Silverton EMS Forced to Curtail Patient Transfers

Due to personnel shortage, Silverton EMS is being forced to make changes concerning patient transfers.

There can no longer be patient transfers for non-emergency reasons (visits to the doctor, etc.). The EMTs and Paramedics regret having to discontinue this part of your volunteer ambulance service, but they cannot risk being out of town in case of a true emergency.

If you have a doctor's appointment and need help getting from your house into a private vehicle, the EMS personnel are still available to assist you in any way they can.

A new law that goes into effect January 1, 1994, will eliminate the need for commercial vehicle operators to have their commercial vehicles undergo dual inspections. The new inspection program, to be overseen by the Texas Department of Public Safety, will combine the U. S. Department of Transportation inspection with the State of Texas safety inspection.

Beginning January 1, inspections obtained at other than an official commercial Texas State Inspection Station will not be accepted.

Commercial motor vehicle means any self-propelled or towed vehicle except a farm vehicle with a gross weight, registered weight or gross weight rating of less than 48,000 pounds used on a public highway to transport passengers or property when: the vehicle or combination of vehicle has a gross weight, registered or gross weight rating in excess of 26,000 pounds; or the vehicle is designed to transport more than 15 people including the driver; or the vehicle is used to transport an amount of hazardous materials requiring placarding under the federal Hazardous Materials Transportation Act.




Silverton EMS Has Meeting





Scholarship Program Targets Rural Areas in Need of Health Care

A new Community Scholarship Program (CSP), administered by the Center for Rural Health Initiatives, is a federal, state and community

community, how can you expect visitors to find out about these attractions?

Whether or not you have lived in the community for seven days or 70 years, you still need to be familiar enough with the community to give directions. Not only do the directions need to be correct, they also need to be easy to follow. One of the most important things you can know about is the local businesses. Be able to tell what they offer and where they are located. It is true that they depend on you to support them. But, you also depend on them to be there for you, so do your part to help them out! Finally, don't forget about our local Chambers of Commerce. If visitors have questions you can't answer, refer them to the Chamber. You may contact the Quitaque Chamber of Commerce at 455-1456 or the Silverton Chamber of Commerce at 823-2125. They should be able to answer your questions as well as inform you about what Briscoe County has to


partnership which supports students who are committed to returning to their rural communities to practice primary health care. The purpose of the program is to increase the availability of primary health care in rural Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) in Torses.

The CSP is open to physician assistant and nurse practitioner students and to students in their third or fourth year of medical school. Students are nominated for the program by community-based sponsors. A sponsor must be located in a rural Texas HPSA and commit to funding 35 percent of the student's educational expenses as well as to providing a fulltime practice opportunity to the student when he or she is ready to practice. The Center for Rural Health Initiatives and the National Health Service Corps provide the remaining 65 percent of the funding.

A student must be a resident of the rural HPSA in which the sponsor is located. In return for the payment of educational expenses, the student agrees to provide one year of practice to the sponsor for each year of scholarship, for a minimum of two

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG), the excellent crop being enjoyed on the Plains is the

result of the crop's overall earliness and outstanding weather conditions that allowed producers to get in the field and get their cotton harvested with only minimal delays.

So far this rare combination of events is allowing many area gins to finish processing their part of the 1993 crop before the Christmas holidays. Many more are expecting to finish before the new year begins. Only a few are planning to be operating into the month

All indications still point to a near record crop for the High Plains.

In Silverton and Quitaque, the total number of bales that had been ginned as of Monday, December 20, was 49,480 bales.

The December USDA crop estimate remains 3.45 million bales from Texas crop reporting districts 1-N and 1-S. These two districts are often used as a yardstick of overall production in the 25 counties that make up the High

"This crop has the potential of setting a number of records," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald

Johnson. "Not only is this one of the best crops ever in terms of quality, it is also going to end up being one of the biggest ever produced on the Plains."

