## WTC goals plan widened

This year marks a new approach to long-range planning at WTC, and the process is now three-quarters complete, according to Dr. Harry Krenek, WTC

president.

"We have always planned," he said, but "we are going through the most serious economic crisis the college has ever faced, and [there is a need for] more effective and efficient use of limited re-

sources."

The college is operating with almost a million dollars less in local revenue than it received in 1983, he noted. "We are not willing to give things up, we want to see progress," adding he felt a more structured approach to planning would help achieve that goal.

Krenek explained that the planning process has involved several stages and encompasses short-term goals for the coming year as well as long-term goals covering the next three to five years.

Goals for several divisions are detailed in this issue of "The Texan," with remaining division goals to be profiled in an upcoming issue.

Beginning last September department heads and faculty members devised specific goals for each department. These were submitted to division chairpersons who in turn submitted division goals to the administration.

Krenek noted that the goals are currently undergoing evaluation by the administrative staff. The next step in the process will be conducted at an administrative retreat to be held in May. At that time the administrative staff and division chairpersons will review goals and come up with "our priority objectives," he explained.

Goals will be incorporated into a proposed budget, a typical procedure, he said, but this year the goals and objectives should be much more specific and defined. "The budget is your educational plan expressed in dollars," he added.

The final step in the planning sequence will occur this summer when the budget and goals are presented to WTC's board of trustees. Krenek said he expects active input from board members

## WTC sign vandalism prompts new direction

With the WTC entrance sign being vandalized twice in one school year, college officials have decided to switch to an entirely different sign, one "less susceptible to damages," according to President Dr. Harry Krenek.

The new entrance sign will be made of metal and will feature the WTC logo designed by painter-artist Kenny Miller and now displayed on the College Ave. billboard. Welding instructor Sam Walker will make the new sign, which will be lighted at night.

The decision to replace the sign was made because of the repeated vandalism occurrences which cost up to \$600 to fix. The latest incident occurred during spring break.

Krenek stressed he did not think that WTC students were responsible for the damage. Last fall, beer bottles were apparently thrown into it, breaking the cutout wooden letters which spelled "Western Texas College."

## Speed enforcement 'on hold' for present

## WTC Pops concert will expand to 3 performances, first April 26

The WTC choir and drama department's second annual Music Review-Pops Concert will expand from two to three performances this year and is slated Thursday, April 26, through Saturday, April 28, in the Fine Arts Theater.

Tickets will go on sale April 23 at the Fine Arts Theatre box office. Prices for the Thursday night performance will be \$4 for adults, \$3 for students and \$2 for WTC students. Prices for Friday

and Saturday will remain the same, with the exception of WTC students paying \$3.

Music instructor Brent Hardegree said, "Last year was the first year for the concert and we had to turn away people wanting to buy tickets. We held the concert over one extra night this year to allow more people to see the show. People will need to get tickets as early as possible."

The show will consist of songs performed by the WTC choir and collegiate singers groups, and other songs performed individu-

ally or by small groups by choir students.

"After we have finished rehearsals for the musical part of the show, Jim Rambo (drama instructor) and his students will produce skits, dialogue and costumes to add continuity to the show," Hardegree said.

He noted other concerts and recitals still planned this spring also.

## Communication, Letters Division sets goals for English, mass communications, other areas

Since November of last year, the Communication and Letters Division of WTC has been setting goals to improve the quality of education offered its students. Dr. Ed Barkowsky, chairman of that division, believes that all of the goals will be reached.

"I feel that they are all going to succeed, I have a splendid department to work with and they'll go through with their goals," he said.

The Communication and Letters Division includes the departments of English, foreign language, mass communications, reading, philosophy and religion.

Barkowsky said that the project began with individual instructors stating goals they would like to see accomplished in their departments. The goals were ultimately reviewed by Bettie McQueen, Dean of Instruction, and then division chairmen met in December to discuss the plans.

