Olga Robertson has given fully to the prison ministries and has visited prisons in Korea, Australia, Canada and the United States. She plans to build another church at the Medium Camp at the prison and a building for the kindergarten, and then she said she would like to visit all the penal colonies and prisons around the Phillippines.

#### MINUTES OF THE KC-O'BRIEN ISD MEETING

Will covered and lockable thermostat covers be provided? 15. Is finished quarry floor requirement acknowledged?, 16. Is Epoxy paint finish for all interior

Upon acceptance of this Proposal the successful bidder shall furnish a Performance and Payment Bond for the completion of said work within the time stated, and for the following sum for construction of a New Band Hall Building.'

Addendums were acknowledged. Total Bid for Construction of Band Hall: Enterprises Deady \$99,986.00: T.A. Litteken 99,085; Fisk Construction 98,200; Electra Construction

Alternate #1--If Plumber is required to reroute the existing water line around the new Band Hall because of the foundation requirements, add the sum of: Deady Enterprised \$150; T.A. Litteken \$1004; Fisk Construction \$650; Electra Construction

Alternate #2--Add a brick veneer masonry accent strip as indicated on drawing sheet #6, increasing the foundation for the brick ledge required, using metal straps to tie masonry into the wall panels. and based on a brick allowance of \$190 per thousand, for the sum of: Deady Enterprises \$1650; T.A. Litteken \$2126.25; Fisk Construction \$1000; Electra Construction, no charge.