Johnson adds that, so far, marketing of the 1993 crop also is moving at a rapid pace. No firm numbers were available at press time; however, Johnson says that in talking to a number of producers during the past week, most report a majority of their cotton already has been sold or arrangements are in the process of

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

TELCOT Report

A Weekly Summary of Cotton Marketing News


> For the Week Ending December 16

To the surprise of most market watchers, a key reversal in cotton futures on December 10 was virtually

ignored by the market just days later as futures shrugged off the losses and were once again off to the races. Meanwhile, sales of Texas/Oklahoma cotton on the TELCOT electronic marketing system responded by remaining at healthy levels through the trading period ended December 16.

On Friday, December 10, New York cotton futures came down off contract highs to close as much as almost one cent lower on the day. To many in the trade, the move signaled a key reversal from the market's recent bullish trend. But, on Monday, December 13, the expected failed to happen as futures ended with only minimal losses, and the bears' hopes fizzled in the face of continuing demand and strength. The December 10 market reversal also failed to impress world prices, as they remained unchanged over the weekend following the reversal. In addition, U. S. export business saw a slight recovery during the same period, as evidenced by sales of several thousand bales of Texas

cotton to Hong Kong. One market watcher commented, "The invitations to a bear party were all signed, sealed and delivered, but, the bears must have been disappointed that more sellers didn't show up." But, there was more disappointment to come for the bears, as futures ended with gains of amost two cents over the next two trading sessions.

A report on December 14 predicted world consumption would exceed production by about 4.6 million bales. Traders said the news helped fuel existing bullishness, as did indications of a continuing rise in world cotton prices. An overnight price jump of one cent per pound among the five cheapest world cotton growths in the Cotlook Ltd. "A" Index on December 15 seemed to confirm ideas of crop problems or tight supplies in certain countries. Traders said such developments could pave the way for a potential increase in U. S. export sales. The market took a breather on December 16, as prices closed fractionally lower. But, traders felt the market soon would renew its upward move, adding that a short break from recent rallies was healthy for a bull market.


In the past week, harvest of the Texas cotton crop was nearing one of the earliest completions in modern times, according to trade sources. Early in the week, the state's crop was 97 percent harvested, ahead of 83 percent a year ago and 85 percent as the five-year average. Some gins had completed operations for the season, while others looked forward to finishing by late December. "Only 20 to 25 of the more than 200 gins on the High Plains are expected to be operating in January," reported one source.

Producers in Texas and Oklahoma continued to be blessed by a trade with a strong appetite for cotton grown in the area, as 65 to 70 percent of this year's record crop already had been marketed by mid-December.

Gains in New York cotton futures encouraged sales on the TELCOT electronic marketing system, with 128,750 bales of Texas/Oklahoma cotton sold in the five-day trading period. Sixty-eight percent of the week's volume occurred on December 14 and 15, coinciding with the significant gains in cotton futures.

One industry source points out that sharp advances in New York cotton futures in the past week have been on the cotton grower's wide in the face of an adjusted worldprice (AWP) which, by all indications, continues to climb unabated. These gains in futures have countered sharp advances in the AWP, allowing producers to maintain relatively favorable equity levels. The AWP through the week ending December 23 is 45.37 cents per pound, up a whopping 118 points from the previous week and resulting in a producer option payment (POP) of 698

The National Cotton Council (NCC) early in the week recommended a final 1994 acreage reduction program (ARP) set-aside rate not to exceed 11 percent, versus USDA's preliminary set-aside of percent. The move followed rele of USDA's December supply/demand report, which was closely in line with the agency's November report. NCC maintains that a 30 percent stocks-touse ratio can be achieved with an 11 percent ARP, assuming abandonment of six percent, yield of 665 pounds per acre, 1.5 million acres outside the farm program and a 90 percent participation rate. NCC also points to continuing strong domestic demand, favorable export prospects, the possibility of vields below the 680-pound level USDA uses, and the chance that non-program acres could fall below USDA's estimated levels.