Mrs. McQueen has consolidated and prioritized all of the goals in order for Dr. Harry Krenek, president of WTC, and the administrative council to review and discuss them. In May,

all who submitted goals will meet to form a plan to accomplish those deemed most worthy based on both a short-term and long-term basis.

Barkowsky said, "It involves virtually everyone on campus."

Some of the general goals for the English Department are to prioritize financial resources within the department; to revise instructional material in developmental English for individual labs; to expand the reading program; and to track former English students as they move on to four-year schools.

Barkowsky said, "We hope to be able to start producing our own instructional material rather than rely on outside sources because lab material tends to be expensive."

He also said that there has been several things discussed that are tied to budget and financing.

The English department is interested in unifying teaching assignments for all English teachers. Barkowsky said the purpose is to create a system so that the "student expectation" for all teachers is the same.

The plan to "track" former English students is to evaluate

how the staff can improve certain areas of study.

Barkowsky said, "We're going to develop a system of researching the progress of our English students as they enter full-time college classes."

He said the reading program also needs to be expanded in order to accommodate the growing number of students. This need is linked to state-mandated TASP requirements and WTC's own developmental class program.

"We have a real space problem with the reading program. Our developmental reading classes are simply overloaded."

Another goal is to strengthen the relationship between the WTC instructors and area high-school teachers, noting this goal has already begun.

The WTC English staff and area high-school teachers recently conducted a workshop and plans are to continue this every semester. "This is exciting when they invite us to speak and consult with them."

Barkowsky also said that there is a need for more equipment and classrooms in the mass communications area.

He said he believes all of the goals are within the finances of the school and the division will simply rely on the administration to supply funding for them.

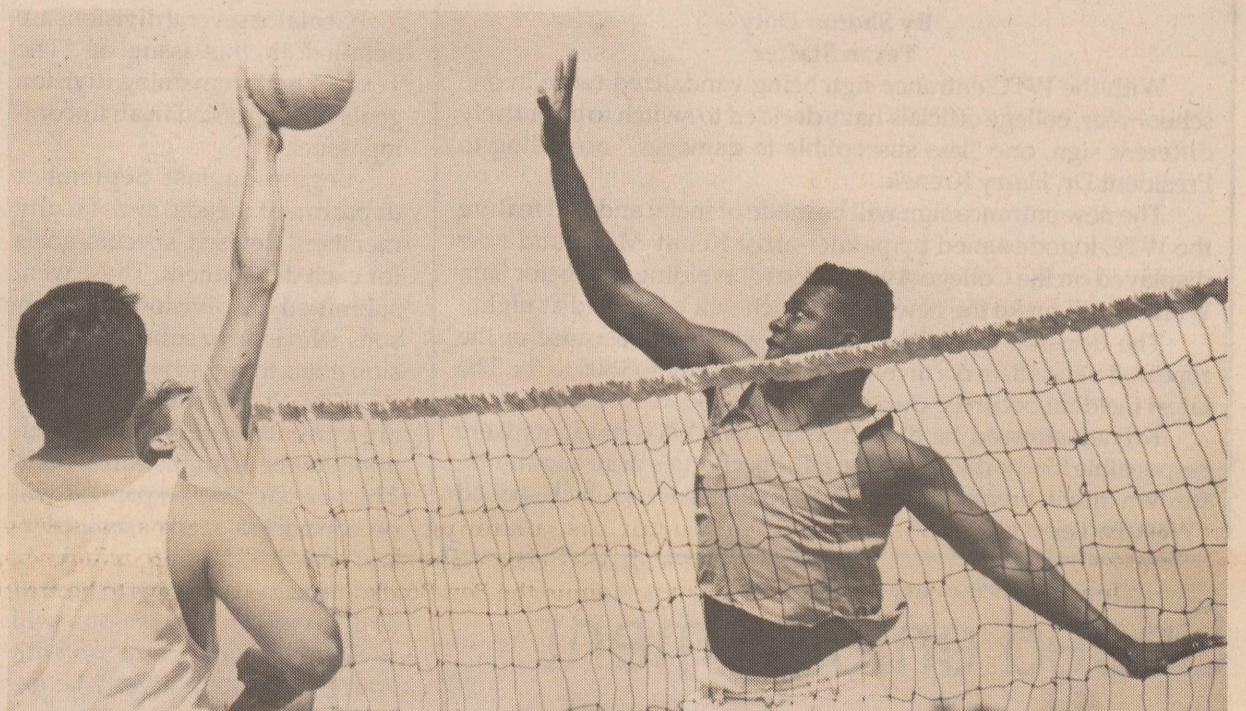
Barkowsky said, "Any development that we have so far, we're not talking about huge expenditures."

