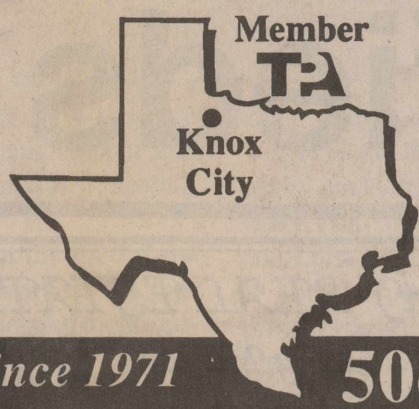

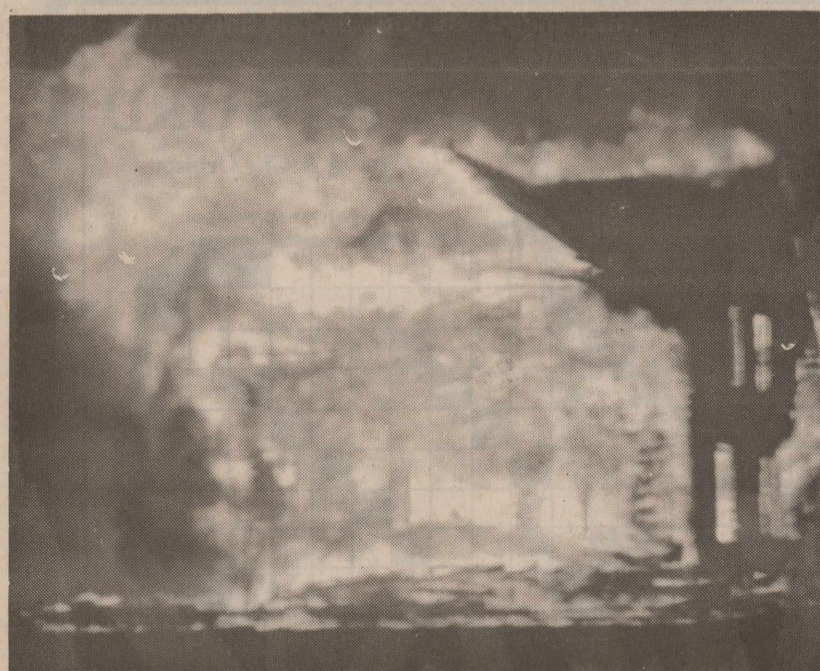

Chamber To Give \$100 For Holiday Promotion

The Knox City Chamber of Commerce has announced a Christmas promotion that will make someone a hundred dollars richer on Saturday, December 4.

Held in conjunction with the Christmas Parade, the \$100.00 will be awarded during a drawing that will be held after the parade results are announced. More details on registering for the drawing are still being finalized by the chamber and will be announced at a later date.

Plans for the Christmas parade are just about complete, with more and more details being worked out each week. At a meeting of the parade planning committee this past Monday evening, the group discussed many items and is still working on many more. Already finalized are the parade route, placement of the reviewing stand, sound system, announcer, filming, categories of entries, number of awards in the various categories, the arrival of Santa Claus into the parade, and the selection of six out of town judges for the event.

Items still being worked on include the possibility of bringing portable bleachers into the downtown area for the elderly to be able to sit and watch the parade, entertainment and church choir singing after the parade, the sale of refreshments, and the selection of a Grand Marshal for the parade.

Tentative plans are for an hour of festivities and singing of

Christmas carols in the downtown Merchants Park area immediately following the parade and prior to the announcing of parade winners. All area church choirs and individuals who might be interested in singing are encouraged to participate in the festivities. A complete sound system will be provided, including a hookup capability for background music by cassette player and plug-ins for electric keyboard instruments. Tentative plans also include the sale of hot chocolate, coffee, and maybe even the sale of hot dogs before and after the parade.

The whole concept behind the parade and the after parade festivities is to have a holiday celebration that brings Knox City and the surrounding area together to have a good time while getting into the spirit of the Christmas holidays. More parade entries are welcome, every business, organization, church, and individual who wants to enter the parade is encouraged to call the chamber office, or letting parade chairpersons Roger and Rita Rosencranz know.

Based on information and entries already confirmed, the event should be a really great time for everyone involved. More details will appear in the coming weeks prior to the parade.

Greyhounds Battle, Lose Tough Homecoming Game To Spur 49-21

Even though the Greyhound offense totaled 205 yards and three touchdowns, the hard fought effort was not enough to overcome the Bulldogs from Spur, who won last Friday night's Homecoming game by a score of 49-21.

