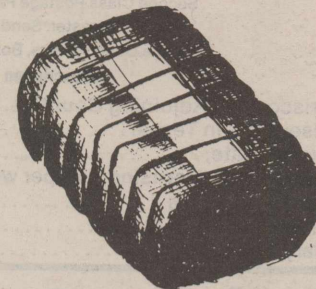

The second annual Tri-State Show and Auction will be held September 2-3-4 at the Tri-State Fairgrounds in Amarillo under the sponsorship of the Tri-State Antique Truck & Tractor Association and the Texas Plains Two-Cylinder Club.

There will be antique tractors, autos, machinery, trucks, engines, vendor spaces, food booths and a swap meet. Other features include Blue Grass Music, daily parades, slow tractor races, slow truck races, pedal tractor pulls, trashing and other events.

Monday's auction will include lots of country and western memorabilia, old pumps, cast-iron skillets and pots, cross-cut saws, grintstone, scythes, lanterns, singletrees, coal buckets, old tractors, children's antique wagon, horse bits, antique tools, Maytag wringer washer with gas motor, granite coffee pots. They are expecting 50-75 tractors and horse-drawn wagons, antique farm implements and buggies.

Furadan 4F is Cleared For Aphid Control

Furadan 4F was cleared for use for aphid control in cotton in Briscoe County on Monday, August 21, 1995. There is no doubt that Furadan is an excellent aphid control material and is one of the least expensive approaches, but it does have a downside from the standpoint of worker re-entry restrictions.

Absolutely no one is to enter a

Furadan-treated field for the first 48 hours following an application, regardless of personal protective equipment (PPE). After the two-day restricted-access period there are still 12 more days in which PPE must be used. This includes overalls, chemical resistant gloves and shoes and socks. Coveralls can be one- or two-piece and do not need to be chemical resistant. Therefore, a long-sleeve

shirt and long pants would suffice. The only exceptions to the remaining 12-day restricted entry provisions would involve those that monitor cotton for plant mapping or insect scouting. These folks are not required to wear protective clothing.

BEET ARMYWORMS IN COTTON

Beet armyworm activity is on the rise as more egg masses are found. While most earlier activity has been concentrated in the more southern acreage, light infestations are now becoming more evident in northern areas. Some activity has been reported near Quitaque and south of Silverton.

This pest is extremely hard and expensive to control. Costs range from \$18 per acre on up for a single application. Control has averaged no more than 70% in most cases. The threshold for worms is probably somewhere between 12,000 to 15,000 per acre. Infestation levels can often reach in the hundreds of thousands per acre. This would mean that a single application would rarely provide adequate control once worms are established. Good coverage and higher spray volumes are required for adequate control.

One approach to managing beet armyworms is to use the early-detection threshold. This relies on detecting hatching egg masses. When two hatching egg masses are found per 100 row feet examined, multiple applications of the insect growth regulator Dimilin may provide the best approach to avoiding high worm counts and high damage potential. Sequential applications of 4-8 ounces of Dimilin per acre should be used, on a 5-7 day schedule. At least eight ounces may be needed per acre by the time multiple applications have been completed against heavy egg-laying pressure. This is an expensive program, but may wind up with the best results. Once high numbers of beet armyworms become well established in cotton, they are extremely difficult and expensive to remove.

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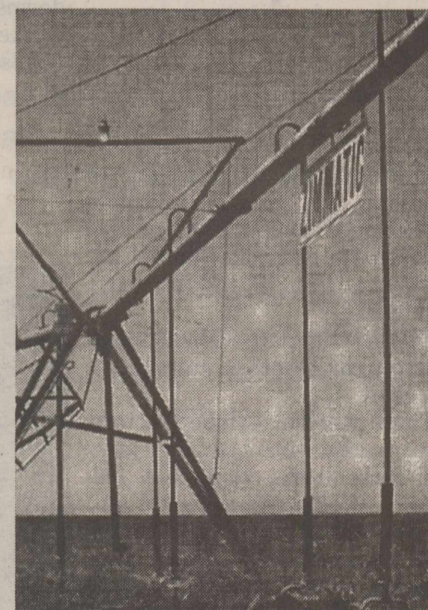