He also said, "The goals we've set so far are not wonderfully expensive, except in the case of physical expansion, the goals are conservative."

## Meat judges gain several awards as contest season draws to close

The WTC meats judging team ended the year by winning eighth place overall in the intercollegiate meat judging competition at the Houston Livestock Show during the weekend of Feb. 25-26.

Brent Atkinson from Patton Springs took seventh place overall, winning third in beef judging and 10th in port judging. Mark Faulkenberry from Snyder was second high individual in lambs and Shad Cox from Hobbs, N.M. was ninth high individual in beef judging.

The team placed sixth overall at the National Western Livestock Show in Denver held in January. This was the major national competition for meats judging.

On Feb. 14, the team competed in Fort Worth at the Southwestern Livestock Show and won fifth place overall.

Faulkenberry won first place in lamb judging and 10th high individual in the contest. He was also sixth in placings and seventh in questions.

Derrick Bruton from Frankston was seventh in the overall contest, second high individual in beef grading, fifth high individual in total beef judging and 10th high in placings.

Benny Cornett from Sweetwater was 10th high individual in pork judging.

Out of the 14 teams in the competition, WTC was seventh

in beef grading, fifth in lambs, fifth in pork, fifth in beef and third in placings to give them fifth place in the overall contest.

The team was in Sweetwater Feb. 21 for the National Southwestern Hampshire Meat Hog Conference, winning first place in the swine-judging competition. In addition, WTC had the top three high-placing individuals at the event.

Individual winners were Marc Faulkenberry, Shad Cox and Derrick Bruton.

Shad Cox was third in lambs and seventh in the overall contest. The team was third in total placings, fifth in grading, fourth in lambs and pork and sixth in beef.

Last fall the team finished second in a competition at Garden City, Kan. The team was first in beef grading, third in questions and fourth in placing.

Marc Faulkenberry was high individual on the team and finished third in the overall

contest. He tied for high individual in beef grading and was seventh in questions.

Derrick Bruton was third high individual in beef grading.

Shad Cox was ninth in beef grading and Michelle Cox of San Angelo was 10th in beef grading.

Quenna Shurbet of Seymour judged as an alternate and was fourth high individual among the alternates.

The team won fifth place overall at the Excel High Plains Meat Judging contest held in Plainview during the fall.

The WTC team was first in lamb judging, second in questions, fourth in beef judging and sixth in pork judging.

Shad Cox was third high overall, fifth in beef grading and sixth in lamb judging.

Derrick Bruton was the high individual in lamb judging and Michelle Cox was seventh high individual in lamb judging.

The team is coached by Jim Judah.

## Art emphasizes 'creativity' as goal

The WTC Fine Arts Division's goals for the years ahead are to improve and to strengthen the quality of the areas which are now available.

The division includes art, speech-drama and music. The goals have been established as part of a campus-wide planning effort.

John Gibson, division chairman and art instructor, said he and Ty Brunson, art instructor, are planning to have the art and ceramics classes expanded. They are making three classes out of their regular two.

They also hope to offer more areas of instruction such as sculpture and glass blowing classes.

In addition, they plan to move

night classes to a daytime schedule which will last twice as long. They will retain some night classes, Gibson noted. "What we really want is to strengthen the areas we already have."

James Rambo, drama and speech teacher, said he hopes to emphasize "even more quality" in WTC's play productions.

