## February Sales Tax Increases

AUSTIN, TEX. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday returned \$106.4 million in local sales tax payments to 954 cities who levy the one-percent local tax.

"This is the biggest single payment since city sales tax rebates began in 1968," Bullock said.

The \$106.4 million payment represents a 16 percent jump over last February's checks, which in turn had grown 16 percent over the previous February. Payments so far in 1982 are running 13.2 percent above last year's January-February total.

Knox City received \$9,735.77 for its net payment for this period, as compared to \$9,414.95 for the same period last year. 1982 payments to date were \$13,379.58, a 5.22% increase.

Munday's net payment for this period was \$6,571.48, as compared to this period last year when the payment was \$6,362.13. Payments for 1982 to date were \$8,803.35 reflecting a 6.86% decrease from last year's \$9,451.82.

Benjamin had \$718.72 as compared to last year's net payment of \$428.66. The same figures represent the year-to-date total with a huge 67.67% increase.

Goree showed an increase of 20.63%. The net payment this period was \$1,090.57, as compared to \$904.08 last year during this period. These were also totals for the year so far.

Other area towns and their net payments for this period were Haskell \$27,034.37, Crowell \$2,970.86, Aspermont \$7,962.19, O'Brien \$364.48, Paducah \$9,997.02, Rochester \$791.06, Rule \$3,386.29, Seymour \$21,549.05, Stamford \$25,158.57, and Weinert \$359.73.

The city sales taxes collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

## Taxpayer Reaction Expected

AUSTIN, TEXAS: The 1982 property tax reappraisal in the city of Houston will be the "shot heard around the State" according to the executive director of the State Property Tax Board.

Speaking at the seventh annual meeting of Texans for Equitable Taxation, Ken Graeber said that he expected a strong taxpayer reaction to the Houston reappraisal. State Representative Paul Colbert of Houston later addressed the TET delegates and agreed with Graeber's assessment, adding that the Houston controversy will be followed by similar reappraisals in most other Texas counties under the new Property Tax Code.

In addition, TET members heard from Texas Commissioner of Education Raymon Bynum who told the group that by 1985 Texas would need to develop new revenue resources in order to fund public schools and other state functions adequately. He said that while Texas has grown accustomed to having large surpluses, in 1985 "we'll hit a brick wall".

Taxens for Equitable Taxation is a statewide coalition of taxpayers and local governments whose main goal is property tax relief. TET's state headquarters office is located at 1011 Congress, Suite 421, Austin, Texas 78701.

Taxens for Equitable Taxation was organized July 25, 1975, in Munday, Texas. TET has 92 school districts and 925 individuals who are members. Knox City-O'Brien School Superintendent W.R. Baker has served as state president since its beginning.

## Hospital Auxiliary Chooses New Project

Knox County Hospital Auxiliary members heard their guest speakers, Randy Abernathy, hospital administrator, and Bill Nemir, anesthetist, list various needs Monday night. However, they did name a priority item, considered as being the most vitally needed at the present time - an anesthesia machine. The machine that has been used finally completely quit and three surgeries which had been scheduled had to be postponed. The hospital now has a loaner, courtesy of Aspermont Hospital, but even though they do not perform surgery presently at Aspermont, they do not want to sell the machine.

Nemir described in detail the Ohio Modulus Anesthesia machine along with the pertinent accessories including a ventilator and its accessories.

Both men expressed profound thanks to the auxiliary members for their support and help in hospital needs. Those who help in hospital duties and those who help in the Thrift Shop are doing a tremendous job, the men said. Nemir said he had worked in and around hospitals for 20 years and he had never seen a more dedicated group of workers. "You are a small group and it is unbelievable how much help, both physically and financially, you give to this hospital," he remarked.

Abernathy said he felt as if he should apologize for coming to the meeting always with "my hand stuck out." President Peggy McGaughey

assured him that the group needed to know the needs of the hospital as this was the sole purpose in forming the auxiliary. To date, the auxiliary has purchased a Care 4000 monitor and also a bedside monitor, both vitally needed by the hospital and utilized daily. Nemir said the local hospital has very modern equipment with which to work and the lab is second to none. In addition to the anesthesia machine, other needs listed included a fetal heart monitor and operating lights. However, unless an anesthesia machine is acquired, lights for the operating room, they said, would not be needed.

After the discussion, a business session followed and members heard president-elect Jerry Smith give the financial report in the absence of Pansy Russell. Mrs. Smith said that the Thrift Shop had closed several days during the extremely cold weather, but had managed with the help of memorials, to add another \$876.70 to their account. The group paid off the bedside monitor and paid its sales taxes for the year.

