## Filing Deadlines March 3, 9

Filing deadline for the city and school elections is right around the corner.

Wednesday, March 3, is the last day prospective candidates can file for either election. Deadline for the hospital election is Tuesday, March 9.

Three terms expire in the City of Knox City election including those of L.V. Worley, Celso Gonzales, and Larry Staggs. All incumbents have signed for re-election. Also seeking seats on the council are Dave Thompson and Greg Kuehler. Holdover city officials include Mayor Charles Auburg and councilmen Craig Williams and Carol Felts. City secretary said that any interested person could pick up the necessary form at City Hall before 5:00 p.m. next Wednesday.

In the school election, terms of Alex Godsey and Doug Meinzer are expiring. Meinzer had filed for re-election and also signing were Mary Ann Boone and Donnie Roberts. Any others who are interested in running for the position of trustee on the Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School Board may obtain the necessary form in the superintendent's office at Knox City. Holdover trustees include Henry J. Jones, J.B. Rutherford, J.M. Emerson, John Gillispie, and Allen McGaughey.

The terms of Richie Smith and Vernal Zeissel expire in the Knox County Hospital election. As of Tuesday morning, neither incumbent had filed for re-election. Holdover elective trustee is Greg Clonts while holdover appointive directors include Stanton Brown, Bernard Brown, Gaylon Hord and Terry Keener. Hospital administrator Randy Abernathy said that any person interested in filing must be 18 years of age or older, must be a registered, qualified voter of the district, own land subject to taxation by the district, and submit a petition to the secretary of the board Richie Smith in Munday. The petition must contain the names of not less than 25 qualified voters residing within the boundary of the hospital district. The petitions for the position may be picked up at Knox County Hospital.

### WTU To Increase Retail Rates

A settlement agreement allowing West Texas Utilities Company to increase its rates to retail customers has been approved by the Texas Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The new rates, which will average about 8.3 per cent above the old rates, were placed in effect on Friday, February 12. This action is in accordance with a stipulated agreement with all intervenors, including cities represented by the Texas Municipal League, WTU and the PUC staff.

The increase is designed to increase the Company's annual retail revenues by \$11.8 million. A wholesale rate increase of \$5.5 million, also settled by agreement and expected to be approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, would bring WTU's total annual revenue increase to \$17.3 million. The Company had applied for a total increase of \$32.2.

The effect on a residential bill for 600 kilowatt-hours of electricity per month would be slightly over 10 per cent. This would include the fuel cost adjustment. For 600 kilowatts at a residence, the bill would be \$37.89 under the new rates and \$34.39 under the old rates.

## All Risk Insurance Explained

When Congress decided to minimize crop disaster programs, it came up with what nearly everyone agrees is a better idea: a nationwide program of All-Risk crop insurance in which the government pays a substantial part of the premium for an insurance policy individual crop producers can tailor to their own needs.

The new insurance program, sponsored by USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), begins with this year's crops and is available through local private insurance agents.

According to Ross Smith, FCIC district director, farmers in Knox County can now obtain insurance coverage for cotton, grain sorghum and corn.

Smith explains that farmers can "customize" their insurance in a variety of ways. For one thing, starting this year, a farmer with documented yield history for at least three years can obtain a production guarantee based on past yields. Each farmer has a choice of carrying a policy that guarantees either 50 percent, 65 percent, or 75 percent of average yield. Each also can choose from three selections, the price to be paid for each pound or bushel that actual production on the farm falls below the guarantee.

Another choice involves hail insurance. By electing to delete hail and fire coverage from the All-Risk policy and carrying private hail and fire coverage instead, a farmer's premium for All-Risk insurance will be reduced accordingly. Or, if the maximum hail and fire

## MINUTES OF THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING

February 9, 1982

The City Council met in a regular session with Mayor Charles Auburg, Councilmen Celso Gonzales, Larry Staggs, Craig Williams and L.V. Worley present.

A letter from the Fire Department was discussed and ideas for acquiring a Fire Truck were discussed. The Council agreed to check into a Bond Election. The Mayor expressed his appreciation to the Fire Department for their efforts.

L.V. Worley made a motion to elevate Richard Ferguson to Chief of Police and to raise his salary \$50.00 per month. Craig Williams seconded the motion and all voted for it. The Council noted that Richard Ferguson has been allowing passengers in the patrol car and agreed that he should discontinue the practice.

Celso Gonzales made a motion to raise all full time, hourly wage employees 25 cents per hour. Larry Staggs seconded the motion and voted for it.

Larry Staggs made a motion and L.V. Worley seconded it to raise the City Secretary's salary \$50.00 per

month. All voted for the motion.

