Eat Slowly and Eat Less

Yes, eating slowly can help you to eat less! It takes about 20 minutes for your body to begin digesting food. So, if you eat quickly, you will put more food into your body than you need in order to satisfy your hunger. This also may help you to avoid the "I'm stuffed and miserable" feeling.

There are several ways to help you to eat slowly. Some suggestions include: putting your fork or spoon down after every bite; taste, chew and swallow the food before taking another bite; and

stop eating in the middle of the meal for two minutes to give your body more time to begin digestion. Other ideas are: use a fork or spoon to eat everything; no fingers allowed; avoid bending over your plate while eating; sit up straight and bring the food to your mouth; count the number of bites you take per minute; and try to be the last one finished eating, without seconds.

Do you belong to the "clean plate club"? Some people feel that they have to eat every bite on their plate, regardless of how full they are. This in turn makes them eat way too much. Some ways to avoid this are: use a smaller plate and take smaller bites; leave the table as soon as you finish eating; drink a glass of water before sitting down to eat; or set aside one bite to leave on your plate to help you realize that you do not have to eat everything that is placed in front of you. I hope

that you will find some of these suggestions helpful in learning to control your eating habits.

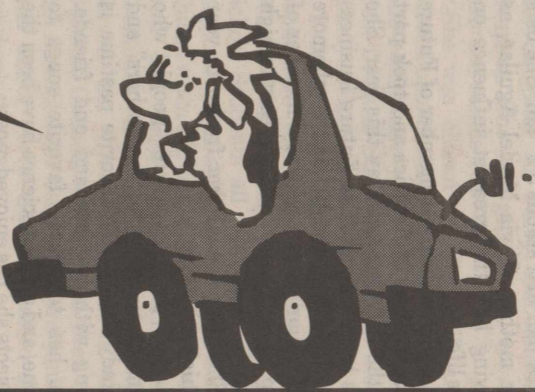

Graduates represent the SPC Levelland and Lubbock campuses and SPC's educational program at Reese Air Force Base.

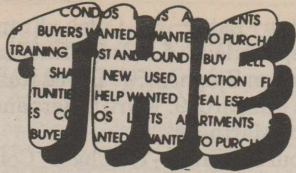

Boll Weevil Trap Counts High Again

Boll weevil trap counts for the week ending May 8, 1995 were significantly higher than the past two weeks. Three hundred and sixty-six weevils were taken from the four active traps in the county.

What this means is that the first suicidal emergence ended sometime in the last couple of weeks, and another emergence is currently upon us. Whether this emergence will effect our crop is not known. It probably will not, but other weevils are sure to follow later in the growing season.

More traps will become active in the county later this month, and we should be able to get a better picture of the boll weevil situation. I will keep you informed of the development throughout the season.
