Hounds Fall In Defensive Battle

Fielding two powerful defensive units, the Knox City Greyhounds and the Paducah Dragons tangled in a District 9-A battle last Friday evening at Greyhound Stadium with Paducah coming out on top by way of one lone scoring drive.

The 41 yard touchdown pass by Paducah was the only score of the evening for either team as Knox City and the Dragons both played excellent defense. While the Greyhound offense stumbled and turned the ball over to Paducah on three separate occasions, the defense held strong and allowed the normally powerful Dragon offense just 157 yards during four quarters of hard hitting action.

The Dragons also knew how to stop potential scoring drives, their defense allowed Knox City only 142 yards that included just three completions out of 12 attempts.

The loss to Paducah leaves Knox City with a 5-3 season record and a 3-2 record in district 9-A. The Greyhounds face unbeaten Munday this Friday evening. Munday is state ranked at #1 and has yet to lose a game this season. Their toughest game of the season was two weeks ago when they also faced the Paducah Dragons. In other games this season, Munday has had high scoring games but the Paducah defense held Munday to just 21 poin-

With Paducah holding Munday to 21 points and Knox City holding this Friday night should be the game of the season for both Munday and Knox City. In what is probably the biggest rivalry in district 9-A, the Greyhounds and Moguls will meet each other at 7:30 p.m. in Greyhound Stadium. 





Interested In **Scholarships?**

Fall is in the air. For those who plan ahead it's time to get ready for the winter holidays. For collegebound high school seniors and their parents though, now is the time to prepare for school next fall. That is particularly true for those interested in scholarships.

This year, the Air Force offered over 70 ROTC scholarships to seniors in northern Texas and northern Louisiana. These scholarships paid for full tuition, books, most incidental fees and \$100 a month nontaxable allowance during the school year. These scholarships can be used at over 700 schools across the United States. How did those 70 lucky people receive those scholarships? Through preparation. Not only had they done well in school, they had taken the ACT or SAT tests early. For Air Force ROTC scholarships, applications must be made by December first and they must include ACT or SAT scores.

If readers would like more information on Air Force (or almost any other) scholarships, high school senior counselors usually have the necessary application forms. If not, simply contact the local Air Force recruiting office. But do it soon, because more scholarships will be awarded next spring to those who are ready now.







Motorists Reminded **Of Winter**

Major V.J. Cawthon, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said, "Winter driving can be very hazardous. Drivers are faced with many dangerous obstacles: nights are longer, freezing temperatures, snow, sleet, and ice covered roads, all creating handicaps for the driver.

The most important safety tip for winter drivings is to "slow down". On ice covered roads, only drive when it is necessary and realize that it's going to take you at least twice as long to cover that same distance as when the road was dry and clear of ice. So, remember to set more time aside for driving under winter conditions

When temperatures drop below the freezing point, drivers must guard against reduced visibility caused by frosted windows and windshields. Allow your car's engine to warm up and for the defroster to become effective before driving. Be sure your windows and headlights are clear and free of any obstructions, like mud or snow. Do all this in advance, before you hit the road.

Major Cawthon stated, "During adverse weather conditions, allow yourself plenty of travel time and try not to make your vehicle a wristwatch and the highway a magic time machine by trying to make up lost time on the streets and highways.'





As our first hard freeze has been received in the area, pecan harvest will begin if it has not already. As the pecans are being gathered,

homeowners are encouraged to save pecans for entries in the 1989 Knox County Pecan Show which will be held on Saturday, December 2, at the Knox County Aging Service Center in Knox City. The show is being hosted by the Knox County Horticulture Committee and being sponsored by the Brazos Valley Young Farmers.

In preparing samples, homeowners should select at least 40 pecans of one variety, place them in a sack with name and address and the variety of pecans if known. Homeowners may enter each variety category only once, however family members entries are a separate entry. Samples must be grown in 1989. Samples of pecans may be brought to any of the following locations: County Extension Office in Benjamin; Oscar & Leta Mangis, Paint and Whittle Shop in Knox City; Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Center in Munday; Mike Birkenfeld Exxon Station in Rhineland.

Processing of pecans will be conducted on December 1 at the Knox City Ag Building. Processing includes sorting of varieties, weighing and shelling 10 pecans and weighing and classing the pecan meat by quality.

Judging will begin at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, December 2. Emory Boring of Vernon will serve as this year's judge.
