting to order.

The Invocation was given by Rob Harrison.

There were no Public participation for Public Comments.

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Carriker Rural Health Initiative Passes Senate

AUSTIN - A comprehensive health care bill designed to address a desperate situation in the state's rural areas has won overwhelming approval from the Texas Senate.

House Bill 18, sponsored in the Senate by Sen. Chet Brooks and myself, contains a number of important measures stemming from a study by The Special Task Force on Rural Health Care Delivery that was created in June 1987. The study concluded that health care in Texas is in crisis, and the situation is getting worse.

HB 18 is a big step in addressing the problem, and is undoubtedly the most comprehensive rural health bill ever approved by the Legislature.

Senate Bill 1107, another rural health initiative I sponsored, was included under HB 18.

Inclusion of the SB 1107 provision means that physicians and hospitals can obtain enhanced Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement by taking advantage of the federal Rural Health Clinic Services Act passed by U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

Comptroller Bob Bullock has estimated at least \$4 million per year in additional Medicare funds could flow into Texas once this Act is implemented. This increase in federal funds would not require additional state expenditures and would go directly to clinics and other service providers.

Also under this provision, clinics may become certified in areas where no health care now exists.

Some of the other vital measures included in HB 18 are provisions that allow for creation of a center of rural health initiatives at the Texas Department of Health, measures that address emergency hospital transfers and provide liability relief to physicians, and a provision requiring medical schools to incorporate a clerkship in family practice during the third clinical year.

HB 18, which is supported by the

Texas Medical Association, Texas Nurses Association, Texas Rural Health Association, American Association of Retired Persons, Texas Association of Community Health Centers, and many others, now goes to the governor for his signature.

Having Problem With IRS? Try Problem Resolution Office

If you have a problem with Internal Revenue Service that you have been unable to resolve through normal channels, contact the Problem Resolution Office. This office is the taxpayer's advocate and has the ability to cut through red tape.

Some of the problems handled by Problem Resolution are delayed or missing refunds, wrong social security numbers, incorrect billings, undue hardship resulting from inappropriate enforcement action, and mistakes by taxpayers.

In addition to problem solving, Problem Resolution also is responsible for identifying causes of problems so corrective action can be taken to prevent their recurrence.

Problem Resolution is as close as your telephone. Call the IRS taxpayer assistance number in your local telephone directory or toll-free 1-800-424-1040, and ask for Problem Resolution. The assistor will ask you

questions to ensure that you meet problem resolution criteria and make a written referral for you. If you meet the criteria, you will be contacted by a caseworker within a few days who may request additional information or provide you with the solution to your problem.

Remember, if you have a federal tax problem try normal channels first and if that doesn't resolve your problem, call for Problem Resolution.

FOOD SAFETY-Bacterial food poisoning may present the biggest health threat to food safety, despite the present concern over pesticides and other manmade contaminants, says Dr. Al Wagner, an Extension Service food technologist. A wide range of materials can cause food poisoning, but bacteria continue as the main culprit, statistics show.

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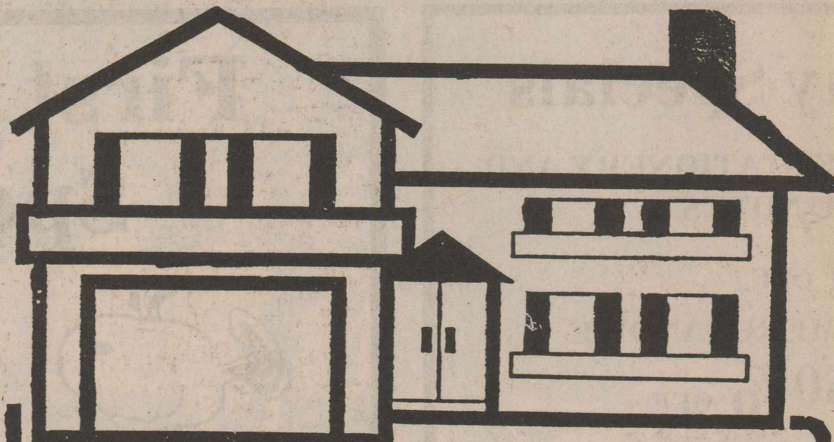
