

Cattlemen Contribute To Rehab

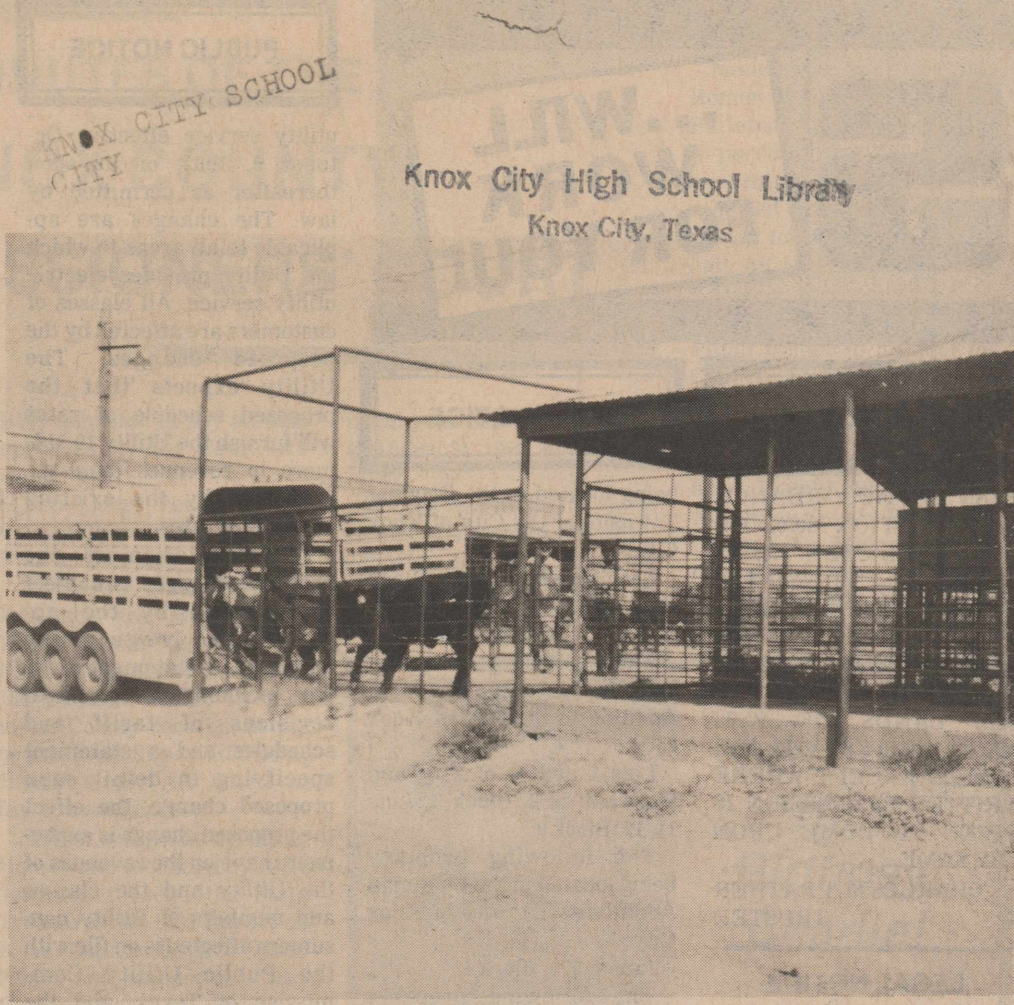

Bloodmobile To Be Here October 19

On Tuesday, October 19, residents of Knox City and the area will have the opportunity to help maintain the supply of blood and blood products needed by patients

in our regional hospitals.

The Red River Regional Red Cross bloodmobile will be at the First Christian Church from 1:30 to 6:00 p.m.

Each weekday, the bloodmobile and center must collect 95 units of blood to supply the needs of the patients in 43 hospitals in this region. It is used by children and adults with a long list of medical problems including leukemia, cancer, anemia, kidney and liver disease, trauma cases as well as those undergoing open heart surgery.

Persons in good general health and between the ages

of 17 and 66 years old, willing to take about one hour of their time to be volunteer blood donors, enable the Red Cross to supply these needs. There is no other source of this vital, life-giving fluid.

The need for an anesthesia machine, along with the per-

tinent accessories including a ventilator and its accessories, was cited by hospital administrator Randy Abernathy and anesthetist Bill Nemir at last February's monthly meeting when members voted unanimously to purchase a machine with a monitor and readout feature. Costing approximately \$14,000.00, it has been described as the "Cadillac"

of anesthesia machines, and hospital officials were extremely pleased with the equipment.

Other funds derived from the West Texas Opry sponsored in May by the auxiliary, as well as the many memorials to the organization, have made it possible to take care of the note payoff in this length of time, Mrs. McGaughey said.

The contribution of items to the Thrift Shop, the memorials to the auxiliary, and the volunteer help combine to make the auxiliary successful in its purchase of needed equipment for the hospital, Mrs. McGaughey explained.

