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

High winds cause havoc with 60+ mph gusts here

Strong thunderstorms rolled into the South Plains and Lynn County area Tuesday night, spawning brief heavy rains with intense lightning, some small hail in some areas, and high winds. The rains moved on east overnight, but the wind grew in intensity throughout the day on Wednesday, drying out the land and kicking up heavy dust storms on Wednesday afternoon, with sustained winds from the west/southwest over 30 mph and strong gusts in the 50-60+ mph range.

At O'Donnell, the wind speeds averaged 32 mph° on Wednesday, with a 62 mph gust recorded at 5:10 p.m., but a strong 82-mph downburst wind gust was also recorded during the thunderstorm Tuesday night, which may have been the culprit that caused damage to several warehouses and roofs, uprooting some trees and causing damage to powerline poles. The Compress and Farmers Coop Gin in O'Donnell reportedly had considerable damage to facilities, with sheet metal ripped from buildings and other damages. When the thunderstorms ripped

through O'Donnell Tuesday night it took down some powerlines, and the entire town was without electricity from about 10 p.m. Tuesday night until the power was restored at approximately 5:30 a.m. Thursday.



The power outage impacted a backup generator that operates the city's pump station, which caused a loss in water pressure for the City of O'Donnell, creating a boil notice for the drinking water. Lynn County Emergency Management Coordinator Bill Schoemann contacted Mayor Mark Roye to offer assistance, and he brought pallets of bottled water to the city offices, where city officials set up a water station at City Hall, free for citizens in need of drinking water.

Wind gusts peaked at 62 mph in the Tahoka area, recorded at 3:29 p.m. Wednesday, with an average windspeed of 30 mph from the west and southwest. In the New Home area, a peak gust of 67 mph was recorded at 3:17 p.m., according to the National Weather Service mesonet site. Some minor wind damage was reported throughout these areas, scattering tree branches and other debris.

Did you know? ... about Tornadoes

· A tornado technically is born when a funnel cloud touches down on the ground. Although tornadoes are more frequent in the afternoon, they can happen anytime, even at night. Tornadoes can occur almost anywhere in the world, but the United States is the country with the highest frequency of tornadoes.

 Texas has the highest average annual number of tornadoes in the US. An average of 132 tornadoes touch Texas soil each year.

 The deadliest tornado in history was the infamous Tri-State Tornado that occurred on March 18, 1925 and hit Missouri, Illinois and Indiana, causing 695 fatalities. The most tornado-prone city in

America is Oklahoma City, which has been hit by more than 100 over the years. · The biggest tornado in history

was the Hallam, Neb., tornado of May 22, 2004, which had a peak width of nearly 2.5 miles.

. The tornado with the fastest wind-speed ever recorded occurred near Bridge Creek, Okla. on May 3, 1999. It was measured at 302 miles per hour.



Citizens: Register your storm shelters with Lynn Co. Emergency Mgmt office

Lynn County residents who have storm shelters or safe rooms on their property are being asked to register these locations with the Lynn County Emergency Management Office (EMO).

"Many times a storm or an event happens in a community and the emergency responders are there to help with the recovery efforts looking for survivors. You can help with this effort by registering your address and cell numbers with the Lynn County Emergency Management Office, who will maintain a list of individuals that may have a storm shelter, safe room, or any other location on a property that is used as a shelter. This information will assist the emergency responders in a quicker response with rescue, medical services and recovery," said William Schoemann, Emergency Management Coordinator.

"This list will only be maintained for emergency response use and will be updated by the EMO," he explained. "If you wish to have

Tornado sirens to be tested at 11:30 Friday

In preparation for the upcoming severe weather season, the City of Tahoka will be testing its emergency warning siren system at 11:30 a.m. Friday, March 22. The city's tornado siren, when it sounds, will have a series of multiple short bursts, which is different than the one long burst for a fire.

If citizens hear the tornado siren during severe weather, it is an indication that the presence of a tornado exists, and citizens should take shelter immediately.

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



Remember to Render! **Taxable property renditions** are due April 1 or April 15.

Does this apply to you?

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, such as the equipment or inventory owned by a business, it does.

What is a rendition?

A rendition is a report to your county appraisal district that lists all of the taxable property that you owned or controlled on Jan. 1 of this year. This often applies to furniture, fixtures, equipment or inventory owned by a business.

What are the advantages of filing?

- You give your opinion of your property's value.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address.
- · If your property's value depreciated, you can file a report of decreased value.

What is the deadline?

- · For most property types, renditions' must be filed with the appraisal district after Jan. 1 and no later than April 15. Different deadlines apply in certain appraisal districts. A property owner may apply, in writing, for a mandatory extension to May 15.
- Rendition statements and property reports for property located in an appraisal district in which one or more taxing units exempt freeport property under Tax Code Section 11.251 must be delivered to the chief appraiser no later than April 1. A property owner may apply, in writing, for a mandatory extension to May 1.
- Different deadlines apply for regulated properties.
- . The chief appraiser may extend the deadline another 15 days for good cause shown in writing by the property owner for each type of property.

REMEMBER!!

Filing is your responsibility. If you render late, don't render, or file an incomplete or false rendition, you may face a 10 to 50 percent penalty.



> Water samples are also collected as an extra service to those participating in the program. HPWD is able to check Total Dissolved Solids (TDS), chloride, and pH levels of groundwater. It is important to understand water chemistry since it impacts the efficient use of supplemental nutrients applied to crops.

All this information is used to better understand the groundwater conditions in aquifers within the HPWD service area.

For example, the 2018 program participants' well data reveals an average depthto-water of 225 feet and an average flow rate of 108 gallons per minute. The average amount of irrigation water applied in 2018 by program participants was 15.2 inches for corn,15 inches for silage, 11.3 inches for cotton, and 5.7 inches for wheat.

All information gathered from each site is shared with program participants. Several producers have said the data has helped them better understand their irrigation system's performance.

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