The three touchdowns scored by Knox City came after a 1 yard run by Lance Dever, a 17 yard pass reception by Brian Rosencranz from David Dudensing, and a 10 yard run by Michael Frausto. Duane Tolliver kicked in all three extra points.

Knox City was able to run for 126 yards and pick up another 79 in the air while managing 12 first downs. In contrast, Spur ran for 325 yards, passed for 205 yards with a total of 14 first downs. Spur had 8 completions out of 11 total passes, Knox City was 4 for 13.

Spur's overall season record is now 6-1 and 2-0 in district play, while Knox City is 0-5-1 for the season and 0-2 in district 3-A action.

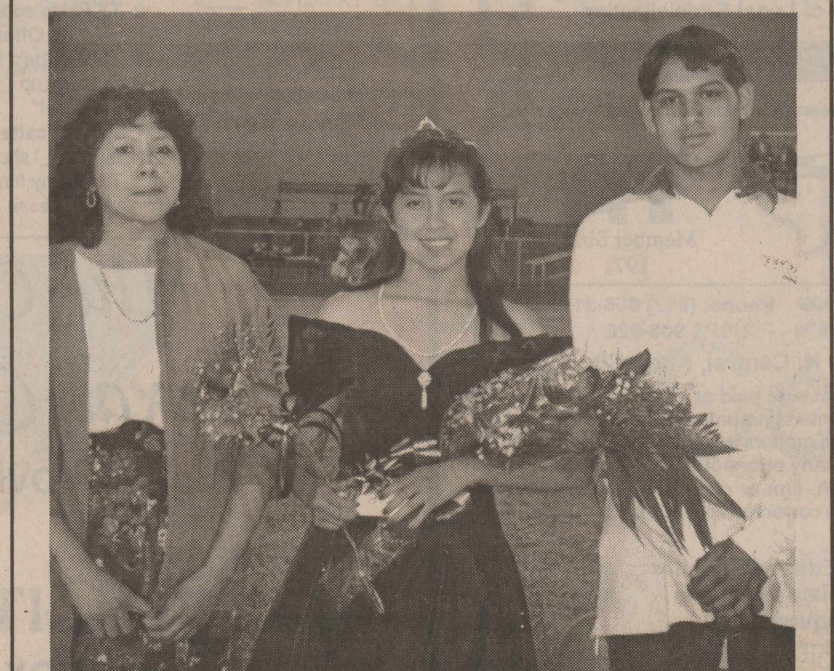

Former Knox City Resident Convicted Of Felony Theft

Lynda Faye Flye, 33, of Munday and formerly of Knox City, was convicted of felony theft Wednesday, October 12, in the 50th Judicial District Court of Knox County after a one-day trial before the Court without a jury.

Evidence introduced by the State indicated that Ms. Flye had unlawfully obtained more than \$7,000.00 in state welfare benefits and food stamps by making false representations on two separate applications for welfare benefits filed with the Texas Department of Human Services during the year of 1989.

Ms. Flye had represented on her application for assistance that her husband, Charlie Flye Jr., was not living with her and their five children at the time and that he

was not supporting them.

The State produced eight witnesses including the DHS case-worker, Ms. Jo Scott of Knox City, all of whose testimony indicated that the husband was living with the defendant and their children at the time and that she was receiving support from him. The defendant, testifying upon her own behalf, denied the charges. She also called three other witnesses to support her contentions.

At the close of testimony, District Judge David Hajek, found the defendant, Lynda Faye Flye, guilty. Sentencing hearing will be held on November 3, 1993.

District Attorney Bill Neal represented the State, while Kristen Fouts, attorney from Stamford, represented the defendant.

