Kidnap Attempts Foiled

An attempt to abduct a 9-year-old girl failed when the youngster "used her head pretty good", according to Knox City Police Chief Gil Gillilan. The fourth grade student left her class at Knox City Elementary School about 3:30 p.m. last Tuesday, and as she was walking to her mother's business, a man in an old black two-door car, described as very dirty with some rust spots on it, pulled up beside her. She said the man told her, "Your mommy told me to come pick you up." She told him, "No, my mom told me to walk home." The man then replied, "No, your mommy told me to pick you up." She then told him, "No, I am almost home anyway. I just live right around

the corner." She said that when she told him that, he drove off, on up to Central Avenue, and turned and headed towards Benjamin. The little girl described the man as a white male, dark complexioned, short dark hair, beard, and mustache, who spoke in a low voice.

Elementary principal Maribeth Williams sent a note home with students describing the incident and urging parents to watch their children carefully.

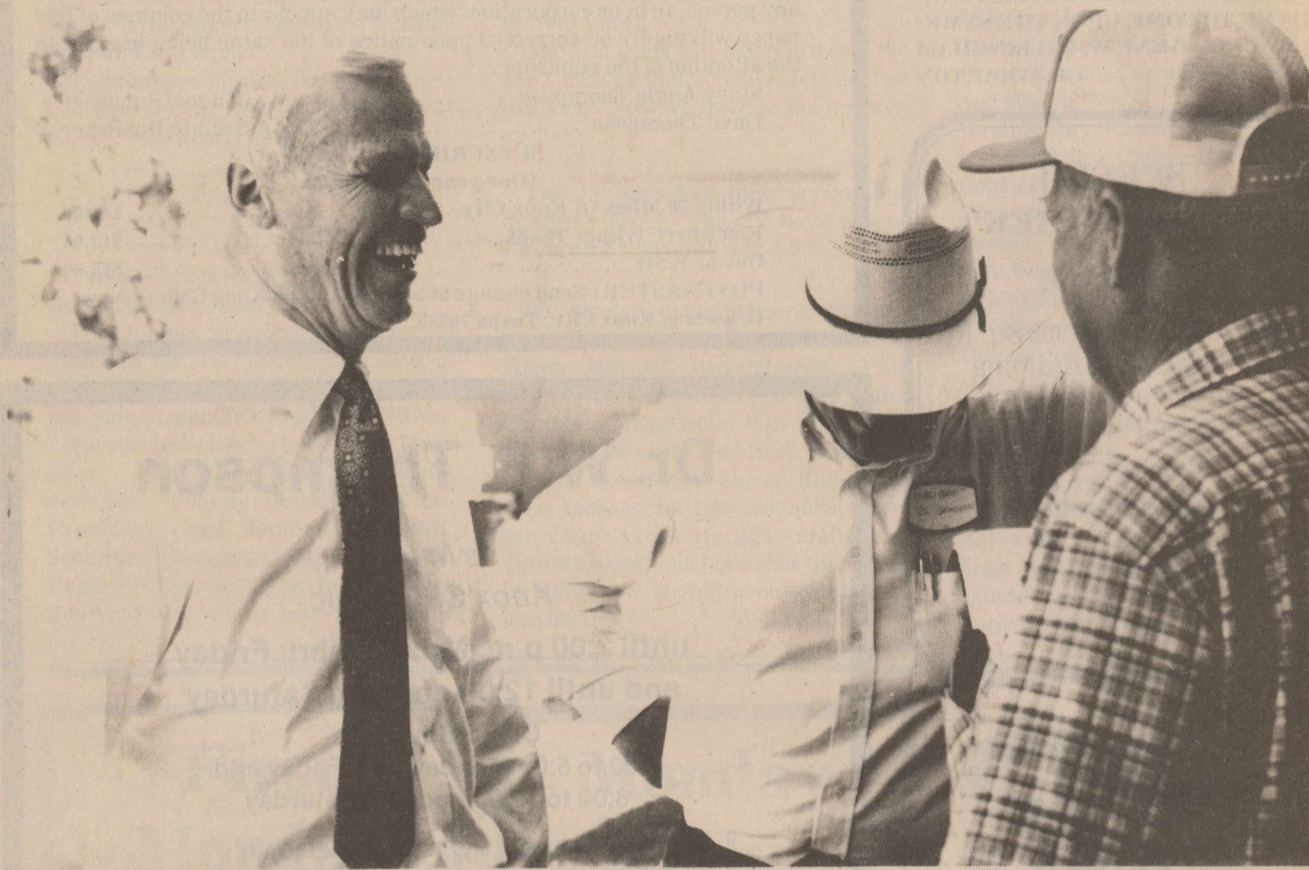
Chief Gillilan said that law officials in all the surrounding areas are on the lookout for the vehicle.

Thursday morning at 8:40 o'clock, a 10-year-old girl was approached at

Reynolds Elementary School in Stamford by a man wearing a yellow and green ski mask. The fifth grade girl said the man drove up to her in a "rusty, old" pickup truck and told her that the school principal sent him to find her. The youngster reportedly ran from the man without speaking to him.

Law officials do not believe that the two incidents are connected in any way.

The Stamford incident happened almost a year to the day, September 7, 1988, when Courtney Clayton disappeared after walking a block from her home to a Stamford grocery store. Her skelton was found several months later in Shackelford County.

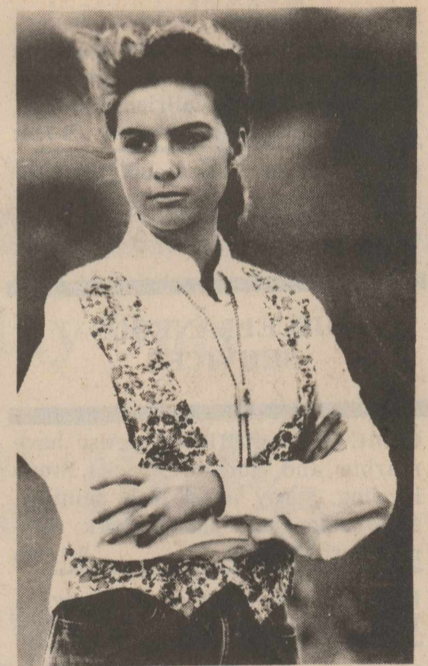
Barbizon is the largest School of modeling in the world with schools in the United States, France, and Germany.