The Council was advised that Dr. Thompson's Clinic has been billing City employees' calls to the City. Although the employees pay their own bill his office staff was advised to bill only to the employee. Correct records will prevent possible problems.

L.V. Worley made a motion to appoint Carl Shelton as Election Judge. Craig Williams seconded the motion and all voted for it.

Larry Staggs reported that the Ambulance Service continues to operate well.

Larry Staggs made a motion to pass a resolution waiving the \$208.66 from the Knox City Housing Authority in lieu of taxes. L.V. Worley seconded the motion and all voted for it.

The Mayor advised that he will not be available for the March 9 meeting and the Council agreed to meet March 2.

Craig Williams made a

motion to adopt Ordinance No. 1090 assessing a 15% penalty on collection of delinquent taxes. Larry Staggs seconded the motion and all voted for it. The Council agreed to change the McCreary, Huey and Veselka contract date from February 1 to May 1.

The meeting was adjourned.

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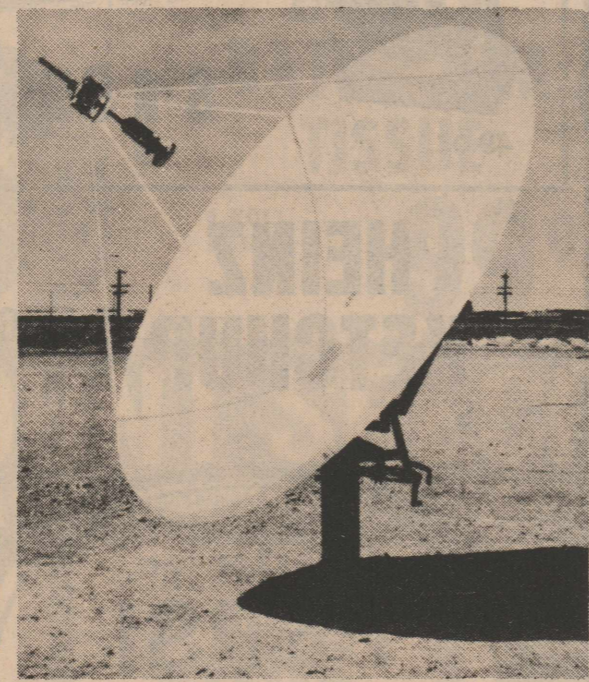

## Conference To Aid Farmers Set March 9

BY CHARLES SIEPEL  
County Extension Agent

Changes in agriculture present threats for some farmers and opportunities for others during 1982, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service warn. In either case, they caution, these changes will effect how farmers fare not only in 1982 but in years to come.

Suggestions for ways to make the most of these changes will be presented during a special one-day program at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, March 9, at the Fair Park Auditorium, three blocks north of the Childress County courthouse.

The program, "Profitable Decision Making in 1982," is especially tailored to the needs of Knox County producers. A panel of Extension

educators will spend the day addressing real-world problems of farming and ranching. They will cover farm policy, production and financial decisions, and marketing alternatives.

Policy and marketing trends will be examined by Dr. Ron Knutson, economist and policy and marketing specialist; Dr. Roland Smith, economist and marketing specialist; and Dr. Carl Anderson, economist and cotton marketing specialist. Knutson will discuss implications of the 1981 farm bill. Smith will discuss marketing outlooks for wheat, and Anderson will look at cotton prospects.

The relationship of production and financial decisions will be covered by Dr. Wayne Hayenga, farm management economist. He will offer some suggestions on ways to stretch credit, evaluating risk position, trade-offs between income and survival, crop insurance, spending money to make money, selecting the best crop from the standpoint of profit and risk, and the implications of such choices for the farmer, the landlord and the banker.

A dutch treat barbecue lunch will be served at noon for \$5.

Farmers and ranchers in Knox County have demonstrated their ability to produce. Their ability to survive in today's economy will depend upon their success in management and marketing. This conference is designed to help our producers in these critical areas of management and marketing.

protection is wanted, a farmer can purchase private insurance to supplement the coverage provided by the All-risk policy.

To make All-Risk insurance as affordable as possible, Smith points out that the federal government pays up to 30 percent of the premium. The balance, which is paid by the farmer, is a tax-deductible business expense. This further reduces the net cost of carrying insurance protection. In addition, discounts--ranging from five percent of the premium, after one year, to as high as 50 percent of the premium--are given to policyholders with few or no insured losses.

Knox County farmers desiring information about the insurance options available to them and what various levels of protection would cost should contact their local insurance agent.