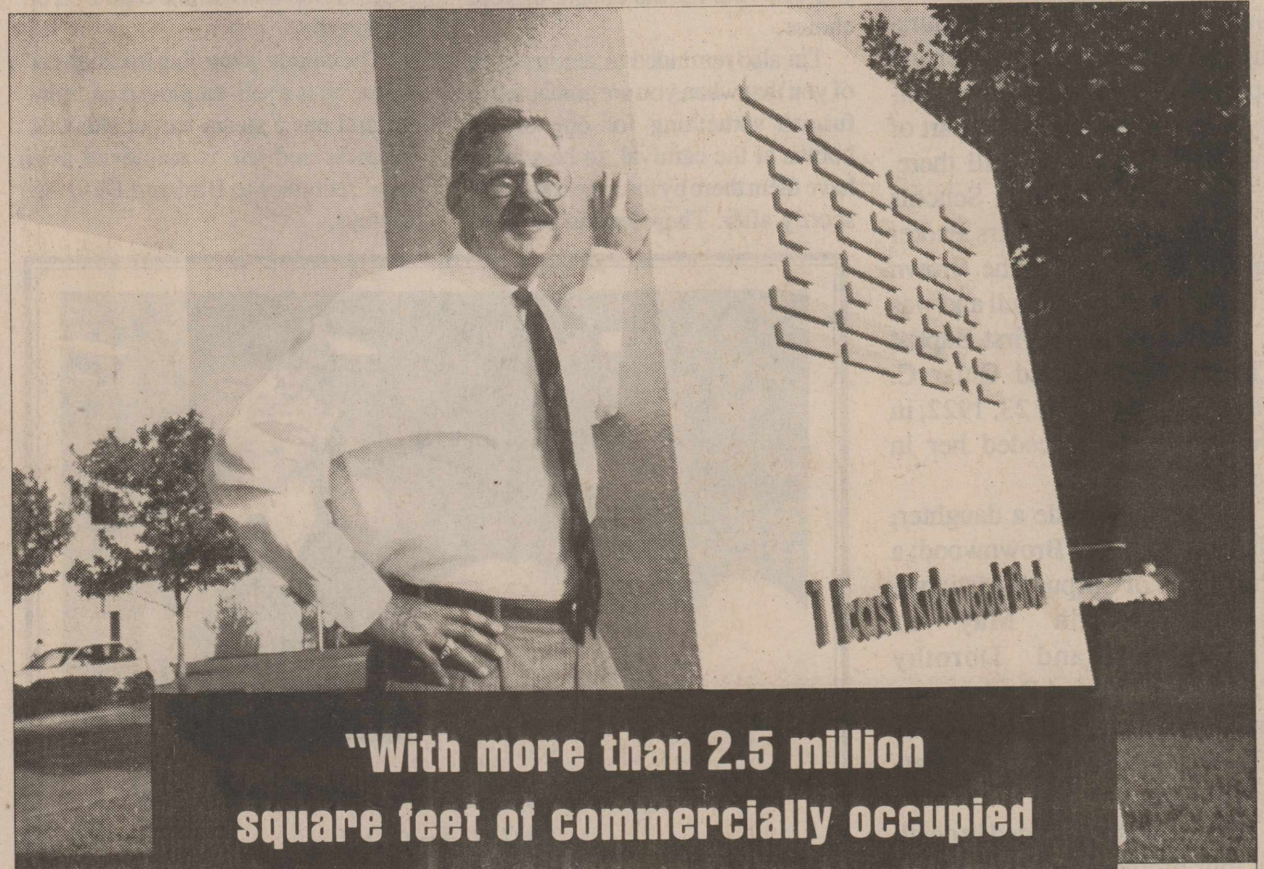

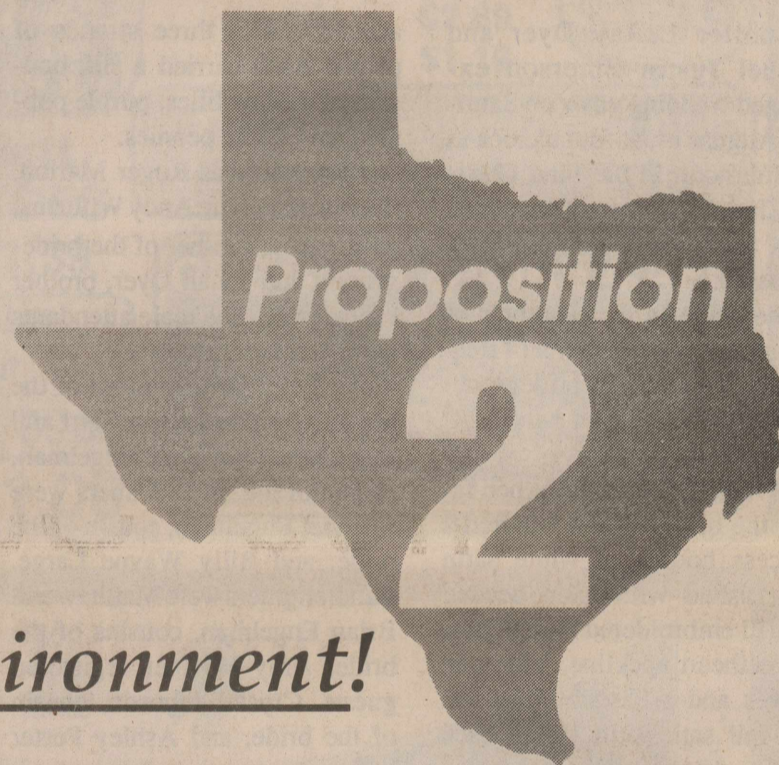

Kolpinghaus, Vienna, Austria (October 19, 1993) -- *Very slowly* - - "Doo you s-p-e-a-k Eng-lish? I wou-ld li-ke a sm-all fro-sty, pl-es-se." - - Words to live by in Greece, thanks to Dave Thomas, owner of Wendy's. When I return home, I may need to be reminded that I'm surrounded by fluent Americans!

