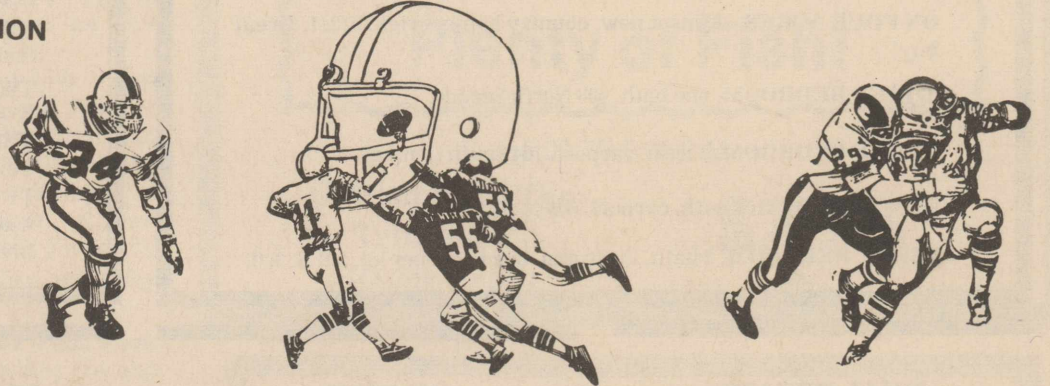

Lions Growl, Paw Hounds

KC Suffers First Season Loss

Traveling to Albany for their last pre-district game last Friday night, the Knox City Greyhounds suffered their first loss of the 1989 football season with a 17 to 7 defeat by the Albany Lions.

Knox City started the game on defense after the opening kickoff by Augie Rodriguez. The Lions quickly showed their ability to move the ball against Knox City as they moved the ball rapidly down the field, picking up several first downs along the way. The fast moving drive was stopped by a Greyhound fumble recovery.

The Knox City offense stumbled during their first showing as the ball was fumbled back to Albany on a short second down run. The following drive by the Lions lasted just three downs, with Albany punting back to Knox City on fourth down.

A strong Albany defense held the Greyhounds deep in their own territory until a pass from Billy Wayne Large to Ray Flye gave Knox City operating room in the mid-field area. That drive stopped abruptly as the ball went back to Albany following another Knox City fumble and turnover.

The next Albany drive was stopped when the Greyhound defense toughened up and forced a fourth down punt that was blocked by Ray Flye, giving Knox City excellent field position deep in Lion territory. Andy McCrary immediately picked up 15 yards on a pass from Large just prior to the first quarter ending. Two plays into the second quarter, Andy McCrary fumbled the ball and turned it over to Albany on the five yard line.

During the next drive by Albany, strong tackles by Augie Rodriguez, Bubba Manual and Ray Flye slowed the Lions and a pass interception by Ray Flye once again turned the football back over to Knox City. The Greyhound offense then tried something new as Billy Wayne Large moved into the backfield while Andy Williams came in as quarterback. A short screen pass from Williams to Large was successful and moved the ball back toward the goal line. Two plays later Large returned as quarterback, but once again Knox City turned the ball over to Albany with yet another fumble.

With both an aerial and ground attack, Albany seemed to have no trouble moving the ball during the next series of downs as Knox City defenders missed assignments and virtually gave the Lions a free run of the turf. What would have been a touchdown pass was stopped when Andy Williams jumped high to swat the ball away from the intended Lion receiver. A fake field goal attempt by Albany again gained big yardage and several plays later, the Lions did kick in a field goal to take the first lead of the game with a score of 3-0 over the Greyhounds.

The Albany defense stopped Knox City on the next drive and forced the Greyhounds to punt on fourth down following two runs by Large and an incomplete pass attempt. The Lion offense soon found a Knox City defense that stood their ground and allowed only short yardage as Albany punted back to the Greyhounds on fourth down.

An incomplete pass by Large, a penalty by Rodriguez and a first down run by Large moved Knox City down to the Albany 43 yard line with four

seconds left in the first half. With time for just one play, Large ran the ball down to the eight yard line before being stopped by a group from the Albany defense.

Opening the second half on offense, Knox City wasted no time in moving the ball and finished the opening series of downs with a pass completion from Large to Boyce Tankersley that turned into a 57 yard combination pass/run touchdown play. The extra point by Rodriguez moved the Greyhounds ahead in the game by a score of 7 to 3.

Strengthened by their lead over Albany, the Greyhound defense stood tough on the next series and stopped several run and pass attempts before a combination of short yardage runs moved Albany down the field and over the goal line. The first Lion touchdown of the game followed a strong goal line stand by the Greyhound defense. The extra point kick moved Albany ahead by a score of 10 to 7 over Knox City.

The remainder of the third quarter and most of the fourth quarter brought what appeared to be stalled offenses by both the Lions and Greyhounds as the game turned into a strong defen-

sive matchup. Penalties became frequent as both teams attempted to score once more before the final buzzer sounded.

Albany did score again after the offense was placed into excellent scoring position by a punt return that traveled almost the entire length of the field before the ball carrier was run out of bounds. With just over one minute left in the game, Albany moved across the goal line to again take the lead in the game. The point after kick was good and moved the Lions ahead to what would be the final score of the game, 17 to 7.