He wants to give all his students the knowledge of what it takes to put on a production, he said.

His main goal is to do "something new and exceptional," noting he wants the WTC drama productions to be on a competition level comparable with four-year schools.

Jan McCathern, speech instructor, is planning on additional speech classes. She also plans to continue the Ben Brock

Memorial Speech Tournament held each spring.

The tournament, held last month, had a large turnout with more than 275 students representing about 35 schools attending.

Brent Hardegree of the music department has plans to expand his Collegiate Singers. There are nine members of the group which are considered the "best" of students enrolled.

He noted the group is important because it can perform in areas of limited space where the Concert Choir, made up of 30 singers, cannot.

Hardegree plans to "get on the road" more so that the groups can be seen by more of the public.

Gibson sums up the Fine Arts Division's goals by saying the faculty is trying to find new and exceptional ways to be creative.

## Occupational Ed sets goal to pace new technology

Jerry Dennis, chairman of the Occupational Education Division, said his department's main goals include making improvements to keep up with technological advances in the auto and diesel mechanic fields and welding.

The planning is part of a campus-wide program involving all of WTC's seven educational divisions.

Goals for auto mechanics include changes in the types of programs and degrees offered to students.

He said, "We want to create new classes, maybe in one-year or six-month programs, for students in specialized training."

More auto shops have specialized areas for automobile repair, he noted. "We want to design programs that the students can learn in so that they can enter one or two specialized areas without having to learn everything before they can get a job."

Purchasing new equipment and tools were goals for the welding division.

"Automobiles, planes and other things made of more exotic metals. These take special kinds of welders, and we hope to buy equipment to teach students how to weld these new kinds of metals."

Teaching students electronic fuel injection was the main goal for the diesel mechanics division.

"Within the next five years, almost all diesel transportation will be electronically fuel injected. We hope to start classes teaching students everything this involves by 1992.

He concluded that most of the goals for his division could probably be met.

"Most of our goals were pretty reasonable. If they don't work out, we'll change them. We'll set and make smaller goals over a shorter period of time which, in time, will accomplish our longer range goals.

