The Watermelon Festival, sponsored by the Knox City Chamber of Commerce and the Knox County Horticulture Committee, has been rescheduled for July 29, according to chamber officials. Original date was planned for July 15. Seedless watermelons from Johnson Farms will be featured.

Santa Fe Withdraws Motion

Good news was received last week when it was learned that Santa Fe was withdrawing its plans to abandon the railway that runs from Chillicothe to Sweetwater.

The information came from attorney Thomas F. McFarland Jr. of Chicago who had been hired by a group of firms interested in keeping the railroad in operation.

U.S. Representatives Bill Sarpalius and Charles Stenholm had requested an "oral" hearing concerning the abandonment of the Santa Fe Railroad line which includes 155 miles of track.

The congressmen had contacted the Interstate Commerce Commission and urged an investigation into the proposed abandonment of the line, on which wheat, cotton, and other agricultural endeavors rely.

The congressmen had expressed their concern in the loss of this rail service, fearing it would result in an increased transportation costs for numerous farmers and ranchers.



A TWISTER about 1:30 a.m. Tuesday lifted two rabbit pens above two other pens and a wooden fence, slamming into a large, nonbearing mulberry tree in the backyard of Melanie and Jim Dillon, four miles east of Knox City. Jim said the tree was all that kept the demolished pens from entering their house, probably saving their lives. They were in the house at the time and thought the tv antenna had slammed into the roof but discovered it later west of the house uprooted from its concrete base. The neighbors to their west of them, Sherry and David Bordovsky had their antenna thrown into roof and the forceful winds laid down a metal fence stripping the metal anchors from it. The Danny Lains to the west of the Bordovskys had shingles ripped from their roof in several places. Neighbors to the east of the Dillons, the Donald Johnsons at Johnson Farms had damage to antennas, fences, and to a couple of outbuildings that Donald said they could fix back pretty easily.

Grand Champion Gelding was Cap Real Serenade, owned by Glenn Cole of Wichita Falls. Named Reserve Champion Gelding was Schoolteacher, owned by Kendra Williams of Guthrie.

Taking the judged event high point belt buckle in the 13 and under division was Kendra Williams and Schoolteacher with 39 points. Lethal Wiseman of Quannah rode Rockie Rhoads to the timed event Championship in that division with 20 points.

Angie Williams of Guthrie duplicated little sister Kendra's feat by winning the judged event buckle in the 14-18 age division with 38 points on Ninety-six. Nancy Graves, also of Guthrie, was the timed event winner with 24 points. She was riding Abilene.

Glen Cole earned 26 points on his way to taking home the judged event buckle in the 19 and over group, showing Cap Real Serenade. Vicke Reeves of Burkburnett gathered 24 points to be the timed buckle winner. Her mount was Poke.

