Man points fake gun at campus: Police Chief placed on administrative leave after response falls short at school incident

The Tahoka Police Chief was placed on administrative leave by city officials last week after an incident near the Tahoka ISD elementary playground that involved a man pointing what turned out to be a fake rifle, but looked very realistic, at children and parents as children were leaving the school grounds. The response by Tahoka Police Chief Miguel Reyna left school officials baffled afterwards, although in the end no one was injured in the incident.

According to information from Dick Van Hoose, TISD Superintendent, school had just let out and children were leaving for the day, crossing the playground on the north side of the elementary campus to parents' vehicles parked on N. 4th Street, when a man came out of a stone house directly across the street from the playground, holding what appeared to be a rifle and pointing it at the children and parents on the playground.

"When teachers realized what was occurring, they rushed outside and hurried children to their parents, or brought them back inside the building," Van Hoose told The News. "The Tahoka Police were called, as well as the school security officer. By the time they, and I arrived, the man had gone back into his house. You could see through his windows that he was still inside, however. The Police Chief and another officer knocked on the front door of the home, but the man would not open the door. After standing outside the home for a while, the police then left the

scene," he said. The superintendent said that, at the time the police chief and his officer left the scene, there had been no determination as to whether the weapon the man had been holding was fake or real, and police had not spoken with the man because he would not answer the door.

The next day, police issued a mental health arrest warrant for the

man who lived at that location, An-, Hoose, Superintendent." tonio Baker, 27, and he was taken to a mental health facility in Lubbock. "Afterwards, a search by police

officers of Baker's home revealed several fake pistols and the fake rifle, all of which were made of plastic but looked very realistic," said Van Hoose, "The TISD security officer, Tom Tejeda, told me that even up close the rifle looked very real. It was all black, and there was no orange tip like you would usually find on a toy gun," he added.

"We will attempt to file charges of terroristic threat against this individual," the superintendent added."

The school district posted an "Important Notice" on social media on Thursday after the incident occurred, that read: "TISD Parents - I know many of you are concerned, as we all are, with a situation that occurred north of the elementary playground, today. I want to assure you that TISD is working in conjunction with local law enforcement to handle the situation in a legal manner. Safety of our students and teachers-is of highest regard and we are working toward that safety. Please continue to entrust to us the care and education of your children. - signed Dick Van

The following day, on Friday, city officials placed Chief Reyna on administrative leave, pending action by the Tahoka City Council. Tahoka Police Officer Jeff Parker was appointed as Interim Chief during this time, and the Council called a special meeting for Monday night, Feb. 18, with the sole agenda item listed as "consider and act upon terminating the Chief of Police."

However, Tahoka Mayor John Baker told The News about 1 p.m. Monday that Chief Reyna had indicated to him (the mayor) that he would resign his position as Chief of Police, and would bring his letter of resignation to city offices when they opened Tuesday morning (because the city offices were closed on Monday for Presidents' Day). With this information, the special meeting that had been scheduled for Monday night was canceled, Baker said. The city did receive his letter of resignation on Ruesday

"The City of Tahoka will open an application process to fill the position of Chief of Police, but in the interim Jeff Parker will continue to act as Interim Chief," Baker added.

Three contested races set in May 4 elections

The filing period for candidates interested in seeking places on city, school and hospital board elections in Lynn County ended Friday, with three of eight entities having enough candidates for contested races in the May 4 elections. The other five entities may cancel their elections, with no contested races to consider.

Those having contested races will be Wilson ISD, with five candidates for three trustee seats; O'Donnell ISD, with four candidates for three trustee seats; and the City of O'Donnell, with four candidates for two positions on the city

Filing for the three seats on the Wilson ISD Board of Trustees are incumbents Les Walker, Tracy Kendrick and Bonnie Schwertner, joined by candidates Oscar Ortega and J.J. Pena.