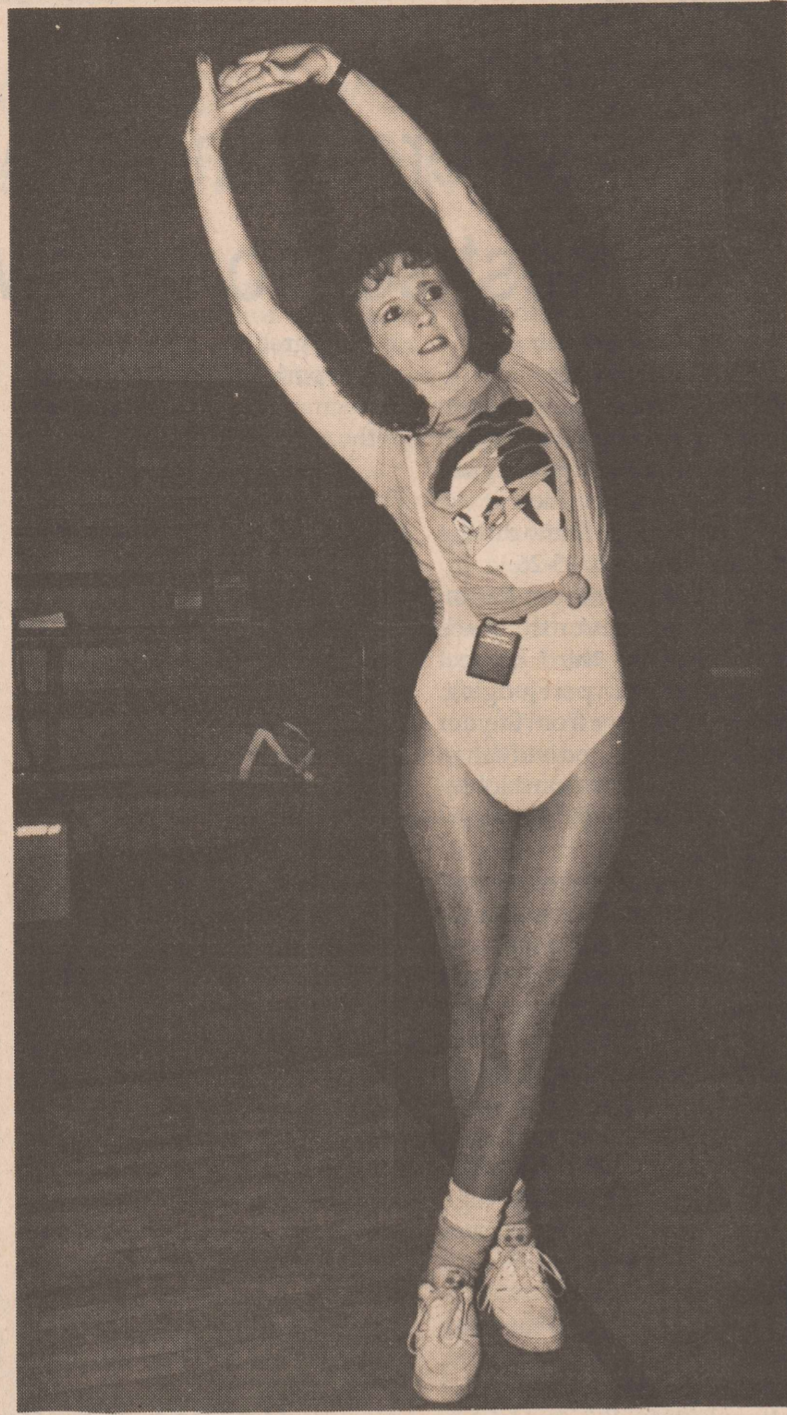

Odessa beat McLennan in the finals of the men's tournament as the Region V National Junior College Athletic Association tournament was held in Snyder Mar. 6-10.

The tournament pitted the best from the Western and Northern JuCo Conferences.

The championship game for the men saw Odessa stay with their long range shooting and McLennan rely on inside strength.

The outside guns proved to be the best weapon as Odessa hit nine 3-pointers and defeated McLennan 90-71 to advance to the national tournament in Hutchinson, Kan.

The men's first round placed Odessa vs. Hill, TSTI vs. Howard,

NMJC vs. McLennan and South Plains vs. Grayson.

Odessa blasted the No. 2 seed from the North, Hill, 81-62 in the first men's game. The next game saw 5th ranked Howard with its No. 1 ranked offense in the nation destroy TSTI 115-86.

New Mexico JuCo lost their game against McLennon 95-87 and became the first team from the West to loose in the first three days.

The final game of the day placed South Plains against Grayson. Grayson played a good game but South Plains outlasted Grayson 76-65.

The second round placed McLennan vs. Howard. McLennon relied on good coaching and clutch baskets to defeat nation-

ally ranked Howard College 89-88.

Howard blew an 8-point lead in the last three minutes to let their hopes of a national championship slip away. The second game found South Plains playing Odessa. Odessa relied on long range shooting, hitting eleven 3-pointers to defeat South Plains 72-67.

South Plains was victorious over the Odessa College team in the women's finals of the Region V National Junior College Athletic Association tournament played here Mar. 6-10.

The tournament pitted Western and Northern JuCo Conference teams.

Representing the West in the women's tourney were Frank Phillips (25-2), Howard College (26-4), Odessa College (24-6) and South Plains (23-6).

Representing the North were Grayson College (30-1), which was ranked 5th in the nation, Hill College (11-16), McLennan College and Cisco Junior College.

The first round of the tourney placed South Plains vs. Grayson. South Plains failed to be intimidated by the high ranking of Grayson as they defeated the Lady Vikings 62-58.

The second game of the day matched Frank Phillip vs. Hill College. Hill proved to be no match for the Lady Plainsmen as

they dominated Hill 94-68.