ACS Funds Colon Cancer Research

Researchers announced December 2 that they have identified the genetic flaw that causes as many as one in six cases of colon cancer, as well as a number of other fatal cancers of the uterus, ovaries and other organs. The American Cancer Society funds the research of Dr. Burt Vogelstein, leader of one of the two teams credited with this discovery.

Volunteers and donors from throughout the Panhandle of Texas, including Briscoe County, raise money to support this and other national American Cancer Society research programs. Pat Popham, District 29 Crusade Chairman from Canadian, states, "We are proud that the dollars we raise through neighborhood community crusades, galas such as the Hutchinson Oil Patch Extravaganza, bikeathons and other special events as well as through our Love Lights a Tree and memorial program come back home to the Panhandle in this way. Thousands of our friends and neighbors benefit from this and other ACS research findings." Last year the American Cancer Society also returned \$1,070 in patient services to patients in Briscoe County and \$15,708 in public

These researchers state that they have found the gene responsible for INHERITED colon cancer and predicted that this would allow highrisk people to be aggressively screened in order to detect the disease, or its precancerous form, at a highly curable stage. This gene also may be linked to other cancers including ovarian, uterine and stomach.

The American Cancer Society's guidelines for screening for the early detection of colon cancer include for both men and women at average risk:

(1) Having a regular cancer-related checkup; and

(2) Having a digital rectal examination every year after age 40.

For people with a family history of colon or rectal cancer or ulcerative colitis, these tests may need to be performed more frequently as prescribed by their doctor.

'Cedar Fever' Attacks **Part of Texas Winter**

According to allergy specialists, Texas is not unique in its number of natural irritants for allergy sufferers; however, the fact that people in other states suffer from itchy eyes, runny noses, sneezing, headaches, general fatigue and other symptoms hardly improves an allergic Texan's outlook.

For many Texans, one of the most

miserable seasons of the year has arrived with the first onset of cold weather. At about the time of the first frost, "cedar fever" will descend with the wind-blown pollen that causes it.

Cedar fever is an allergic reaction to pollen of the male mountain cedar. The mountain cedar, which is actually two species of juniper, is indigenous statewide, but is especially concentrated in Central Texas. In a typical year, these wild shrubs release pollen from mid-November to mid-

Dennis Perrotta, chief of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Epidemiology, said that cedar fever is second only to ragweed allergy in the number of Texans it affects. "The severity of cedar allergy may be greater in individuals than is ragweed allergy," he said. "Even people able to resist other allergies may suffer from cedar fever. Also, the severity of their reactions may vary from year to year."

For people with numerous allergies, cedar fever may compound earlier reactions to ragweed and fall elm pollen in November, and be further aggravated by oak, elm, pecan and other pollens in March. In addition, humidity at any time can increase the number of mold spores-another allergen-in the air.

"People in the midst of a pollen allergy attack may wonder about its seriousness. If there is any consolation for them, it is that while most reactions are uncomfortable, they are temporary. Relatively mild cases may be controlled with over-the-counter antihistamines,' Perrotta said

Perrotta added, however, that anyone with severe or persistent symptoms should consult a physician. He said that prolonged irritation of the sinuses or throat can predispose a person to infections, or may be signs of another illness. Also, anyone with a history of recurrent respiratory disease may need to seek treatment by an allergy



Why Don't Federal Employees Pay Social Security Taxes?

"If Social Security is such a good program, why don't Social Security employees pay into it? I often get this question, especialy when I'm speaking before public groups," says Terry Richardson, Social Security Manager in Plainview.

I tell them that more than 1.2 million federal employees pay Social Security taxes just as other wage earners do. I also explain that not every federal employee is permitted to pay into Social Security. If they were hired before January 1, 1984, they had to be covered by the Civil Service Retirement System—a program established in May 1920 to provide federal employees with a pension after many years of service.

(The Social Security program was not enacted into law until 1935.)

The situation changed in 1983, when a new law established the Federal Employees Retirement System (FERS) that requires all federal employees hired after January 1, 1984 to pay Social Security taxes. The new law also gave all federal employees on duty at the time an opportunity to join FERS. Although more than 100,000 employees switched to FERS, those who had many years of government service chose to stay with the Civil Service retirement plan.