After 10 days of strenuous travel, topping the 4000 mile mark, I returned "home" to the Kolpinghaus Tuesday morning two hours before German class. Four of us left Rome the night before, spending the night on the train.

Last Wednesday morning, 20 of us boarded a train headed for the toe of Italy. From there we spent 22 hours on a boat for a one day stay in Athens, Greece. Sounds crazy, but I'll never admit it!

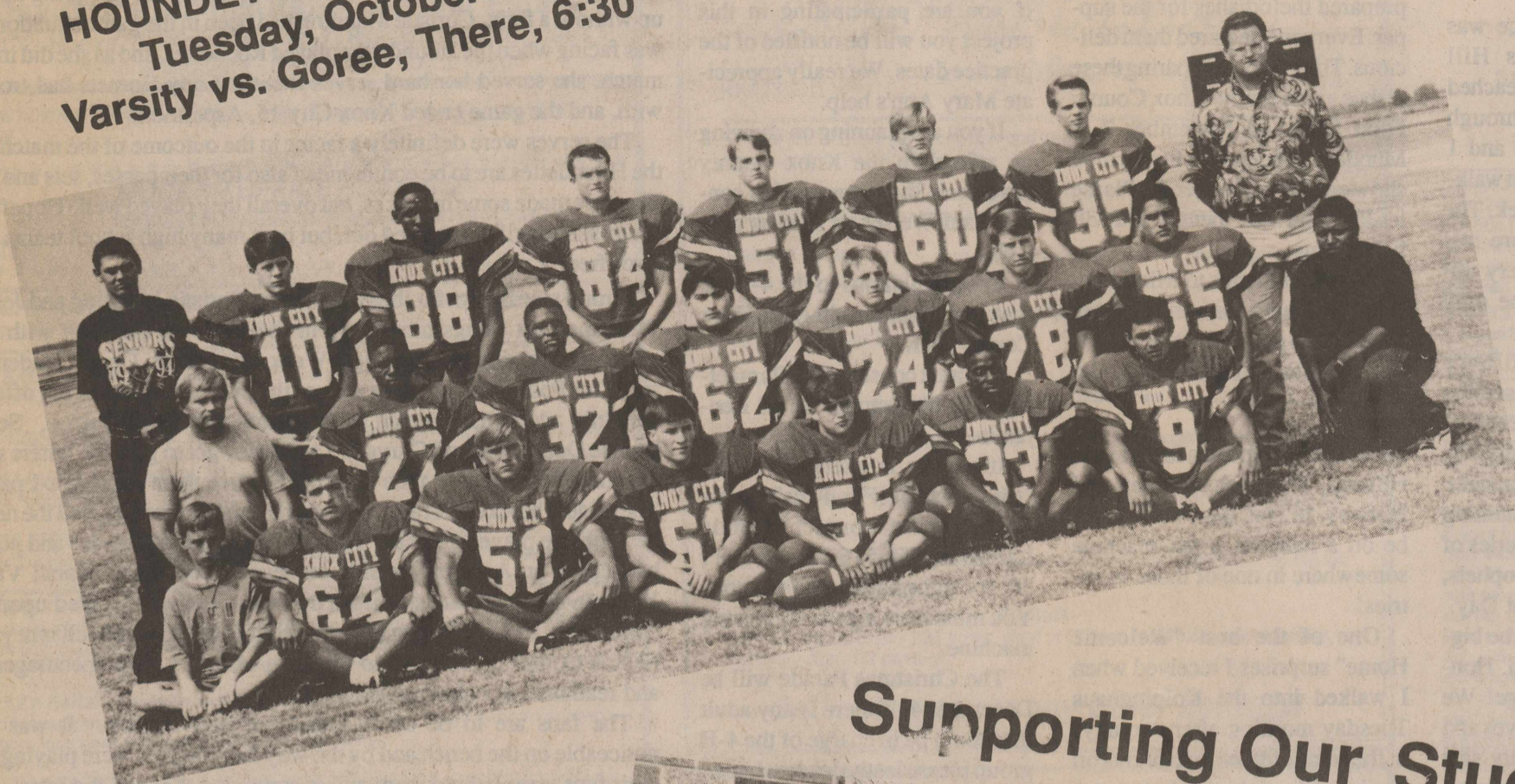
