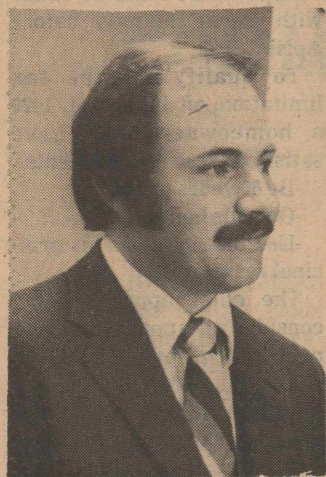

Roby Farmer Is Seeking 78th Seat

Steven A. Carriker, 31, of Roby has announced his intentions to run for the Democratic nomination for State Representative in the newly-created 78th district of Texas. The sprawling 78th district covers 12 counties of West Central and North-western Texas and include Cottle, King, Knox, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Scurry, Jones, Nolan, and rural Taylor, as well as Carriker's home county of Fisher.

A farmer and livestock producer, Carriker said in his announcement statement at a press conference in the Fisher County Courthouse last Thursday morning that people of the small towns and rural areas "need one of their own to stand up for them in the halls of government". He went on to say that although the state house is dominated by the large urban interests, that rural and small town people have an opportunity, due to the configuration of the new district, to elect their own candidate to the legislature.

Carriker called attention to the special problems faced by the schools, the agricultural and business communities, and the elderly of the 78th district and emphasized his desire to work for the often overlooked interests of those groups in Austin.

Carriker and his wife Kathy live on the family farm in eastern Fisher County. They have a six year-old son and are expecting their second child in May.

Texas Tech Honor Roll Announced

LUBBOCK--More than 2,200 students at Texas Tech University qualified for the deans' honor rolls in the university's six colleges during the 1981 semester.

Students making the honor roll included Kay A. Howell and Jay K. Rutherford, both of Knox City, and Angelia M. Reid of O'Brien.

To qualify for a dean's honor roll, a student must have a grade point average of 3.5 or more on a 4.0 scale and must have taken 12 hours or more of work.

Texas Tech has an enrollment of almost 23,000 students in six colleges including agricultural sciences, arts and sciences, business administration, education, engineering and home economics.

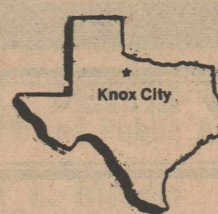

Brief Hail Storm Hits This Area

Several residents of Knox City and the surrounding area, who were in a tornado watch until 11:00 o'clock Saturday night, woke to hear a "whoshing" sound about 2:10 Sunday morning followed immediately by hard rain and hail for several minutes. Precipitation measured from .5 to .6 of an inch.

No damage was reported locally to the News office; however, Rule to the south of Knox City, reported high wind caused damages of between \$7,000 to \$10,000 to school property. Rule Superintendent Lavon Beakley reported to The Abilene Reporter-News that the early morning storm cut off power for about 90 minutes and sent debris through at least two homes, left its mark on several school buildings.

Strong winds blew down several telephone poles about six miles southeast of town near the Buster Lowrey farm. Buster reported that he had a water tank "just drop down" in his field while Buddy Angle, who farms the adjoining field, said he had half of a five-inch irrigation wheel standing straight up in his field as if it had been picked up by the winds and then dropped in his field.

Tornado season is definitely here and residents are reminded that two blasts of the fire siren indicate that persons should watch for approaching storms.

Each of the seven member band is an act within itself. In addition to playing any type instrument, the boys are unsurpassed in close vocal harmony.

Others booked so far to appear will include The Angle Sisters, who need no introduction to hometown folk; Don Caldwell, owner of Don Caldwell Studios who plays saxophone that absolutely charms the audience; Cecil Caldwell, no relation to Don, who is billed as the world's best-

dressed fiddle player and dances and jokes as he plays to the delight of the fans; and Jim Fullingham, the singing farmer from Petersburg who is one of the best gospel singers ever presented in this area.

Tickets will go on sale within a couple of weeks and with the numbered seats in the new auditorium, all seats will be reserved. Also, with the limited seating, it will be to everyone's advantage to secure their seats early.

In this way, elderly homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 homestead exemption, said Oscar Mangis, chief appraiser for the Knox County Appraisal District.

According to a law passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, over-65 homeowners who qualified for the school homestead "tax freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with

the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the home is located.

Application must be made with Oscar Mangis before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1, 1979 a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

- Be 65 years or older
- Own his home
- Use that home as his principal residence

The chief appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the chief appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 over-65 homestead exemption. No refunds of taxes paid will be given for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted

Knox City and adjoining rural areas, March 25-12:30-2:30 p.m. at Knox County Aging Service Center.

Participants will be required to register, giving their name and address. Priority will be given to the elderly and low income, as long as it lasts during the designated hours, officials said.

WTU Is Granted Interim Rate Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has been granted an interim rate increase for power sold to its wholesale customers.

The increase was approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, effective February 26, 1982, and will remain in effect until final resolution of a rate ap-

plication filed last October by WTU.

The interim rates granted will result in an increase of \$3.5 million, or 8.1 per cent, annually from 14 rural electric cooperatives, one municipality, and one investor-owned distribution system.

In its application, WTU had asked for a \$4.3 million increase to become effective December 15, 1981. The FERC initially suspended this increase for five months, which would have delayed the effective date of the new rates until May 16, 1982. Granting the interim rates has the effect of shortening the suspension period and allowing lower rates to go into effect subject to refund.

The FERC decision follows closely the increase in retail rates granted by the Public Utility Commission of Texas effective February 12. Together, the increases are expected to provide an additional revenue of \$15.3 million on an annual basis, with \$11.8 coming from retail customers and \$3.5 from wholesale customers. The original cases filed by WTU were designed to produce \$32.2 million in additional revenues.