It would be difficult to compare Social Security and the federal retirement systems. employee Although both provide a monthly check when you reach a certain age, the eligibility requirements differ. Your Social Security benefit is a percentage of your earnings averaged over most of your working lifetime. A worker with average earnings can expect a retirement benefit that represents about 42 percent of his or her lifetime earnings. Social Security never was intended to be your only source of income when you retire or become disabled. Instead, it is intended to supplement other kinds of income you may have, such as a pension from your employer as well as savings and investments. On the other hand, either federal plan provides an annuity to replace a substantial part of the employee's income when he or she retires. To do this, the eligibility requirements for retiring from federal employment are based on age, years of service, and the employee's highest salary for three years.

As the years go by, the number of employees covered by the Civil Service plan will drop, and, eventually, all federal employees will be paying Social Security taxes.

Many people don't know that members of religious orders who have taken a vow of poverty may still be eligible for Social Security benefits. These members who have taken vows of poverty have no earnings to report and pay no Social Security taxes. (Social Security benefits generally are based on your average earnings over your working life.)

But even in these instances, the services an individual performs for a religious order may be covered under Social Security if the order waives its exemption from Social Security taxation. This means the order would pay Social Security taxes for its members.

While no wages are paid to the members of the order, the "fair market value" of their meals, lodging, clothing and other benefits are deemed to be their wages.

If a religious order elects to take advantage of this part of the Social Security law, it may even elect back coverage for its members for a retroactive period of up to 20 calendar quarters—five years of coverage. (40 quarters of coverage generally are needed to be eligible for Social Security retirement benefits.)

Whether a religious order opts for Social Security coverage or not, individual members of that order might still be eligible for benefits under the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program. SSI payments, which are administered by the Social Security Administration, are not based upon an individual's work record. They are paid to individuals with little or no income who are 65 or older, blind, or disabled.

A&M Researchers in Need of Fencing to Run An Experiment

They need fence—lots of fence—at the Y Ranch south of Crowell.

Some 45 miles of fencing and at least 15 cattle guards are being sought by researchers at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Vernon, which operates the Y Experimental Ranch, as the key elements in an ambitious project to find more economical ranching methods.

Dr. Jerry Cox, the center's resident

director, estimated the cost of the fencing and equipment needed for the research at \$250,000-more than the center's annual research budget-and said researchers are seeking funding assistance from ranchers or anyone "interested in supporting new and innovative research programs

Cox and brush control specialist Dr. Jim Ansley, livestock nutrition expert Dr. Bill Pinchak, and range ecologist Dr. Richard Teague recently explained

the project's objectives and cost details.
State Rep. John Hirshi, D-Wichita Falls, who supports the project, attended the meeting. He said, "The experiment's ultimate goal is to make

ranching more viable into the next century." Some of the costs of ranching, such as for brush control, he said, "are driving people out of the business, and older ranchers are questioning whether there's a future in it.'

The A&M experiment, Hirshi said, could help "find ways to cut the costs of ranching without reducing the number of cattle you run," for producers in the Rolling Plains as well as anywhere else.

Hirshi said he supports the basic concept of the proposed experiment, as a public-private partnership.

In a letter to Hirschi, Cox said scientists from the Vernon center visited more than 76 Rolling Plains THURSDAY, DECEMBER 23, 1993

ranchers to help identify the problems that pose the greatest limits to "their ability to maintain an economically viable ranching operation."

Topping that list were, in order: brush control, drought, grass and animal productivity, and profitability. Cox added, "To date, research has not provided a solution to these problems."

Cox said that through discussions with ranchers, researchers, Extension specialists, consultants and politicians in surrounding western states and in Washington, D. C., the A&M scientists determined that "selected problems were nationally important," and designed an "economically and environmentally strategy.'

That strategy is based on three

★ Chemical and mechanical brush methods are either environmentally unacceptable or too expensive, at a time when some estimates say brush and marginal vegetation can reduce potential livestock production in some areas by 50 percent.