At O'Donnell ISD, incumbents Billy Edwards, Landon Mires and Melissa Pedroza are joined by candidate Simon Resendez Jr., seeking the three positions on the Board of

The four candidates filing for two city council seats in the City of, O'Donnell include incumbents Jessie Perez and Bruce Vaughn, and candidates Paul Hale and Katy (See MAY 4 ELECTIONS, page 2)



Both the City of Tahoka and Tahoka ISD have a full slate of uncontested incumbents who have all filed for re-election. For the City of Tahoka, Mayor John Baker sister. and council members Shiloh Braddock and Johnny Rosas are seeking re-election. At Tahoka ISD, incumbents Slate May, Joh Luna, Doug Green and Lea Swinford are seeking re-election for their seats on the Board of Trustees.

The three Wilson City Council incumbents whose terms are up are all seeking re-election. Pat Cages, Angela Taylor and Helen Stephenson are all uncontested in their bids to keep their seats.

County Hospital District Board study showed that listening of Directors have filed for another term seeking re-election. Both Mary Gayle Raindl and Manuel DeLeon are uncontested in this election.

All entities with uncontested races are eligible to cancel those elections, if they so choose.


Leona Sterlene Strickland





Also proposed is a new hunting season for javelina in six counties in the South Plains, to include: Borden, Dawson, Gaines, Hardeman, Scurry, and Terry counties.

The expansion of "doe days" from four to 16 days in 20 counties is being considered, to include: Bell (east of IH 35), Burleson, Delta, Ellis, Falls, Fannin, Franklin, Freestone, Hopkins, Hunt, Kaufman, Limestone, Milam, Navarro, Rains, Smith, Titus, Van Zandt, Williamson (east of IH 35), and Wood.





Another solar farm planned in Dawson County

Plans for the two-phase construction of another solar farm, which will be located both north and south of Lamesa, were revealed on Monday evening. Information about the proposed projects was part of the report provided by Sean Overeynder, executive director of the Lamesa Economic Development Corporation and Lamesa Economic Alliance Project, at the joint meeting of those two boards.

While no details have been made available about exactly where the solar farms would be located, he was told one farm would be about five miles north of Lamesa and the other would be about 15 miles south of Lamesa. The plans call for each of those farms to produce 285 megawatts of electricity for a total of 570 megawatts, which would make the combined solar farms the second largest facility planned in Dawson County. The ENGIE projects also would be only 80 megawatts less than the two solar projects currently planned for construction near O'Donnell in northeast Dawson County.

The two projects announced on Monday evening would be the sixth and seventh solar farms planned here, but only two of those projects actually have been completed at this time.

Plans still are in place for the construction of a 150-megawatt solar farm southwest of Lamesa about 5 miles west of Friendship Baptist Church, planned by Core Solar LLC.

Health department issues statewide measles alert

With seven cases of measles confirmed in Texas as of Feb. 7, the Texas Dept. of State Health Services has issued a Measles Health Alert for the state.

The measles cases have been confirmed in five counties with six cases in southeast Texas and one in central Texas. Those counties are Montgomery, Harris, Galveston, Bell and Denton. Five of those cases are in the greater Houston area.

Measles is highly contagious and is transmitted primarily from person to person by respiratory droplets and airborne spread, according to the DSHS. Persons are contagious from four days before onset of rash to four days after appearance of rash. The incubation period is about two weeks from exposure

The CDC recommends children get two doses of the measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine in order to be fully protected against measles. The first dose should be administered between 12 and 15 months of age, and the second between ages 4 and 6.

A growing trend to not vaccinate children, especially in Europe, is being blamed for the increase in measles cases, since measles was considered as having been eradicated in the U.S. in 2000.

Brownfield ISD to seek voter approval for \$40 million bond proposal

Brownfield ISD will ask voters in a May 4 election for a \$40 million bond to build a new high school and make safety improvements at other campuses. Planning and design work have begun for a new high school campus on land already owned by Brownfield ISD directly east of the current high school.

The bond will consist of six projects around Brownfield ISD, chief among them the construction of a new high school. Other projects include building secure entrances at each BISD campus, new playgrounds at Colonial Heights and Oak Grove, moving middle school to the current high school, adding locker rooms near the BHS tennis courts, and demolition of parts of the current middle school building.





