Greyhounds Back On Track Defeat Motley County

Traveling northwest to play for their first district game on the road, the Knox City Greyhounds rebounded from a defeat at the hands of the Spur Bulldogs last week with victory over the Motley County Matadors last Friday night.

Opening the game on defense, Knox City allowed the Matadors only one first down prior to forcing a punt back to the Greyhounds. Taking over on offense, Knox City wasted no time in establishing a ground game with solid runs by Billy Wayne Large and Alex Ledesma. With Ledesma punching the ball across the line for short gains, Large took the Matadors by surprise with a long yardage romp down the left side. Without allowing Motley County a chance to rest, Large crossed the goal line for a touchdown just two plays later. With the extra point attempt by Augie Rodriquez missing the uprights, Knox City took an early lead 6-0 over

Working with a stalled offense, Motley County soon punted back to Knox City on fourth down and allowed Large and company a chance to get back to work. A fumble between center and quarterback on the first play of the series quickly turned the ball back over to Motley County deep in Greyhound territory on the 25 yard line. Richard Davenport showed how to sack a Motley County quarterback and was instrumental in forcing the Matadors to turn the ball back over to Knox City after just one short series.

With runs by Ledesma and Large and a long pass completion from Large to Boyce Tankersley, Knox City wasted no time in moving the ball back into Matador territory. A touchdown run by Large had the Knox City fans cheering, but the play was called back on a Greyhound clipping penalty. The first play of the second quarter saw Andy McCrary gain a few yards up the middle, but once again a Greyhound penalty moved the ball in a reverse direction. On 1st and 21, Large threw to McCrary, but the incomplete pass soon brought about a 2nd and 21. A long pass from Large was next, but all Greyhound receivers were covered. A short gain on a Large to Ledesma run preceded a punt back to the Matadors scoring drive had been stopped by Knox City mistakes and penalties.

After three plays that went nowhere, Motley County punted back to Knox City with Andy McCrary receiving the kick and running it back to the Matador 33 yard line. With quarter-back duties split by Large and Andy Williams, Knox City began a slow but steady march down to the end zone. Alex Ledesma soon picked up a first down near the goal line but another Knox City penalty brought the ball back out to the 16 yard line. Large ran