★ Rotational grazing (and resting) can be used to accumulate forage, as commonly done in Asia and Africa. During droughts, forage is stored in a "forage reserve," a base which allows ranchers to maintain the core breeding herd and reduce feed purchases. Following wet years the reserve is burned for brush control and to improve forage quality.

★Controlled, prescribed burns can help control woody brush (which can crowd out desirable grasses and contribute to soil erosion), and create a mesquite savanna, or a relatively low density of large trees, that would free more forage space for livestock while providing a habitat for a variety of


Ansley, Teague and Pinchak and staff at the Vernon center have long worked together on developing these same concepts, as part of an over-all grazing

In September, Cox said, the Vernon staff presented the grazing strategy to 12 Texas ranchers, and with their approval, developed an experimental design to "scientifically compare the new grazing strategy with commonly

used grazing systems. Cox noted that previous grazing experiments in the United States have been carried out on relatively small pastures, but that the sheer size of the Y Ranch—over 38,000 acres—will allow the experiments to take place in ranchsized pastures (2,000 to 4,000 acres) that "introduce a 'real world' element to the experiment without sacrificing a testable scientific design.

Hirschi noted that a friend of his who ranches near Wichita Falls uses the same methods outlined in the strategy, and that, "Using the paddock system and frequent rotation, he has had superior results.

Cox said Texas A&M will provide the funds to run the experiment, and that cattle will be provided by an Amarillo

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Conference and Trade Show Set For Jan. 10, 11

The annual irrigation conference for High Plains growers and equipment dealers has been around for more than two decades, according to Leon New, Extension Service irrigation specialist and conference chairman. But this year the conference takes on a new look.

"The 1994 conference will be quite different because we're encompassing all of Texas and going out to other states as well," said New. The Irrigation Conference and Trade Show, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Irrigation Association and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be held at the Amarillo Civic Center on January 10, 11.

The expanded program includes two full days of seminars and workshops and a much larger trade show, according to Mike Stephens, TAIA president from Lubbock.

"We are targeting a much wider audience ranging from the Texas agricultural producer and equipment dealer to their counterparts in five neighboring states with some dealers coming from as far away as Minnesota and North Dakota," said Stephens.

Rep. Pete Laney, Texas House speaker, will deliver the keynote address at Tuesday's noon luncheon.

Bob Givens, KGNC agribusiness news director and popular host of "Agribusiness News at Noon," will broadcast his show live during both days of the conference. More than 75 industry equipment and service vendors will be on hand for the trade show

New said the concurrent sessions will run both days and provide in-depth programs on innovations in chemigation, business management, marketing, and state and federal regulations—all of which have application for producers and dealers.

"On Tuesday, we are placing a heavy emphasis on six major commodities, including corn, grain sorghum, wheat, peanuts, sugar beets and cotton. All six commodities are further represented by THURSDAY, DECEMBER 23, 1993

Research scientists will brief producers on current research in short season and dryland corn production, breeding programs, crop physiology, managing production, and marketing. Three CEUs may be earned by participants on Monday and four on Tuesday

VA 1994 Insurance Dividends Announced

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has announced it will pay more than \$51,362,000 in dividends in 1994 to 127,076 Texas veterans holding active veterans' life insurance policies.

These dividends are made possible because veterans are living longer than originally predicted, and the insurance trust funds are earning high yields from investment in long-term government securities.


"This is good news for veterans and an economy in need of this kind of positive stimulation," said Waco VA Regional Office Director Dr. Lois High.

The national payout of \$955.9 million is comparable to dividends paid in recent years, with \$963.8 million paid nationwide in 1993 and \$1 billion paid in 1992. The 1994 payout will be credited automatically to some 2.5 million policyholders on the anniversary date of their policies.

Policyholders may choose to receive a check or select one of nine alternative dividend options. VA is cautioning veterans that only those policies that have been kept in force receive annual dividend distributions.

The dividend amount will vary according to age, type of insurance and duration of the policy. No applications from individual policyholders are