The next game saw Howard defeat McLennan, but at a high cost. Howard lost their star freshman, Kim Robinson, in the first half with ligament damage to her right knee. The final was 87-81.

The last game of the day placed Odessa College vs. Cisco Jr. College. Cisco dominated the entire game but a 12-3 run by Odessa in the second half proved to be the difference as Odessa won 87-81 and clinched an all Western Conference second round.

The second round of the Region V Tournament placed South Plains vs. Howard and Frank Phillips vs. Odessa. South Plains would be facing a Howard squad that was without the talents of the injured Kim Robinson, but Howard still had 6'1 post Shannon Lawson.

Lawson was shut down and conference co-MVP Sheryl Swoopes picked up South Plains as they defeated Howard 48-45. The second semi-final game saw Western Conference co-MVP Pat McDonald of Frank Phillips pour

in 27 points in a losing effort as Odessa pulled off some what of an upset 78-75.

The championship game was to be a hard fought battle as South Plains took on Odessa College. The game went down to the last seconds as Sheryl Swoopes put in two free-throws and a 3-pointer to rally from an 8-point deficit. The 3-pointer came with 37 seconds left in the game.

Odessa had a chance to win at the buzzer but an off-balanced jump shot proved to be an air-ball and South Plains won the game 58-57. South Plains automatically advanced to the NJCAA national tournament in Tyler.

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## Added PE facilities here are part of division goals

Expanded facilities and improvement of existing space and equipment are the main goals for WTC's Health and Physical Education Division.

The future planning is in response to President Harry Krenek's request for both short term and long terms goals from each of the campus' seven divisions. Lee Burke, chairman for HPE, said certain projects may be in place by the semester's end. In particular, he noted, class-

room 109 will be converted into a Universal Gym where one or two people can work out during the day.

"This is the room for those who want a little privacy in their workout," Burke said.

Also by the semester's end, a storage room will be converted into an aerobics room which will house stationary bikes, a manual treadmill and, if funds are able, a stair-climber exercise device.

The largest request made by the combined HPE Division was for a complete new building.

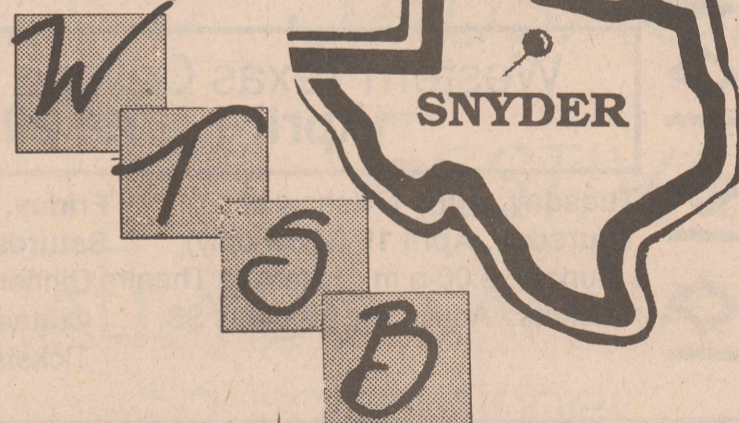
Burke reasoned that the existing facility houses class rooms, intramural athletics and such community activities such as the newly expanded weight room and aerobics classes. He said, "It gets real congested, so we all decided we need more space."

Other long term goals that were set included maintaining and increasing student enrollment by offering a variety of courses and promoting more community involvement by appealing to certain civic organizations, business and special groups such as policemen, firemen and Senior Citizens. Burke pointed out these goals hinge on the division acquiring more space.

Although some of the HPE projects will likely have to be delayed in favor of academic needs, a possibility which Burke said he "agrees with," he said he won't lose sight of the division goals. "We haven't thrown them away—they're still goals, it's just that we can't do them now."

## Freshmen labeled 'more conservative'

(CPS)—This year's freshmen are more conservative about drugs and drinking, more liberal about abortion and national policy issues, and more prone to hit the streets to demonstrate than their predecessors, a national survey of entering college freshmen found.

