Construction Begins On WTC Baseball/Softball Complex



If you build it . . .

Construction is now underway on the new baseball/softball complex to be built on campus in conjunction with the startup of the new athletic programs this fall. When completed, both fields will be regulation size according to NCAA and NJCA standards with shared concession and restroom facilities.

The teams will begin Division I conference play during the fall semester, with home games scheduled for Moffett and Cates fields for this initial season and moving to the campus complex by next year. The WTC Board of Trustees voted Monday to move forward on construction of the complex, which was initially planned as practice facilities for

"Our current timetable calls for having the grass in by Labor Day and the fields ready for practice and games by the second season," said WTC President, Greg Williams, adding "This is the first phase of construction with plans for expansion of the facilities in future years so we will have one of the best field situations in our conference." He also noted that the new complex in addition to the top-notch playing fields at Moffett and Cates would make Snyder more attractive for playoff games and tournaments in the area.

The college is working with the Lubbock architectural firm of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper in the design and planning of the complex. Other partners for the project include Scurry County, the City of Snyder, college staff, and local individuals and business owners who have expressed a desire to support and promote the new programs. This support has greatly affected the anticipated cost of building the complex, including clearing and grading and seeding and irrigation of the playing fields as well as installation of water and sewer lines by local staff and/or supporters at a discounted price, and donations of construction materials such as masonry and piping from local businesses.

During planning stages for the complex, Dean of Students Jim Clifton, who also serves as Athletic Director for the college, visited college ballfields in the Lubbock and Abilene

areas to get a better idea of what construction materials and equipment would be needed during this first phase. He noted that monetary and in-kind gifts have greatly benefited the new programs. "We wanted to look at the best features and most notable mistakes of other college ballparks so we can build a complex that is not only functional and comfortable, but is also a source of pride for the community that helped put it together.'

An announcement is expected later this month of a \$100,000 contribution to assist with the construction of the complex. The announcement of the donor will be made in conjunction with the kickoff of the second fundraising campaign, entitled "Keep the Ball Rolling." Another big boost came with the donation of pipe by Kinder Morgan for the construction of fencing and other facilities for the complex. College Trustee, Carolyn Barbee noted that other companies have indicated a willingness to donate pipe as well to assist with field construction.

Dr. Williams expressed his appreciation for the support that the college has received during the kickoff campaign and also noted that naming rights for the complex are still open for any donor contributing \$500,000 or more to the baseball and softball programs. Individuals may also support the programs by purchasing a chance on the 2002 Chevy S-10 truck to be given away during the annual July 4th celebration. Only 1000 chances are being made available at \$25 each, and with around 300 sold thus far, the odds are looking

As for the teams that will be playing on the new fields, recruiting efforts are paying off for both head coaches with around a dozen students from the Scurry County area already on the roster and others coming from as far away as California, Montana, Puerto Rico, and Brazil. Both baseball coach, James King, and softball coach, Rodney McNeil say they are optimistic about the way that their teams are shaping up and look forward to getting them on the field and getting ready to compete.