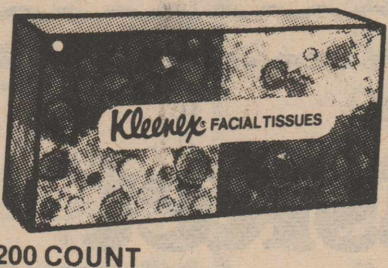

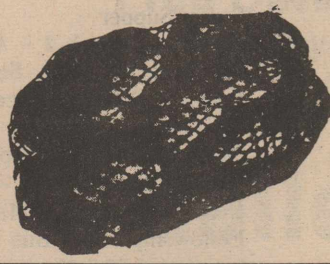

MOTION was made by Lee Patterson, seconded by Bobby Roberson to place in the Minutes of the Court that it is the County's policy to provide equal opportunities and not to discriminate against any person with regard to employment decisions, and it is the County's policy to locate and construct facilities financed with Revenue Sharing Funds in such a manner as to avoid discrimination in the use of those facilities. All voted in favor of this motion.

MOTION was made by Lee Patterson, seconded by Billy Johnston to set the salary of the Justice of Peace, Precinct #4 at \$2,425.20 per year, \$202.10 per month. ALL voted in favor.

There being no further business to come before the Court at this time, upon Motion by Bobby Roberson, seconded by Lee Patterson, this meeting was adjourned, with all voting in favor.

### Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — There are few programs that exemplify the proper use of minimal federal funds to encourage maximum accomplishments better than programs designed to serve senior citizens.

In early December of last year, I received a letter from a constituent critical of some of these programs, which prompted me to contact my District Advisory Committee on Aging. I rely on this group for guidance in matters concerning senior citizens. I was so impressed with the overwhelmingly positive nature of their comments and the many insights these individuals were able to offer about these programs, that I wanted to share some of these thoughts.

The group addressed critical comments ranging from an exclusive "social club" attitude of the senior citizen center in her county, to discrimination, inadequate contributions by financially able participants and the suggestion that federal funding should not be continued.

Virtually every response I received from the advisory committee enthusiastically espoused the value and worthiness of these programs. Although it was stated in many different ways, all of the respondents agreed with the Fisher County member who said, "Many tax dollars are spent needlessly, but I feel such is not the fact in this program. It has in some way made a number of people productive who otherwise might have remained dormant."

A professional woman from Clyde explained, "Our main goals are to keep persons 60 years and over active in community activities, to be a resource in the community, instead of a liability. The reason that I so completely support

senior citizens centers is because they are preventive medicine."

Another Abilene professional explained further, "Older persons living alone frequently do not eat balanced meals and consequently their health begins to deteriorate. Hence, they are soon candidates for institutional care with all its escalating costs."

With regard to all income levels being able to participate, a Ranger man commented, "I do not believe the program was designed for low income only, nor should it ever become another form of welfare program. People in West Texas have a well developed sense of pride and many of the 'truly needy' would not participate if it were identified as a low income program. It would indeed be sad if the program were rewritten to promote further segregation of persons based upon their economic status."

Still another commented, "Indeed we want to be a 'social club,' but we add quickly that there are no restrictions for membership except for age."

The respondents did not try to claim the programs were perfect. "I suppose there will be abuses in all programs as long as human nature remains as it is. Certainly these should not be tolerated when brought to the attention of those in authority," mentioned another individual.

Numerous constructive suggestions focused primarily around sensitivity training for the directors, open discussions in the community about the purposes of the program, clearer understanding of program objectives by all administrators, and in general, greater community involvement.

It was encouraging and

heart-warming for me to hear about these many valuable programs being made available to our senior citizens. I believe many of us can join the Knox County woman who said, "I work with many senior citizens on other programs and I find that we owe them so much. Most of them have been taxpayers, leading citizens in their own communities and have set the cornerstones on which our country stands. Many of these individuals are now lonely, ill, depressed and heavy hearted. How can we afford to let them down?"

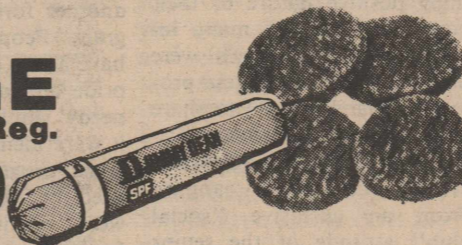

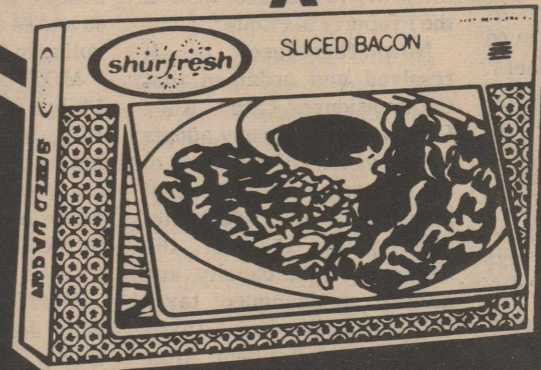