"While student attitudes seem to be moving in a more conservative direction on the issues of drugs and crime, their views on most other issues are changing in a decidedly liberal direction," concluded Alexander Astin, the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA) professor who directs the annual survey.

Along with the American Council on Education, Astin each year asks more than 200,000 students at 403 campuses around the country what they think about current issues and social problems.

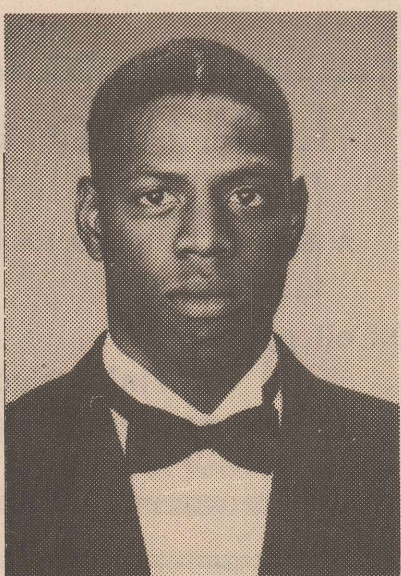
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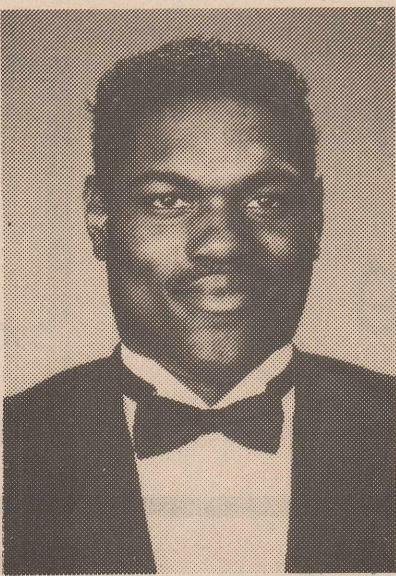

## Four athletes named to All-WJCAC cage squad

The All-WJCAC squad was announced following the end of the 1989-90 basketball season and a pair of men and women from WTC were on the team.

The Lady Dusters placed Bobbie Brown and Tami Wilson to the all-conference team while the Westerners placed Dominick Byrd and Kenneth Critton.

Brown is a 5'11" outside shooter from Jayton. She averaged 13.8 points a game and shot 52 percent from the 3-point range, leading the conference in that category.

Wilson is a 5'11" post who dominated both the offensive and defensive ends of the court. She scored 18.4 points a game while collecting 13 rebounds a game. She also led the conference in blocks with 4.3 a contest and led the Dusters in field goal percentage with a 57 percent mark.

Byrd and Critton battled each other for the leading rebounding spot all season and both ended with just over 10 a game.

Byrd, a 6'4" freshman, averaged 18 points a game and shot 63 percent from the line to put him in the Top 10 in both categories.

Critton, a 6'8" sophomore, will transfer to Washington State for his final two years.

Tony Joyce, who shot almost 40 percent from the line, was named to the honorable mention list.

# Additional staff, equipment needed

Additional teaching staff and equipment is the goal of WTC's Science Division, which includes the area of agricultural instruction and the operation of the college farm.

The science department, headed by Mike Otto, offers instruction in physics, geology, chemistry, biology, astronomy, botany and meteorology.

Otto noted the interest in these subject areas has created the need for an additional biology instructor. Science is now taught by Otto, Joe Carter and Marilyn Freemyer.

To better equip the science labs, the department is request-

ing a micro-TV camera along with an electronic balance. They also want additional skeleton models for visual aids.

In addition, he said the department is in need of a safer place to dispose of organic chemicals, which if kept for a prolonged period of time can become explosive.

Like the science department, staff with the agriculture department and college farm noted a need for an additional instructor. Current faculty members are Bob Doty and Jim Judah.

Another goal is to reinstitute the farm and ranch management program.