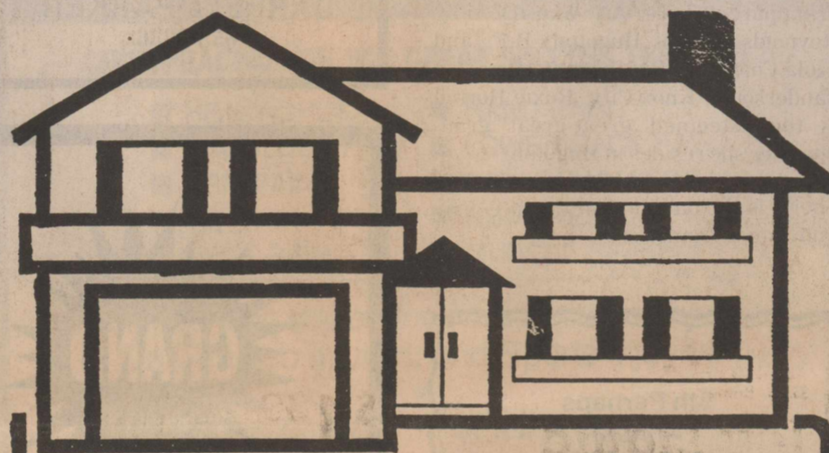

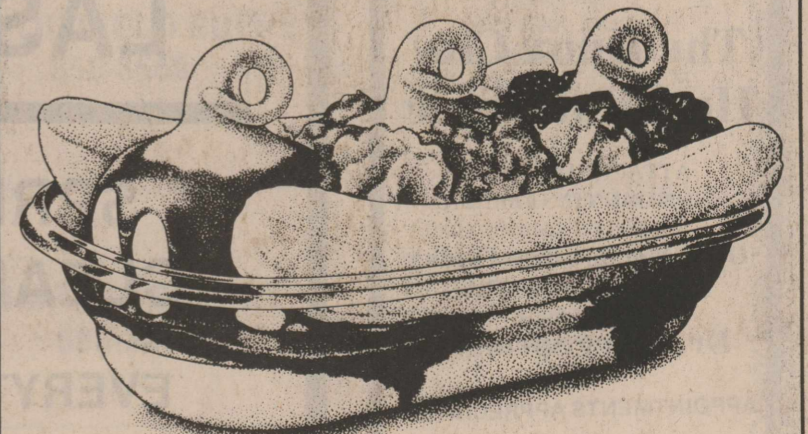

Brazos Electric Co-Op Seeks Permanent Rate Reduction

Brazos Electric Cooperative today filed with the Public Utility Commission for a rate reduction that will permanently reduce rates to about the same level they have been since the cooperative implemented a temporary rate reduction in December.

"It is uncommon in today's world, but we in the cooperative business gauge our success by how little we can charge our customers," Richard E. McCaskill, Brazos Electric Cooperative's executive vice president and general manager said. "Our goal is not to profit, but to economically serve our customers with dependable electric power. Whenever we foresee that we can safely reduce rates, we will request authority to do so."

McCaskill said Brazos Electric Cooperative has a history of passing savings to its wholesale customers. The cooperative has returned \$20 million in the last two years with tem-

porary rate reductions. Additionally it reduced its fuel charged by more than \$11 million per year, starting in 1987. In 1977, it returned \$1 million to its customers. McCaskill said the pending reduction means the cooperative's wholesale customers will have had a 19 percent average reduction in their cost of power since 1984. To the end consumer, this means a reduction of about \$10.00 per 1,000 kilowatt hours. The cooperative has had only one rate increase since 1976.

Public notices state the cooperative has requested that the rate reduction become effective July 17 and that the cooperative's revenues be reduced by \$21,508,032, or 10.8 percent. McCaskill emphasized that the present temporary rate structure already has lowered rates by about that amount.

The proposed rate structure features different summer (on-peak) and winter (off-peak) rates for the cooperative's customers. It also provides a different rate schedule for customers receiving only part of their total electricity requirements from Brazos Electric Cooperative. An interruptible rate schedule will be available to customers that wish to pass along its lower cost to industrial consumers.

"We are delighted to pass along this reduction," McCaskill said. "It again exemplifies our commitment to making our members as competitive as possible in the retail electric service market."

Brazos Electric Cooperative is a member-owned generation and transmission electric cooperative based in Waco. It provides wholesale electric power to 20 member cooperatives, seven municipal electric systems and Texas A&M University. The electric cooperatives include Bartlett, B-K, Belfalls, Comanche County, Cooke County, Denton County, Dickens, Erath County, Fort Belknap, Gate City, Hamilton County, Hill County, J-A-C, Johnson County, McLennan County, Mid-South, Navarro County, Navasota Valley, Tri-County and Wise. Municipal systems served by Brazos Electric Cooperative are: Bartlett, Granbury, Hearne, Sanger, Seymour, Weatherford and Whitesboro. These systems serve 240,000 consumers in a 66-county area of central and north Texas.

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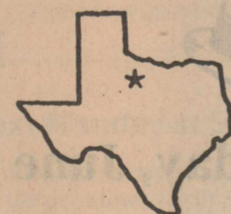