Members discussed various ways to raise money including a return benefit of the Grapevine Opry later in the year as well as a red bean and cornbread supper, and a bake sale. One member offered to bake pies for the auxiliary to sell if customers would call in their orders or let them know at the Thrift Shop.

Mrs. McGaughey also said the auxiliary is in need of more workers at the hospital as well as in the Thrift Shop.

After reviewing the hospital's needs, the auxiliary members voted unanimously to purchase the deluxe model of the anesthesia machine which includes a monitor and read-out feature. Price of the project is \$12,000.00. The women ask that interested persons are invited to make donations to the anesthesia fund which will continue to be listed in *The Knox County News* each week as well as the memorials.

# Restock Your Pond

By Soil Conservation Service

How are the fishing conditions in your livestock ponds? If you are like most landowners in Knox County, your ponds need to be cleaned out and re-stocked. Now is the time of the year to begin planning for this operation.

If your pond has too many trash fish, you should begin your program by cleaning out the pond. This can be accomplished by pouring Rotenone into the water and mixing it up with the water to achieve the best kill. The chemical dissipates quickly so you can begin re-stocking very soon after you clean out the pond.

You may ask, "Can I overstock my pond?" The answer is definitely YES! Ponds should be stocked using the following guidelines.

1. Channel Catfish Only- 1200 catfish per surface acre.
2. Channel Catfish and Fathead Minnows-
  - a) Unfertilized Ponds - 200 Catfish and 2 lbs. of Minnows per surface acre.
  - b) Properly Fertilized Ponds - 400 Catfish and 2 lbs. Minnows per surface acre.
3. Black Bass and Fathead Minnows -
  - a) Unfertilized Ponds - 100 Bass and 2 lbs. Minnows per surface acre.
  - b) Properly Fertilized Ponds - 200 Bass and 2 lbs. Minnows per surface acre.
4. Channel Catfish, Black Bass, and Fathead Minnows -
  - a) Unfertilized Ponds - 75 Catfish, 75 Bass, 2 lbs. Minnows per surface acre.
  - b) Properly Fertilized Ponds - 150 Catfish, 150 Bass, 2 lbs. Minnows/surface ac. If

you stock catfish and bass at the same time, be sure that either the catfish are larger than six inches or the bass are only one to two inches in size to prevent predation of the catfish by the bass.

5. For larger ponds (over 1 surface acre)-Channel Catfish, Bass, and Bluegills -

- a) Unfertilized Ponds - 50 Catfish, 50 Bass, and 100 Bluegills per surface acre.
- b) Properly Fertilized Ponds - 100 Catfish, 100 Bass, and 200 Bluegills per surface acre.

The local Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District is sponsoring a fish-pond stocking program at this time. Orders for fish are now being taken and the fish will be delivered sometime in late March or early April. The fish will be delivered to a central delivery point in Knox County where you can pick up your order and transport it to your ponds in a short period of time. The fish are guaranteed live delivery to pond if you transport them to your pond within two hours from the time you pick them up. The fish are also guaranteed to be healthy and free of parasites and disease. The district will provide the fish for you at a considerable savings from what it would cost you to travel and purchase them from a commercial fishery.

Fish that will be available and their prices include: 3-5 inch, Channel Catfish, \$.35; 6-8 inch, Channel, \$.65; 2-4 inch, Bass, \$.65; 2-4 inch, Bluegill, \$.35; Fathead Minnows, \$.65 per lb.

Some 1-2 inch Bass may be available at approximately \$.35 per fish. These smaller Black Bass (1-2 in.) are recommended if you are stocking bass with bluegills or catfish.

Orders are now being taken at the Knox City Soil Conservation Service office. The SCS will also help you determine how many fish you need for your pond. For more information contact the SCS at 1101 E. Main in Knox City or call 658-3526.

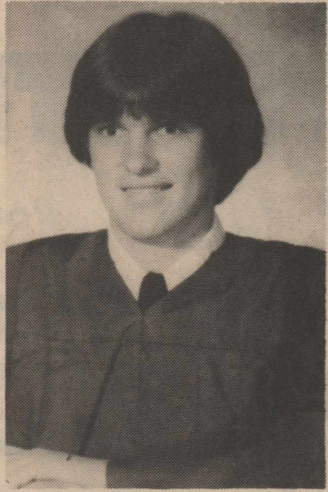


STEVEN LYNN