Equipment needs and added

classroom space were listed also for a stronger ag program. Equipment noted includes a gooseneck trailer, working chutes, shop and brush control devices, cattle scales, a farm tractor and a grain trailer.

Other goals were to provide weather-proof facilities for livestock labs, also facilities for judging contests, project shows and farm shows.

Lastly, the department is shooting for a long-term goal of building an indoor arena and a meat cutting lab equipped with a freezer, cooler, tables and cutting equipment to meet USDA requirements.

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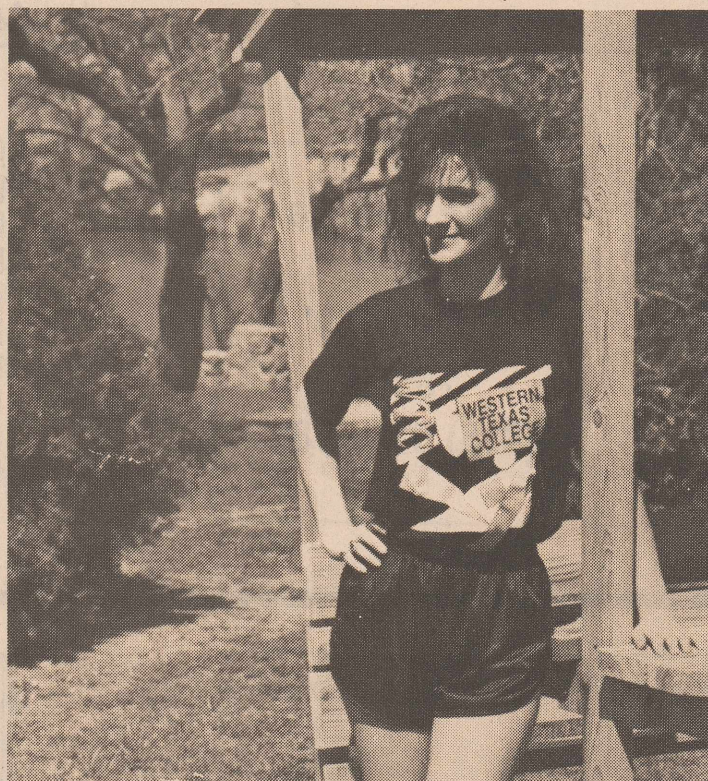
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## MUSIC REVIEW

Krenek commented that "the impetus [for more structured plans] came from an institutional self-study." These evaluations are conducted periodically and are followed up by a visit by an accreditation team, he explained. One of the recommendations made by such a team two years ago was a more formal planning process, he said, adding that WTC officials had intended to implement such a process anyway.

Krenek said many colleges hire a professional consulting firm to set up the initial planning program, which can result in a cost in excess of \$20,000. WTC is designing its own at a considerable savings. "We've never done this before," Krenek said, noting that revisions may be necessary in the future. "We will evaluate the process as well [as the goals]."

"Response has been excellent," Krenek said. This type of planning "involves many more people" and results in more ideas, he added, saying he felt some excellent goals had been proposed. "As an end result we have one objective: to make WTC a better place for students."

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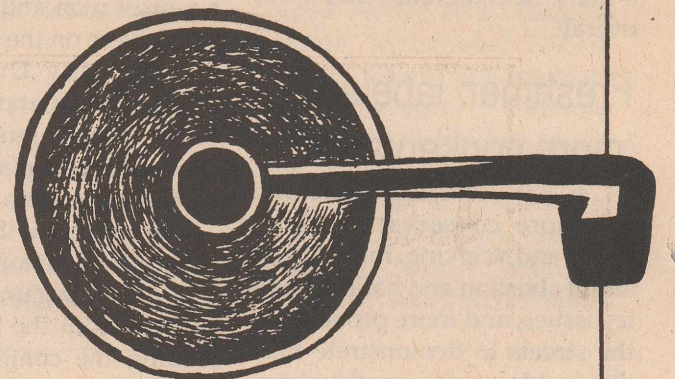
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