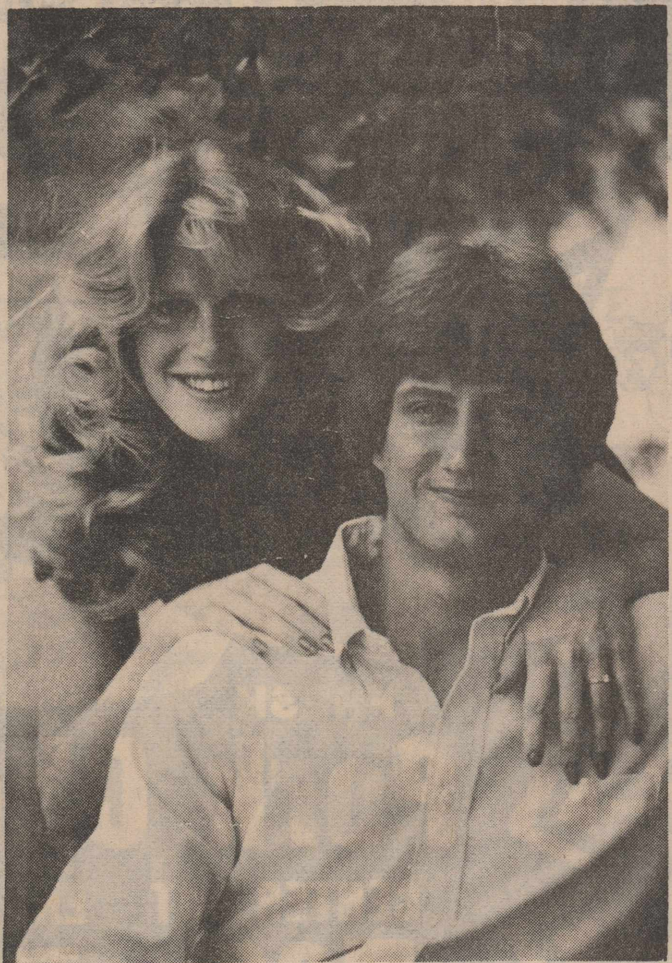
Former Resident Dies In Dallas

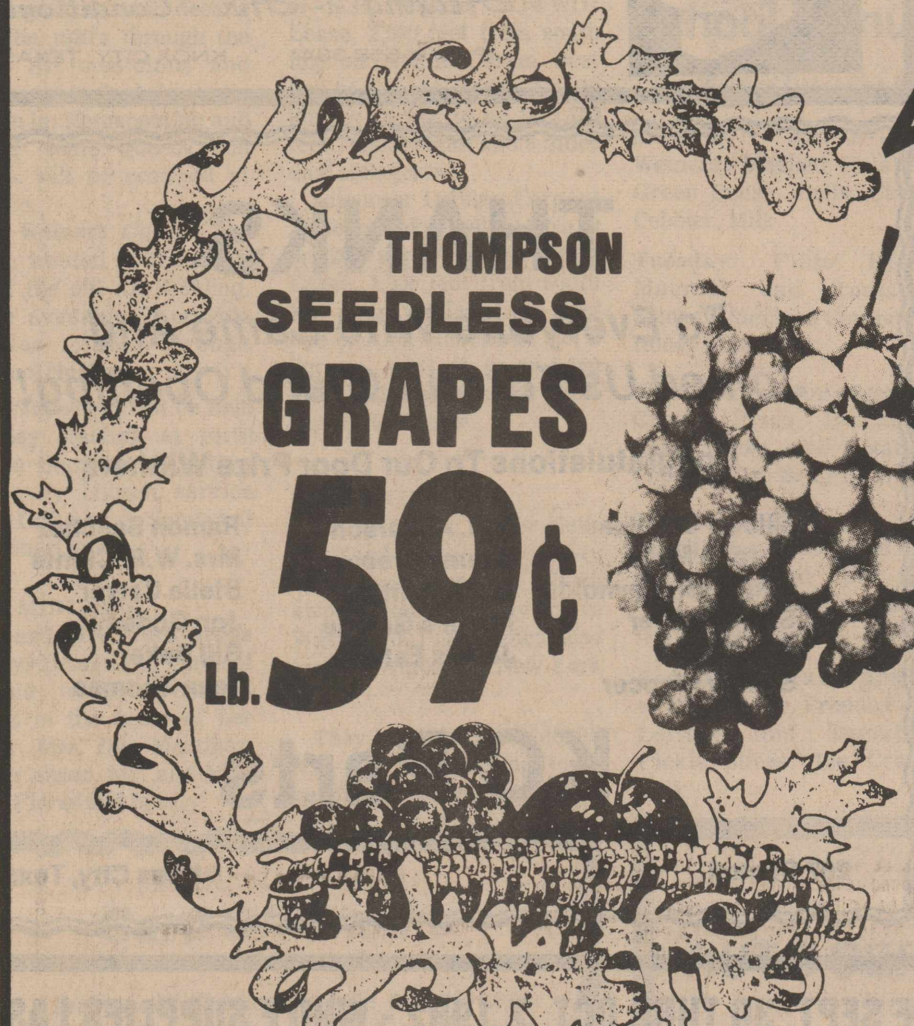

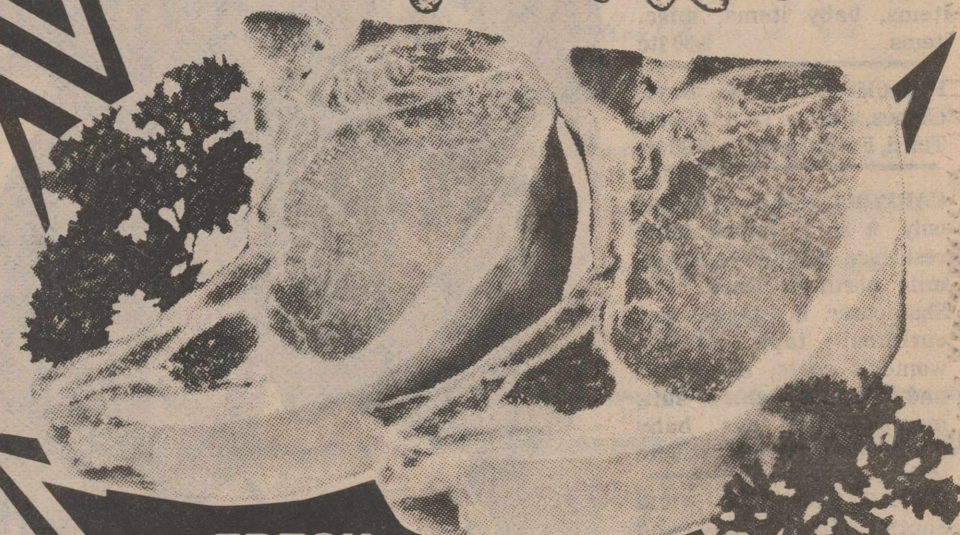

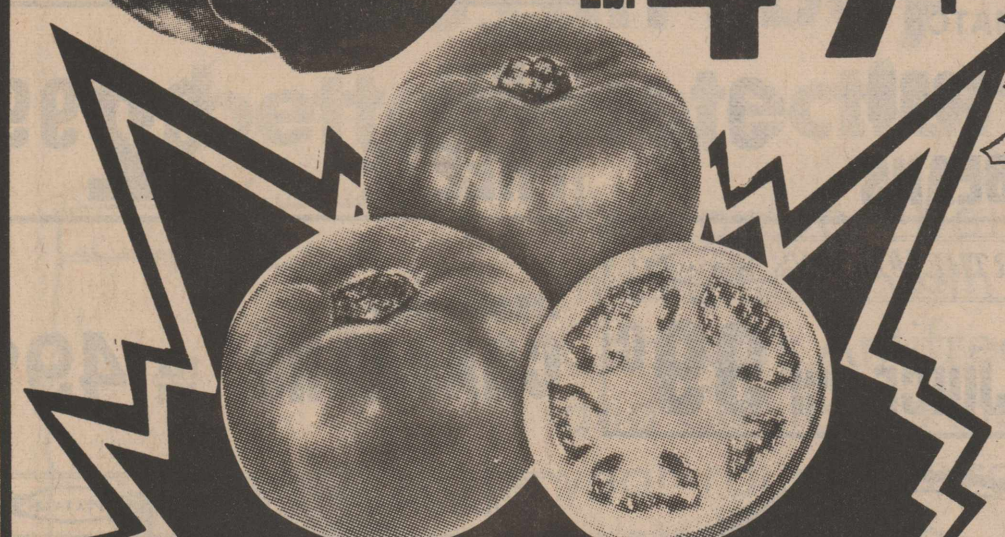

With the dove season here again, General Telephone is reminding hunters not to shoot in the direction of telephone lines and poles, according to W.C. Wells, general manager.

The warning and reasons given are timely and should be considered by every hunter.

A shot may disrupt telephone service and en-

danger many people who depend on their telephones during an emergency. Damaged communications lines often do more than disrupt weekend plans, it was pointed out.

The lines may be carrying emergency messages which guide planes, serve radar tracking stations or connect several missile sites.

Just remember: Each minute a telephone is out of order the safety of many people may be threatened, which is reason enough not to shoot birds on telephone lines or poles.

There is another reason not to shoot at a bird on a telephone line or in the direction of a line: It is against Federal and State laws that prohibit any action to disrupt communications.

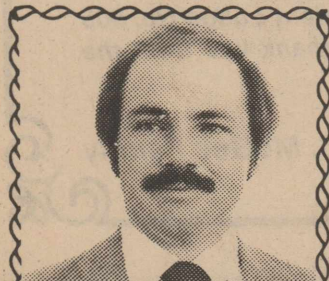

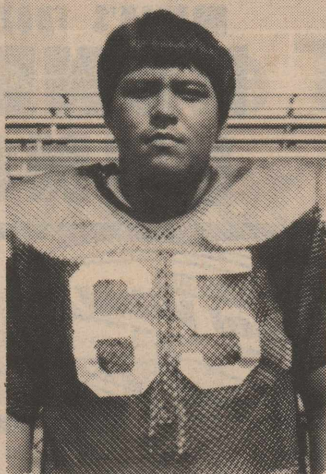