Despite the score favoring Albany when the final buzzer sounded, Knox City showed strength and determination throughout the game. The Greyhounds should have no problem getting ready for the Spur Bulldogs when they open district play in Knox City Friday night at Greyhound Stadium. Be sure to go on out to the game and show your support for a Knox City team that fights right up to the final buzzer. It should be another exciting game as Knox City plays at home for the first time this season.

Mail Scam Arrives In Knox City

Knox County Hospital Administrator John Martin was not too surprised when he opened the hospital mail Tuesday morning and found an invoice from a company calling itself 'Local Yellow Pages.' The main reason Martin was not surprised to receive what appeared at first glance to be a bill for phone book advertising was because of a story he read in the Sunday edition of *The Abilene Reporter News*. The story by Business Writer Mary Ann Lemon gave a wealth of information on the newest mail order scam to reach businesses in Abilene and the surrounding area.

A firm out of Margate, Florida, that calls itself 'Local Yellow Pages' has been sending out what appears to be invoices for phone book advertising.

The form profiled in *The Abilene Reporter News* story is identical to the one received Tuesday morning by Mr. Martin. Our local hospital was being charged \$97.00 for advertising under the classification of 'Hospitals.' There was no explanation of the size or type of ad, and no mention at all of what publication in which this ad would appear.

The only indication that all is not what it appears to be is a small disclaimer notice on the bottom of the form. It states, "This is a solicitation for the order of services and not a bill, invoice or statement of account due. You are under no obligation to make any payment on account of this offer unless you accept this offer." This statement is supposed to be in large 30 point type, but appears instead in

small 12 point type size. In the *Reporter News* story, Wanda Cooper of Cooper Advertising Agency in Abilene explained the form this way: "Of course, it isn't a bill at all. It's a solicitation, though it doesn't reveal what's for sale. It's designed to trick busy bookkeepers into mailing a check without a second thought."

The use of the term 'yellow pages' and the walking fingers logo are not illegal because neither are registered trademarks and both are visible in three places on the form. The use of these causes the receiver to automatically assume that the form is from the phone company for an ad in the yellow pages of the local phone

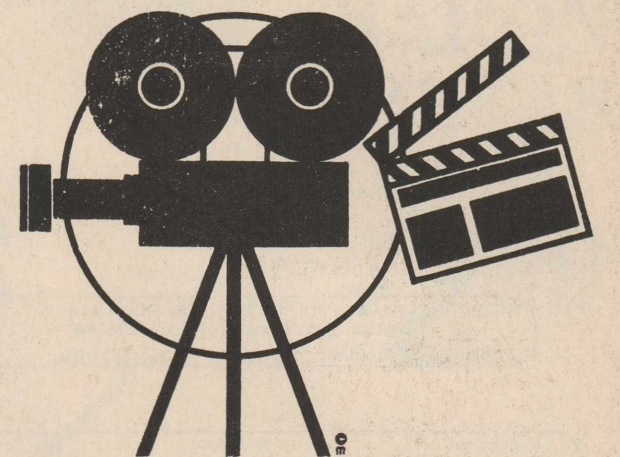

book. In fact, the ad may or may not appear in any publication. If it does make it into print, it is usually in some obscure business publication that no one has ever heard of and doesn't do the subscriber any good at all.

Abilene Better Business Bureau President Bob Test described the scheme this way: "The solicitations usually request about \$100, a small sum that doesn't ring accounting warning bells. If even a small number of small firms respond, say two per cent of 200,000 mailings, the company makes good money." To fight this type of problem, the BBB recommends the following precautions:

Buy from a new supplier only after verifying its existence and reliability.

Do business by telephone only with firms whose address and phone can be verified.

Do not accept cash-on-delivery shipments and insist on open account billing.

So, as John Martin found out, it is wise to check your mail very carefully, even in a small community such as Knox City.

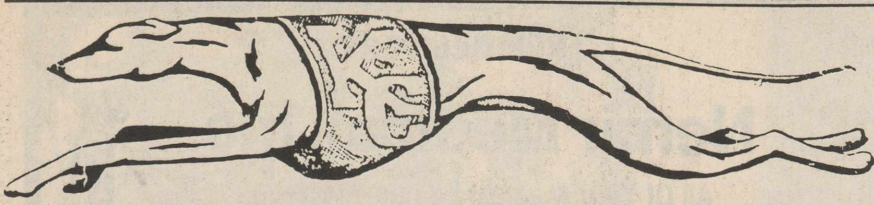

The Knox City-O'Brien CISD, through a satellite system called TI-IN, can now bring a "big school" curriculum offering to our students. The TI-IN satellite dish which you have seen on the Knox City campus will enable us to offer over 20 high school credit courses when scheduling permits. Foreign language courses include Spanish, French, German, Latin, and Japanese. Other courses available are psychology, sociology, art, history, computer science, honors calculus, anatomy and physiology and others.

In addition to high school courses, students benefit from a variety of programs and seminars: Student enrichment programs which cover a broad range of content areas and are geared toward students of all ages, test reviews for students who would like to better prepare for the SAT or ACT, college nights which bring students and college representatives together.

Programs for the Knox City-O'Brien CISD staff offer us an opportunity to acquire additional skills and training.

Programs for the community are in the planning which will explore such issues as drug abuse prevention, how parents can help their children be better students, new tax law updates, operation of a small business, and others.

The TI-IN network is today's high-tech classroom.
