Jury trial returns 'not guilty' verdicts in sexual assault of child case

A jury trial held in 106th District Court in Tahoka last week resulted in two "not guilty" verdicts for the defendant in a sexual assault of child case here, after two days of trial proceedings.


Matthew Arcos, 41, was found not guilty on two counts of sexual assault of a child ("child" defined

from charges on April 3, 2016. The jury returned a verdict of not guilty on Count 1, for causing sexual organ of child to contact the mouth of the defendant, and not guilty on Count 2, for penetration of sexual organ of child.

HISTORY UNCOVERED ...

The 70's style façade of the Dayton Parker Pharmacy building has been removed and uncovered down to its original brick, now showing the name of Wynne Collier Druggist, as the renovation continues for Lynn County Hospital District's new fitness center on the square in Tahoka. Wynne Collier owned Collier Drug from 1936 until his death in 1964, at which time his wife Coye ran the store with Dayton Parker as pharmacist. Parker eventually bought the practice, and it became Dayton Parker Pharmacy in 1970, until December 2000 when it closed. This building was erected in 1916, after the original frame building in the same location was destroyed in the fire of December 1915 that destroyed many of Tahoka's downtown buildings. Before Wynne Collier, W.E. Gilmore and Son opened a drug store in the same location in 1903, and from 1906-1936 the drug store was called Thomas Brothers Drug. It was Thomas Brothers who built the current brick building after the fire of 1915. (LCN PHOTO by Juanell Jones)

NWS designates two county tornadoes as EF-2, EF-1 in last Sunday's storms

The National Weather Service in Lubbock released a public information statement last Thursday about two of last Sunday's tornadoes that caused property damage in Lynn County, rating the first one as an EF-2 that traveled north and east of Tahoka, and the second one as an EF-1 that was southeast of O'Donnell.

The Enhanced Fujita (EF) scale classifies tornadoes into the following categories:

- EF0: Weak, 65 to 85 MPH
- EF1: Weak, 86 to 110 MPH • EF2: Strong, 111 to 135 MPH
- EF3: Strong, 136 to 165 MPH
- EF4: Violent, 166 To 200 MPH

• EF5: Violent, >200 MPH

The EF-2 tornado, with estimated peak wind speeds of 120 mph, developed at 5:45 p.m. between New Home and Tahoka, a couple miles west of U.S. Highway 87. The path length of this tornado was 17.2 miles, with a width of 1.2 miles, from 5:55 p.m. until 6:50

The tornado crossed Highway 87 north of Tahoka at approximately 5:55 p.m., accompanied by very large hail, but minimal wind damage was observed along the highway, according to the report. The tornado increased in strength quickly as it moved south-southeast east of Highway 87, causing EF-2 damage to power poles approximately 2.7 miles N-NE of Tahoka.

The tornado crossed U.S. Highway 380 about 3 miles east of Tahoka around 6:05 p.m. The tornado caused EF-1 damage to a residence

along U.S. 380.

About a half mile south of the highway the tornado caused EF-1 to EF-2 damage to a manufactured home and farm equipment. The KLBB WSR-88D indicated about 40 to 55 kts low-level rotational velocity during this period.

By 6:30 p.m., the tornado and parent mesocyclone halted their S-SE motion and wobbled back to the west as indicated by the radar data and storm spotter/chaser video. The strength of the velocity couplet gradually decreased and by

about 6:50 p.m. no further reports of the tornado were received.

The second tornado, east of O'Donnell, was considered an EF-1, with estimated peak wind speeds of 90 mph, a path of 5.0 miles and path width of 0.5 miles, from 7:12 to 7:25 p.m.

Shortly after 7 p.m., the radar-observed mesocyclone began to strengthen in southeast Lynn County to the E-NE of O'Donnell. EF-1 tree damage was observed at a residence along FM 1054 south of the small community of Draw, TX, roughly coincident with peak low-level rotational velocities of about 50 kts from the KLBB WSR-88D. Lacking other damage indicators, the start and end times/locations of the second tornado were estimated by radar, according to the report.

Additional small tornadoes may have occurred with this supercell across southern and eastern portions of Lynn County, but no other reports of damage have been received by the National Weather Service.

SPAG program offers rebates for new storm cellars/safe rooms

Plains region, including Lynn constructed County, who build a new storm cellar or safe room on their residential property can apply for a 50% rebate of the eligible costs (up to a maximum rebate of \$3,000) through a program offered by SPAG.

The safe room rebates are funded through FEMA and the Texas Division of Emergency Management and administered locally by staff at the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG).

"We believe this is a great opportunity to help better prepare the residents of the South Plains to take shelter from potential storms, however, there are standards and guidelines to apply to participate in this program," said a SPAG representative.

This program is completely voluntary, and is not retroactive. Safe rooms installed prior to being accepted to participate in the SPAG Regional Safe Room Rebate Program are not eligible for a rebate.

Applicants must own their home and must pay the contractor/installer in full (out-ofpocket) to receive a 50% rebate of the eligible costs (up to a maximum rebate of \$3,000).

Homeowners who live in any of the 15 counties in the SPAG region are eligible to apply, including Lynn County. Homes located in a local or FEMA-designated floodplain are not eligible for the rebate

Safe-rooms may be installed above ground or underground, indoors and/or

Homeowners in the South outdoors, in existing or newly single-family homes, or manufactured homes. Proof of ownership documentation must be submitted along with an application packet to SPAG.

> Due to limited funding for this region, this rebate program is based on a first-come, first-serve basis. Builders, installers and manufacturers working on the project must comply with both FEMA guidance and ICC Standards of the Texas Residential Safe Rooms Rebate Program.