10. Never crawl under a school bus.



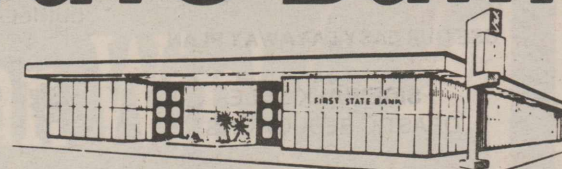

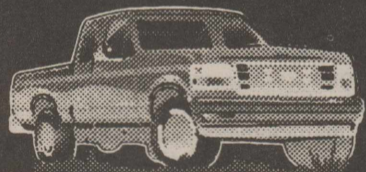

During the time that Mr. Potter lived at that place in Floyd County, he had to ride 25 miles to get his mail and his nearest neighbor was at Plainview, which was 18 miles from his camp . . .

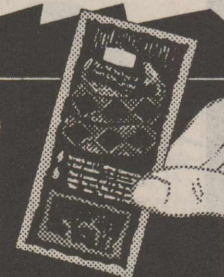

Bush, Governor of Texas, will update cattle feeders on the new realities in politics during his keynote address. Following Gov. Bush, cattle feeders will get a glimpse of how Frito Lay builds consumer loyalty and market share when Lloyd Ward, president of the central division of Frito Lay, Inc., addresses consumer marketing strategies.

Industry issues at the national

level are vitally important to cattle feeders. NCA President Bob Drake will discuss how the cattle industry is dealing with the many issues confronting it during lunch on Monday.

With the consolidation of NCA and the Meat Board now a reality, two past TCFA presidents who were key players in the process, will give cattle feeders a look at what's ahead. Protecting the potential that exists for the 1995 High Plains cotton crop will be no easy task, according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG).

Dr. Jim Leser, Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) Entomologist, reports the combined threat posed by late-season build-ups of the boll weevil, beet armyworm, bollworms and aphids could become a very costly bullet to dodge for many producers.

Leser warns producers across the area to keep a very close eye on their crop and advises them to step up their scouting efforts for each of these pests. He notes that newly-emerging boll weevils are continuing to cause problems for producers south of Lubbock and that several of the counties north of Lubbock that are considered to be "threatened" will have cotton treated for weevils before the growing season ends.

Leser notes that fields as far north as Edmonson in Hale County and Kress in Swisher County already have been treated for weevils this year.

Producers are advised to do everything they can to get their fields past the point where weevils can damage their crop or else face the possibility of up to six insecticide applications to get them through.

Anyone who wants more complete information about boll weevil management can obtain a copy of the pamphlet titled "Boll Weevil Management in the West Texas High Plains" from their County Extension Agent.

Leser adds that the threat posed by the beet armyworm is also significant enough that producers will need to keep a close watch on their crops. The key to beet armyworm control is early detection and treatment. Later planted, lush fields or fields with skippy stands are the most vulnerable to this pest.

Routine scouting for boll weevils and bollworms are not adequate for beet armyworms since egg masses are located on the underside of leaves.

He notes that beet armyworm eggclays are currently widely scattered across the entire High Plains region. So far they have not swept across the area with the same ferocity that devastated the Lower Rio Grande Valley or, more recently, the Southern Rolling Plains area around San Angelo.

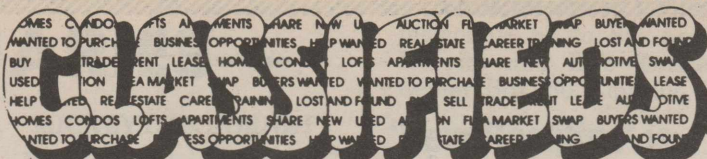
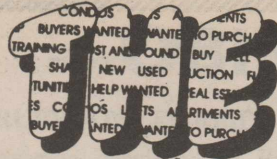

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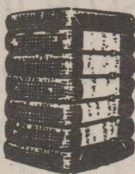
